

Girl killed when struck by train

A 17-year-old Tipton High School junior was struck and killed Saturday evening when her vehicle was struck by an Indiana Transportation Museum train.

Ava Ridenour, well-known in Hamilton County as a Tipton High School softball player, was pronounced dead at the scene, police said.

Tipton police said Ridenour was following another car, headed east on Park Road just before 8:30 p.m. Both vehicles apparently disregarded the crossing lights and Ridenour's vehicle was struck.

The Museum's Blue Arrow diner train earlier in the evening had departed from Fishers and made a stop in Noblesville en route to Tipton. It was returning, first stop scheduled at Atlanta, from Tipton when the accident happened.

The train, police said, hit the driver's side of Ridenour's truck, pushing the

TIF funds are essentially business property taxes that are made available to repay loans based on a forecast increase in assessed values. The theory is that as commercial property becomes more valuable, taxes increase, and it behooves city leaders if we don't do," he said.



After 30 Noblesville fouls...

Millers breeze with depth

Noblesville's Lady Millers opened their basketball season on the road Tuesday evening, but their fans who attended didn't see what hopefully, potentially will be Coach Donna Keck's veteran squad this season.

Too many fouls, way too many fouls for Noblesville to really show its stuff, although the Millers easily won, 65-48. It wasn't that close of the game. NHS led 51-28 after three quarters before all the starters retired for the evening.

"There were about eight minutes of basketball played," said Keck. "Because of all the fouls, we couldn't really get into the flow. One of my assistant coaches told me there were over 60 fouls called in the game."

But, Noblesville played a huge part in that type of evening with 30 fouls of its own. Two Millers, Becca Bergman and Katelyn O'Reilly, sat the last seven minutes of the second quarter, each with three fouls.

Noblesville, with some excellent defense, survived a sluggish offensive first half and went to halftime with just a 27-19 lead.

"Our depth carried us through that first half," said Keck. "We used 12 players tonight and most of them got lots of minutes.

"We got out and ran some in the second half; that's what we wanted to do," Keck added.

If there was any doubt, from the start, that Noblesville would win this game, the Millers settled that issue by outscoring Tech 24-9 in the third quarter. And, like Keck, said, they did it with their running game.

Alexis Shannon broke down court five different times in the third quarter and her teammates found her with sharp passes. Shannon notched 10 points in the quarter and finished the game with 16 points.

O'Reilly also scored in double figures, notching 11 points, and Emily Kiser finished with nine points and Audrey DeFoe was next in line with eight points.

Ten different Millers scored.

The game marked the return of Bergman, after the senior point guard sat all of last year with an injury.

"It was good to have Deepe out t

"It was good to have Becca out there tonight," Keck said, "but she can't get into foul trouble like she did tonight."

Bergman led Noblesville with seven assists and with five steals.

The game also marked the varsity start of Kiser, the 6-2 freshman. She scored nine points and led Noblesville with 11 rebounds.

"Kiser is going to be a special player," said Keck.

Erin Wood and O'Reilly each grabbed five boards.

Noblesville led by 23 points after three quarters and once had a 57-28 advantage early in the fourth period.

'Rumble in Fort Wayne' to crown overall champion

Drivers and car owners will compete for a newly created \$1,000 bonus as overall champion of the "Rumble in Fort Wayne" midget division, event organizer Tony Barhorst announced.

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"With the expansion of our event to three days, I think it's fitting that we formally recognize an overall champion," Barhorst said, looking ahead to the 17th annual indoor racing classic on Dec. 26-28 at the Memorial Coliseum Expo Center.


