

The City defines the area as being bordered by Maple Avenue on the north; 8th Street on the east,

Christian Avenue on the south, and White River on the

Before the first meeting was held, the City said the goal was a revitalization plan that neighborhood leaders can use to strengthen a historic and vibrant area of Noblesville.

Neighborhood folks have been given an opportunity to kick around ideas with City leaders. The mayor, council members and other city leaders have been present to listen.

The idea I get from listening to residents is that they hope the City does more than just listen. And, while they are willing to jump in and help, many of the residents I've talked with feel as if they can accomplish very little without the City leading the way.

New streets and sidewalks, for sure. Building new sidewalks in certain section of the Southwest Quad already is underway.

The City needs to use its powers in cleaning up certain areas, both residential and former locations left behind of businesses.

The City has done much to help improve 8th Street ... with new businesses; by beautifying the area; by making for a better traffic flow on 8th

But, it can be debated if 8th Street is a true part of the Quad. In fact, 8th Street and the railroad kind of separates, kind of isolates the rest of Noblesville from the Southwest Ouad.

What the City needs to give to the area, I believe, is a community center. A place of pride for the neighborhood. A place for a neighborhood to organize. A place for the residents, young and old,

A place for senior citizens to meet. A place for kids to play. A place for adults to enjoy.

I grew up on, I guess I could claim, the doorstep of the Southwest Quad. The Jellisons lived on Maple Avenue, about as far west as one could live without owning a houseboat on White River.

I still remember the time when my Dad and other parents in the area turned the northeast corner of the cemetery into a baseball diamond. It was the pride of the area. Kids formed teams from all over the south side and came to play at our diamond.



A splash area would be great. And, of course, the community building, which could include meeting rooms, party rooms, a small indoor gym, etc. A place for community leaders to meet and talk and act.

The Boys & Girls Club could come in and offer programming. So could the Noblesville Parks Department. Programs, yes, for kids, but also programs for adults.

The City should take the lead in building such a facility. City money would be needed. But, a community center also could be a project for the neighborhood. A project for a healthy industrial area in the Southwest Quad. A project for the Parks Department. A project for the Boys & Girls Club. A project for all of Noblesville to fund.

A community center could bring about many of the ideas discussed in the first two meetings

- \*Facilitate investment in the neighborhood.
- \*Create sustainable environment.
- \*Encourage social connectivity.
- \*Embrace the uniqueness of the SW Quad.
- \*Improve the environment to create a healthier neighborhood.

\*Initiate neighborhood beautification projects.

It will take the City leadership to pull off such a project. The City shouldn't expect the Southwest Quad to take the lead, no more than the west side of Noblesville to take the lead in the proposed Federal Hill Park or for the east side to take the lead in a proposed new park in that area.

It is time that the City does something big for the Southwest Quad. The community center would be the answer.



## 'Hounds prepare for another state appearance

Carmel's Todd Witsken Tennis Center will be hosting a couple boys tennis state quarter-final matches on Friday, but the Greyhounds team won't be playing there.

Instead, the top-ranked Carmel team will travel to No. 4 Center Grove for their match, taking on the host Trojans. Don't read too much into this, it's simply the luck of the draw, as Center Grove will also be the site of another quarter-final match-up Friday afternoon.

All of Friday's matches begin at 3 p.m. The winners will travel to North Central's Barbara Wynne Tennis Center Saturday morning for the 10 a.m. semi-finals, with the championship match at 2 p.m.

This is the fifth year in a row and the 11th overall that Carmel will be playing at the big meet.

"Every time is special," said Greyhounds coach Mike Bostic. "Every time I'm fortunate enough to go to it, it feels like the first time, because it's a different year, it's a different group of kids, it's a different road to state and it's always special."

Carmel's road is through the northern part of the state. The Greyhounds beat eighth-ranked Penn 5-0 to win a championship at the Culver Academy semi-state, winning all five matches in straight sets.

Bostic said it wasn't easy.

"We played well," said the coach. "They put up a good fight. They're very well-coached, they get fired up and they came out playing really well."

Carmel trailed early in its singles matches, with No. 1 singles Nick Werner trailing 4-1 in the first set, and John Armstrong and Azad Koya down 2-1 at Nos. 2 and 3 singles respectively.

"It was a wake-up call," said Bostic.
"We were ready to play, it was semi-state, but Penn was excellent. So we had to fight

back."

Carmel hasn't dropped any matches in the post-season. Neither has Center Grove, which has played at its own courts all through the tournament. The Trojans beat No. 17 Franklin Community, Greenwood and Whiteland to win the sectional, Shelbyville and Perry Meridian to win the regional, and Richmond to win semi-state. The Red Devils actually had to play their regional championship (a 3-2 win over Batesville) and the semi-state on the same day after weather postponed that final to Seturday morning.

Center Grove is 19-3, while the Greyhounds are 19-0. Carmel is one of two undefeated teams at state. Delta is the other one at 24-0; the No. 9 Eagles will take on Culver Academies in their quarter-final match. Culver is the only unranked team at state.
