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# Abide in Him

Christian, “*Christianos*”. Not one who merely goes to church, nor one whom has made a confession of faith with the lips but, with that profession goes no further as “even the demons believe and tremble” James 2:19 (NKJV), but one that is a follower of Christ. Christian(s) appears three times in the King James Bible. In Acts 26:28 King “Agrippa said unto Paul, Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian” and the Apostle Peter writes “Yet if any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed” 1 Peter 4:16. But, “the disciples were first called Christians in Antioch” Acts 11:26 (NKJV). In around 42-43 A.D. the pagan world dubbed the followers Christian out of contempt, and vehemently rejected this group of people as did the Jewry. As those from the Kingdom of Rome are called Roman, and Syrians are called such, as they hail from Syria, Christians are called Christian because they are of the Kingdom of Christ. While it was said, we would suffer as followers of Christ neither Jesus nor his disciples ever called us Christians, rather fellow followers were referred to as disciples, servants, brethren, the elect or saints. It was not a name chosen by the followers of Christ but a name applied to them based on what was observed about them. Despite severe persecution the followers remained faithful to Christ and His teachings. The brethren abided in Christ.

As Christ followers we abide *in* Him and He abides *in* us (John 15:4)! To abide- “*meno*” - we stay in, stand in, continue in, dwell in, endure in, and tarry in (which is to remain in place). We abide in Him through Him. Christian, we don’t just believe in God the external. When we came to our knees in repentance and took Him as savior we became indwelt with His Holy Spirit. We through the Holy Spirit become engrafted with Him. He is grafted into every fiber of our being and into every area of our lives. He, unless you deliberately separate yourself from Him, becomes inseparable from us; the naked eye should not be able to perceive where we stop and He begins. We “turned to God from idols to serve the living and true God” 1 Thess 1:9 (NKJV). “By this we know that we are *in* Him. He who says he abides in Him ought himself also to walk just as He walked” 1 John 2:5-6 (NKJV). We trust in Him and learn to walk in submission and devotion to His ways and in His love. As a consequence along the way we become increasingly obedient, and “as in obeying the voice of the LORD? Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice” 1 Sam 15:22 (NKJV). We wear the badge *Christianos* in humility and

fear of the LORD as “what does the LORD your God require of you, but to fear the LORD your God, to walk in all His ways and to love Him, to serve the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul, *and* to keep the commandments of the LORD” Deut 10:12-13 (NKJV).

“See, I have set before you today life and good, death and evil” Deut 30:15 (NKJV). There are two paths set before us. Matt 7: 13-14 makes known a wide gate and broad path that leads to destruction and a narrow gate with a difficult path leading to life. The broad path is the way of the world, the way of the unrighteous; it is the path of least resistance. The narrow way, this is the path of the obedient walking their way through hardships and difficult decisions. Steps on this path involve making decisions that are neither always comfortable nor agreeable with the ways of the world. In obedience if you “in all your ways acknowledge Him...He shall direct your paths” Prov 3:6 (NKJV). Therefore, “Ponder the path of your feet, And let all your ways be established. Do not turn to the right or the left; Remove your foot from evil.” Prov 4:26-27 (NKJV). The narrow path will separate us from the world and unfortunately it will also often separate us from certain persons who have been intimately involved in our lives as not all the people in our lives are treading the same path. Sometimes with each step we take on the narrow path it is almost as if a wall is building between ourselves and those determined to remain in a world that is tenaciously seeking and choosing the easy road with the wide open gate. With each footfall another brick is laid. It is not a wall built to keep others out, but rather a wall that separates one path from the other. As we walk up the path getting closer to the God we love, the higher and higher the wall seems to gets. And, it is a wall we cannot straddle. We can’t have one foot on the path to sanctification and the other on the path to destruction. We are not to be conformed to this world (Romans 12:2); we are not to be partakers with the sons of disobedience sharing in their filthiness and foolish talk (Eph 5:4-7). We cannot abide in relationship with the world. “Do you not know that friendship with the world is enmity with God? Whoever therefore wants to be a friend of the world makes himself an enemy of God” James 4:4 (NKJV).

Christian, we abide in Him - we stay in Him, endure in Him, tarry in Him; by definition alone our belief and behavior needs to be congruent. When there is inconsistency or conflict in our faith and our walk it creates a dissonance in the soul. A feeling of unrest, confusion, strife, and pain. The further apart the belief and behavior, the greater the dissonance. The dissonance creates a discomfort, a stress that will find a way to relieve itself most often in self destructive ways with negative results including resentment, distraction, an inability to move in any

direction, retreat, anger, addictions – to name a few. The stress will continue until something changes. Either the belief has to change or the behavior has to change. You have to make a choice, a decision to follow one path. That includes understanding that there are worldly relationships we cannot abide in. If you are straddling the wall eventually you will either fall or be pulled to the path of least resistance. While contemplating your walk remember, “*it is* impossible for those who were once enlightened, and have tasted the heavenly gift, and have become partakers of the Holy Spirit, and have tasted the good word of God and the powers of the age to come, if they fall away, to renew them again to repentance, since they crucify again for themselves the Son of God, and put *Him* to an open shame” Heb 6:4-6 (NKJV). Just as in musical dissonance – where one note clashes up against the next note, with both notes having been written to be played, the melody will not resolve until you play the next note. If the note lingers unresolved, there remains a harsh sound that hangs - needing something else to be played.

Jesus said “**He who loves father or mother more than Me is not worthy of Me. And he who loves son or daughter more than Me is not worthy of Me**” Matt 10:37 (NKJV). Your relationship with Christ is the number one relationship. Jesus – the person of God, is the relationship we abide in. We abide in Him, He abides in us. Christian, He is engrafted in you and there is no way to separate the graft without death. Those of the world, “They do not know, nor do they understand” Psalms 82:5 (NKJV).

Put Him first. Our strength is in Him, that strength abides within us. When we meditate on Him and his Word we can retreat into our Souls where He lives and connect with His spirit in us; we can actually feel His arms holding, His hands wiping away the tears, His voice that says it will be alright as we walk the difficult path leading to life. Yes, when the world looks at us under the microscope flaws will still be seen “My little children, these things I write to you, so that you may not sin. And if anyone sins, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous. And He Himself is the propitiation for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the whole world” 1 John 2:1-2 (NKJV).

Choose your path. “I pour out my soul within me. For I used to go with the multitude; I went with them to the house of God, With the voice of joy and praise, With a multitude that kept a pilgrim feast.” Psalms 42:4 (NKJV). “Blessed *is* the man Who walks not in the counsel of the ungodly, Nor stands in the path of sinners, Nor sits in the seat of the scornful; But his delight *is* in the law of the LORD, And in His law he meditates day and night.” Psalms 1:1-2 (NKJV)

# World-class divers in Heights pool

If you've been around Hamilton Heights' pool this past week, you've probably seen some world-class divers.

The Huskies have opened their Natatorium to John Wingfield, the 2008 Olympic diving coach, and his diving academy. The Indiana Diving Academy, which also goes by the name Ripfest, is setting up shop in Hamilton County, as it also uses the Forest Park Aquatic Center in Noblesville for training, along with a dryland facility at Carroll Construction's building at State Road 19 and 206th Street.

"It's really a win-win situation," said Wingfield. "Their youth in the area get world class coaching, and we have the opportunity to utilize those facilities.

One of those divers is now a Husky. Brooke Schultz transferred to Heights this year, and she will be a sophomore diver for the Huskies team. Schultz won the FINA Junior World Championships in the girls 14-15 age 1-meter event.

Wingfield is familiar with another Noblesville diver: He coached David Boudia at the 2008 Olympics, which of course was the beginning of Boudia's Olympic glory. He would go on to win a gold medal in the men's 10-meter individual platform in 2012.

Among some of the other divers who practiced at the Huskies pool were Toby Stanley, a 22-year-old Arkansas native now making his home in Fishers. Stanley just competed at the Malaysian Grand Prix, where he finished second in the 10-meter platform. Stanley has won several national and international competitions throughout his career.

Also diving at Heights include Zach Cooper, a 16-year-old from Martinsville.

He won the 14-18 Synchronized Boys Platform event at this year's Junior National Diving Championships. Cooper, in fact, has been winning meets since a young age - his first big victories were in the 8-9 Boys division at the Annual National Grassroots Invitational, where he swept the 1-meter, 3-meter and platform novice events.

The girls are well-represented as well. Brooke Popsichal, an 18-year-old from Carrollton, Texas, has won several events, including a 1-3-platform sweep in the 14-15 Girls division of the 2011 Pine Crest David Nielsen Invitational. Annie Wiese, from Carmel, is 15 and already a big winner: She was first in the Synchronized Women Platform at the USA Diving National Preliminary Zone B Championships.

The most experienced of the group is Mai Nakagawa, 27, from Japan. She was a 10-meter platform finalist at the 2008 and 2012 Olympics.

"Our program is attracting many of the best from the world," said Wingfield.

The coach is also looking for the next generation of diving stars. That's what he did with Boudia, his former teammate Thomas Finchum and Elwood's Mary Beth Dunnichay. Wingfield took them under his wing when they were 10-and-under divers, and turned them into world-class competitors.

"We're good at doing that, kind of looking for the next young ones for down the road," said Wingfield.

Ripfest will conduct two Winter Camps for anyone interested. It does mean anyone - Ripfest's Web site said these camps are open for anyone ages "9 through 99." Visit [www.ripfest.net](http://www.ripfest.net) for more details.

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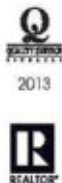

## Gilbert doesn’t know how to lose

I’m glad he was only riding on the bus and not driving it because I think I floored Westfield football coach Jake Gilbert following the Shamrocks 28-7 victory over No. 1 (Class 5A) ranked and undefeated McCutcheon Friday evening.

What I said was, “Jake, you remind me of a young Jim Belden.”

Pause.

Then Gilbert came with, “I’m really not young.”

He’s right. Jake has been a varsity football coach for 10 years. This is his fourth at Westfield. He is 55-55 overall; 25-19 and counting at Westfield.

I wasn’t so much thinking about ages. I was thinking more about Belden the coach and Belden the man before Jim became a Hall of Fame coach at Carmel after a stop at Noblesville and, yes, a start at Westfield.

All great coaches know the x’s and o’s of the game. But, the really, really great coaches have that magical touch of making kids believe they can run through brick walls. That’s what made Belden so good. Maybe the best coach ever in Indiana high school football. That same touch is what we see today in Gilbert.

Jake never knows there are games he should lose. Like, for example, the McCutcheon game.

Not many of we so-called experts gave Westfield much of a chance to win. The Mavs, you know, were undefeated. The Mavs were ranked No. 1. The Mavs were averaging 47.8 points a game.

No disrespect to McCutcheon. That was a good football team which blew its way through the North Central Conference. However, forgotten in all of this is that Westfield twice defeated the Mavs last season, including a 45-21 sectional licking and that the Shamrocks had won their last six games over the Mavericks when McCutcheon still was playing in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference.

That, of course, is the key, playing in the HCC. Again no disrespect, but playing in the HCC is a lot different than playing in the North Central Conference.

During the week, while many were talking and writing about just how tough McCutcheon is and how the Mavs were going to gain revenge over the HCC, Gilbert was planning ways to return to the State Finals. Westfield was state runner-up last season, losing to Cathedral.

Westfield can win Sectional 11 with a win this Friday at home over Harrison, another ex-Hoosier Conference team. Westfield and Harrison decided to keep playing this season. Westfield won the non-conference season opener, 35-14.

“It really helps us playing in Class 5A and playing in the Hoosier Crossroads, a 6A conference,” said Gilbert.” We are who we are and we’re a 5A team. We probably will be 5A for awhile.”

Westfield, which finished 3-3 in the HCC this season, is the only team from the HCC standing. The Shamrocks this season defeated Zionsville, Southeastern and Brownsburg (arguably the bottom three teams in the conference) and lost to Noblesville, Avon and Fishers.

Westfield’s win over McCutcheon Friday was a defensive masterpiece. The Shamrocks held Blake Elming to 77 yards in 22 carries. Elming came into the game with 2,200 yards rushing in nine games.

Westfield’s offense was amazing, too.

With starting junior quarterback Ryan Pepiot sitting out with an injury, junior varsity QB (sophomore) Andy Sweet stepped up big. He completed 10-of-13 passes for 99 yards and he also nearly had more yards rushing (73) than did Elming.


It was Westfield senior Elvin Caldwell, not Elming, who put on a running show. Caldwell carried 26 times for 121 yards and all four touchdowns.

Gilbert had his Shamrocks believing they were Superman, just like Belden did for all those years.


Following last year’s State Finals birth and should Westfield move on in this year’s tourney, Gilbert will have the community of Westfield going football nuts when the Shamrocks move into their new stadium next season. It’s a stadium which might be the best in Hamilton County. Same could be said of Gilbert’s Shamrocks.

# First-ever state soccer title for Tigers

There was so much experience on both the Fishers and Carmel girls soccer teams Saturday when they faced off for the Class 2A state championship.

Many of the Tigers players were on last year's state runner-up team. The Greyhounds are nine-time IHSAA state champions - the dictionary definition of "they don't rebuild, they reload."  
But in the 80 minutes of soccer played at IUPUI's Carroll Stadium, the biggest kick of all was by a Fishers freshman. Gretchen Mills scored the lone goal of the game, and that gave the No. 6-ranked Tigers a 1-0 state championship victory over No. 2 Carmel.

"She was nervous coming in," said Fishers coach Ben Beasley of Mills. "Her first touch was a little off. And then after that, I felt like she was one of our best threats in the midfield."  
It's the first-ever girls soccer state title for Fishers, and the school's third state championship in its history, adding to the 2007 boys cross country and 2010 5A football titles.

The Tigers finished their season with a 16-1-6 record. Carmel was one of those ties; the two teams played to a 2-2 draw on Aug. 30, which seems like years ago now. Fishers got past a difficult sectional, edging Noblesville and Hamilton Southeastern, took care of business in the regional, and held off Fort Wayne Carroll in the semi-state championship.  
Mills scored her goal unassisted in the 11th minute. Remarkably, it was one of only four shots on goal that Fishers had in the entire game - all of them were in the first half. Mills also had a shot on goal, with senior Maryna Clark making the other two. Fishers made its chances count.

"They admitted to me that they were nervous coming in last year," said Fishers coach Ben Beasley. "Rightfully so. A very young team. We were starting sophomores and juniors in key positions. Not so much a problem this year. Late in the game we had some nervous moments, but I didn't feel like we had any nervous plays."  
The 'Hounds had seven shots on goal, including three from senior Amanda Shaw and two from junior Chandler Backes. Carmel kept forcing the issue in the second half, but just couldn't get a shot in. Fishers goalkeeper Hannah Sullivan saved all seven of the Greyhounds' shots on goal.  
"Best game of her career," said Beasley. "She was focused, and again, she made things look easy."

Carmel kept fighting to the end, and almost got the tie when Shaw kicked at the net. Her shot hit the crossbar, though, coming agonizingly close to scoring.  
"We knew they can get shots on goal, and Amanda almost got one," said Beasley. "And I've known her for a long, long time, back to U-9. No, there was never a safe moment in this game."  
"After we gave up the goal, I thought we were really on it," said 'Hounds coach Frank Dixon.  
Celene Funke made three saves for Carmel, which made a memorable postseason run. The Greyhounds won both of their sectional games in overtime, escaped Cathedral in a shootout in the regional semifinals, then blitzed No. 1 Brebeuf Jesuit 3-1 to win the regional title before taking the Evansville Harrison semi-state.  
"It was a fantastic season," said Dixon. "They got better and better as we went along through the year. Our leadership was great. I can't ask for anything more. One chance here or there, and they're the state champs. The best part of it is, there's a whole bunch of them coming back next year."

# Tigers’ Peebles wins Mental Attitude Award

In addition to winning its first-ever state championship Saturday, the Fishers girls soccer team got another big honor: Its first-ever Mental Attitude Award winner.

"It's the best way you could possible end your senior year," she said. "I'm going to miss this team and this program so much, but it's awesome to say you could end it with a state championship."

# Golden Eagles defend their title

A soccer team only needs one more goal than its opponents to win.  
But it never hurts to get a couple more just in case.

The Guerin Catholic boys soccer team already had the goal it needed late in the second half of the IHSAA Class 1A state championship, but decided, why not get two more? That's what the Golden Eagles did, scoring twice in a span of 25 seconds. That made top-ranked Guerin's final margin over Tri-West 3-0, and gave GC a successful defense of its state championship.

"We've been scoring in swarms all year," said GCHS coach John Cech. "We've been scoring late, playing close games for a half, and teams have been able to hang with us for a half. But after halftime, we make a few adjustments, and when we score, they just seem to come in bunches."

That was the script on Saturday at IUPUI's Carroll Stadium. The Bruins had given up a mere 13 goals in 21 games, and came into the state championship with a 20-0-1 record and a No. 2 ranking in 1A.

Guerin kept working, and finally broke through in the 63rd minute when senior Luke Bestard kicked it in from the right side. Senior Zach Garvey had the assist, and the Golden Eagles had a 1-0 lead.

Garvey got an unassisted goal of his own with 9:35 left to make the score 2-0. Then, Bestard scored 25 seconds later, also unassisted.

Guerin Catholic had 11 shots on goal in all. Sophomore Khalid Hunter made four of them, Bestard had three and Mason May two. As for the defense, Cech said that having defenders like seniors David Hinkebein and Andrew Kaskie "makes all the difference in the world."

"We have an ability to shut teams down, and I thought we did a great job of that today," said Cech.

Sophomore goalkeeper Tarcissio Trujillo saved all three of Tri-West's shots on goal.

"Tarcissio does exactly what we ask him to do - make the key play when it's necessary, clean up the mess if our defense lets down," said Cech.

Add the Golden Eagles' 2012 3A boys basketball trophy to the two from soccer, and Guerin Catholic has now won three state championships. It also puts Guerin coach John Cech in rare company - he's

now one of only four coaches to mentor two boys soccer state championship teams.
