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

Nov. 20 meeting scheduled...

Public safety training center in the works

A public safety training center for all police, fire and emergency medical services in Hamilton County is in the works. A meeting on November 20 has been scheduled by county commissioners to hear opinions from officials of the eight municipalities and county government with the intention of creating a consensus on planning such a training center.

A master plan for a state-of-the-art training and education facility has already been written. The administration and education building has been built on 96 acres donated by the City of Westfield. It is manned by Kurt Aikman, a Westfield Fire Department employee.

A countywide cooperative effort will be needed to develop various additional components including a training tower, firing range and an equipped water rescue site on an existing gravel pit. If completed as proposed the complex will be the first of its kind in the state built for a single county.

There are nine police agencies in the county along with ten fire departments most of which have emergency medical services. Police officers get their initial training at the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy and training is also provided for firefighters, but training on localized needs is done on a department-by-department basis.

Costs of the project and a funding formula have yet to be established. Carmel and Clay Township are known to be planning a training center for their fire department, but whether a countywide facility would affect that plan is unknown.

Bridgestone moving to Nashville

"Under one roof, we will increase collaboration, innovation and growth across our lines of business. Current and future teammates will benefit by being part of an exciting and motivating workplace culture intensely focused on meeting the needs of those who buy our products and services."

Carmel Library Named a 2014 Star Library

The Carmel Clay Public Library is a 2014 Star Library by the *Library Journal* Index of Public Library Service. The Library Journal (LJ) Index is a measurement tool that compares U.S. public libraries with their peers in similar budget categories based on four types of output measures of their per capita use. The Carmel Library is a 3-star library in the \$5 - \$9.9 million budget range.

The LJ Index is a national rating system designed to recognize and promote America's public libraries, to help improve the pool of nationally collected library statistics, and to encourage library self-evaluation. LJ Index scores and star ratings are based on data reported annually by public libraries to their state library agencies and compiled nationally by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS).

To receive an LJ Index rating a library must satisfy these criteria:

- Have a service area with at least 1,000 population
- Have total operating expenditures of at

The four service output statistics are: pleased to announce that it has been named library visits, circulation, public access computer use, and program attendance. Star Library ratings of five, four, and three stars are awarded to libraries that generate the highest combined per capita outputs among their peers. For each library, each of the four output statistics is measured against the average for the library's peer group. Within each peer group, LJ identifies the top 30 scores. The top ten scores receive a 5-star rating, the next ten scores a 4-star rating, and the remaining ten scores a 3-star

> The Carmel Library is one of nine libraries in Indiana to receive a Star Library rating this year. Other notable Indiana libraries are Evansville-Vanderburgh and Allen County (Fort Wayne). This is the first time the Carmel Library has made the list.

Tod Windlan's first game as coach of the Carmel girls basketball team will be tonight, on the road, at Roncalli. The Lady Rebels are ranked No. 7 in the state.

Roncalli's 5-10 junior guard Lindsey Corsaro is ranked as one of the best players in the state. As a sophomore, Corsaro averaged 19.7 points and 10.7 rebounds. Windlan prides his teams into playing defense. Back in the days when he coached Hamilton Heights, the Huskies often would score as many buckets when playing defense than they did at the offensive end of the court.

That was three years ago when Windlan led Heights to a 23-3 record and to a state championship game against Mt. Vernon.

Oh, yes, Hamilton Heights. After Carmel plays at Roncalli tonight and at Cathedral on Saturday, the Lady Greyhounds third straight game also will be on the road, at Hamilton Heights. You can bet fans at the Husky Dome are staging a nice little welcome home party for their old coach, although on the hardwood it doesn't appear that the young Huskies will be able to challenge a veteran Carmel team.

"It's going to be awkward playing at Heights, sitting on the visitors' bench," Windlan said. "I still have lots of friends at Heights."

The reason Windlan left, the story goes, is that he wanted a teaching job and Hamilton Heights couldn't open one for its

Any hard feelings, going back, coach. "It's just going to feel awkward," Windlan answered.

Last year at Warren Central, Windlan led the Warriors to a 7-14 season in the tough MIC Conference. The year before, WC had gone 0-20.

Now, Windlan has moved to another MIC team, at Carmel playing arguably the toughest schedule in the state.

"This season we've added playing in the Bedford Lawrence North tourney," Windlan pointed out. "Bedford is ranked No. 1 in the

Welcome to Carmel, Mr. Coach.

He said he more than accepts the challenge.

"We should be deep. We should be a good shooting team. Seven of our first nine players return from last season."

No one ever hinted that Carmel couldn't shoot the basketball last season ... everyone from everywhere. The Greyhounds hit 114of-403 boomers. Of those returning, Emily Kmec, now a 6-1 junior, led the way with 44 three-pointers. Andi Kwasniewski, a 5-9 guard, hit 22; Abby Abel, a 5-5 senior canned 20, and Amanda Shaw, a 5-8 senior stuck in 17.

Shaw and Abel are the only seniors returning on a Carmel team which, because of playing experience at the varsity level, is anything but young.

The team, however, will get a little younger because Windlan has said Amy will be in the starting lineup tonight with Kmec, Abel and junior Carrie Larson.

"Abel will be our senior leader, along with Shaw," said Windlan. "Shaw is the best athlete on the team, but she's coming out of soccer and isn't quite ready to play. We will be quicker and more physically strong when she returns. She has a Division I college scholarship to attend the University of Missouri.'

Shaw averaged 10.1 points a game last season. Abel scored at a 10.7 clip and Kmec led the Greyhounds in scoring as a sophomore with an 11.6 average.

Kmec also led Carmel in rebounding (4.6), followed by Shaw (3.7) and Larson


