A scary trip for Tindley?

It likely will be an awesome feeling when the Indianapolis Tindley Tigers slip into Larry Wright Stadium in Sheridan Friday evening, seeing all those Sheridan state championship banners hanging from the stadium walls.

Perhaps, even a scary sight for the visitors.

Looking across the field and seeing a Hall of Fame coach, Wright, who in 50 years has won a record 389 games, and your team in its only three seasons having won just eight games.

It was kind of that way last week as Sheridan lost its regular season finale to Tri-Central. The Blackhawks played very well in the first half. Yes, in the first half.

Sheridan lost that game, and lost the Heartland Hoosier Conference championship, to the defending state champion Trojans.

"They ran 80 plays and we ran 37," Wright talked about that game. "They had the football for nearly 36 minutes. They gained 400 yards and we gained 324.'

Not exactly consistently good numbers for a team about to start the post season.

Wright said he doesn't know a lot about a Tindley team which is in only its third year of varsity football.

"I wrote them and asked for rosters and game films and they haven't responded," Wright said.

Tindley hasn't had a bad season. In fact the Tigers were rolling along with four wins in their first six games until dropping their last three.

Victories have come over Indianapolis Washington 34-20, Northwest 26-20, Edinburg 38-33 and Dugger Union 54-13. The Tigers have lost to Crawfordsville 40-6, Noblesville Home School 40-0, Oldenburg Academy 41-16, Anderson Prep Academy 22-14 and Shortridge 55-0.

Sheridan lost the Tri-Central game in the fourth quarter, a trouble spot for the Blackhawks this season. They have been outscored in fourth quarters 62-31.

As a team this season, Sheridan has passed for 686 yards and given up 948 yards through the air. On the ground, Sheridan has rushed for 2,173 yards and given up 1,587.

Sheridan running back Austin Hoover has outrushed the Blackhawks' nine opponents combined. Hoover, who led Hamilton County in rushing for a third straight year, has carried 306 times for 1,820 yards and 21 touchdowns. Through the air, Garrett Chesney is 38-of-91 for 685 yards and eight touchdowns. His leading receiver is Jacob Chesney with 26 catches for 525 yards and six touchdowns. Hoover and Robert Sizemore also have caught TD passes.




