Friday night tragedy...

Accident kills pedestrian on 191st Street

Friday night at approximately 11:43 p.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to the intersection of 191st Street and Golden Meadow Way in Noblesville in reference to a report of motor vehicle crash involving a pedestrian.

Based on witness statements and evidence at the scene, preliminary information suggests that a 2007 Buick Rendezvous was traveling westbound on 191st Street, near the intersection of Golden Meadow Way, when the crash occurred. Witnesses state that just prior to the crash, a pedestrian was near the westbound lane of travel of 191st Street and was struck by the Buick. After being struck by the Buick, evidence suggests that the pedestrian was struck a

second time by a 2000 Mercury Sable that was traveling eastbound on 191st Street. Both drivers stopped immediately and attempted to render aid.

The pedestrian suffered injuries as a result of the crash and was transported by ground ambulance to Riverview Health in Noblesville. The pedestrian was pronounced dead shortly after arriving at the hospital. The identity of the pedestrian is being withheld at this time until family notifications have been confirmed. An updated release will be provided once notifications have been made.

The driver of the Buick did not sustain any injuries; however was transported to Riverview Health for a check out. The driver has been identified as Amy C. Leap, 26, of

Noblesville. There were five additional passengers in the Buick but none of them sustained any injuries. The driver of the Mercury did not sustain any injuries. She has been identified as Gabrielle L. Shepherd, 22, of Noblesville.

Members of the Accident Reconstruction Unit were called to the scene to collect evidence and investigate the crash. 191st Street was closed between S.R. 37 and Golden Meadow Way for approximately three hours while investigators gathered information and spoke with witnesses. The case remains an ongoing investigation.

Gas leak briefly shuts down Lantern Road

A gas leak at the intersection of Lantern Road and Rexham Court in Fishers closed traffic on Lantern north of 131st Street Friday morning.

The leak was caused by utility construction. There were no evacuations from nearby residents or New Britton Elementary School, although it was recommended to the school that children be kept indoors until the leak was contained. Vectren was on the scene and in conjunction with firefighters, air monitoring is being conducted as safety precaution in affected area.

The leak was secured by 11 a.m., and Lantern Road was re-opened at that time.

Vibromatic still going strong

Vibromatic is located in a somewhat unassuming building way down on the far end of Noblesville's Southwest Quad.

But while the building's location may be low-key, Vibromatic's business is anything but.

The company has been part of the Noblesville landscape since 1956. It has stayed true to its roots after all these years, focusing on building automation equipment - vibratory feeders, as co-owner Bob Band calls it.

"Vibratory feeders, anywhere that our customer wants to introduce automation into his process," said Band. "We build the equipment that helps him do that."

Band is one of two co-owners of Vibromatic, which is located at 1301 S. Sixth St. The other is Doug Daubenspeck, a lifelong

resident of Noblesville and part of a family that has been in the Noblesville area since the 1840's. Daubenspeck said he is proud of the city's long history of manufacturing.

Band and Daubenspeck bought Vibromatic from its former owner (who had worked at the company since the 1950's) on July 31, 2013. Both men have been a part of

Downtown Noblesville accident injures Brownsburg man

Friday at approximately 11:17 a.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to the intersection of 8th and Logan Street in Noblesville in reference to a report of motor vehicle crash involving a pedestrian.

Based on witness statements and evidence at the scene, preliminary information suggests that a 2007 Ford Freestyle was traveling northbound on 8th Street and was attempting to turn westbound onto Logan Street when the crash occurred. Witnesses state that just prior to the crash, a pedestrian was walking northbound across Logan Street when the vehicle struck him. It appears that the pedestrian was walking within the boundaries of the designated crosswalk and was crossing in accordance with regulatory lights at the time of the crash.

The victim suffered injuries as a result of the crash and was transported by ground ambulance to I.U. Health Methodist Hospital (Indianapolis). His condition was unavailable at the time of this release. The pedestrian has been identified as Curtis T. Jones, 37, of Brownsburg.

The driver of the Ford did not sustain any injuries. The driver has been identified as Zoe L. Marks, 80, of Noblesville. There was an additional passenger in the vehicle and that person did not suffer any injuries either.

Members of the Accident Reconstruction Unit were called to the scene to collect evidence and investigate the crash. The intersection of 8th and Logan Street was closed for approximately an hour and a half while investigator gathered information and spoke with witnesses. The case remains an ongoing investigation. It does not appear that alcohol or weather was a factor.

Life jackets are not just for summer

As the weather cools, wearing an overcoat becomes a nearly automatic equipment choice for enjoying the outdoors.

At the same time, many people recreating around water seem to forget about wearing another, more vital type of jacket—a life jacket.

That's a mistake that can be life threatening during a season when many enjoy kayaking or canoeing, duck hunting from a johnboat, or taking a late-winter ice-fishing trip.

Water temperatures plummet, increasing the chance of hypothermia and the risk of drowning, particularly if a person goes overboard while not wearing a life jacket.

Indiana law requires all vessels to carry one wearable U.S. Coast Guard approved PFD (personal floatation device) for each person on board. In addition, vessels 16 feet in length or longer (except a canoe or kayak) must have one USCG-approved PFD on board and readily accessible.

Common sense, however, requires that you wear a life jacket at all times while on the water, no matter what the season.

"Cold water brings additional concerns to the recreating public," said Indiana Boating Law administrator Lt. Kenton Turner. "Life jackets are a yearlong priority and should be the first thought on everyone's mind when enjoying Indiana's waterways."

the company for years: Daubenspeck for 27 years, and Band for 18 years.

"We're really in a niche market," said Band. "We're doing very well. The economy is good, at least in our eyes right now."

"We're hiring, we're working with co-op programs at the high school for kids that have that desire to get into a skilled trade, perhaps, and not attend a traditional college."

Vibromatic has a good-sized work force, with Band said totals 24. Of those, he estimated that eight to 10 of them live in Noblesville. The company is one of several that are part of an industrial area in the Southwest Quad. Band said the companies in the area do help each other out.

"We definitely have a connection between Lusco, behind us," said Band. "We do things to try to help them out, they do things to try help us out. We kind of work together in that fashion. The fellow across the street gets a lot of automotive business out here. We've let him work on our trucks, our company trucks, our company fleet, things like that."

As for how Noblesville can help out local businesses - not just in the Southwest Quad, but all across the cities, Daubenspeck has a couple ideas.

"The City of Noblesville could help promote locally manufactured products es-

pecially Southwest Quad companies," said Daubenspeck. Doing so will help contribute substantially to this area of Noblesville and its long-term sustainability.

"Maybe come up with a Made In Noblesville initiative - and promote all the capacity of the local manufacturing sector to create jobs, create tax revenue and foster innovation. The city could build a website to help promote companies like Vibromatic to be found for new projects from not only local companies but for companies across the USA and globally. Local companies can always use the help of the city drive new business to our INBOX and opportunities to quote. Most of our work comes from out of state companies and more and more is coming from companies outside the USA."

One thing Band feels the city could do to help out the businesses - and this would help more than just them - is to maintain the roads in the Southwest Quad. Sixth Street gets beat up with all of the industrial activity around it, and Band said he personally feels "the city has forgotten that Sixth Street is here and part of it."

"They've repaved all of Eighth Street, and they're repaving all the roads there, but it seems like they've forgotten that there is something over here on the west side of those railroad tracks," said Band.

Members of the Noblesville Rotary visited North Elementary School on Friday for what has become an annual tradition: Giving out dictionaries to the school's third graders.

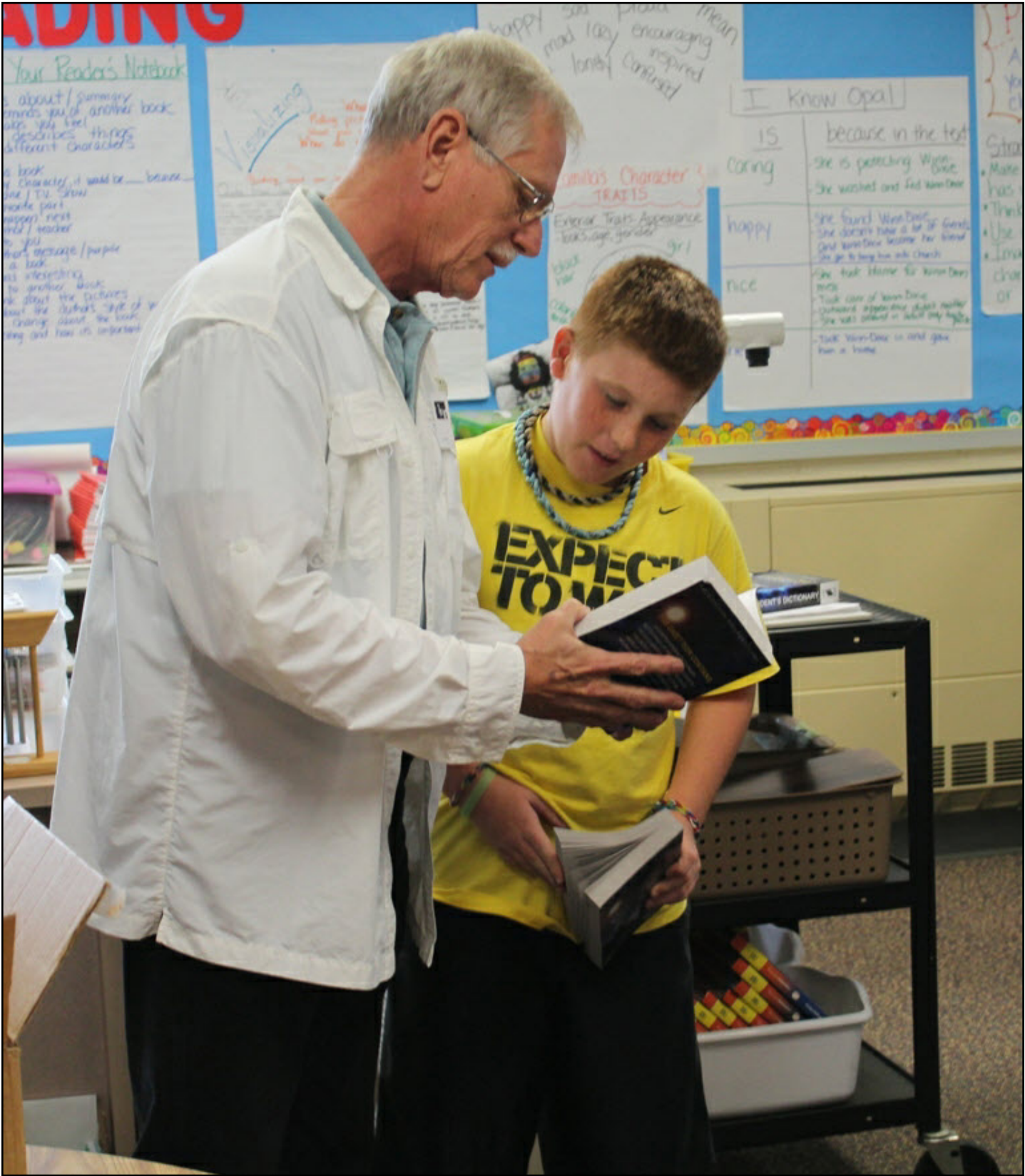
The Rotary participates as part of The Dictionary Project, which is a national organization dedicated to helping children learn by donating dictionaries. "

Millers win on the road in OT

With Toks Akinribade, the top running back in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference, in their backfield, one might have thought Brownsburg would go for two following scoring first in the overtime in a wild shootout with visiting Noblesville last evening.

Brownsburg didn't, electing to kick the extra point to take a 35-28 advantage.

When Noblesville countered with a touchdown of its own, there was no question, no second guessing in the mind of Miller coach Lance Scheib.

"On the road, we wanted to win the game right then," Scheib said.

The Noblesville coach used the best running quarterback in the conference. Luke Melloh successfully ran the two-pointer and the Millers came away with a huge 36-35 victory.

Before scoring the two-pointer, Melloh ran three consecutive plays, scoring on the third try.

"Same play four straight times (including the two-pointer), Melloh running behind Brandon Knight," Scheib said. "Our offensive line did a great job tonight."

That it did. The Millers rushed the football 48 times and collected 222 yards. They also passed for 148 yards.

Melloh carried the ball 19 times for 96 yards. Hayden Stinnett led the Millers in rushing with 116 yards in 21 carries. Melloh rushed for two touchdowns and Stinnett for one.

Through the air, Carl Hardy completed 8-f-9 passes for 107 yards and Melloh 3-of-10 for 41 yards

Brian McLean had four catches for 71 yards; Jarel Youree two for 11 yards; Joey Herron 1 for 43 yards and a TD, and Stinnett caught one ball for eight yards.

The defense, despite giving up 35 points, was outstanding in the victory.

"Their big back (Akinribade) is hands down the best and their quarterback is a stud," Scheib said. "Our linebackers did a great job, and also tonight, for the first time, we used Knight on defense."

The two teams fought back-and-forth throughout the evening. Noblesville led 6-0 after one quarter, 13-7 at halftime and 21-14 after three periods.

Noblesville almost pulled out the win in regulation play. Andrew Little just missed on a 35-yard field goal with two seconds left.

"He just did missed it," Scheib said. "It was a 35-yard try and the kick went 34 yards."

Stinnett got Noblesville's first touchdown, scoring in the first period on a five-yard run.

Noblesville went to the air in the second quarter. Hardy passed 43 yard to Herron. Little kicked the PAT.

In the third quarter, Melloh crossed the goal line on a one-yard run. Scheib went for two on this play and Youree zipped into the end zone.

Noblesville's defense got the Millers' fourth quarter touchdown. Hank Davis intercepted and returned the pigskin 34 yards for the TD and Little booted the extra point.

Following Brownsburg's go-ahead touchdown to open the overtime, the stage was set for Melloh and the junior quarterback did his thing, first on the TD run and then on the two-pointer.

Tigers dominate Shamrocks, 38-7

The Fishers student section had an "easy" button on display Friday night. Someone must have pushed it, because the Tigers had an easy win.

The Tigers jumped out to a 21-0 lead after the first quarter and never looked back, beating the Westfield 38-7 at Reynolds Tigers Stadium. Fishers improved to 6-2 overall, and remained in a tie for first place with Avon in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference standings. Both teams are 4-1 in the league. The Shamrocks dropped to 3-3 in the HCC and 4-4 overall.

There was no secret to the game: The Tigers played well in all aspects of the game. They scored points in every way possible, had several players step up offensively, and the defense was solid for the entire game.

"I thought our defense played great," said Fishers coach Rick Wimmer.

The Tigers started the game with a nice drive, scoring on their first series. Zach Eaton capped the drive with a 10-yard touchdown run. Anthony Beck made the extra point kick, his first on what would become a 5-for-5 night.

As the first quarter wound down, Fishers got two scores off of its defense. The Tigers forced Westfield into a three-and-out, and the Shamrocks punted the ball away. Josh Lloyd got a hold of it, and started returning

- and didn't stop until he reached the end zone. The total was 72 yards.

"We were actually going for a block on that, but Josh made a couple guys miss early, and then got some blocks later down the field, and that was certainly the big play," said Wimmer.

R.J. Potts made another big play just a few seconds later. He intercepted Westfield's first pass of its new drive, and took it 22 yards into the end zone. Just like that, the score was 21-0 Fishers.

Eaton was responsible for both of the Tigers' second-quarter touchdowns. He threw a 15-yard pass to Gino Castellani with 4:17 left in the half, then snuck the ball in from the 1 at the 30-second mark. Eaton had an efficient night, completing nine of 13 passes for 117 yards.

"Zach's really helped us as a quarterback in balancing our offense," said Wimmer.

Beck nailed a 30-yard field goal in the third quarter, the only points of that period.

Maurice Campbell was again the Tigers' leading rusher, with 126 yards in 21 carries. Wimmer noted that this was the seventh straight game where Campbell has gained more than 100 yards, and said that "speaks volumes" about Fishers' offensive line.

Westfield got on the board midway through the fourth quarter, as Ryan Pepiot took the ball in from 14 yards. Nick Dowd made the extra point kick. Pepiot finished with 127 rushing yards on the night.

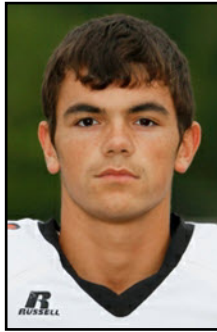
