"We probably have more on the table right now than any time I've been a County Commissioner," Steve Dillinger told the Hamilton County Reporter in a recent interview.

Dillinger represents the Town of Fishers, City of Noblesville, and Delaware and Noblesville Townships. Christine Altman represents the City of Carmel and Clay Township. Mark Heirbrandt represents Adams, Fall Creek, Jackson, Washington, Wayne and White River Townships and the municipalities of Arcadia, Atlanta, Cicero, Sheridan and Westfield.

Serving as County Commissioner is no easy job. Nor is it a part time job. Certainly so in this day and age, here in Hamilton

At the joint meeting with the County Council, the Commissioners said if there is not a change by the State Legislation the County may not move forward with this project at this time.

We are in the process of hiring a construction manager to help us along with this project," Dillinger said. "We've got the money, but after \$12 million the State Legislation won't let us use it."

At the meeting, County Council president Rick McKinney asked what offices will be put in the expansion. County Attorney Mike Howard replied the first floor will be the auditor, assessor, treasurer and recorder. Councilman Rick Ayers said he does not see the value of moving all of the Assessor's office to downtown Noblesville. Altman replied almost every assessing function can be done online.

Another item of concern is the County becoming a part of building a pubic safety training facility, located on the west side of Noblesville and east side of Westfield.

"We're getting a lot of pressure from fire chiefs and police chiefs to do something," said Dillinger. "Such a facility would save the cost of sending our people elsewhere for training, and, we're told, will become a revenue raiser for us with other areas coming to train here."

At the time of the meeting, the Commissioners said the training center was "third or fourth on the list of priorities.

Another project brought into the discussion was a domestic violence shelter in Hamilton County. Altman reported this is "not a dead issue," even though the group Alternatives pulled out.

There also is a need, the Commissioners told the Council, for more space at the County Jail. A change in the law means that the County will need to house more "D" felons after July 1, 2015. The State is supposed to be sending money for this project, but no one seems to know if that will be for capital expenses. The County is budgeting \$50,000 for a study to finish the third floor on the Community Corrections building.

"All of these projects are valued," Dillinger said. "But, the county is like schools, businesses, residents, we have only so much money in our budget."



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

Five county schools stopped in conference chases

Entering Friday's regular season finales, six of Hamilton County's eight football teams still were in the running for conference championships. Guerin Catholic is not in a conference, and Westfield was out of the picture in the Hoosier Crossroads.

Only Carmel, playing in the Metropolitan Conference, came away with a trophy.

The Greyhounds defeated Lawrence Central, 27-20, to finish 7-0 in the MIC.

Playing in the conference for 18 years, this is only the second time for Carmel to outright capture the championship. The other time was in 2009. Carmel did share the title in 2012, 2008 and 2000.

For the other five county teams which had a chance, last Friday was a terrible ending for all five.

Fishers needed only a victory over last place Zionsville to tie with Avon in the Hoosier Crossroads. A Fishers victory at Zionsville and a Noblesville victory over years.

Avon would have given Fishers the championship outright. Neither happened. Fishers was upset and Noblesville didn't win. Fishers and Westfield shared the crown last year. This is only the second time in the last eight seasons that a team from Fishers or Hamilton Southeastern did not win the

As things turned out, had Noblesville beaten Avon the Millers, Avon and Fishers Avon 21, Noblesville 16 would have tied for first place. That didn't

Sheridan needed a win at Tri-Central to claim the Hoosier Heartland hardware. That didn't happen. Sheridan had won the first two championships since joining the conference but now has placed second to Tri-Central each of the last two seasons..

In the Mid-Indiana, Hamilton Heights did its part in trying to catch Lewis Cass. The Huskies needed a victory by Western to tie Lewis Cass for first. That didn't happen. Heights had won outright or shared the Mid-Indiana crown four of the last five





become 27, as the Greyhounds and the Panthers clinched semi-final wins. It was another tense meeting between the two, and North Central won this round, beating Carmel 3-2 to win this year's IHSAA boys tennis state championship.

The final was played at Indianapolis Racquet Club, as showers and threatening skies forced the tournament away from North Central's Barbara Wynne Tennis Center. The morning semi-finals were played outside, but that was all the weather would allow.

It's the 19th state title for the Panthers, while the Greyhounds have won eight. North Central finished the season with a 22-1 record, while Carmel ended at 21-1.

"It's been going on for 40-something years, probably," said 'Hounds coach Mike Bostic. "Back and forth. Tip our hats to them. Played great. They got the momentum early, and we just couldn't recover. They played like champions today. But our guys fought hard all year long, and if you're one of the last two teams standing at the end of the year, you should be very proud of your season."

The Panthers won at Nos. 2 and 3 singles first, giving them a 2-0 advantage. Carmel won its first point at No. 2 doubles, with Patrick Fletchall and Zach Hennessey emerging victorious in a roaring second set tiebreak. The score was 6-1, 7-6 (5).

That gave the Greyhounds a little bit of hope, but NC snatched it away by winning at No. 1 singles. Carmel did prevail at No. 1 doubles, with Matt Quammen and Radha Vishnubhotla coming back to win in three sets. That victory is important, as it sends Quammen and Vishnubhotla into the IH-SAA state doubles tournament next weekend.

"That's why we kept playing, we had something to play for," said Vishnubhotla. "I thought it was really special that we could fight back and come back and win that."

Vishnubhotla received another honor after his match, when he was named the IHSAA's Mental Attitude Award Winner. The son of Vishnu and Lakshmi Vishnubhotla, Radha has distinguished himself as an academic star as well: He carries a 4.27 grade-point average - that includes 29 Advanced Placement or honors classes.

"Receiving the Mental Attitude Award means a lot to me," said Vishnubhotla, who said he has been "working hard in everything I do, scholarship, leadership," as well as trying to represent Carmel High School the best he could.

The Greyhounds advanced to the final with a 4-1 win over Jasper in the semi-finals. Both Carmel doubles teams won in straight sets, as did No. 1 singles Nick Werner and No. 3 singles Azad Koya. North Central advanced by beating Delta 5-0; the Eagles were undefeated all the way through the state semi-finals.

'Hounds, Tigers win regionals, Heights falls

After squeaking past Cathedral in penalty kicks in Wednesday's regional semi-final, Carmel coach Frank Dixon wanted his team to remember how to start scoring goals.

The Greyhounds figured it out just in time for Saturday's championship. Host and No. 2-ranked Carmel stunned No. 1 Brebeuf Jesuit 3-1 to win the regional for the first time since 2011. The 'Hounds will travel to Evansville Harrison next Saturday to compete in the semi-state.
