# Change the batteries in your smoke, CO detectors

Daylight-saving time ends Sunday, Nov. 2, and marks the 27<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the *Change Your Clock Change Your Battery*® (CYCCYB) program, which reminds us to change and test the batteries in our smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors. This message is simple and the habit can be lifesaving.

The Carmel Fire Department reminds our residents that one easy step can help save their lives and the lives of those around them. Everyone is encouraged to use the extra hour they “gain” from daylight-saving time to change the batteries in their own smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors, test the alarms and remind friends, family, neighbors and fellow community members to do the same.

Communities nationwide witness tragic home fire deaths each year. Approximately every three hours a home fire death occurs somewhere in the nation and 80 percent of those occur in homes without working smoke alarms. Non-working smoke alarms rob residents of the protective benefits home safety devices were designed to provide. The most commonly cited cause of non-working smoke alarms: worn or missing batteries.

“Eighty percent of child fire fatalities occur in homes without working smoke alarms. It’s a tragic statistic that could be reduced by adopting the simple habit of the Change Your Clock Change Your Battery program,” says Fire Chief Matthew Hoffman.

Changing smoke alarm batteries at least once a year, testing those alarms and reminding others to do the same are some of the simplest, most effective ways to reduce these tragic deaths and injuries. Additionally, the International Association of Fire Chiefs recommends that smoke alarms in homes should be replaced every 10 years and having both ionization and photoelectric smoke alarms are best to alert people to all types of home fires.

“The peak time for home fire fatalities is between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m. when most families are sleeping,” says Chief Hoffman.

man. “Smoke alarm maintenance is a simple, effective way to reduce home fire deaths. Children and senior citizens are most at risk, and a working smoke alarm can give them the extra seconds they need to get out safely.”

In addition, Chief Hoffman recommends residents not only use the “extra” hour they save from the time change to test smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors and to plan and practice escape routes, but also to make sure fellow neighbors and community members do the same. Families should also prepare a fire safety kit that includes working flashlights and fresh batteries.

Tragically, fire can kill selectively. Those most at risk include:

**Children** – On average, home fires kill 500 children ages 14 and under each year. Roughly three-quarters of child fire fatalities under age 15 occurred in homes without working smoke alarms.

**Seniors** – Adults 75 and older are 2.8 times more likely to die in a home fire.

**Low-Income Households** – Many low-income families are unable to afford batteries for their smoke alarms. These same households often rely on poorly installed, maintained or misused portable or area heating equipment – a main cause of fatal home fires.

Congress in the Fifth District. Incumbent freshman Republican Congressman Susan Brooks is opposed by Democrat Shawn Denney of Indianapolis and John Krom, Libertarian of Noblesville.

Rep. Brooks is a Carmel resident, an attorney with experience as a U.S. District Attorney in Indianapolis. More recently she was a member of the IVY Tech administration where she headed Workforce Development. She is married and mother of two children.

Denney was originally from New Castle where he worked for Chrysler Corporation for many years. He also claims experience in retail sales, insurance and education. He is a graduate of the University of Indianapolis.

Another of the contested races on the ballot next week is for State Representative in Dist. 29 which includes Noblesville.

Kathy Richardson, incumbent Republican, is challenged by Joe Marcum, the Democrat. Rep. Richardson, lifelong Noblesville resident, has represented the area since 1993 and now is in legislative leadership as chair of the Majority Caucus. She was the first woman to achieve that position.

She attended Purdue University following graduation from Noblesville High School and then went to work in the county clerk's office where she has remained since. She served two terms as elected clerk before going to the state legislature. Richardson is a member of numerous community organizations including Kiwanis, Chamber of Commerce and Extension Homemakers. She is married to Perry Williams.

Macum is a recently retired Noblesville High School teacher. A resident of the city for 35 years, he and his wife, Debbie, are parents of two daughters. Seeking office for

the first time, Marcum is a graduate of Ball State University. His community involvement has revolved around teaching and coaching. He is endorsed by the ISTA.

The candidate is trying to mount the most serious challenge the incumbent has experienced, but faces an uphill battle in a traditionally Republican district. Richardson is not taking victory for granted as both she and Marcum have been making voter contacts, advertising in the media and placing numerous yard signs.

The remainder of the local ballot has few contested races. All but one county level office is unopposed. Only Republican candidate Fred Glynn has an opponent. Rosemary Dunkle, Democrat, is challenging the first time candidate in the Carmel area district which is overwhelmingly Republican.

Headed for re-election are Prosecutor Lee Buckingham, Sheriff Mark Bowen, Commissioner Christine Altman and Assessor Robin Ward. Being elected for the first time as Coroner is John Chalfin, and returning to office for new terms are former Clerk Tammy Baitz and Recorder Jennifer Hayden.

Four incumbent judges are headed for new terms. Circuit Judge Paul Felix and Superior Court judges William Hughes, Richard Campbell and Wayne Sturdevant retain office without opposition. All are Republicans.

In probably the most lackluster of all local elections, Fishers will elect its first mayor on Nov. 4. Scott Fadness, currently the town manager, is unopposed on the Republican ticket. But, he only gets one year with this election, and will face voters again in 2015 to seek a full four-year term.

# NHS assistant principal, student section account, have Twitter discussion

Noblesville assistant principal Craig McCaffrey had a spirited back-and-forth on Twitter with the Miller student section account earlier this week regarding Noblesville's actions during the Millers sectional football game with Carmel last Friday.

McCaffrey expressed disappointment with how the student section acted during the game, saying in a tweet that it cost the Millers a spirit award. "Wish we were as classy at games as we are at school," he said.

The student section account responded by saying that the "We hate Carmel" chant is said by not only the Noblesville students, but also by Fishers and Hamilton Southeastern. McCaffrey was unmoved - he noted in a response that Channel 13's Rich Nye was there when Miller students yelled at the Carmel bus.

The "Go Millers" account stuck by its opinion - "let him know we don't like our rival school," it said. The account went on to say that it could've been any other

school, and that such behavior is expected.

Still, McCaffrey remained disappointed. He reminded the account that it was "giving the perception" that it was "talking for everyone," which he said is "definitely not the case."

"Go Millers" encouraged McCaffrey to "take a canvas vote," saying that "the student body loves it." The account also said that it does speak for the student section.

The student section account's tweets to McCaffrey have since been removed. However, a screen shot of those tweets, which would have been posted late Tuesday morning and early Tuesday afternoon, was provided to The Reporter Wednesday afternoon.

McCaffrey himself soon said that he was "done with this conversation" and that he was "more than willing" to discuss the matter with anyone after school on Tuesday.

## Sobriety checkpoint to take place overnight Oct. 31-Nov. 1

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership will conduct a sobriety checkpoint on the night of Friday, Oct. 31 and the early hours of Saturday, Nov. 1.

At a sobriety checkpoint, law enforcement officers evaluate drivers for signs of alcohol or drug impairment at a specified point along the roadway, often depending upon the support of local property owners for the use of appropriate land. Checkpoint sites are selected based upon analysis of available crash and impaired driving arrest data and a consideration of officer safety. Vehicles are stopped in a specific sequence, such as every other vehicle, every third vehicle, every fourth vehicle or by stopping three, four, or five cars in succession and allowing other traffic to proceed while checking the stopped vehicles. The planned sequence in which vehicles are stopped depends on the number of officers available to staff the checkpoint, traffic congestion, and other safety concerns.

Upon making contact with the driver, the officer advises them that they've been stopped at an HCTSP sobriety checkpoint and asks for the driver's license and the vehicle's registration. If, in the course of the contact, the officer detects that alcohol may be involved and that the driver may be impaired or if some other issue arises, then the vehicle is directed into a pull-off area for further investigation. Further investigation may involve the Standardized Field Sobriety Tests (SFSTs). On the other hand, if all looks right during the initial contact, the driver is often on his or her way in less than two minutes.

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership (HCTSP) is a consortium of law enforcement agencies in Hamilton County working to increase the usage of seatbelts, to combat aggressive driving, and to decrease impaired driving with the overall goal of creating a safer Hamilton County. The HCTSP

is comprised of the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department, Fishers Police Department, Carmel Police Department, Noblesville Police Department, and the Westfield Police Department with the assistance of the Indiana State Police.

Sobriety checkpoints are legal in 39 states, including Indiana, and the District of Columbia. In 1990, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that, if conducted properly, sobriety checkpoints do not constitute an illegal search and seizure. In the 2002 case of *State v. Gerschoffer*, the Indiana Supreme Court found that sobriety checkpoints are constitutional when conducted properly. Members of the Hamilton County Prosecuting Attorney's Office work with the Partnership to ensure that each checkpoint meets constitutional requirements.

# Heights Primary rolls out 1:1 iPad pilot program

Just three months into the 1:1 pilot program at Hamilton Heights Primary School, first grade teachers Sandy Baitz and Ashley Mandery say they couldn't be more pleased with the response and the impact the devices are having on their students. With the success of the 1:1 initiatives at the Middle and High Schools, Baitz and Mandery say they were not surprised at the student's reception and enthusiasm of this new learning tool.

Trial studies around the country involving the use of iPads in the classroom at all levels have returned positive results. These findings support what faculty and staff already engaged in the 1:1 initiative at Heights have experienced first-hand with the introduction of iPads into their classrooms: an increase in independent and self-initiated learning among students; increase in student motivation and active en-

gagement in learning; improvement in teachers' capacity to plan for and meet individual student needs; improvement in student learning outcomes; extending students' learning beyond the classroom; improving parental engagement in learning and strengthening home-school links and among others.

Heights is one of many primary schools adopting 1:1 iPad programs in the state and had applied for a grant to help make this possible. While grant monies fell short this year, the determined teachers and administration at the Primary School pulled together funding from several sources to purchase 60 mini-iPads and cases in order to roll out a pilot program involving first grade students in Baitz and Mandery's classes. They have not been disappointed. The students love the new interactive tool and Baitz and

Mandery try to utilize the new iPads during some part of each day.

The teachers say they have simply transitioned from white board application to iPad application when it makes sense. They have helped the students become familiar with the devices and learn a number of simple applications to work into the core curriculum to give them exposure and experience with this new tool. "We are assessing everything from the size of the device to establishing the rules of the road for use, student response, and engagement," said Baitz, who has been with the corporation in several capacities for over 16 years. "Overall, the students have taken to this new amenity very well. In fact, we have moved from the basics to using these tools for creation projects for reading, math, science and social studies."

"This tool just seems to be something that draws and keeps the attention of the students," added Mandery, with six years under belt as an educator at Heights. "It is another tool we can use to reach every student at their learning level. "Some days the classroom is so quiet you can hear a pin drop because students are so engaged in their work," added Baitz.

"We want the best learning opportunities for our students," continued Mandery. "Advances in technology have changed the way people access and process information and digital literacy skills are essential for our children to be successful in the 21st century. This is a part of a well thought out, researched and considered process designed around ensuring our students have the best possible education we can give them."

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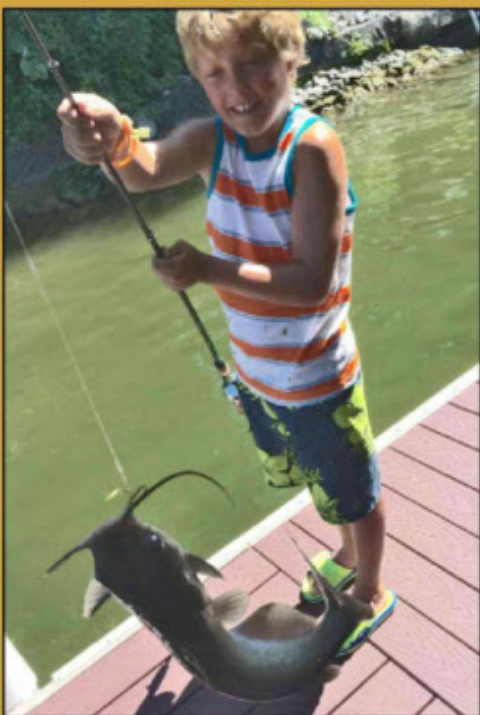

# Fuel agree to terms with Travis Ouellette

The Indy Fuel signed forward Travis Ouellette to a standard ECHL player contract, the team announced Wednesday. A 5'9", 165 lb. right-handed shooter from Windsor, Ontario, Canada, Ouellette split time last season with the Arizona Sundogs and St. Charles Chill in the Central Hockey League (CHL) and the Greenville Road Warriors in the ECHL.

"We're happy to add Travis to the mix in our forward group," said Fuel Head Coach and Vice President of Hockey Operations Scott Hillman on Wednesday. "He'll add depth and experience to our team and he's certainly got the ability to score goals."

In 25 CHL appearances last season, Ouellette, 25, scored nine goals and collected 24 combined points before potting

two goals and three points in nine ECHL appearances for Greenville. Prior to his professional career, Ouellette tallied 37 goals and 82 career points in 147 games played for Ferris State University over four seasons from 2009 to 2013 and helped the Bulldogs to their only NCAA Frozen Four appearance in program history in 2012.

Next up for the Fuel is a Friday home clash vs. the Evansville IceMen with the opening faceoff set for 7:35 p.m. at the Fairgrounds Coliseum on "Halloween Trunk or Treat Night." All youth ticket holders in attendance will receive an Indy Fuel Halloween goodie bag and are invited to participate in the Safe Night Trunk or Treat Event on the Indiana State Fairgrounds from 5 to 7 p.m.

## Is Fishers' aerial game key?

Could it get any better than this?  
Seriously!  
\*Two state powerhouses who here in Hamilton County are separated by White River. Carmel is undefeated and ranked No. 1 in Indiana. Fishers is 7-3 and ranked No. 12. The Tigers will visit the Greyhounds (7 p.m.) on Friday.

\*Carmel has a long and extremely successful post-season tournament record. The Greyhounds have won seven state championships and have reached the State Finals a dozen times. Fishers has played football only since 2006. The Tigers went 1-10 this first season, winning a sectional game over Kokomo. In 2010 the Tigers went 14-1 and won the state championship.

\*This season, Carmel has lost to no one. The Greyhounds won the MIC Conference, arguably the best football conference in the state. Fishers finished second in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference, arguably the second-best conference in the state.

\*Both teams have great coaches. Kevin Wright is 51-9 in this his fifth year at Carmel. Rick Wimmer is 70-34 in this his 9<sup>th</sup> year as Fishers' only coach. Take away that first season, Wimmer's record is 69-24 while building a new program. Wimmer has been a varsity coach for 32 years. His career record is 234-117. Wright has been a varsity coach for 21 years. His career mark is 185-63.

\*Fishers has one of the state's top running backs in Maurice Campbell. Carmel, even with the injury loss of quarterback Michael Viktrup, has a great stable of running backs in Shakir Paschall, Chris Perkins and Isaac James.

Carmel Stadium will be jumping in this one.

"I am always impressed when I watch Rick Wimmer's teams," said Wright. "They have done a great job improving each week and are one of the most complete teams we will play. They are a balanced offense, led by Campbell, who is the best running back we have played against. They are a true 4-3 defense and they play it well. They are also a very good kicking team.

"We've had two tremendous games with them in the last few years and I expect the same thing Friday," Wright added.

"Carmel is very good," Wimmer talked about the Greyhounds. "Their defense is awesome. They are scoring at an average of 30 points a game while allowing just 11.9.

"We will have to tackle well and we must get their offense off the field. We need a better offense to do that," said Wimmer.

The interesting battle to watch will be Campbell running the pigskin for Fishers and, with Viktrup out, what once was a four-headed Carmel monster now being a three-headed Carmel monster.

Campbell has carried the football 243 times, gained 1434 yards and has scored 18 touchdowns. As a team, Fishers has rushed for 1880 yards and ran for 25 TDs. Campbell is the attack for the Tigers.

"Campbell has been held under 100 yards in just one game this season," Wimmer said. "That's when he rushed for 90 yards against Zionsville. But, it all starts up front. Our guys have to make plays."

While Fishers will run the football with Campbell, Carmel will run the football with Paschall (175 carries for 837 yards), Perkins (119 for 712) and James (71 for 497). James is averaging seven yards a carry and Perkins six yards a trip.

The one huge difference between the two teams on the stat page is the passing game. Fishers quarterback Zach Eaton is 116-for-208 for 1422 yards and 11 touchdowns. He has been intercepted just three times. James, who quarterbacked Carmel to the state championship game last season before being moved to a wide-receiver this year, is just 8-of-24 through the air for 187 yards since replacing Viktrup. He has thrown for three touchdowns and has been intercepted only two times.

Wright doesn't pull any punches in talking about Carmel's ground attack.

"We are who we are; we run the football," said the coach.

Carmel has an outstanding offensive line.

Eaton will throw the ball around. Four Fishers receivers have double digit catches, led by Simeon Foster with 29 for 432 yards and Chris Thomas with 22 for 381. Jordan Hernandez has 11 receptions for 148 yards and Campbell has 10 for 92 yards.

Carmel has three receivers with double digit grabs, James with 24 for 162 yards, Jalen Walker with 19 for 192 and Ethan Merriweather with 10 for 170. With James now at QB, the spotlight is on Walker and Merriweather.

Fishers is scoring at a 29.0 clip and is allowing just 16 points a game.

Both teams have strong defenses.

Carmel is led in tackles by Ryan Smith 70. Alex Osleger has 62, Cameron Hunt 42 and Noah Burks 40. Logan Burgess has 4.5 sacks and Burks has 4.0.

Leading Fishers in tackles are Luke Harbison (36), Josh Lloyd (35), Michael Kinder (33), R.J. Potts (31), and Trent Nielsen 30. Joel Wilcox has 6.5 sacks

Fishers has 16 sacks and 15 pass interceptions. Carmel has 25 sacks and six picks.

"Our kids continue to overcome injuries and find ways to win physical games against some vey good teams" Wright said. "Our defense has done a great job of keeping people out of he end zone and holding teams to field goals in the red zone. Our offense has started slowly the past couple of weeks but has responded well in the second half with our backs against the wall."

"It was a big deal for our team last week when we defeated Hamilton Southeastern for the second time in the same season," said Wimmer. "That never before had happened."

# ‘Rocks to face No. 1 Mavs

The history of the Westfield-McCutcheon football series has been interesting.

In the early days, the Mavs unloaded on the Shamrocks. The series began with the birth of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference in 2001. McCutcheon won, easily the first four games 49-6, 49-6 again, 46-21 and 49-21.

Then things changed. Westfield won eight of the next 10 games, including the last six. As the series ended after last season with McCutcheon leaving the HCC, Westfield defeated the Mavericks twice, 42-28 during the regular season and 45-21 in the sectional.

Now, the series has taken on a brand new look. For the second straight year McCutcheon and Westfield on Friday (7 p.m. at McCutcheon) will meet in a sectional game. This time, however, McCutcheon is coming out of the North Central Conference while Westfield is still in the Hoosier Crossroads.

McCutcheon is 9-0 and ranked No. 1 in Class 5A. Westfield is 5-4. Westfield is the defending state runner-up.

The contest Friday will be a first-round event in Class 5A, Sectional 11.

“Obviously when you draw the team which is undefeated and ranked No. 1,” said Westfield coach Jake Gilbert, “there is plenty to be concerned about. But, I am grateful for the bye week and the time we had to prepare. Our guys understand what is at stake. We not only want to make it back to the state championship game, we want to win it.

“The road is tough,” Gilbert continued. “We start with the No. 1 team in 5A. We have worked extremely hard, and I trust our kids are ready.”

McCutcheon, scoring at a 47.8 clip and allowing just 17.4 points a game, has blown out most of its opponents while playing the

new North Central Conference schedule. The Mavs started the season with a victory over a Hoosier Conference team, Zionsville, 21-13. Then came a 45-37 win over a non-conference foe West Lafayette. The Mavs went on to pound NCC opponent Lafayette Jeff 55-14, Kokomo 42-21, Logansport 49-19, Richmond 56-12, Harrison 33-, Muncie Central 61-27 and Anderson 68-7.

“McCutcheon is big and physical,” Gilbert continued. “They have the ability to bully you on both sides of the ball with their line play. They have a running back who averages over 250 yards per game.

“McCutcheon has rolled over everyone they have played this season. I know they are excited to get a shot at us. We played them twice last season so we are pretty familiar with each other.

“For us to win” Gilbert said, “we have to stop the run first ad foremost. Our defensive linemen will have to play well and we better tackle all night. Offensively, we have to execute without turning the ball over. Our turnover margin has held us back from being a great team. Our offensive linemen will have to be ready to go and we need a huge night from our running bacs. We need to continue to be explosive and force McCutcheon to defend the entire field.”

McCutcheon’s running back is Blake Elming with 221 carries for 2200 yards. The 5-9, 165 pounder has rushed for 27 touchdowns. Levon Thompson has carried 47 times for 419 yards and six TDs. Quarterback Aaron Phillips is 38-of-67 for 752 yards and 12 touchdowns. He has been intercepted just two times. Phillips’ top receivers are Dakota Loveless with 13 catches for 326 yards and four touchdowns and Kevin Adkins with eight catches for 157 yards and four scores.

Westfield, hopefully, benefitted from the week off. The Shamrocks had dropped back to back games to Avon 23-6 and Fishers

On the ground, Elvin Caldwell has carried 156 times for 847 yards and 12 touchdowns and Brandon Karsnick 53 times for 276 yards.
