


Temporary traffic restrictions at **Cherry Street, SR 37**

The City of Noblesville has announced that as part of the improvement work to Cherry Street east of State Road 37, temporary traffic restrictions will be-

gin next Monday, October 20th. Beginning on Monday morning, Cherry Street between Cumberland Road and State Road 37 will be closed to traffic. Vehicles travelling on State Road 37 (both north and south) will not be permitted to turn west onto Cherry Street. Vehicles travelling east on Cherry Street will not be permitted to drive past Cumberland Road

These traffic restrictions are scheduled to last two weeks; however, if the project is completed sooner than expected then the restrictions will be lifted at

Dismissals of drug charges

The Hamilton County Reporter has learned that at least four of the defendants charged in a drug investigation by the United States Drug Enforcement Administration and the Hamilton/Boone County Drug Task Force have filed motions to have those charges dismissed.

The requests for dismissal have been filed in Hamilton County Superior Court 1 for:

Dr. Larry J. Ley, Noblesville; filed on Oct. 9.

Eric W. Ley, Noblesville; filed on Oct. 8.

Derek Tislow, Avon; filed on Oct. 9

Andrew Dollard, Carmel attorney; filed on Oct.9.

"There are others (who have filed)," said Tammy Bennett of Superior Court 1. "Seems as if another is being filed every day." Bennett said Superior Court 1 Judge Steve Nation has given the dismissal was not immediately available to The Reporter.

Other defendants charged on July 25, a list provided to The Reporter, included:

The charges against each individual, as given to The Reporter by the State of Indiana, include "a count of Conspiracy to Commit Dealing in Schedule III control substance, and arise out of the activities of the Drug & Opate Recovery Network or Living Life Clean organizations having locations in Carmel, Noblesville, Kokomo, Centerville and Muncie."

Indianapolis Regional Airport completes runway extension

In a noteworthy achievement for capital projects, the multi-year project to extend the main runway and Taxiway A at the Indianapolis Regional Airport has been completed not only ahead of schedule, but at less expense than anticipated. The 500foot addition also involved the relocation of navigational aids to accommodate the lengthened runway and allow an Instrument anapolis International Airport, Indianapolis Landing System (ILS) option to remain for the approach to Runway 25. ILS-equipped runways allow precision approaches to continue during low-visibility weather conditions

Now at 6,002 feet in length, Runway 7-25 is longer than runways used at some U.S. airports for scheduled commercial jet operations. More importantly, the extension means more payload flexibility for aircraft

operators using Indianapolis Regional, enhancing the airport's ability to support the region's general aviation needs. By making Indianapolis Regional more competitive, the project, which supported an estimated 60 local jobs, will also result in an increase to the airport's annual economic impact to the region of more than \$6 million.

Serving as a reliever airport to the Indi-Regional accommodates approximately 130 general aviation takeoffs and landings per day, and more than 140 aircraft are based there. In addition to offering existing hangars for rent, the airport also encourages the private development of new hangars through an incentive program. Bennett said it was her understanding that because the defendants are being represented by different attorneys, each request will be treated individually.

When The Reporter originally broke the story of the arrests, the newspaper also was given by the State investigation background on Dr. Larry Ley and attorney Andrew Dollard, who in the last election ran and was defeated for the office of Hamilton County Council.

Dollard has since provided The Reporter his request to Superior Court 1 for dismissal. In The Reporter's own investigation of Dr. Ley in July it was discovered that Ley had purchased one of the historical "Craycraft homes" in the "Old Town" district on Conner Street in Noblesville. He had added parking and done work inside to prepare the house for offices.

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


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Fall leaf colors mostly on schedule, but rainy weather taking toll

The fall color display for trees is on schedule across most of Indiana, although recent cool, rainy and windy weather is likely to slow the color change and knock leaves from trees, according to DNR community and urban forester Carrie Tauscher.

The result could be a shorter viewing season.

"Across Indiana, we're seeing yellows and oranges now," Tauscher said. "Tulip poplar sycamore, sweetgum, cottonwood and some of the understory trees like sasafrass are starting to turn and give some great gold colors"

Tauscher said sugar maples will come into full color along with the oaks between now and early November.

Leaves produce pigments that give them color. During spring and summer, the green pigment, chlorophyll, is dominant. When days become shorter, other pigments in the leaf become visible as the amount of chlorophyll dwindles.

Best fall color formation happens when there are bright, warm days, cool nights and moist soils.

"With the cold rainy days we've had recently I'm hoping for some sunny, relatively warm days to start pushing color," Tauscher said.

In southern Indiana, conditions are different. Tauscher said less rain earlier in the season has resulted in drier soils, accelerating and slightly diminishing the color change. Nonetheless, tourists and communities that depend on leaf viewing shouldn't worry. The fall color each year is something different and special, she said.

"They're still going to have nice color," Tauscher said. "Madison and other communities that promote tourism will still be beautiful."

While enjoying Indiana's fall foliage, Hoosiers should consider planting trees on their properties. Order forms are now available for ordering tree seedlings from Indiana's state nurseries for spring delivery. The trees are available at a nominal cost for reforestation purposes, with 100 trees being a minimum order. For more information, visit dnr.IN.gov/forestry.





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


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Find everything deer related on new Web page

Deer.dnr.IN.gov, is a one-stop-shop for information on deer hunting, deer biology, how to respond to nuisance deer, the state's deer management strategy, scientific reports on topics such as harvest trends and disease, and more.

"Whether you're getting into deer hunting, need to keep them out of your garden, or just found an 'abandoned' fawn, this will be your place to go," said Falyn Owens, a deer research biologist with the DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife.

Urban deer hunting season and archery deer season are already underway, and firearms season begins Nov. 15.

Hunters can use the Web page to research licensing requirements and regulations, download a permission form for hunting on private land, learn how to donate venison, and watch videos on tree stand safety, meat preparation and recipes.

Power winning at an impressive clip

1. Inside the numbers - Power wins at impressive clip: Over the last five years, no driver has won more Indy car races than Will Power.

Twenty of the Australian's 24 career Indy car wins have come since he joined Team Penske as a full-time Verizon IndyCar Series driver in 2010.

Power's five-year rise from race winner to title contender, and finally, the Verizon IndyCar Series champion, is impressive and so is his winning percentage over that time - 23.256 percent.

Power's winning percentage stacks up favorably against the greats of the sport.

A.J. Foyt, who holds the all-time record for victories in Indy car history with 67, won at an 18 percent clip. Power, for his part, has won 24 out of the 139 times he's strapped into an Indy car - 17.26 percent of the races he's started.

Power's winning percentage isn't unparalleled among his contemporaries, though.

Sebastien Bourdais' domination of the Champ Car World Series from 2004-2007 resulted in 31 wins over 69 starts (nearly 45 percent), and even with one win since his full-time return to Indy car racing, the Frenchman's winning percentage remains close to 25 percent -- which is on par with the PGA winning percentage of Tiger Woods.

2. Hinchcliffe takes Deadmau5 for ride on IMS Road Course: An average work day for James Hinchcliffe and Joel Zimmerman, a progressive house music producer known as Deadmau5, is anything but average.

On Oct. 15, Zimmerman got a chance to compare the two, when he traded his iconic mouse-style headdress called "mau5head" for a racing helmet and Hinchcliffe took him for a high-speed ride through the esses of the 14-turn road course at Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

"Hinch knows this track like the back of his hand," Zimmerman said. "He knows the brake points and when to stretch. This was nutty."

Despite both Hinchcliffe and Zimmerman being natives of Toronto, it wasn't until their meeting at a rainy

Canadian hometown - that the 27-year-old racing driver and the 33-year-old musician were formally introduced.

While this wasn't Zimmerman's first time in the Indy car 2-seater, having taken a ride on the Streets of Toronto prior to the Honda Indy Toronto, this time he felt the rhythm of racing.

"In drummer territory, you have to keep the time," he said. "You have to be on it. You have to meet certain cues."

Though this concept is comparable to motorsports, there are major differences for a typical day on the job for Hinchcliffe, vs. one for Zimmerman: If Zimmerman messes up while working on a music track, it's safe to start over. But if Hinchcliffe slips up on track, it can be dangerous - a detail not missed by Zimmerman.

"The screams weren't too distracting," joked Hinchcliffe, "Joel's been in quick cars before so he has an appreciation for what we're doing here. In the wet it gives you a whole different perspective. The risks you have to take in the wet are much greater."

But Hinchcliffe played it safe and after four fast laps through the Grand Prix of Indianapolis course, Zimmerman jumped out of the car with a huge grin and a jolt of adrenaline.

"Are you going to brake or what?" said Zimmerman about Hinchcliffe's reaction time. "You have to know the absolute latest moment that you can slam on your brakes. It's really about timing. As he told me, every millisecond counts."

3. Hunter-Reay to be inducted in Broward Sports Hall of Fame: Ryan Hunter-Reay is a Verizon IndyCar Series champion and Indianapolis 500 winner.

Later this month, he'll add another title - Broward Sports Hall of Famer.

The Verizon IndyCar Series standout, a lifelong resident of Fort Lauderdale, will be inducted into the Broward County Sports Hall of Fame on Oct. 28 alongside

Indianapolis Motor Speedway - nearly 600 miles from the Olympic champion Sanya Richards-Ross and Pro Football Hall of Famer Dwight Stephenson among others.

> The Broward County Sports Hall of Fame recognizes coaches, athletes and pioneers who are, or have been, Broward County residents. Past members include Dara Torres, Chris Evert, Whitey Ford, H. Wayne Huizenga and Dan Marino.

4. Bell hosts weekly series of athlete tests: Indy car racer and NBCSN Verizon IndyCar Series analyst Townsend Bell is the host of "What'Cha Got" -- seven weekly episodes airing Sundays during ESPN FC on ESPN2.

The short episodes feature six MLS players swapping their daily rides for a turn behind the wheel of a Lamborghini on a circuit in the parking lot of an MLS stadium. The Eastern and Western Conference players with the best time will compete in the final, airing Dec. 7, with a year-long lease of the Lamborghini as the prize.

5. Four karters selected for USF2000 test day: Four finalists from a group of 12 karters have been named to the inaugural Mazda Road to Indy and MAXSpeed Group Driver Advancement Program.

The drivers are each awarded a one-day Cooper Tires USF2000 Championship Powered by Mazda test Jan. 28 at Homestead-Miami Speedway, with the support of both Mazda Road to Indy and MAXSpeed Group personnel.

Selected by a panel of judges were Oliver Askew, 17, of Tequesta, Fla.; Christian Brooks, 14, of Santa Clarita, Calif.; Sabre Cook, 19, of Grand Junction, Colo.; and Austin Versteeg, 15, of Sandy, Utah. All are competitors in the United States Rotax MAX Challenge program.

"Karting is such an important element to the health and growth of motorsport in North America," said Verizon IndyCar Series driver James Hinchcliffe, who was a member of the judging panel along with Indy Lights champion Gabby Chaves. "The talent pool was deep and all of them should be proud of what they have accomplished and of making it into the finals."
