Fishers Police Department provides home safety tips

Over the past couple of days the Fishers Police Department has responded to two daytime residential burglaries. One of the burglaries occurred, in the Geist area, on the Marion County side of Fall Creek Road and the most recent in the area of 96th Street and Olivo Road in Fishers. Thieves are targeting jewelry. Therefore we recommend residents secure their jewelry in a safe place where it cannot be easily removed from the home. Please take a few moments to review the following home safety tips:

Home Safety Tips

- Install exterior lights at all entrances. Consider motion detector lights.
- Install a wide-angle viewer on all exterior doors.
- Check who is at the door and do not open the door to anyone you don't know.
- Install good locks on all doors and windows. Use those locks!
- Be sure locks on doors and windows can be opened quickly in case of fire.
- Leave a light on when you are not home. If you are on vacation, use a timer to control lighting.
- Don't hide keys outside.
- Remove house keys from your keychain when your car is serviced.
- Talk with trusted neighbors. Keep an eye on their house and ask them to watch yours.
- Stop mail and newspaper delivery when you are away.

- Install an alarm system that will detect entry and notify police.
- Have your lawn mowed and snow shoveled when away.
- Close garage doors at night.
- Keep trees and bushes trimmed. Do not let plants block doors and windows.

Suspicious Activity

An event that is out of the ordinary or that makes you feel uncomfortable could be a crime in progress.

- Adults or juveniles walking casually through the neighborhood looking into windows, backyards, vehicles, etc.
- A vehicle driving slowly through your neighborhood with or without lights on.
- Something wakes you in the night.
- Someone you don't know rings your doorbell.
- An unknown car parked near your home containing one or more people.
- If something is suspicious to you, Call the 911!

# Old National Centre hosts Dark Star Orchestra, Milky Chance

Old National Centre in Indianapolis announced two musical acts are scheduled to appear in 2015.

Presenting its critically acclaimed live show to Deadheads both young and old, **Dark Star Orchestra** is set to perform locally on Thursday, Feb. 12, 2015 at the Egyptian Room at Old National Centre.

Numerous original members of the Grateful Dead have played alongside DSO and have had this to say:

Offering a continually evolving artistic outlet within the Grateful Dead's musical canon, members of Dark Star Orchestra seek out the unique style of each performance era and offer their own interpretations and improvisations at each show. Using entire set lists from the Grateful Dead's decades of touring as a launching pad, Dark Star Orchestra recreates song for song performances straight from the set list of these historic shows.

Made up of Jeff Mattson (Jerry Garcia), Lisa Mackey (Donna Jean Godchaux), Dino English (Bill Kreutzmann), Rob Koritz (Mickey Hart), Skip Vangelas (Phil Lesh), Rob Eaton (Bob Weir) and Rob Barraco (multiple keyboardists), Dark Star Orchestra does not try to match Grateful Dead live songs note for note. Anything so formulaic would quickly dispel the free spirit embodied in the music.

While faithful improvisation is pinnacle, precision is of equal importance with DSO, which position the stage plot based on the year of Grateful Dead show to be performed, adapting phrasing, voice arrangements, and even arranges specific musical equipment for the various eras of Dead music performed. At the end of each performance, the band announces the date and venue where the original show just covered took place. Dark Star Orchestra dips into every incarnation of the Dead, so most fans can "see" shows that happened long before they were born.

Dark Star Orchestra isn't a cover band. Its shows are not even meant as tributes. What Dark Star Orchestra tirelessly strives for and achieves is a continuation of the spirit of what has now become over forty years of the Grateful Dead's timeless music.

Tickets go on sale Friday, and are \$23.50 in advance and \$25 on the day of show. Four packs are available for \$75 while supplies last.

**Milky Chance** announced their very first full-scale North American tour in 2015. Fresh off selling out four shows in New York, Los Angeles, Toronto and San Francisco, the gold-selling German duo are excited to be hitting the road again in 2015. The two-month tour begins on March 20 at South Side Music Hall in Dallas, TX stopping at major markets across the U.S.

before wrapping up on May 22 at Commodore Ballroom in Vancouver, BC. Make sure to get your tickets early!

Fan club pre-sale tickets go on sale today at 10am EST and general public tickets can be purchased

starting Friday. General admission tickets are \$18 in advance, \$20 at the door.

As soon as it was released, *Sadnecessary* climbed to #4 on iTunes Overall Top Albums chart and #1 on the Alternative Albums chart. Their smash "Stolen Dance" continues to make major waves at radio, sitting at #1 at Triple A for 9 consecutive weeks and #1 at Alternative for 6 weeks. Meanwhile the official music video for "Stolen Dance" has nearly 80 million views and climbing.

Longtime friends Clemens Rehbein and Philipp Dausch came together during high school in Kassel, Germany and founded Milky Chance shortly after. Initially, they released *Sadnecessary* independently in Europe through their own label Lichtdicht Records and saw major success, hitting #1 in France and going Top 10 in nine countries, while "Stolen Dance" took off online.

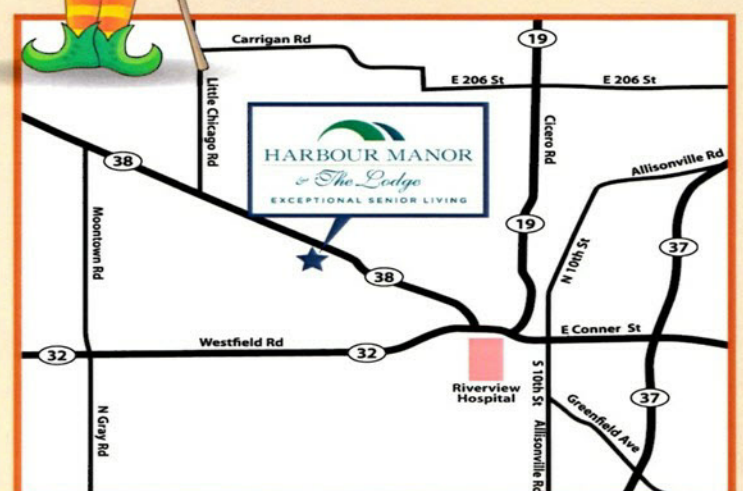

# Westfield incident ends with no injuries

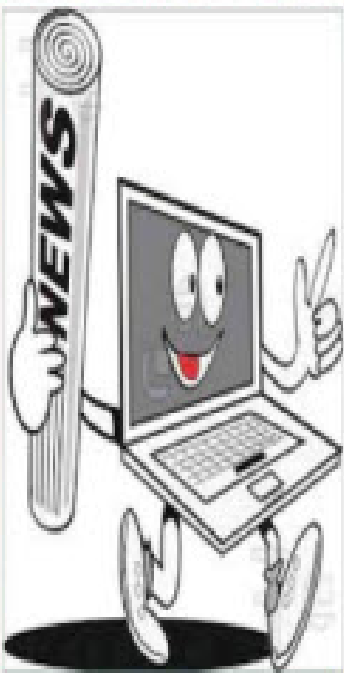

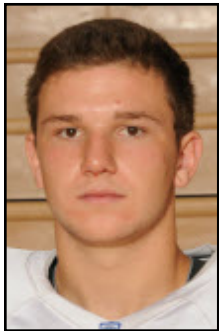

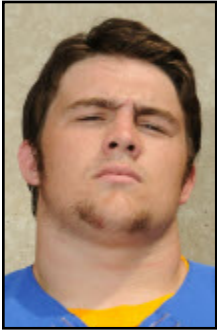

# Heights, Guerin face toughies

Two backyard Hamilton County football teams, Guerin Catholic and Hamilton Heights, could meet in Class 3A, Sectional 30.

That should be fine with both the Golden Eagles and the Huskies, because if they do meet it will be in three weeks in the championship game.

For now, there are more important things on the minds of Guerin and Heights. Both face very tough opponents in Round 1 this Friday. Hamilton Heights will travel to Indian Creek, where the Huskies were eliminated in last year's sectional. Guerin Catholic will host Lawrenceburg.

Heights may have the toughest assignment of the two. The Huskies will take on an undefeated Indian Creek team.

"I think their reputation precedes them," said Heights mentor Mitch Street when looking at Indian Creek. "They have been and still are a well-coached and physical football team. They make you work in all three phases of the game. Their offense can pass and run the football.

"You need a plan of attack against them," said Street. "You have a plan an attack against them, and have executable levels to the plan.

"It will be a good test for us. We are excited for the opportunity to play a quality football team," added the coach.

Heights is 7-2, with losses only to Noblesville and Lewis Cass. Indian Creek is 9-0. The two teams have no common opponent on their schedules.

Indian Creek, averaging 50.3 points a game and allowing just 9.3 points a contest, has been awesome. The Braves have defeated Knightstown 56-7, Greenwood 15-14, Eastern Hancock 40-10, Greencastle 47-0, Brown County 63-7, Milan 61-32, North Decatur 63-6, Broad Ripple 61-8 and South Decatur 47-0.

Coach Mike Gillin is the third winningest active coach in the state with a 36-year record of 292-107. In this his 14<sup>th</sup> year at Indian Creek, Gillin is 126-35.

"They have a winning program," Street said. "There just isn't one thing you have to protect against."

Indian Creek quarterback Gynson Robley has hit on 98-of-150 passes for 1,690. Running back Dokken Egenolf has carried 178 times for 1,682 yards. Ethan Whitaker has 32 catches for 482 yards; Jake McGowan 27 receptions for 673 yards and Austin Hogue 26 catches for 401 yards.

Hamilton Heights also knows how to put points on the board, especially so for leading "Mr. Everything" Grant Weatherford.

“Grant has scored every way a player can score,” Street said.

Weatherford has carried the football 46 times for 432 yards and five touchdowns and has caught 24 passes for 516 yards and eight scores. When still playing quarterback before moving to wide-receiver, Weatherford hit on 11-of-26 passes for 216 yards and two TDs. He also has returned a pass interception and a fumble for touchdowns and kickoff and punt returns for touchdowns.

Weatherford also has 38 solo tackles and 18 assists.

Another threat for the Huskies the second half of the season was quarterback Ethan Jones, who in just five games was 45-of-66 for 768 yards through the air. He fired for 12 touchdowns. Grant Weatherford is the leading receiver. Jesse Brown caught 17 balls for 220 yards.

The team’s leading rusher, Jesse Kerfoot, may be back from an injury. He has carried 45 times for 358 yards. Nathan Roth has 256 yards in 52 carries.

On the defensive side of the football, Isaac Ray has 48 solo tackles, Joe Woods 41, Weatherford and Nick Peterson 38 each and Roth and Riley White 33 each.

The Huskies, who have a 15-year record of 92-15 in the Mid-Indiana Conference, ended conference play last week with a 40-0 smashing of Peru.

“We will have to play really hard,” said Street. “It will be a tight game.

Meanwhile, Guerin Catholic, 6-3 on the year, will be in their Eagles Nest to face a 7-2 Lawrenceburg team. The two teams had no common opponents on their schedules.

Lawrenceburg dropped its first two games of the season, falling 14-13 in overtime to South Dearborn and 9-3 to Taylor out of Ohio. Since then the Tigers have defeated Milan 44-0, Greensburg 47-46, Franklin County 43-15, Batesville 14-7, Rushville 61-22, Connersville 12-0 and Silver Creek 42-28.

“Lawrenceburg has 17 seniors,” said Guerin coach Tom Dilley. “They have a 2 ½ hour bus trip to our place.”

Dilley said his team is playing well.

“We’re running and throwing the football,” said the first-year Guerin Catholic coach.

The throwing is being done by Matt Labus, who is 100-of-190 for 1,570 yards. He has fired for 17 touchdowns. His top receiver is Brian Matthews with 44 catches for 824 yards. Second-leading receiver Arion Shinaver (33 catches for 445 yards) is injured and will be lost for the remainder of the season.

# A scary trip for Tindley?

It likely will be an awesome feeling when the Indianapolis Tindley Tigers slip into Larry Wright Stadium in Sheridan Friday evening, seeing all those Sheridan state championship banners hanging from the stadium walls.

Perhaps, even a scary sight for the visitors.

Looking across the field and seeing a Hall of Fame coach, Wright, who in 50 years has won a record 389 games, and your team in its only three seasons having won just eight games.

So, all the Blackhawks need to do Friday is come out and play football, something a 5-4 Sheridan team hasn't always done this season. At least, not consistently, for four quarters.

"They ran 80 plays and we ran 37," Wright talked about that game. "They had the football for nearly 36 minutes. They gained 400 yards and we gained 324."

Not exactly consistently good numbers for a team about to start the post season.

Wright said he doesn't know a lot about a Tindley team which is in only its third year of varsity football.

"I wrote them and asked for rosters and game films and they haven't responded," Wright said.

Tindley hasn't had a bad season. In fact the Tigers were rolling along with four wins in their first six games until dropping their last three.

Victories have come over Indianapolis Washington 34-20, Northwest 26-20, Edinburg 38-33 and Dugger Union 54-13. The Tigers have lost to Crawfordsville 40-6, Noblesville Home School 40-0, Oldenburg Academy 41-16, Anderson Prep Academy 22-14 and Shortridge 55-0.

Sheridan lost the Tri-Central game in the fourth quarter, a trouble spot for the Blackhawks this season. They have been outscored in fourth quarters 62-31.

As a team this season, Sheridan has passed for 686 yards and given up 948 yards through the air. On the ground, Sheridan has rushed for 2,173 yards and given up 1,587.

Sheridan running back Austin Hoover has outrushed the Blackhawks' nine opponents combined. Hoover, who led Hamilton County in rushing for a third straight year, has carried 306 times for 1,820 yards and 21 touchdowns.

Through the air, Garrett Chesney is 38-of-91 for 685 yards and eight touchdowns. His leading receiver is Jacob Chesney with 26 catches for 525 yards and six touchdowns. Hoover and Robert Sizemore also have caught TD passes.

Hoover has 2,203 total all-purpose yards. Kent Hollingsworth leads the team in pancake bocks with 14. Jacob Eidson has 11.

Katie Hybarger has booted 21-of-28 extra points and also has kicked a field goal.

On defense, Hoover leads Sheridan with 90 solo tackles, followed by Jacob Chesney 63, Sizemore 59, and Joey Callahan 46.

Sheridan has intercepted eight passes, two each by Garrett Chesney, Jacob Chesney and Hoover.

Callahan and Sizemore lead in quarterback sacks with three each.

So, no kidding, all the Blackhawks need to do Friday is come out and play football. That's all.

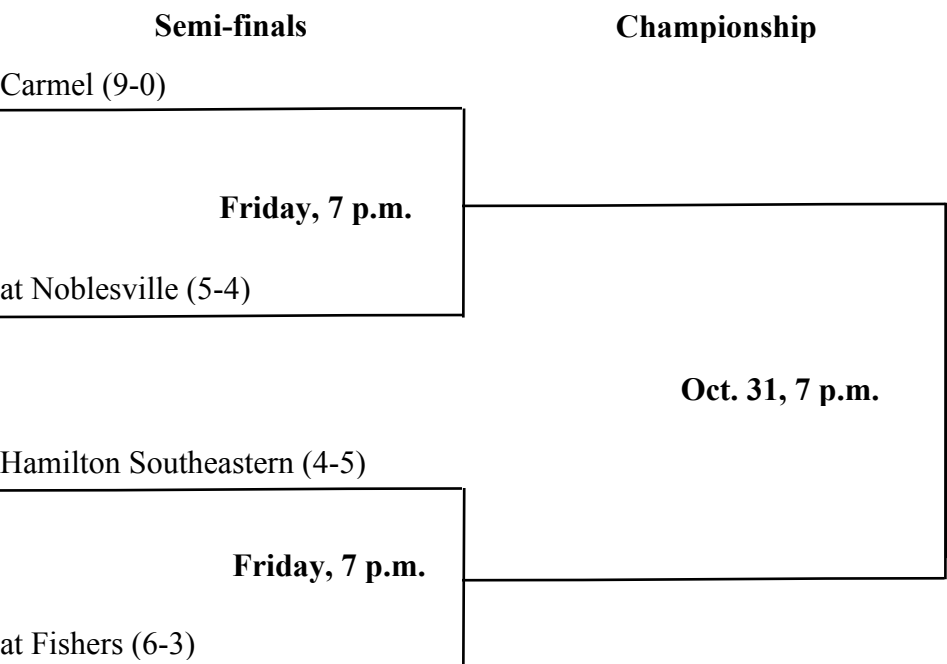

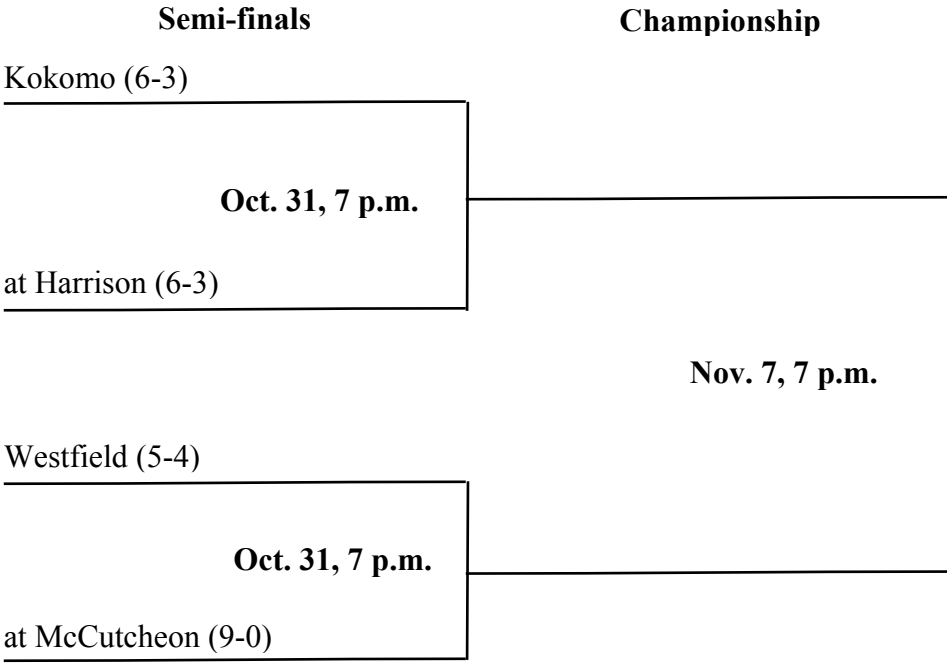

## Class 6A, Sectional 4

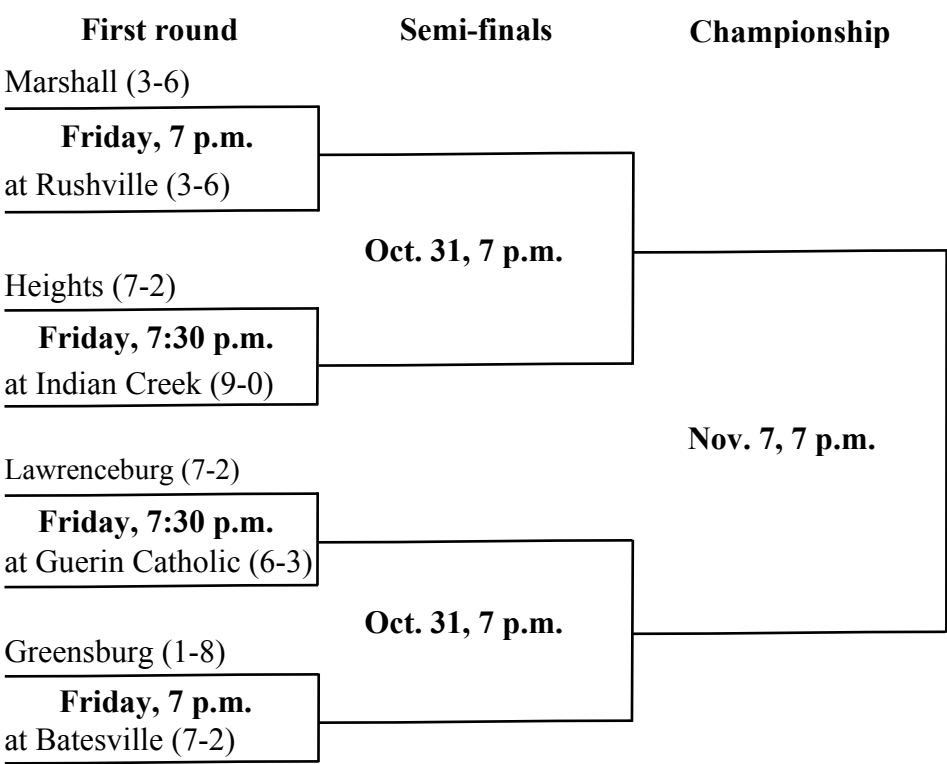

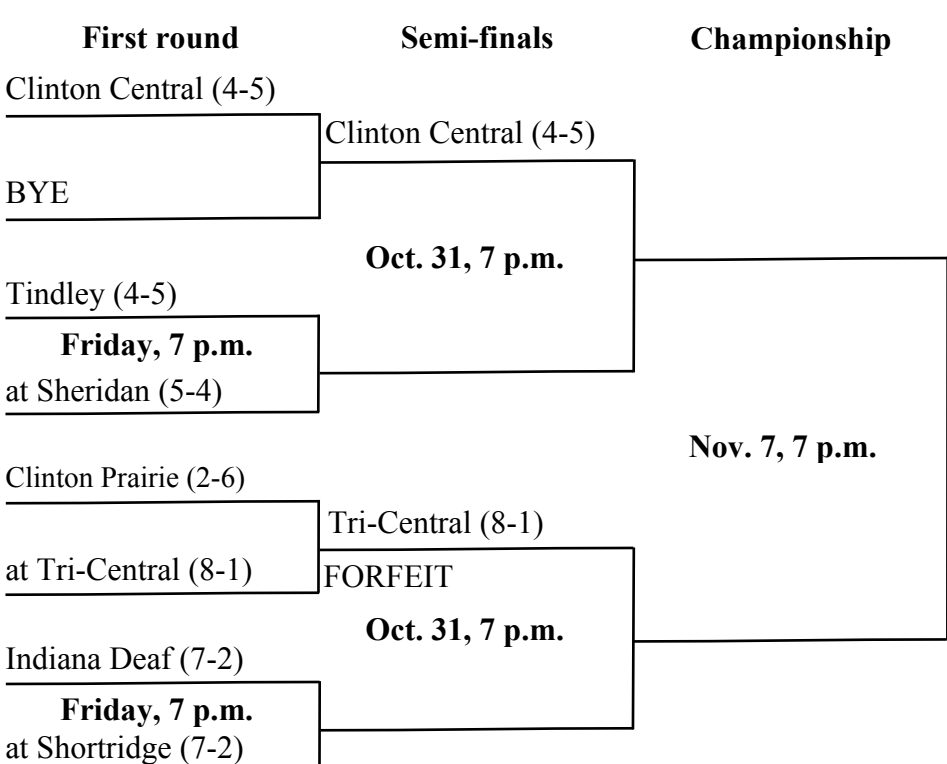
