Court documents reveal events in Fishers murder

The Hamilton County Prosecutor’s Office on Thursday released a 72 page probable cause affidavit that outlined the events surrounding the arrest of 17 year old Maxwell Winkler in the murder of 73 year old Henry Kim.

The documents outlined suspicious activity involving Winkler that began on Halloween night.

The affidavit revealed Kim was discovered dead by Trisin Ginn at approximately 7:15 p.m. on Saturday, November 1st.

During the probable cause hearing Fisher Police Detective Doug Baker testified that Ginn was walking his dog in the area of Windermere Park when he heard three gunshots and observed muzzle flashes from the opposite side of a nearby retention pond, where Ginn later discovered Kim with his throat slashed and shot.

Baker said when police officers arrived they found three .22 caliber shell casings near Kim’s body.

Fishers detectives testified about how they were contacted by area residents indicating on Halloween night an unknown white male followed trick or treaters in a neighborhood near Windermere Park. Residents indicated the unknown male shoved a juvenile in the



back, pulled out a knife that was later dropped. The knife was eventually recovered by Fishers police. Detectives suspect the unknown male to have been Winkler.

On Monday, November 3rd, police, while searching a wooded area for evidence, near where Kim was found dead, located Winkler. A search of Winkler revealed he was carrying two knives. Police indicated one of the knives appeared to have blood on it.

Fisher police testified in the probable cause hearing that while walking Winkler back to their police vehicles to be transported to the Fishers Police Department no questions or direct conversation was made by law enforcement due to the fact Winkler is a juvenile and was not in the presence of his parents. However, police detectives stated, Winkler made a “spontaneous utterance” of "I didn't kill anyone."

During a search of Winkler’s residence police found a .22 caliber handgun, .22 caliber ammunition that matched the shell casings found near Kim’s body, a bloody towel and handwritten letters that outlined what prosecutors called “a desire or methodology for planning to kill or injure people.”

At approximately 3:48 a.m., after hearing testimony of police officers, Judge Steven Nation found probable cause for murder and issued an arrest warrant for Maxwell Winkler.

Police find suspect’s handwritten letters outlining murder

The handwritten letters found this week during a search of Maxwell Winkler’s home were described by prosecutors as “A desire or methodology for planning to kill or injure people, were not the first of their kind.

Fishers police detectives testified in the probable cause hearing that a Hamilton Southeastern School Resource Officer learned two years ago that Winkler had then written a letter called “My Bucket List” that talked about how Winkler likes to plan and talk about killing, mass destruction and weapons of mass destruction.

Police described Winkler as a person that likes to write things down, and as a planner.

After a news release published by the Fishers Police Department asking for the community’s help with infor-

mation surrounding Henry Kim’s death, several Hamilton Southeastern students notified Fishers police with concerns Winkler may have been involved.

Detectives, during the probable cause hearing, testified Fishers Lieutenant Todd Crowder had received information from Hamilton Southeastern students that Winkler fits some of the similar profiles and changes of behavior.

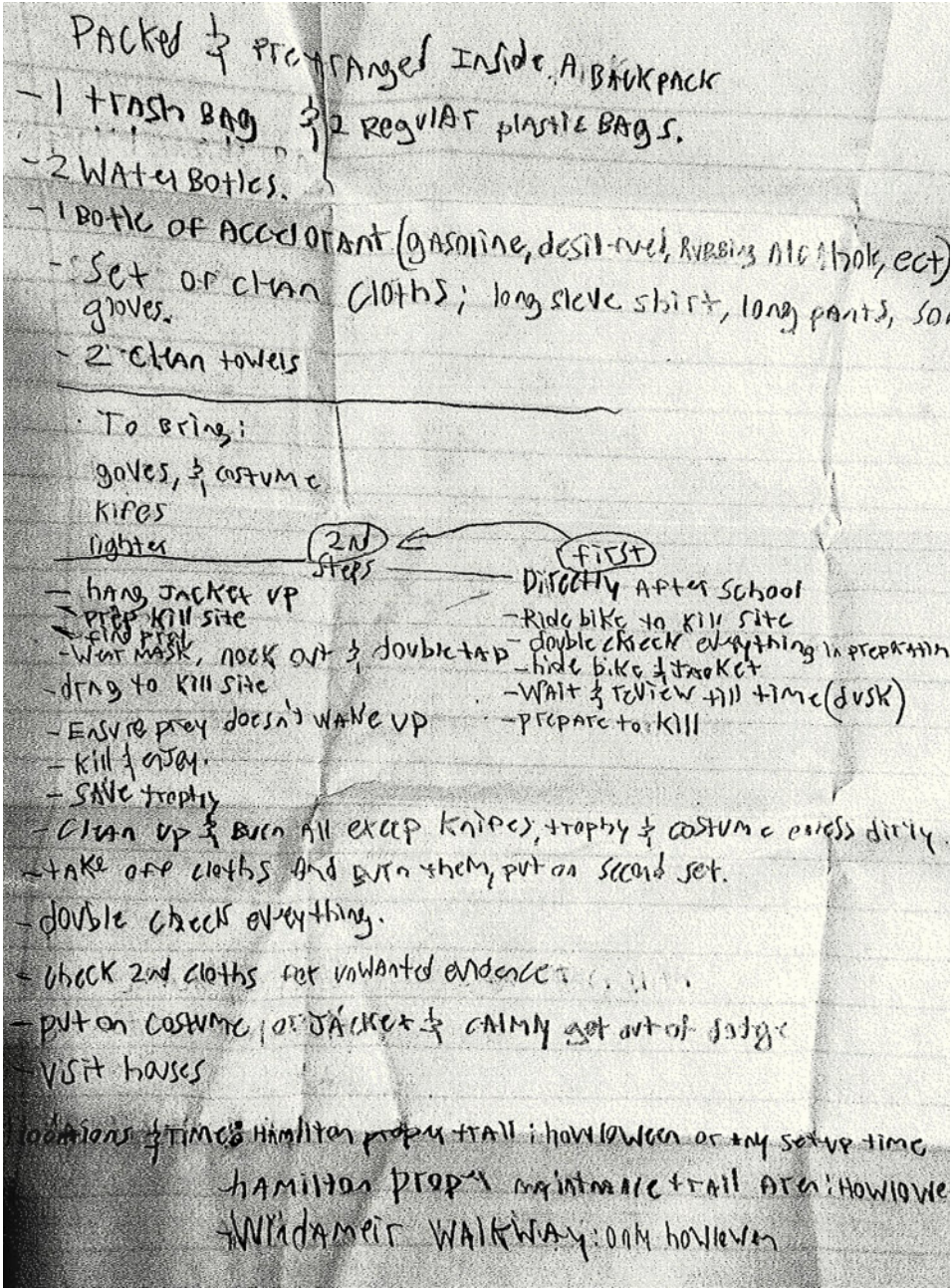
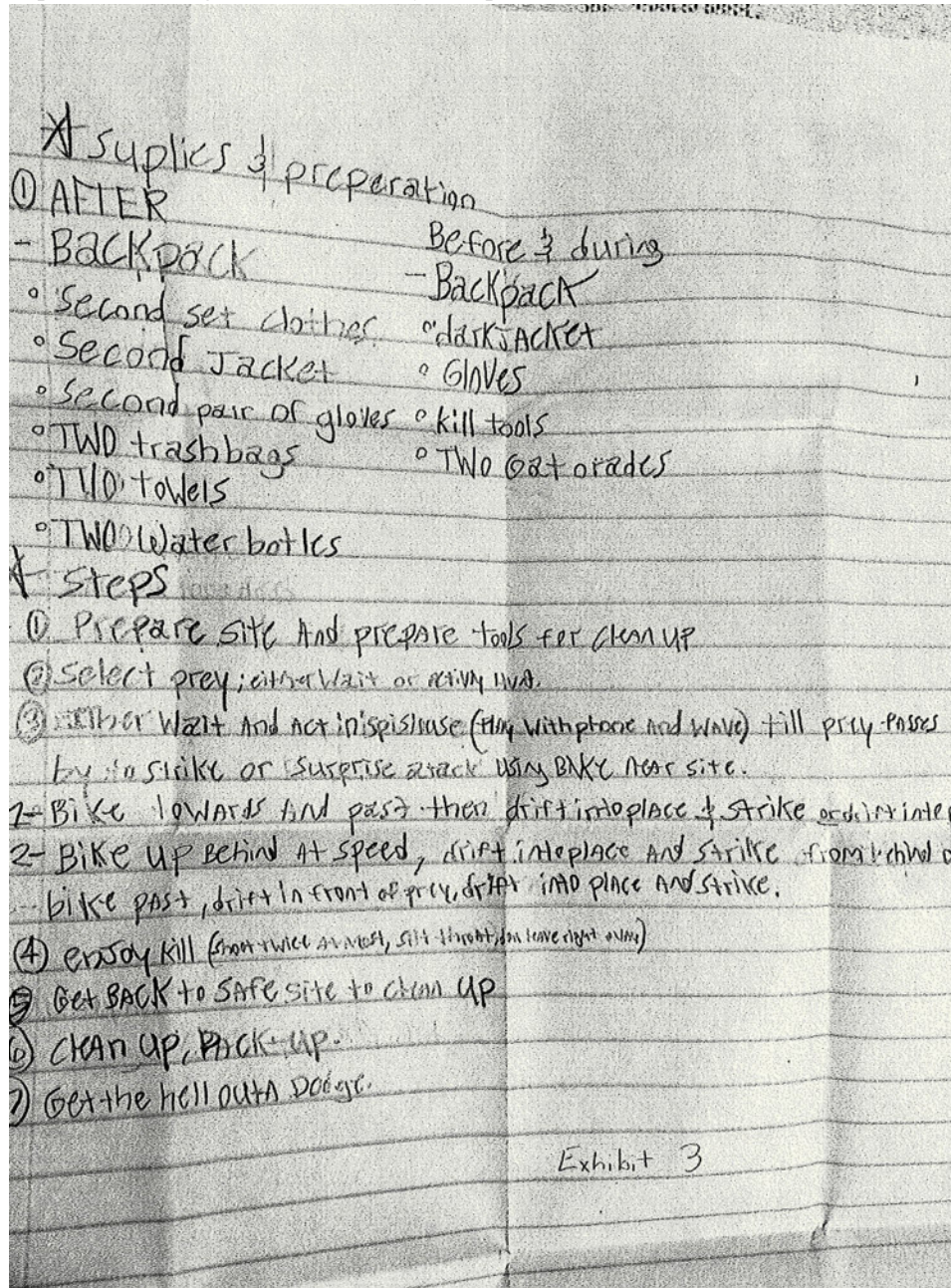
Police were also contacted by one of Winkler’s teachers indicating Winkler, over the weekend, had changed his appearance by shaving his beard and cutting his hair.

Many Hamilton Southeastern parents have expressed relief that Winkler is being held in jail and is no longer

in school. “This kid could have been the next school shooter,” said a Fishers resident during an interview at the Hamilton County Judicial Center following Winkler’s initial hearing on Wednesday.

“It is sad that an elderly man was killed, but what I don’t understand is how this kid was allowed to remain in school after police and school officials learned that he liked planning, talking and writing about killing and injuring people,” said another HSE parent. “We may have been just days away from a major school tragedy.”

The letter recovered by investigators at Winkler’s home contained statements about “finding prey, surprise attack, enjoying kill, shooting twice and slashing throat.”




This arrest stemmed from a robbery and battery that occurred on October 26th, 2014 in the 100 block of West Main Street in Carmel, IN. Through an extensive investigation, Hahn was linked to the crime through video surveillance and other related evidence. Hahn was later transported to the Hamilton County Jail and bond was set at \$35,000.

The Duke grants, totaling \$75,000, will fund programs in the three school district through Marian University’s Academy for Teaching and Learning Leadership.

“With the grant we are going to be doing a needs assessment in conjunction with Marian University,” Mundy told the Hamilton County Reporter.

The needs assessment is going to be entitled SMART Future.

“We will be inviting the community to join in a set of four meetings to work with the district to assess our present situation, set goals and brainstorm ways to continue to build Sheridan Community Schools,” Mundy said.

All meetings will take place at the Sheridan Elementary School cafeteria. They will begin at 6:30 p.m. and end no later than 8 p.m. on the following dates:

- January 21, 2015
- February 18, 2015
- March 18, 2015
- April 8, 2015

Each of the three school corporations will receive a customized program from MU-ATLL, which provides graduate level education to those who aspire to become K-12 teachers, and current K-12 teachers seeking to become principals and administrators in their schools.

“Developing great teachers is one of the most valuable things we can do to support education in our state,” Duke Energy Indiana President Doug Esamann said. “A dynamic teacher can be key to student achievement, and Marian University is using this grant to help three Indiana school systems reach new levels of teacher training.”

The population in Hamilton County is growing faster than any area of the state. In order to minimize the growing pains that inevitably accompany rapid growth, Sheridan Community Schools is embarking on a strategic visioning process to engage the local community and set a course of action for the next five years. Duke Energy Indiana has committed financial support for the process, which will help ensure the schools’ ability to serve a student population that is expected to increase significantly in the next decade. Marian University is partnering with Sheridan Community Schools to provide strategic planning services and marketing/communication materials to maximize success and engagement.

portant, not because of Turner, but because he is going to resign and a replacement will be chosen before the end of the year to take his place in next year's legislative session.

Finally, there was an example of the importance of one vote in Tuesday's election. In the election of Southeastern School Board members, two candidates tied in Fall Creek Township in a three-way race for a board seat. Katrina Hockemeyer and Matthew Stolle each received 1,182 votes.

As it turns out they won't have to worry about breaking the tie because the third candidate, Michelle Fullhart, won the seat with 1,414 votes, but a tie shows the importance one vote can have in any election.

The City of Carmel announced the addition of 2.25 miles to its trail network on Wednesday. The new trails will be located on Main Street from Cool Creek Court to Gray Road (left) and on 136th Street between Keystone Parkway and Gray Road (right).

Trail projects will add 2.25 miles to Carmel’s network

The City of Carmel will add more than two miles to its 125 miles of existing paths used by walkers, runners and bicyclists throughout the City. Work is now underway on the two new City path projects, which include:

- 136th Street from Keystone Parkway to Gray Road, an additional 1.25 miles;
- Main Street from Cool Creek Court to Gray Road, an additional one mile section that will extend the path from Keystone Parkway to Gray Road.

The projects are being funded largely with federal transportation dollars from the Transportation Alternatives Program administered through the Indiana Department of Transportation. The program calls for 80 percent of the project cost to be funded by INDOT, 20 percent from local revenues. The 136th Street Path contract was awarded for \$666,736 and the Main Street Path contract was awarded for \$821,339.

“These are exciting projects that will enhance the pedestrian and bicycling options for many of our residents living to the east of Keystone Parkway. Carmel is already recognized as a bronze level Bicycle Friendly Community by the League of American Bicyclists and we hope to raise that level of recognition by adding these to our network of paths and trails,” said Mayor Jim Brainard.

Online holiday sales expected to jump 10 to 15 percent

Online holiday sales are expected to be 10 percent to 15 percent higher than last year, says Richard Feinberg, a Purdue University professor of retail management.

Feinberg says retail sales are expected to exceed \$70 billion in November and December.

Online sales likely will account for 10 percent of all retail holiday spending, up from 9 percent in 2013 and 8 percent in 2012, he says.

While online sales continue to grow, that growth is slowing, Feinberg says.

"Much of the online sales increases the last five years have been fueled by a growth in the number of online shoppers, not how much they spent," he says. "The growth in new shoppers is slowing. So online retailers are faced with having to lure shoppers from other online competitors and enticing shoppers to spend more."

Some other observations from Feinberg on online holiday sales include:

- * From 20 percent to 25 percent of online sales will come from mobile devices. "Tablets are particularly significant for mobile sales growth, accounting for some 70 percent of all mobile-based sales," he says. "It is still difficult for most consumers to transact on their smartphone. This should change dramatically over the next two years as smartphone screen sizes get larger and retailers learn how to improve mobile sales sites."
- * More retailers will offer free shipping. "Consumers expect free shipping," Feinberg says. "They recommend online stores with free shipping to their friends."
- * Price continues to be a dominant factor in online sales. "Purdue research shows that the majority of online shoppers use price to make buying decisions," Feinberg says. "It's just too easy to compare prices for similar products on the Internet."
- * Consumers read and trust online reviews. "Our research shows that more than half of all consumers – and even more of those under 35 – do online research before buying," Feinberg says. "The reviews can determine where they buy and what they buy."

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Heights will visit Guerin

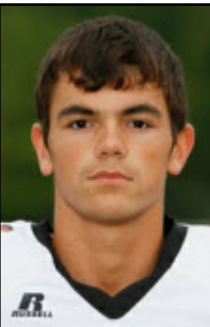

Both have strong offensive which can hit opponents with several weapons. Both have defenses capable of stopping opponents. Both teams have excellent players at the skill positions and both have strong offensive and defensive lines. Both have super stars. Both teams are deep in talent.

Problem is, both are from Hamilton County and only one will advance into the post-season tonight when Heights travels to Guerin in the Eagles Nest for the championship game of Class 3A, Sectional 30.

Coach Mitch Street's Huskies are 9-2, beaten only by 6A Noblesville and by Mid-Indiana Conference champ Lewis Cass. The Huskies got off to a slow start, losing 2-of-4 and playing without quarterback Ethan Jones. Heights has won its last seven games, including a 28-27 sectional opener against undefeated Indian Creek.

This is Street's fourth season as head coach at Heights. He will enter Friday's contest with a 39-10 record.

Coach Tom Dilley's Eagles are 8-3, beaten only by 5A Martinsville and Terre Haute South and by 4A Chatard. The 28-24 Martinsville loss and the 24-23 overtime

loss to Terre Haute South came in the Eagles' first three games.

This is Dilley's first season at Guerin. "Hamilton Heights is a good team with lots of talent," said Dilley. "They have lots of different weapons. (Grant) Weatherford is a very good football player. Trouble is, if you try to focus on any one player you can get into trouble"

"Guerin has lots of skilled people and good offensive and defensive lines," Street talked about the Eagles. "They've had some injuries, but they are so deep and have others who have stepped up.

"We can't go three-and-out. We can't commit turnovers. We need to keep their offense off the field They can run or pass. We can do that, too.

"Guerin is well-coached and has lots of players," Street added.

Weatherford, of course, is a player who has done it all for the Huskies. He quarterbacked the team early in the season. Then, when Jones moved into the lineup, Weatherford moved to the receiving position in which he was ticketed for when the season began.

Weatherford has caught 33 passes for 659 yards and eighth touchdowns. He also has carried the ball 48 times for 438 yards (that's a 9.1 average) and five touchdowns. He has returned punts and kickoffs for touchdowns. He has crossed the goal line 19 times for 114 points.

With the return of injured Jesse Kerfoot, Heights' offense has become more dangerous. In 83 carries, Kerfoot has gained 628 yards (a 7.6) average and rushed for a dozen touchdowns.

Jones has improved game by game at quarterback. Missing four games he still has competed 62-of-90 passes for 1,028 yards and 13 touchdowns. He has been intercepted just two times.

Another offensive weapon for the Huskies is Jesse Brown, who has 22 receptions for 270 yards and has carried the ball 43 times for 161 yards. Riley White has 11 receptions for 119 yards and Sterling Weatherford has nine catches for 184 yards.

On defense, Isaac Ray leads the Huskies in solo tackles with 63 followed by Grant Weatherford with 54, Joe Woods with 50, Nick Peterson with 43, and White and Nate Roth with 41 each.

Hamilton Heights is averaging 31.1 points a game and giving up 12.2 points a contest.

Guerin Catholic is scoring at a 29.0 clip and allowing 14.8 points a contest.

The Eagles have one of the best, if not the best, passing combinations in 3A football with quarterback Matt Labus and receiver Brian Matthews. Labus is nearing the 2,000 yard mark throwing the football. Matthews has more than 50 catches for a total over 1,000 yards. Guerin's passing game has suffered a big loss with a season-ending injury to Arion Shinaver. The junior had 33 catches totaling 445 yards before missing the last two games.

Guerin's running attack has been led by Carter McGinnis, but when the sophomore missed two games with an injury, sophomore Johnny Swidan filled the spot. McGinnis is back and so is senior Evan Hansen, a running back and also an outstanding defender at linebacker.

Hansen and Kyle Schultz lead the Eagles in solo tackles, followed closely by Brady McGinnis and Brennan Thieneman.

"We need to pick up first downs and keep the football and we need to play at a high level," said Street.

"Like all games, this game will come down to tackling and blocking," said Dilley.

Experienced Lady Royals...

Shoot for 4-peat in HCC

Experience, arguably, is the No. 1 need to win the Hoosier Crossroads Conference. Experience is what defending HCC champion Hamilton Southeastern has going for it this season.

Rebounding looks solid. Shooting, Coach Chris Huppenthal said, is “a work in progress.” Defense shouldn’t be a problem. The Lady Royals are working hard at the defensive end of the court.

But, it is the experience returning which should give the Lady Royals another shot at the conference championship.

Southeastern is coming off a kind of strange 2013-14 season. The Royals, with an 8-1 record, won a hotly-contested conference war in the HCC. Westfield, Fishers and Noblesville tied for second, each at 7-2. But, outside of the conference last season HSE went only 4-9. That tells you a little about how strong a non-conference schedule Southeastern plays.

It will be that way again this season, the Lady Royals playing a tough card. They will have 17 regular season games, plus also playing in the tough Fishers and North Central tourneys.

Southeastern was won the conference three consecutive years.

Huppenthal, who in nine seasons has posted a 160-43 mark at Southeastern, enters this year with four returning starters. They are junior Megan Walton, seniors Taylor Graham and Madi Taylor and sophomore Bre Lloyd.

Walton is the top scorer returning. She averaged 11.6 points and 4.5 rebounds last season.

“Walton is good at every phase of the game,” said Huppenthal. “She knows how to play the game.”

Taylor and Graham are the only two seniors on a young team. Graham missed playing time last season with an injury. When playing she averaged 5.4 points a game. Taylor had a terrific season, scoring at a 9.6 clip and leading the Royals in rebounding with a 6.9 average a game.

“Graham is a great defensive player, and her offense has improved,” Huppenthal said. “Taylor does everything. She’s a defender. She’s a scorer.”

The fourth starter returning, Bre Lloyd, turned in an outstanding freshman season. She figures to be one of the best sophomores in Hamilton County this season after averaging 8.0 points a game last season.

“Lloyd started as a freshman. She’s our points guard,” Huppenthal said.

Watson, Graham, Lloyd and Taylor are ticketed to be in Southeastern’s starting lineup when the Royals open on the road at Lawrence Central next Tuesday.

Two juniors are battling for the fifth starting spot. They are 6-0 Elaina Ededuwa and 5-9 Kyndall Williams

“Ededuwa is a low post player who has improved her outside game since last year,” said Huppenthal. “Williams is a physical athlete who has improved.

“We lost five players from last year’s team, one of which was a starter,” Huppenthal said.

This will be the coach’s 19th year as a varsity mentor. His overall record is 335-81.

“The team had a great summer,” Huppenthal continued, “and looks to build on what it started.

“The challenge for this team will be building off the previous seasons of successes.

“Defensively this group shows much heart and determination and plays with a lot of passion at both ends of the floor. With a solid core group back, this could be an exciting year for the Lady Royals,” Huppenthal added.

Southeastern, as usual, will jump into some hot competition coming out of the gate. After opening at Lawrence Central on the road, the Lady Royals will play in the Fishers Classic, which also includes Muncie Central, Western, Greenfield-Central, Evansville Memorial, Ben Davis and a very good host Fishers team.

Deer numbers down, but productive season expected

Indiana deer hunters should expect another productive season in 2014, although they may see fewer deer than in previous years when the firearms season begins Nov. 15.

"There are several factors contributing to reduced deer numbers in certain areas of the state," DNR deer management biologist Chad Stewart said. "Some are by design and some are by external forces."

The DNR is in the third year of a management effort to reduce deer numbers in targeted areas. Another reason for fewer deer was a serious 2012 outbreak of hemorrhagic disease – an often lethal virus transmitted by small flies known as biting midges.

"These numbers are more in line with what should be seen on the landscape," Stewart said. "We recognize these declines and have been responsive in our management by reducing our antlerless quotas in many areas and dropping some counties from the special late antlerless season. In many cases, these are the levels at which we are trying to manage our herd."

In addition to basic bag limits, hunters can purchase bonus licenses to take additional antlerless deer based on a county's assigned quota. Bonus licenses can be used in any season, except the Urban Deer Zone Season, using the equipment that is legal for that season.

The bonus antlerless quota was reduced this year for 19 counties. As a result of those reductions, six fewer counties are eligible for the special late antlerless season (Dec. 26 through Jan. 4, 2015) than a year ago.

With no hemorrhagic disease reported in 2014 and few reports of deer being affected by last year's hard winter, Stewart anticipates a deer harvest similar to that of 2013 (126,635 deer) but short of the record set in 2012 of 136,248 deer.

The firearms season runs Nov. 15-30. Hunters with a firearms license may take one antlered deer. Bonus licenses are required to take additional deer with firearms.

"Hunters in the north are likely to see deer numbers at lower levels than they are accustomed to seeing," he said. "Historically, deer herds tend to rebound quickly from outbreaks of hemorrhagic disease, but that hasn't been the case in northern Indiana."

Stewart sees a different picture in southern Indiana.

"Hunters there should continue to see good numbers of deer," he said. "The balance of deer cover and the absence of lingering effects from any disease outbreak have produced ample opportunities for hunters to be successful."

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Romaine earns NCAC Player of the Week honors

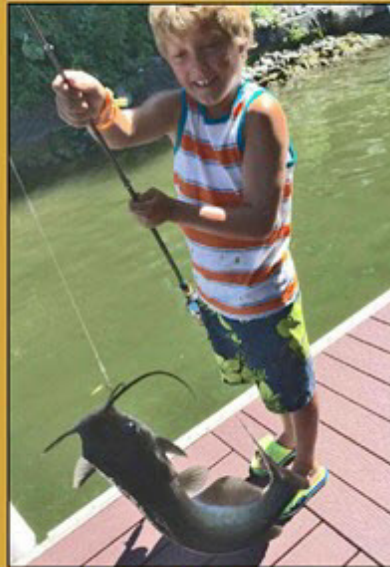

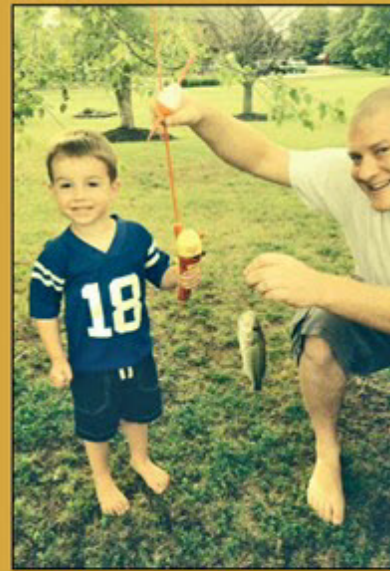

Volleyball state finals are Saturday

The hard-hitting, fast-paced action of the 43rd Annual IHSAA Volleyball State Finals will be under the spotlight Saturday including a defending state champion, two more that fell a step short last year and two others that have never reached this level of the tournament before.

The four state championship matches begin at 11 am ET at Ball State University’s Worthen Arena in Muncie.

The opening match of the day features Class A top-ranked Wes-Del (34-3) and first-time participant #3 Christian Academy of Indiana (33-4). The Class 2A final calls for defending state champion and top-ranked Providence (32-3) to face Southwood (26-13) which returns five years after its last visit to this match.

Second-ranked Fort Wayne Concordia Lutheran (31-6), which settled for last year’s runner-up spot, will be challenged by No. 8 and first-time visitor Northview (36-3) for the Class 3A crown.
