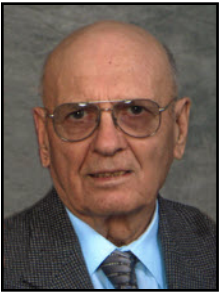

I still remember the days when South Side Park served as one of the major areas for youth baseball in Noblesville. Again, long before Bobby Mills pulled off his dream.

What the Southwest Quad needs today. A community center, all its own.

It could be built at South Side Park, a perfect location. There still is a baseball diamond there, for kids in the neighborhood. An outdoor, lighted basketball court would be nice. A splash area would be great. And, of course, the community building, which could include meeting rooms, party rooms, a small indoor gym, etc. A place for community leaders to meet and talk and act.

The Boys & Girls Club could come in and offer programming. So could the Noblesville Parks Department. Programs, yes, for kids, but also programs for adults.

The City should take the lead in building such a facility. City money would be needed. But, a community center also could be a project for the neighborhood. A project for a healthy industrial area in the Southwest Quad. A project for the Parks Department. A project for the Boys & Girls Club. A project for all of Noblesville to fund.

A community center could bring about many of the ideas discussed in the first two meetings.

- \*Facilitate investment in the neighborhood.
- \*Create sustainable environment.
- \*Encourage social connectivity.
- \*Embrace the uniqueness of the SW Quad.
- \*Improve the environment to create a healthier neighborhood.
- \*Initiate neighborhood beautification projects.

It will take the City leadership to pull off such a project. The City shouldn't expect the Southwest Quad to take the lead, no more than the west side of Noblesville to take the lead in the proposed Federal Hill Park or for the east side to take the lead in a proposed new park in that area.

It is time that the City does something big for the Southwest Quad. The community center would be the answer.

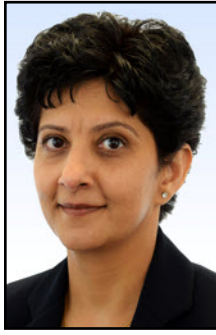

## Holiday sales likely to increase by four percent

Holiday retail sales are likely to be about four percent higher than they were last year, says Richard Feinberg, a Purdue University professor of retail management.

Total holiday spending is predicted to be close to \$986 billion, he says. Surveys show that shoppers are likely to spend an average of \$650 to \$725 on gifts.

In 2013, holiday spending increased 2.8 percent over a year earlier.

Feinberg warns that geopolitical crises and public health concerns could lower consumer confidence and increase cautiousness about spending if those stories remain in the news.

Some other observations on the 2014 holiday retail season:

- While sales are likely to increase, so are the number of retailers and Internet sites available to consumers. That will dilute any increase for many retailers, Feinberg says.
- Most of the non-luxury, large retailers will appeal to consumers' prime moti-

vation: price. That means heavy promotions and constant sales. The main issue is that wage growth has been flat to low for most consumers, and increasing health care costs have offset low inflation. Flash and limited-time sales will be used by a majority of retailers because they create a sense of urgency and they work.

- Late-night and even 24-hour shopping has become so prevalent that many retailers now feel they have to be open nearly all the time to keep up with the competition, Feinberg says.

-Black Friday is now Black November, Feinberg says. Retailers no longer wait for the Friday after Thanksgiving to launch big door-buster sales. A dollar spent on holiday gifts in the first week in November in a store is a dollar that another retailer cannot get in the third week of November.

Still, 75 percent of consumers say they will shop on Black Friday, either in traditional stores or online.

## Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation receives national recognition

Nearly 70 percent of Carmel/Clay Township households visit the Monon Community Center and The Waterpark, explaining why annual membership and pass attendance exceeds 500,000. # MIC title, undefeated season

As good as the Carmel football program has been down through the years, here are a couple of numbers Greyhound fans may want to consider.

\*Carmel hasn't produced an undefeated regular season since 1986.

\*In the 17 years the Greyhounds have played in the Metropolitan Conference, only once has Carmel won the championship outright. That was in the season of 2009. Carmel has tied for the title three other times.

This Friday at Carmel Stadium, those numbers could change. With a victory over conference newcomer Lawrence Central, Carmel will finish the regular season at 9-0 and will win the championship outright with a 7-0 record.

Easier said than done, perhaps.

For one thing, Carmel is coming off its two biggest wins of the season, victories over Ben Davis and Warren Central. The Greyhounds will have to return to earth very quickly.

Plus, Lawrence Central has got to be better than its 3-5 record. There is too much talent on this LC team for the Bears to have won just three games.

Those three victories have been over MIC foes Lawrence North 51-13, Pike 45-35, and North Central 37-0. The Bears have lost to Avon 38-31 Cleveland St.

Ignatius 28-21, Warren Central 41-22, Center Grove 49-31 and Ben Davis 50-36.

Although allowing 31.8 points a game, Lawrence Central is scoring at a 34.3 clip. For good reasons, too. LC has a quarterback, Brian Haas, who has completed 106-of-196 passes for 1,327 yards. LC has seven receivers in double digit catches, led by Gennaro Penn with 23 for 549 yards.

LC has a running back, Gerrid Doaks, who has carried 168 times for 986 yards.

Lawrence Central's problem is not with its offense.

Also, Carmel has some injuries, the biggest one being quarterback Michael Viktrup. He is the second-leading ground gainer with 546 yards in 73 carries. That's an impressive 7.5 yards per carry. He also has completed 52-of-80 passes for 567 yards, and has been intercepted just two times.

Carmel beat Warren Central last week without Viktrup. Coach Kevin Wright said he will not play in the next two games, against Lawrence Central on Friday and at Noblesville in the opening round of the sectional next week.

But, it isn't as if Carmel is replacing Viktrup with a junior varsity backup. At quarterback at Warren last week was Isaac James, and James also will be behind center this week.

"James led us to the state championship game last year," Wright pointed out.

This season James had been used as a wide-out, where he has caught 24 passes for 162 yards. Now filling the that position is a sophomore, Jalen Walker, who has 16 catches for 174 yards and two touchdowns.

Wright likes the way James led Carmel to a pair of first quarter touchdowns at Warren Central, including an 81-yard TD pass to Collin Pearson. It was Pearson's first catch of the season.

"I think that pass caught Warren Central by surprise," said Wright. "They had given up just three points in the first quarter throughout the season. We wanted to come out quick, and we did.

"It was a big win for us on the road," Wright continued. "They had won 14 straight games (including the state championship win over Carmel last season).

Our kids just went out and found a way to win."

Of late, Carmel has been running the football. Without Viktrup throwing passes, that ground attack likely will continue this week.

Carmel has three healthy Greyhounds to do the job, plus one of the best offensive lines in the state. Shakir Paschall has carried 134 times for 578 yards; Chris Perkins 89 times for 489 yards and James 49 times for 307 yards.

The Greyhounds have rushed for 25 touchdowns, including seven by Paschall and five by Perkins. Carmel has passed for just eight touchdowns, two by James.

Carmel's defense has gotten better and better. In the last three weeks in games against North Central, Ben Davis and Warren Central, the Greyhounds have allowed a total of just three touchdowns.

Leading that defense in tackles with 61 is Ryan Smith. Alex Osleger has 54. Osleger leads the team in tackles for losses with 10 and Noah Burks has nine.

Logan Burgess has 4.5 sacks and Alex Schmitt has 3.5.

## Volleyball Pairings Released for 43rd State Tournament

With 397 teams entered along with 5,592 participants, initial matchups for the 43rd Annual IHSAA Volleyball State Tournament were announced this morning.

Sectional play begins on Tuesday, Oct. 21, and continues through Saturday, Oct. 25, at 64 sites across the four enrollment classifications.

Those sectional champions will advance to a one-match regional on the home court of one of the participating teams on Tuesday, Oct. 28, to be followed by a four-team semi-state on Saturday, Nov. 1. The four state championship matches at Ball State University's Worthen Arena are scheduled for Saturday, Nov. 8.

The four top-ranked teams in last week's from the Indiana Coaches of Girls Sports Association and

IndianaPrepVolleyball.com headline this year's field. In Class A, No. 1 Wes-Del will take on Daleville in Sectional 55 at Cowan. In Class 2A, top-ranked and defending state champion Providence drew into the bye match against town rival Clarksville in Sectional 46 at Henryville. In 3A, No. 1 Mishawaka Marian will host Jimtown in the Sectional 19 opener for the second year in a row. And in Class 4A, top-ranked Roncalli will face Center Grove, another top five team, in the bye match in Sectional 13 at Franklin Community.

Avon, the two-time defending Class 4A state champion, will take a 14-match tournament winning streak into its first round contest against Terre Haute North in Sectional 12 at Mooresville. In Class 3A, defending champ Brebeuf Jesuit will meet host New Palestine in the Sectional 26 opener. And defending Class A champion Barr-Reeve will take on rival and host Loogootee in Sectional 23.

Westfield will host the Class 4A sectional involving Hamilton County's big schools. Play opens on Tuesday with Noblesville taking on Fishers. ### About the Draw

To conduct the random drawing for the volleyball state tournament, the IHSAA places ping-pong balls representing

each school in a given sectional into a lottery-style air mix machine. A fan in the bottom of the machine blows the balls around the inside of the transparent container and air then forces each ball up through a tube in random order. For example, the first ball retrieved from the machine will be the visiting team in match one with the second ball representing the home team in match one. The third ball to come out is the visitor in match two and the fourth ball the home team in match two. That same method is followed through all 64 sectionals as well as the semi-state round.

# ‘Hounds prepare for another state appearance

Carmel's Todd Witsken Tennis Center will be hosting a couple boys tennis state quarter-final matches on Friday, but the Greyhounds team won't be playing there.

Instead, the top-ranked Carmel team will travel to No. 4 Center Grove for their match, taking on the host Trojans. Don't read too much into this, it's simply the luck of the draw, as Center Grove will also be the site of another quarter-final match-up Friday afternoon.

All of Friday's matches begin at 3 p.m. The winners will travel to North Central's Barbara Wynne Tennis Center Saturday morning for the 10 a.m. semi-finals, with the championship match at 2 p.m.

This is the fifth year in a row and the 11th overall that Carmel will be playing at the big meet.

"Every time is special," said Greyhounds coach Mike Bostic. "Every time I'm fortunate enough to go to it, it feels like the first time, because it's a different year, it's a different group of kids, it's a different road to state and it's always special."

Carmel's road is through the northern part of the state. The Greyhounds beat eighth-ranked Penn 5-0 to win a championship at the Culver Academy semi-state, winning all five matches in straight sets.

Bostic said it wasn't easy. "We played well," said the coach. "They put up a good fight. They're very well-coached, they get fired up and they came out playing really well."

Carmel trailed early in its singles matches, with No. 1 singles Nick Werner trailing 4-1 in the first set, and John Armstrong and Azad Koya down 2-1 at Nos. 2 and 3 singles respectively.

"It was a wake-up call," said Bostic. "We were ready to play, it was semi-state, but Penn was excellent. So we had to fight back."

Carmel hasn't dropped any matches in the post-season. Neither has Center Grove, which has played at its own courts all through the tournament. The Trojans beat No. 17 Franklin Community, Greenwood and Whiteland to win the sectional, Shelbyville and Perry Meridian to win the regional, and Richmond to win semi-state. The Red Devils actually had to play their regional championship (a 3-2 win over Batesville) and the semi-state on the same day after weather postponed that final to Saturday morning.

Center Grove is 19-3, while the Greyhounds are 19-0. Carmel is one of two undefeated teams at state. Delta is the other one at 24-0; the No. 9 Eagles will take on Culver Academies in their quarter-final match. Culver is the only unranked team at state. Everyone else is in the top nine in the coaches poll.

# ECHL releases revised schedule, alignment

The ECHL announced Monday a series of changes to the league’s 2014-15 schedule, resulting from the ECHL’s consolidation with the former Central Hockey League (CHL) and the addition of seven new member clubs for the 2014-15 campaign. The ECHL also announced this week the league’s new alignment and playoff format for the upcoming season. The Indy Fuel will see only two opponents and no dates or game times altered by the schedule changes.

On October 24<sup>th</sup>, the Fuel’s opponent for Susan G. Komen Central Indiana’s “Pink in the Rink” Night will change from the Toledo Walleye to Fuel Head Coach and Vice President of Hockey Operations Scott Hillman’s former club, the Missouri Mavericks. Then, on January 23<sup>rd</sup>, the Fuel’s home game vs. the Elmira Jackals will now be played vs. the Allen Americans. The Fuel’s road schedule will not be impacted by the ECHL’s schedule changes.

Additionally this season, the Fuel will shift from the five-team Midwest Division in the Western Conference to the seven-team North Division in the Eastern Conference alongside the Cincinnati Cyclones, Evansville IceMen, Fort Wayne Komets, Kalamazoo Wings, Toledo Walleye and Wheeling Nailers. The ECHL’s Eastern Conference will also be home to the seven-team East Division featuring

the Elmira Jackals, Florida Everblades, Greenville Road Warriors, Gwinnett Gladiators, Orlando Solar Bears, Reading Royals and South Carolina Stingrays.

Meanwhile, the ECHL’s Western Conference includes the Central Division, comprised of the seven recently added, former-CHL clubs, the Allen Americans, Brampton Beast, Missouri Mavericks, Quad City Mallards, Rapid City Rush, Tulsa Oilers and Wichita Thunder. Additionally, the seven-team Pacific Division will include the Alaska Aces, Bakersfield Condors, Colorado Eagles, Idaho Steelheads, Ontario Reign, Stockton Thunder and Utah Grizzlies.

The ECHL’s 2015 Kelly Cup playoffs will see the top four teams in each division qualify for the postseason with all four playoff rounds contested in a best-of-seven format. The first two rounds of the playoffs will be played entirely within the division with the division winner meeting the fourth-place finisher and the second-place finisher meeting the team that finished in third place in the Division Semifinals. The Division Finals will pit the winner of each series against each other. The winner of the North Division Finals will meet the winner of the East Division Finals in the Eastern Conference Finals while the winner of the Central Division Finals will meet the winner of the Pacific Division Finals in the Western Conference Finals. The 2015 Kelly

Cup Finals will see the Eastern Conference champion take on the Western Conference champion.

Next up for the Fuel, it’s the team’s inaugural ECHL regular season game, set for 7:35 pm at the Fairgrounds Coliseum on Friday, October 17<sup>th</sup> vs. the Fort Wayne Komets.
