George E. Sheets, 99, of Westfield, passed away on Friday, October 24, 2014 at Maple Park Village in Westfield. He was born on July 11, 1915 to Harry and Edith (Liptrap) Sheets in Hamilton County, Indiana.



George proudly served his country in the United States Army under General George Patton. He was in Company B - 83rd Medical Battalion Armored during WWII. George entered active duty in November 1942 and served in Central Europe Rhineland, including the Battle of the Bulge. He was wounded in Homburg, Germany, and received the Purple Heart. Other medals included the Good Conduct Medal, American Campaign Medal, and the European African Middle Eastern Campaign Medal. George was given an Honorable discharge on October 29, 1945 from Camp Cooke, Cali-

George lived in Hamilton County most of his life, and had been a Westfield resident for 65 years. For 15 years, he worked at Sheets Implements in Westfield, and retired from Hare Chevrolet in 1980 as a mechanic after 22 years. George was a member of Village Park Bible Methodist Church, and enjoyed traveling, hunting, reading, and boating.

He is survived by his daughter, Jerolyn (Larry) Ogle of Sheridan; step-daughters, Rita (Fred) McBride of Noblesville, and Nita Cain of Noblesville; eleven grandchildren; 23 great-grandchildren; and three great-grandchildren.

In addition to his parents, George was preceded in death by his first wife, Frances Elizabeth Sheets in 1957; second wife, Orpha Ann Sheets in 2006; daughter, Judy Ann Roudebush; brother, James Sheets; half-brother, Donald Sheetz; and son-in-law, Michael Cain.

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# What does light have to do with darkness?

with unbelievers. For what fellowship has righteousness with lawlessness? And what communion has light with darkness? And what accord has Christ with Belial? Or what part has a believer with an unbeliever? And what agreement

has the temple of God with idols? For you are the temple of the living God. As God has said: "I will dwell in them And walk among them. I will be their God, And they shall be My people." Therefore "Come out from among them And be separate, says the Lord" 2 Cor 6:14-17 (NKJV).

It is that time of year again. For generations Halloween has been celebrated by modern man. Oft reported as merely a fun time for children with no real meaning or implication. A great excuse for a party and, if you are so inclined, a good reason to scare people. I myself can think of little else that warms the heart more than a happy laughing child and I am certainly not above bribing a little one into a smile and hug with candy. However upon taking a closer look at the origins of the night I can find no redeeming factor that would justify a Christ Follower celebrating Halloween - What does light have to do with darkness, come out and be separate!

While All Hallows Eve may be the traditional name Samhain is the original Celtic festival. Samhain means summers end. The pagan festival dates back somewhere between 2000 and 2500 years ago. It was a harvest festival and a time during which the dead were honored. Festivities of the high holy feast day began at sundown on October 31 marking the end of the Celtic year and concluded at sundown on November 1 having ushered in the new year. It was during this time that the realm of the living could connect with the realm of the dead, the natural could mix with the supernatural and spirits both good and evil could roam about in the dark of the night. Gourds or turnips were carved into lanterns and treats and gifts were set out to welcome the spirits of loved ones while appeasing the wandering evil spirits. They dressed in costumes to scare the spirits away from themselves and their children, and built sacred bonfires where burnt offerings from the year's harvest were offered unto their gods of which there were several hundred. There were Celtic gods and goddesses for poetry, charms and incantations; gods for the forand gods of the agriculture. There was even for youth, old age, gender or innocence. A goddesses were married to each other.

There is controversy among scholars about where the Celtic people originated from, but regardless they are thought to have either evolved into or conquered and settled the British Isles. The ancient people and culture were widespread throughout Northern Europe. They practiced Druidism, a Celtic Paganism with learned priests who were called Druids. Druidism is a nature based religion with worship centering around the created not the Creator. They practiced Mysticism and divination, they were wizards and magicians and believed in a type of re-incarnation where the soul could live in another body or even in the body of an animal. There is evidence that they did practice human sacrifices of both criminal and innocent people who were burnt alive in wicker cages or killed in the attempt to divine the future as it was thought that the dead held the secrets of what was to come. Some say they would sacrifice only willing volunteers who offered themselves up in order to obtain a blessing from one of their gods for their people.

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"Do not be unequally yoked together is the basis for modern day Wicca, paganism, and modern druidism or revival druidism. It is from these roots that the modern day celebration of Halloween has risen. What does darkness have to do with light – come out and be separate - this is a completely pagan practice with both complex meaning and implications for modern culture. Without having delved too deeply here into specific festival practices the brief overview does illustrate how over the stretch of time the celebration festivities have remained intact with little change. Attempts at Christianizing the feast day and commercialization do not negate the Pagan roots. First ventures at Christianization of the holiday occurred around 600 AD with the creation of All Saints Day. A day to celebrate dead saints, it was created in an effort convert pagans to Christianity. Then around 1000 AD All Souls Day was established as a day for faithful Catholics to pray for their dead in Purgatory. However, commercialization with its pagan money god remains the most successful proselvtizer of the multitude into its religion.

According to statistics in 2013, 98% of American children and 68% of American adults celebrated Halloween spending \$6.9 billion with the #1 costume being that of a witch, followed by Batman then that of a Vampire. Not long ago I heard the story of a Haitian missionary worker who was visiting with a Pastor friend here in the US. The friend had taken Mr. Missionary to a local Wal-Mart and to Mr. Missionary's shock and dismay he was confronted on all sides with Halloween paraphernalia. Macabre masks and evil clowns. Tombstones, ghouls and ghosts equipped with demonic moans and evil laughs. Every imaginable evil depicted in plastic. This is exactly what they have been trying to eliminate in his country the worship of darkness and evil. What does light have to do with darkness, come out and be separate! The evil one's greatest trick has been convincing the masses he does not exist – he's just a myth. For those that are convinced it is mere fantasy, even make believe has a real effect on the heart and we good Christian parents seem to have no problem exposing our very pliable youth to this potters hand all in the name of fun! Your precious princess with her fairy wings or your brave little superman will one day grow older having grown weary of the cute side she or he will most assuredly move on to bigger and darker play. What does light have to do with darkness, come out and be separate! Halloween will undoubtedly always be associated with the celebration of the dead and the darkness no matter how you try to sanitize it. And with so much real est, gods for rivers.
