City will use \$588K in savings to balance shortfall without tax increase...

Noblesville approves unbalanced budget

By PETE SMITH

The Noblesville City Council on Tuesday night passed the largest budget in the city's history, but it's more a product of sustained growth and expansion than spending

No raises for city employees or elected officials were approved as part of the budget process, and no major city projects accounted for a large percentage of spending in the \$73.6 million budget, said Deputy Mayor Mike Hendricks.

The budget will not result in any tax increases.

But the budget that was unanimously passed won't be for themselves and don't put a strain on city services. funded entirely with tax revenue. Hendricks said that the city will use a little more than half a million dollars in

savings from a reserve fund that collects unspent money from previous years.

The \$588,204 used for the 2015 budget would still leave the fund with more than \$11 million.

"The revenue is flat and the expenses keep going up," city councilor Greg O'Connor said.

City Councilor Brian Ayer said it was the first "red" budget he had seen in his 10 years on the council.

He said he wants the city to come up with design standards for future growth so that new developments pay

We are going to have to look at ways to fund public safety," said city councilor Rick Taylor, noting that might mean shrinking future budgets.

Of the city's operating budget, known as the general fund, public safety salaries and expenses make up more than 55 percent of costs. And they're on the rise.

This coming year the city plans to hire an additional firefighter and three additional police officers. The city also has to pay for new radios for every public safety employee in the city as part of an upgrade to the county's emergency response system.

One of the major changes to come from the new hires will be a Noblesville police officer as part of the Hamilton/Boone County Drug Task Force - which will



ISP attend cutting edge training in Louisville

On October 14th and 15th, twelve detectives from the Indiana State Police and nine crime scene investigators, also from the Indiana State Police, participated in a forensic gunshot wound evaluation program. The training was part of a 40 hour educational course including a two day practicum, in which the officers observed scenario re-enactments, learned about gunshot trajectory and impact analysis, evidence collection, and wound feature identification.

The training course was the first of its kind here in the United States and designed to help support new standards that will protect justice and save taxpayer dollars. In addition, the course will help support transparency and objectivity in cases involving violent crime and gunshot evidence. The program's content was developed by renowned forensic science expert, Dr. Bill Smock.

Indiana State Police Superintendent Doug Carter stated, "This training will enhance the Department's statewide capabilities as it pertains to investigating and processing crime scenes involving the use of firearms. Additionally, it will be the first step in developing an advanced group of ISP personnel who are trained in investigating the many facets of use of force incidents. The personnel selected represent the Criminal Investigation Division and the Laboratory Division and were selected based on their experience and capabilities. By selecting detectives and crime scene investigators geographically from around the state, this will not only provide for a timely response to incidents, but will give the Department highly trained personnel throughout the state, which will enhance the overall investigative product for the communities in which they serve."
