

Noblesville Police offer safety tips

The Noblesville Police Department would like to remind residents that the official designated hours for Halloween this year in the City of Noblesville will be from 5:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. tonight.

Officers from the Noblesville Police Department will be paying particular attention to motorists who are not obeying traffic laws in and around residential areas where children will be expected to be walking. We would urge all motorist to exercise due care as children sometimes make sudden or unexpected movements such as darting between parked vehicles and crossing streets in locations that are not properly marked, illuminated or designated for pedestrian crossing.

We would also like to remind citizens to observe a few safety tips that will help to make this an enjoyable evening for all.

Parents:

- •Make sure an adult or older responsible youth will be supervising the outing for younger children.
- •Instruct your children to travel only in familiar areas and along an established route.
- •Teach your children to stop only at houses or apartment buildings that are well-lit and never enter a stranger's home.
- •Tell your youngsters not to eat any treat until they return home.

•Establish a return time.

•Review all the appropriate trick-or-treat safety precautions, including pedestrian/traffic safety rules.

•Remind children to walk on sidewalks, not in the street. If no sidewalk in available, have children walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic.

•Remind children to walk, do not run. Be careful crossing yards and lawns where unseen objects or uneven terrain can present tripping hazards.

Costumes and Face Design:

•Only fire-retardant materials should be used for costumes.

Costumes should not be so long that they are a tripping hazard. (Falls are the leading cause of unintentional injuries on Halloween.)

•If children are allowed out after dark, outfits should be made with light colored materials. Strips of reflective tape should be used to make children more visible.

•Avoid masks that may obstruct a child's vision. Use facial paint instead.

Motorists:

•Watch for children darting out from between parked cars.

•Watch for children walking on roadways, medians, and curbs.

•Enter and exit driveways and alleys carefully.

•Travel at a reduced speed (10-15 mph below the posted speed limit) especially in residential areas where it is obvious that children will be walking.

Residents:

•Leave your exterior lights on near your front door if you are participating in handing out candy. Parents/children will use this as a means to identify your willingness to participate.

•Secure any pets (outside and inside) that may become startled because of the costumes, noise, or overall increase in activities on that evening.

•Make sure that children have a clear path to and from your front door. Decorations or other Halloween displays can sometimes impede or present a tripping hazard for unsuspecting children.

Additional Considerations:

•Carrying flashlights will help children see and be seen more clearly.

•When in doubt about a specific treat that your child has brought home, simply throw it away. It is not worth the risk! •Contact the Noblesville Police Department immediately if you suspect that your child's candy/treat has been compromised

in any way! It is our hope that these few tips will



Carmel-Fishers rivalry warming

Fifty years or so from now when you and I are looking down from that big press box in the sky to Reynolds Tiger Stadium in Fishers or trying to climb all those stairs at Carmel Stadium, things will be different when the Tigers and Greyhounds go to war on the football field. By then, it will be

a full-blown rivalry between Carmel and Fishers. The two teams, likely, will be playing during the regular season, although Carmel AD Jimmy Inskeep will find it difficult juggling Carmel's schedule and plaving Fishers. Southeastern and Noblesville and at the same time playing a seven-game MIC Conference schedule. The IHSAA, perhaps, will allow for more than a nine-game regular season schedule. Afterall, the IHSAA this upcoming season is allowing boys and girls basketball teams to play two extra games.

Count on it, the rivalry will be hot 50 years from now.

It is amazing how far Rick Wimmer has taken the Fishers football program in eight short years. Wimmer has taken the program to a point where tonight Fishers will be on an equal level to compete with one of the state's oldest and most successful football program in the state.

It was a great story on how HSE continued to win with half the students after Fishers was born. Even more amazing was how that new high school, that second high school, started to win big time, especially in football.

One of the jobs now-retired Fishers Athletic Director Jon Miles did while helping Fishers High School begin was selecting coaches. Miles did his job well. No better example than hiring Wimmer.

The Tigers went 1-10 that first season. They didn't win a game until Fishers defeated Kokomo in the first round of the sectional. In the second round, Fishers lost to Carmel 41-0

Two years later, Fishers won the state championship. That is remarkable for a start-up football program.

Fishers and Carmel have never met in a regular season football game. The Tigers and the Greyhounds have squared off four times in tourney play. (Check out the series results elsewhere in today's sports section). Fishers lost one of those games by a 7-0 margin. The year Fishers won the state, the Tigers slipped to a 17-14 win over the Greyhounds.

The series has been played with some great coaches. Wimmer is one of the best in the state. Mo Moriarity coached the first two games in the series for Carmel. Kevin Wright has coached the last two.

Although it will be tough to top the 7-0 game won by Carmel in 2009 and the 17-14 game won by Fishers in 2010, tonight's game at Carmel may be the best-yet in the series

Carmel will run the football behind. a huge and talented offensive line of junior Simon Pachciarz (245) senior Ryan Moriarty (265), senior Nate Thompson (225), junior Cayden Cronnin (279) and senior Matt Anton (255). The backfield trio of Isaac James, Shakir Paschall Chris Perkins is outstanding.

Fishers has one of the state's best running backs in Maurice Campbell. He has carried the pigskin 243 times for 1434 yards and 18 touchdowns. Fishers isn't as big as Carmel up front, but the Tigers are good with senior Luka Skudrzik (225) junior Titus Martin (270), senior Matt Hafley (236), junior Gavin Laffoon (228) and junior Chase Bowser (242).

There are a couple of differences when you look at these two powerhouse teams.

*Southeastern's passing attack is very good. Carmel, simply, doesn't throw the ball as much.

Fishers junior Zach Eaton has thrown for 1422 yards and 11 touchdowns and has been intercepted just three times in 208 tosses.

*While Fishers' defense is very good, allowing an average of just 16 points a game, Carmel is giving up just 11.9 points a game.

So, folks, here we go. The series will heat up tonight, but nothing like it will become years from now.

The game was played in a driving rain storm in the first half and strong winds in the second half. Fishers took the ball for their final drive at their own 10 with 3:55 to play. The drive stalled when Justin Todd knocked down a pass on fourt and five with 20 seconds left There were 14 punts in the game.

October 29, 2010 Fishers 17, Carmel 14 Sectional Semifinal played at Carme Weather: 53 degrees, overcast

Fishers dominated field position in the first half while charging out to a 14-0 halftime lead. Fishers quarterback Orris threw for 194 yards on 13-of-22. Carmel scored on the first drive of the second half to close the gap to 14-7 on a Devin Brinson two yard run. Fishers answered with a 35-yard field goal to start the fourth quarter. Carmel countered on the next drive with a nine-yard TD run from Brinson, making it 17-14 with 5:25 left in the game. A fake put run on fourth down was enough for a Fishers first down, and the Tigers ran out the clock. Fishers went on to win the state championship with a victory over Lawrence Central.

November 1, 2013 Carmel 35, Fishers 20 **Sectional Championship Played at Carmel** Weather: 45 degrees, clear

Class 6A, No. 6 Carmel ran for 385 yards in racing to a 35-7 lead in the third quarter as the Greyhounds defeated No. 5 Fishers. The Tigers scored on the second play of the game as Indiana University recruit J-Shun Harris caught a screen pass from Connor Christiansen and went 72 yards. The Greyhounds scored 28 straight points before half. Fishers mounted a comeback in the fourth quarter, pulling to within 35-20 but a goal line stand at the one by Carmel in the closing minutes closed the door. Carmel was led by Shakir Paschall with 22 carries for 209 yards and three touchdowns. Isaac James ran 18 times for 135 yards and a touchdown.

Soccer state champions to be crowned Saturday

A defending state champion and runnerup from last year join a perennial power and five others setting the field for Saturday's 21st Annual IHSAA Boys & Girls Soccer State Finals.

This is the third year the state finals will be played at Carroll Stadium on the IUPUI campus just west of downtown Indianapolis. The Class A boys state championship will begin the day at 10:30 a.m., followed by the Class A girls final at 1 p.m., the 2A boys match at 3:30 p.m. and the 2A girls finale at 6 p.m. All four matches will be streamed live at IHSAAtv.org.

Top-ranked and defending Class A boys state champion Guerin Catholic will meet No. 2 Tri-West Hendricks in the first championship of the day. That will be followed by No. 4 Evansville Mater Dei and No. 5 Fort Wayne Canterbury, two squads making their first appearances at this level of the tournament for the Class A girls title.
