



Local election results were posted at the County Government and Judicial Center as is tradition, but only a small crowd showed up to watch the returns and most drifted away before final results were available just before 11 p.m. The exact cause of the computer problem was not immediately known.

Two state legislative races with big implications for Hamilton County went to Republicans as Sen. Mike Delph turned back J.D. Ford in a district that includes the Carmel area plus portions of Boone and Marion counties. And, Rep. Eric Turner who represents most of northern Hamilton County was reelected despite controversy and an announcement that he will resign immediately upon re-election.

With Turner's election, GOP precinct committeemen from Dist. 32 will choose his successor. Two county potential candidates for the seat are Tony Cook of Cicero and David Tudor of Sheridan.





If there is any team in the Mid-Indiana Conference younger than Fernung's Hamilton Heights Lady Huskies, then that team might want to hire a baby sitter for the 2014-15 season.

Hamilton Heights has only one senior. She is Caitlyn Hays. She's a good one.

"She is our senior leader," said Fernung. "Caitlyn is a three-year starter. She set our school's three-point record last season. She will be our scoring leader."

Hays was the Huskies' second-leading scorer last season, second behind an awesome senior year turned in by Haley Cook, who poured in 489 points and averaged 23.3 points a game. Hays averaged 9.4 points a contest. She was 60-of-178 shooting 3-pointers. Another senior, Kiley Walters, averaged 8.8 points a contest.

Taylor Boyd averaged 9.0 points and 6.4 rebounds. She is one of the pups returning this season. The 6-3 sophomore, who at times showed plenty of promise, is a sophomore.

"Boyd will have to rebound more and score more," said Fernung. "She passes too much, instead of shooting. She will need to take more shots and she will need to be more

If Boyd becomes the scoring threat Husky fans hope she might, Fernung will have a solid 1-2 punch with the big center and with the veteran hot-shooting Hays.

After that, it will be a battling for playing

Returning with varsity experience from last season are sophomore guard/forward Ashton Runner, junior forward Amy Griffey and junior forward Bri Henson. Runner played in all 21 games last season. Griffey and Henson each missed only one game.

That Lady Husky team finished 9-12. The Huskies started the season by winning just 1-of-5 games. They finished the year by winning 4-of-5. They beat Delta in the opening round of the sectional and then lost to Muncie Central, 40-39.

Griffey, Henson and Runner all, at times, started last season. Runner averaged 3.1 points a game; Griffey 2.8 and Henson 1.9. Griffey averaged 3.1 rebounds; Runner pulled 2.3 and Henson 2.0.

Frenung said Henson is another team leader, although only a junior, and is the best defender on the Hamilton Heights team.

# 18 state parks to close temporarily for deer reductions

temporarily to allow for controlled deer a.m. reductions in the coming weeks.

Nov. 17 and 18, and Dec. 1 and 2.

The state parks affected are Brown County, Chain O'Lakes, Charlestown, Clifty Falls, Fort Harrison, Harmonie, Indiana Dunes, Lincoln, McCormick's Creek, Ouabache, Pokagon, Potato Creek, Prophetstown, Shakamak, Spring Mill, Summit Lake, Tippecanoe River and Whitewater Memorial.

These state parks will close to the general public the evening before each of the two efforts and reopen the morning after each two-day reduction.

Only individual hunters drawn last September and those hunters they listed on their applications may participate at Brown County, Chain O'Lakes, Charlestown, Falls, Harmonie, Lincoln, McCormick's Creek, Ouabache, Pokagon, Potato Creek, Prophetstown, Shakamak, Summit Lake, Tippecanoe River and Whitewater Memorial. There will be no standby drawings at those parks.

For Fort Harrison (an archery hunt) and Indiana Dunes and Spring Mill (both are firearms hunts), a public standby drawing to fill spots left vacant will take place on property each morning of the reduction.

Indiana Dunes State Park will conduct daily standby drawings at 8 a.m. CST. Potential standby participants can apply on site between 7 and 7:45 a.m. CST but cannot enter the park before 7 a.m. CST.

Spring Mill and Fort Harrison will conduct daily standby drawings at 8:30 a.m. EST. Potential standby participants can apply onsite between 7:30 a.m. and 8:15 a.m.

Eligibility for daily onsite standby The dates for the temporary closings are drawings is limited to Indiana residents who are 18 years of age by Nov. 17, and have any valid license to take deer in Indiana. Indiana residents who possess an Indiana lifetime license to take deer are also eligible. Participants must wear a hunter orange hat or cap and vest, coat, jacket or coveralls at all times while on the property.

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

An overabundance of turnovers and a rough shooting night doomed the Pacers (1-3) to an 87-81 loss to the Milwaukee Bucks (2-2) on Tuesday night at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

Indiana shot 39.7 percent from the field, made just 6-of-24 attempts from 3-point range, and missed nine free throws. The Pacers also continued to have problems with turnovers. After committing 18 in each of their first three games, the Blue-and-Gold had 19 on Tuesday night, resulting in 28 points on the other end.

"I was more disappointed in our ability to take care of the basketball," head coach Frank Vogel said after the loss. "I thought that's what cost us the game. 28 points off turnovers for them - too much to overcome."

The loss snapped Indiana's six-game winning streak against their Central Division rivals and was the Bucks' first win at Bankers Life Fieldhouse since Nov. 5, 2010.

After taking a five-point lead into the half, the Bucks quickly extended the margin at the start of the third quarter. Brandon Knight hit two straight 3-pointers and then Jabari Parker hit a pair of mid-range jumpers as Milwaukee opened the period with a quick 10-0 spurt.

The Bucks extended their lead to as many as 17 points in the frame before Indiana mounted a comeback.

The Pacers' run coincided with leading scorer Chris Copeland finally getting it going. Copeland started the game 0-for-5 from the field, but finally started hitting shots late in the third. He scored 10 of Indiana's last 14 points in the quarter, helping the Blueand-Gold cut the deficit to eight points..



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
