Many of the cities and townships in the county are also granting funds to some or all these non-profit services.

If you wonder why county money should go to these private organizations, think of it this way: If these groups were not addressing the needs of the dependent elderly, the handicapped, the abused, youngsters with problems and even unwanted domestic animals then the government would end up having to tend to these needs directly.

So, for those who feel the government has control of too many social programs already, then why not let private charitable groups do some of this work with some public financial aid?

Seems like a logical approach, and by the way each of these organizations hustles constantly to raise a lot of their own money through fundraisers, donations and fees.

It might be a good idea if other levels of government The next largest recipient of local tax money is Janus Humane Society, \$94,000, which shelters homeless pets; would try harder to use this approach for some of the services they develop and control.

World class diver to compete for Heights

There is a new class diver who will participate in Hamilton County at Hamilton Heights High School this coming season.


She began competitive diving in 008 at the age of nine, competing in her first Junior Nationals in 2009 and her first Senior Nationals in 2011.





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

Noblesville falls 21-16...

Millers fight until the end with Avon

Noblesville never gave up against Avon Friday night.

The Millers fought until the end, and played well against the red-hot Orioles, who came flying into Hare Chevrolet Field with a four-game winning streak.

But Avon rode a 200-plus yard performance from its star running back to a 21-16 victory over Noblesville.
