Closing skills gap necessary to help job growth

There are four million open jobs in this nation. To fill them, we need to close the skills gap that is preventing people from finding the jobs they want and need.

That's why I've cosponsored legislation like H.R. 803, the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, which reduces barriers to quality in-demand job training and was signed into law

on July 22, 2014. It's also why I've introduced legislation like H.R. 2536, the Computer Science Education Act, which will provide new opportunities for students to learn important skills like coding and computer programming in our K-12 classrooms without any additional cost to taxpayers.

Recently, I visited with students, faculty and community partners who are all part of Grant County's GROW Nurses program. This unique partnership led by Indiana Wesleyan University, Marion Community Schools and Ivy Tech Community College breaks down silos between our local K-12 schools, career and technical education programs, universities and employers. The program is dedicated to building a healthier Grant County through community partnerships that encourage more young people to become nurses. I am particularly pleased to know

GROW Nurses is working to provide more males and minorities the step by step support necessary to enter the nursing profession. As the baby boomer generation continues to age, we will need a new generation of diverse and well-trained nurses ready to meet increased patient demand.

We need more innovative programs like GROW Nurses in the 5th District, in Indiana and across the nation. That's why I've started a series called "Connecting Careers & Classrooms." This series provides educators a behind the scenes look at key sectors of Indiana's economy. The goal is to connect them with people making actual hiring decisions, so they can better advise students on in-demand career paths.

Lazy Frogg ready to hop into business

In July of 2013 Greg Boyd of G.C. Boyd Corporation and Cicero Capital LLC announced plans to revitalize the once popular Cicero landmark formerly known as the Waterfront Inn.

The Waterfront had stood vacant for many years, and area residents described the dilapidated lakeside property as an eye sore in the Cicero community.

At a community meeting in July 2013 area residents listened to a presentation that outlined a restaurant, shrimp hut and lakeside bar.

Boyd indicated his hope was to have the business, later dubbed the Lazy Frogg, up and running by spring of 2014.

A number of setbacks delayed the completion of the remodeling and the opening of the business which is still currently under construction.

"The development certainly ran into its share of challenges this summer when our building team decided to halt all construction for two and half months," said Boyd.

"Probably the biggest challenge we faced was what we uncovered in May as we dug into the building's electrical, sprinkler system, and plumbing issues behind the walls and covered by insulation in the attic. We just could not continue to band aid, as prior contractors did, with what we saw," stated Boyd.

Between Spring Mill and Ditch roads...

146th Street closure begins Monday

Effective on or after Monday, Oct. 27, 146th Street between Ditch Road and Spring Mill Road will be closed. The road is scheduled to be closed to all thru traffic for seven calendar days, tentatively opening back up to traffic on Monday, Nov. 3. During the closure, local traffic should utilize the signed detour route of Spring Mill Road, 141st Street and 156th Street. The closure is part of the improvements to 146th Street which will expand the

two-lane roadway to a divided four-lane roadway with a new roundabout intersection at Ditch Road.

Calumet shifts begin today

Beginning at 6 a.m., Calumet will be shifting traffic along Cumberland Road. Valley Farms Court will now be accessible from the south (106th Street) and the southern half of East Deering Street will be closed for reconstruction. This change is for local traffic, so Cumberland Road will remain closed to through traffic.

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Kokomo ranks third in nation for job growth

Kokomo was the third-ranked city in the U.S. for job growth in 2013 according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) data. Kokomo added 2,300 jobs between August 2013, and August 2014, for a total job growth rate of 5.3 percent.
For the same period, Kokomo's unemployment rate shrank by more than two percentage points, while its labor force increased by 1,817, as the city continues to be a best place for job seekers.
The Talent Tribune listing is based on BLS data for the total number of employed residents in August 2013 and August 2014. The organization calculated the number of jobs added, as well as the percentage of job growth.
"The Kokomo economy continues to outpace the state and national economies," said Kokomo Mayor Greg Goodnight. "Our community is thriving at the same time we are making quality-of-life investments for our residents. Kokomo's job market is one of the best in the U.S., and our housing stock remains one of the most affordable in the nation as well."
This report follows a U.S. Conference of Mayors announcement that Kokomo's Gross Metropolitan Product (GMP) growth rate of 2.4 percent in 2013 placed it 61st of 363 metro areas in the nation.

Lafayette also seeing economic growth

Arrows are pointing upward as Greater Lafayette Commerce takes the pulse of the local economy with release of its Mid-year 2014 Economic Trends.
Among its tallies: some \$206 million in industrial investments, including GE Aviation's \$100 million new plant, a \$90 million expansion at Tate & Lyle, and \$13.3 million investment at TRW, along with \$72.7 million in commercial and multifamily real estate projects. In all, \$440.3 million in new investments across all sectors were announced or made by June 30, 2014.
Other highlights include 20 new knowledge-based startups launched in the first six months of the year, more than two

dozen new retailers and restaurants and several financial institution expansions.
"Our focused, collaborative efforts to be 'The Place of Choice' are paying off, as we continue to see confidence in investing, expanding and locating here," said Jody Hamilton, director of economic development for Greater Lafayette Commerce.
Two recent national recognitions reflect the robustness, Hamilton said. Forbes ranked the community No. 9 in its 2014 list of Best Small Places for Business and Careers out of 184 cities on economic and quality-of-life indicators, job grow trends, cost of living and cost of operating a business. "Our plans never included the tear out of nearly every inch of plumbing and electrical and 6 inch concrete flooring to get to these items," said Boyd. "It was very close to just killing the whole project."
"We debated for 3 weeks and looked at the whole Lazy Frogg Resort planned development and then with the obvious new growth of Westfield...We decided to go back to our design team and plan all new behind the walls and under the concrete, electric, plumbing and sprinkler system schematic," continued Boyd. "A very expensive project, but we pulled up our boot straps, retied them tight, and re-energized our team."
Boyd indicated the decision took an excessive amount of time, planning, resources, that threw his development into a slew of meetings with many government officials for approvals to move the project forward.
Boyd said he has received over a hundred emails from local residents thrilled with perserverance and positive attitude of his team, which includes Gary Kyzr Sheeley in land planning, Chuck Goldfarb and Tres Eldridge on the restaurant side.
Boyd said he is moving forward now at full steam with the restaurant and Key West style bar. "Nothing but good things coming now to the Cicero residents and the people of Morse Lake, including the expectation of new jobs coming to Cicero in December," concluded Boyd.

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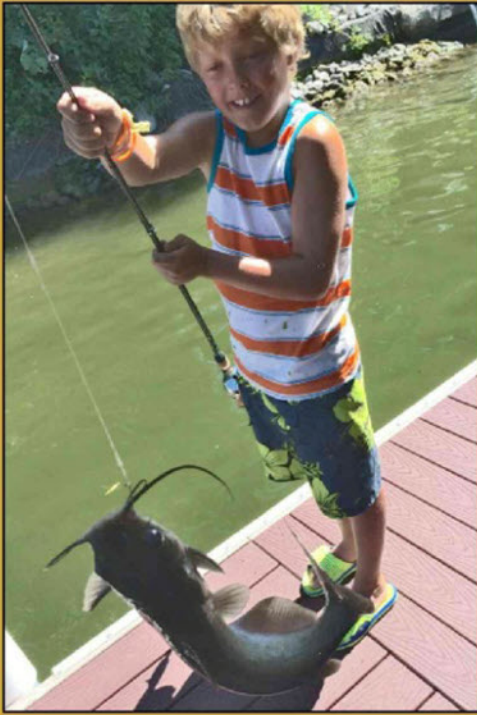

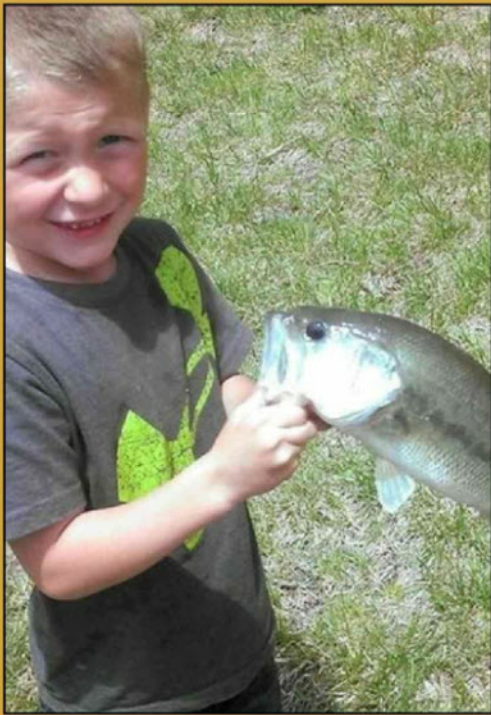

‘Hounds, Royals advance to semi-final showdown

The semi-finals are set at the Westfield volleyball sectional, after first round action finished up on Thursday.

Carmel, the two-time Class 4A state runner-up, overcame the host Shamrocks in four sets, while Hamilton Southeastern cruised past Zionsville to avenge an earlier-season loss. The Greyhounds and the Royals will play each other in the second semi-final at around 12:30 p.m. Saturday, following the 11 a.m. match between Noblesville and North Central.

Carmel won 18-25, 25-22, 25-9, 25-17 over Westfield. The Shamrocks started strong in taking the first set, and were still tied with the 'Hounds at 15-15 in the second set. Carmel was able to win that set, and the momentum carried them through the remainder of the match.

"We made some adjustments offensively and defensively that kind of helped us a little bit," said Greyhounds coach Rich Coleman. "We stuck to our game plan. We had a scouting report and a game plan and we executed that pretty well."

"I think that Carmel stepped up their game," said Shamrocks coach Stacie Pagnard.

Carly Skjodt led the Greyhounds with 24 kills and Morgan Seaman had 43 assists for the Greyhounds. Skjodt and Jamie Scherb paced the defense with 19 and 18 digs respectively.

"We were kind of amped up," said Coleman. We were really excited about the environment early, and Westfield came out and played excellent. Between those two factors, we didn't have a whole lot going our way that first set. Once we finally got calm and relaxed and started playing Carmel volleyball, we were in pretty good shape."

Westfield did show some fight in the fourth set, something Pagnard attributes to

her two seniors, Samantha Reed and Lucy Grenda.

"They've been preparing all week," said Pagnard. "You look at their games individually, they played about as good as they could play. They have something to kind of hang their hats on, they should have no regrets. But we've got to have a full-team effort if we want to make a run."

The Shamrocks finished their season at 22-12. Stats were not available for Westfield as of press time.

"We start a majority of sophomores," said Shamrocks coach Stacie Pagnard. "I think five out of the six kids on the floor at some point in time are sophomores. Obviously the future is bright, but the senior class is really special to me, so I was just hoping that we could pull something out for them."

A pumped-up Southeastern team breezed through the Eagles 25-14, 25-20, 25-21. When the two teams met earlier in the year, Zionsville won in four sets, including a 28-26 fourth set. Needless to say, the Royals were ready to go.

"I thought we came out and played fantastic," said HSE coach Jason Young. "I loved the energy of the girls. Obviously playing a conference opponent that had beaten us earlier in the season, opportunity to get some revenge from that standpoint, settle that."

Hayden Huybers had a strong night with 12 kills; Young said she "dominated the net." Lauren Boswell had her best night of the season with seven kills and no errors; Young said it was her "best night of the season." Caitlin Kane hit eight kills, Gina Furlin made 30 assists and libero Jordan Dixon made 15 digs.

"I liked the effort," said Young. "I liked how cool we played when things got tight. Loved the senior leadership. They stepped up today and I thought we made a lot of good, athletic plays."

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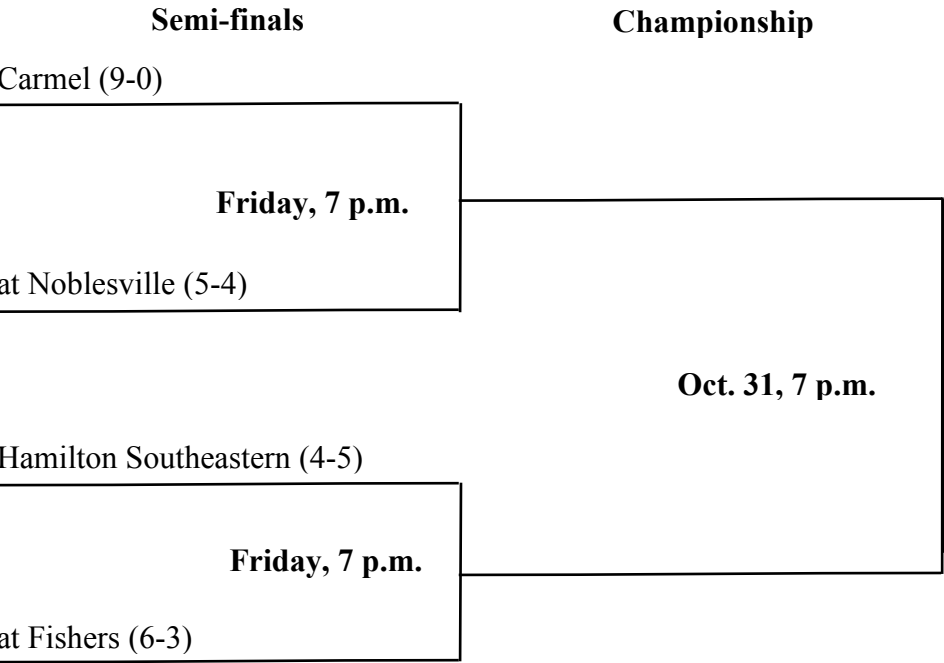
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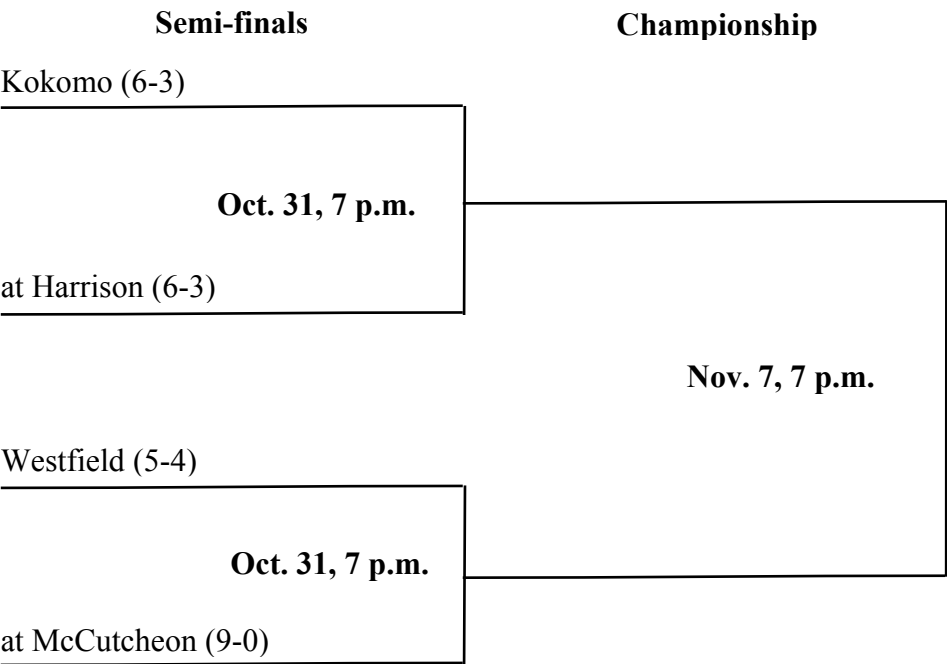
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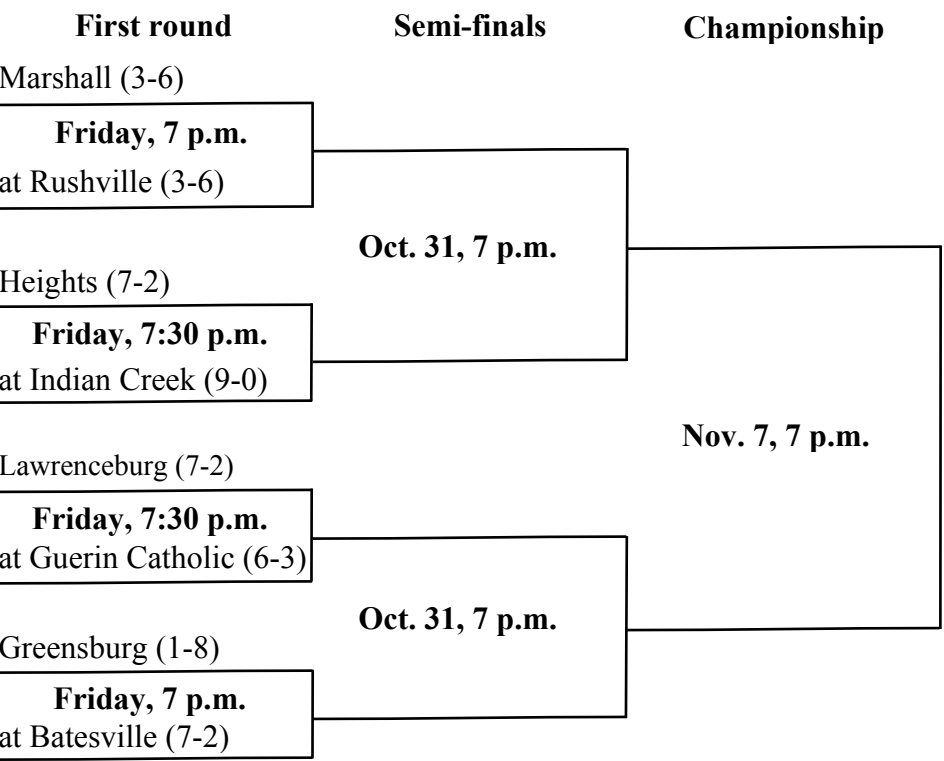
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
