Fishers murder suspect appears in court

Seventeen-year-old Hamilton Southeastern student Maxwell Winkler was arrested Tuesday, charged with the death of 73-year-old Henry Kim.

Kim was found dead near 96th defense attorney Jim Voyles. and Mollenkopf Road in Windemere Park on Saturday night. Hamilton County Coroner's report indicated Kim was shot three times and his throat slashed.

Wednesday Winkler appeared in class A felony. Hamilton County Superior Court III

for his initial hearing on the charge of murder (Class A Felony).

Winkler entered Judge William Hughes' courtroom behalf by the court. wearing orange jail clothing, handcuffed and his feet were shackled.

During the hearing Winkler sat next to high profile

"Mr. Winkler there are several things we need to accomplish today," said Judge Hughes before outlining Winkler's charge and explaining to him his rights.

Winkler did not show any emotion when Hughes explained he was being charged with one count of murder, a

Hughes continued to explain to Winkler that a preliminary plea of not guilty would be entered on Winkler's

The 17 year old Winkler was waived to adult court due to his age and the nature of the crime. Winkler is currently being held in the Hamilton County jail without bond.

After the hearing Hamilton County Prosecutor Lee Buckingham said, "Winkler is being charged with one count of murder in respect to the killing of Mr. Kim on November 1. We have no additional comments to make at this time."

Buckingham's office is expected to release the probable cause affidavit today. The affidavit is expected to outline the events that occurred the night Kim was murdered. Police have not indicated a motive for the murder.






In August 2014, Lt. Logan and Deputy Cline were dispatched on a report of a cardiac arrest at a home in the Homeplace area of southern Hamilton County. On a run in March 2014, Deputy Biddle rienced cardiac arrest. The two officers forced entry into the residence to gain access to the victim. Life saving measure, including CPR and AED use, were employed until Noblesville medics arrived and transported the victim to the hospital. Although the patient later died, the two deputies were successful in reviving the victim at the time of the incident.

Deputy Needham responded to the call hospital a few days later thanks to the life five minutes and utilized an AED, resulting

recovering from the incident.

In May of 1997 the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office, under the direction of Paul Beal, the former director of EMS for Riverview Hospital, began a program of installing automatic external defibrillators in patrol vehicles. This pilot program was called PARADE (Police as Responder Automated Defibrillation Evaluation). The program was one of a kind but quickly drew attention, and by October of 1998 four additional counties in Indiana had joined the study. The Hamilton County Sheriff's Of-

the study showed that law enforcement officers equipped with AED'S were more likely to "save" a person rather than law enforcement officer without the devices. The main goal of the program was to reduce the time from the initial call for help to the first "shock". The average first shock time for police is 6 minutes and 10 minutes for EMS according to the study. On average since the inception of the AED program the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office has used the AED'S between 6 and 9 times a year.
