# Public safety training center in the works

A public safety training center for all police, fire and emergency medical services in Hamilton County is in the works. A meeting on November 20 has been scheduled by county commissioners to hear opinions from officials of the eight municipalities and county government with the intention of creating a consensus on planning such a training center.

A master plan for a state-of-the-art training and education facility has already been written. The administration and education building has been built on 96 acres donated by the City of Westfield. It is manned by Kurt Aikman, a Westfield Fire Department employee.

A countywide cooperative effort will be needed to develop various additional components including a training tower, firing range and an equipped water rescue site on an existing gravel pit. If completed as proposed the complex will be the first of its kind in the state built for a single county.

There are nine police agencies in the county along with ten fire departments most of which have emergency medical services. Police officers get their initial training at the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy and training is also provided for firefighters, but training on localized needs is done on a department-by-department basis.

Costs of the project and a funding formula have yet to be established. Carmel and Clay Township are known to be planning a training center for their fire department, but whether a countywide facility would affect that plan is unknown.

"Under one roof, we will increase collaboration, innovation and growth across our lines of business. Current and future teammates will benefit by being part of an exciting and motivating workplace culture intensely focused on meeting the needs of those who buy our products and services."

The business units moving to the new headquarters represent world-leading tire brands; the world's largest automotive retail and service opera-

Bridgestone Americas selected Highwoods Properties (NYSE:HIW), to develop the Company’s new headquarters. Global architecture firm Perkins + Will has been retained by Highwoods and Bridgestone to design the new facility and tenant improvements, which are expected to be LEED-certified at the Gold level and reflect best practices in workplace space design. Upon completion, the facility will be one of the largest and tallest corporate headquarters buildings in Nashville. Financial terms are not being disclosed by Bridgestone.

Bridgestone has outgrown its current leased headquarters facility on Marriott Drive near Nashville International Airport. With its lease expiring in late 2017, the company launched an extensive search for a new headquarters location to support future growth. The new headquarters will be home to Bridgestone Americas' corporate staff and supporting functions, as well as Bridgestone Americas Tire Operations, LLC; Bridgestone Retail Operations, LLC; Firestone Building Products Company, LLC; and Firestone Industrial Products Company, LLC. Nashville was selected after a nationwide search by a Bridgestone team that included leaders from multiple business units and functional areas.

"We're excited to continue the discussion with the Nashville Metro Council and Industrial Development Board, as well as the State, to make this project a reality. Locating here makes perfect sense, given Bridgestone's existing strong presence in and deep ties to Nashville and Middle Tennessee. And, I know that our Nashville-based teammates will look forward to welcoming their teammates to a new home in a city they love," said Garfield.

## Carmel Library Named a 2014 Star Library

The Carmel Clay Public Library is pleased to announce that it has been named a 2014 Star Library by the *Library Journal* Index of Public Library Service. The *Library Journal (LJ)* Index is a measurement tool that compares U.S. public libraries with their peers in similar budget categories based on four types of output measures of their per capita use. The Carmel Library is a 3-star library in the \$5 - \$9.9 million budget range.

The *LJ* Index is a national rating system designed to recognize and promote America's public libraries, to help improve the pool of nationally collected library statistics, and to encourage library self-evaluation. *LJ* Index scores and *star ratings* are based on data reported annually by public libraries to their state library agencies and compiled nationally by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS).

To receive an *LJ* Index rating a library must satisfy these criteria:

- Meet the IMLS definition of a public library
- Have a service area with at least 1,000 population
- Have total operating expenditures of at least \$10,000
- Report the four service output statistics

The four service output statistics are: library visits, circulation, public access computer use, and program attendance. Star Library ratings of five, four, and three stars are awarded to libraries that generate the highest combined per capita outputs among their peers. For each library, each of the four output statistics is measured against the average for the library's peer group. Within each peer group, *LJ* identifies the top 30 scores. The top ten scores receive a 5-star rating, the next ten scores a 4-star rating, and the remaining ten scores a 3-star rating.

The Carmel Library is one of nine libraries in Indiana to receive a Star Library rating this year. Other notable Indiana libraries are Evansville-Vanderburgh and Allen County (Fort Wayne). This is the first time the Carmel Library has made the list.

"I congratulate our staff for creating a welcoming environment that encourages visitors to use the library and come back again and again," stated Library Director Wendy Phillips. "This ranking also shows how much our community values its public library, which we as staff, administrators and board members truly appreciate."

The Reynolds, and the company founded by Mac Reynolds and wife, Arline, in 1955 were the sixth recipients of the Living Legacy Award. Mac and Arline were active in the Fishers United Methodist Church, the church's food pantry (Come To Me), Central Indiana Youth for Christ, Good News Ministries and Third Phase, Hamilton County's largest shelter, food and clothing pantry.

Both were involved in a number of service organizations: Arline Reynolds participated in the Carmel Music Study Club and

President and District Officer of the United Methodist Women. Mac Reynolds was a charter member of the Fishers Lion Club and also the Community Volunteer Fire Department and in 1998 received the state's highest service award, The Sagamore of the Wabash. Free to the public, the company's annual Christmas light display raises money for Come To Me Food Pantry, and annually surpasses \$30,000 in contributions to the pantry.

Mac Reynolds passed away in 2008; Arline died in 2013. In 2014, Reynolds Farm Equipment headquarters were relocated from Fishers to Atlanta, Indiana. Gary Reynolds, now the company's president, is a respected member of the Conner Prairie Board among other groups and not-for-profit pursuits. Previous recipients of Legacy Fund's Living Legacy Award include the Crosser family, Sonny Beck family, Judi Campbell Lowe, M.D. and family and the Jim and Juanita Harger family.

"The Reynolds family and their company represent the best of Hamilton County and our community, and are truly the embodiment of philanthropy," said Terry Anker, President, Legacy Fund. "They have given their time, talent and treasure for people in need now, and also for our community's future and wellbeing. We have all benefited from their dedication and gifts."

# Heights’ star picks basketball

If Purdue University is down, and recruit Grant Weatherford is buying none of that talk, then the Hamilton Heights senior wants to join with Carmel’s Ryan Cline in leading back the Boilermakers to glory in the Big Ten Conference.

Weatherford “officially” signed with the Boilermakers in front of friends and family at an announcement party at Heights Wednesday afternoon.

“I think Coach (Matt Painter) has an excellent plan for the future, and I’m looking forward being a part of it with my good friend Ryan Cline,” Weatherford told the Hamilton County Reporter in an exclusive interview.

He hopes another former Carmel player will be around when he and Cline arrive in West Lafayette next fall. A.J. Hammons, is a 7-foot junior with the Boilermakers. He played two years of high school basketball at Carmel before transferring to Oak Hill academy in Virginia.

“But,” Weatherford said, “Hammons likely will have a great junior year and take the money and leave for the pros before we get there.”

Weatherford’s father, Tim, attended Purdue and his mother, Cindie, attended Indiana University. One brother, Austin, played basketball at Rose-Hulman and his sister, Dakota, last year played as a freshman at Evansville. His younger brother is a sophomore at Hamilton Heights.

But, it wasn’t a family struggle at home to draw Grant to Purdue or Indiana. The decision was basketball or football. “He loves both sports,” Tim Weatherford said of his son. “But, he got only one offer in football, Ohio University. He received 12 offers in basketball.”

Purdue, however, wasn’t real sure until catching Weatherford, and Cline, in the Vegas AAU tourney at the end of the summer.

“Purdue had offered him a walk-on and promised him a varsity letter,” said Tim, “but after watching him in Vegas they offered him a scholarship.”

“You can’t turn down a Big Ten offer,” said Grant. “It’s a great opportunity. It was the month of July when we got all our summer players with the AAU team and I got a chance to show what I could do as the main ball handler.”

Weatherford said the thrill of playing all over the country with his AAU team this summer still left him fired

up and ready to return to high school football at Hamilton Heights.

“My senior year in football here at Heights ended a little earlier than we planned, but it was a great year. The thrill of playing high school football was great. Now, we’ve got some unfinished business in basketball at the Muncie Central sectional. I’m really looking forward to it,” said Grant.

“I feel real comfortable with the players recruited at Purdue next season.”

Grant, who played for Mitch Street in football at Heights, will play again this season for head basketball coach Chad Ballenger.

He said his biggest thrills in basketball while at Heights so far was winning the 2013 sectional at Muncie Central; winning the 2013-14 Mid-Indiana Conference, and winning the holiday tourney in 2013.

He lettered all four years in football at Hamilton Heights.

# Carmel will play in cold Penn

Whenever big-time high school football fans in Indiana talk about powerhouses from the north, Carmel and Penn always are at the top of the list. Of course, except for years when the IHSAA decides to send Carmel south.

Even a couple of seasons when Carmel played south and Penn played North, the two teams still met ... at the state championship game. That was back in the day when the top group still was Class 5A. Jim Belden's Greyhounds edged Penn 10-7 in 1989. Kevin Wright's Greyhounds won going away, 54-0, in 2011.

Many seasons, four in all, the two teams have squared off in the northern semistate. Penn defeated Belden and Carmel 28-14 in 1995 and again, this time 28-7, in 1996. In 2008, Mo Moriarity broke that string by beating the Kingsmen 38-3. Wright won his second straight semi over Penn last year, in Class 6A, 28-13.

Belden's club also played Penn in a regional in 1987, winning 28-14.

In the seven-game Carmel-Penn tourney series, Carmel has won five and lost two.

Carmel in overall tourney competition has a 78 percent winning margin with 110 victories and 30 defeats. The Greyhounds have won seven states; been runner-up five times; and have captured 26 sectional, 17 regionals, and nine semi-states.

The two bullies of the north will meet again in a semi-state this Friday at Penn.

"Penn has a huge, well-coached offensive line that averages 282 per game," pointed out Wright.

"They averaging 45 points a game. They have a Division 1 tight end and a 6-5, 215-pound quarterback who is a dual threat guy

"Defensively, they only give up eight points a game, led by a Purdue recruit, 6-8, 265-pound end Ben Knutson

"Nobody has come close to them all year long.

"The game is on the road; it's going to be 20 degrees with wind and snow flurries.

"Should be a classic matchup," predicts the Carmel coach.

The Kingsmen have defeated Valparaiso 35-3, Portage 42-0, Elkhart Central 57-21, Fort Wayne Snider 37-17, South Bend Clay 56-6, South Bend Washington 42-19, South Bend St. Joseph 43-0, South Ben Riley 70-0 and Mishawaka 21-12. In the sectional, Penn beat Portage 43-7 and Chesterton 41-6. They knocked off Merrillville 42-6 in the regional and will bring that 12-0 record into the semi-state game.

Carmel also will bring a 12-0 record into the tilt, but the Greyhounds have been far more challenged than Penn. In regular season play, Carmel beat Hamilton Southeastern 14-7, Louisville Trinity 10-7, Center Grove 21-14, Pike 48-21, Lawrence North 42-20, North Central 56-0, Ben Davis 37-14, Warren Central 17-10 and Lawrence Central 27-20. Carmel knocked off Noblesville 28-6 and Fishers 14-7 in the sectional and then last week in the regional

unloaded on a previous unbeaten Fort Wayne Carroll team 56-6.

"Last week we probably played our best overall game since Week 7 when we played Ben Davis," Wright said. "We played with a lot more energy early, which I thought was key. The defense did a nice job not letting them sustain drives, and the offense was both efficient and productive.

"Both Shakir Paschall and Chris Perkins have rushed for over 1,000 yards and now rank in the Top 10 all-time at Carmel for career rushing.

"Slowly," Wright continued, "we are getting healthier, and we get Nate Thompson and Michael Viktrup back. Two-year starter junior guard Chase Krauter played last week for the first time in several weeks."

Virktrup, who is listed No. 2 on the depth chart this week, quarterbacked Carmel until he was injured and then Issac James,

the speedster, moved from wide-receiver to QB. James had quarterbacked Carmel to the state championship game the year before.

Before Viktrup went down, he had passed for 567 yards and rusehd for 546 yards.

Paschall leads Carmel in rushing with 1,042 yards in 211 carries. Perkins has 1,003 yards in 150 trips and James 686 yards in 100 tries. James is averaging 6.9 yards a carry and Perkins 6.7 yards a trip.

Viktrup has the better passing numbers. James is just 12-of-32 throwing the ball.

But, with the weather as predicted, just how much will Carmel throw the football?

In scoring for the Greyhounds, Perkins leads with 84 points, followed by Paschall with 60, place-kicker Nick Stacy 49, Viktrup 42 and James 30.

James, when he played wide-receiver, caught 24 passes for 162 yards. Jalen Walker, only a sophomore, has 21 catches for 207 yards.

Carmel has scored 41 touchdowns rushing and 10 passing.

With the weather conditions being poor, defense could be the key.

Carmel is led in total tackles by inside linebacker Alex Osleger with 68 solos, followed by Noah Burks 53 and Cameron Hunt 51.

Burks has 5.5 sacks.

Wright, in his fifth year, is 53-9 at Carmel. His overall record is 187-63 in 21 seasons. Cory Yeoman has spent all 12 of his years at Penn with a 130-26 mark.

# Windlan's 'Hounds ready

Tod Windlan's first game as coach of the Carmel girls basketball team will be tonight, on the road, at Roncalli. The Lady Rebels are ranked No. 7 in the state.

Roncalli's 5-10 junior guard Lindsey Corsaro is ranked as one of the best players in the state. As a sophomore, Corsaro averaged 19.7 points and 10.7 rebounds. Windlan prides his teams into playing defense. Back in the days when he coached Hamilton Heights, the Huskies often would score as many buckets when playing defense than they did at the offensive end of the court.

That was three years ago when Windlan led Heights to a 23-3 record and to a state championship game against Mt. Vernon.

Oh, yes, Hamilton Heights. After Carmel plays at Roncalli tonight and at Cathedral on Saturday, the Lady Greyhounds third straight game also will be on the road, at Hamilton Heights. You can bet fans at the Husky Dome are staging a nice little welcome home party for their old coach, although on the hardwood it doesn't appear that the young Huskies will be able to challenge a veteran Carmel team.

"It's going to be awkward playing at Heights, sitting on the visitors' bench," Windlan said. "I still have lots of friends at Heights."

The reason Windlan left, the story goes, is that he wanted a teaching job and Hamilton Heights couldn't open one for its coach.

Any hard feelings, going back, coach.  
"It's just going to feel awkward," Windlan answered.

Last year at Warren Central, Windlan led the Warriors to a 7-14 season in the tough MIC Conference. The year before, WC had gone 0-20.

Now, Windlan has moved to another MIC team, at Carmel playing arguably the toughest schedule in the state.

"This season we've added playing in the Bedford Lawrence North tourney," Windlan pointed out. "Bedford is ranked No. 1 in the state."

Welcome to Carmel, Mr. Coach.  
He said he more than accepts the challenge.

"We should be deep. We should be a good shooting team. Seven of our first nine players return from last season."

No one ever hinted that Carmel couldn't shoot the basketball last season ... everyone from everywhere. The Greyhounds hit 114-of-403 boomers. Of those returning, Emily Kmec, now a 6-1 junior, led the way with 44 three-pointers. Andi Kwasniewski, a 5-9 guard, hit 22; Abby Abel, a 5-5 senior canned 20, and Amanda Shaw, a 5-8 senior stuck in 17.

Shaw and Abel are the only seniors returning on a Carmel team which, because of playing experience at the varsity level, is anything but young.

The team, however, will get a little younger because Windlan has said Amy Dilk and Blake Smith, a pair of freshmen, will be in the starting lineup tonight with Kmec, Abel and junior Carrie Larson.

"Abel will be our senior leader, along with Shaw," said Windlan. "Shaw is the best athlete on the team, but she's coming out of soccer and isn't quite ready to play. We will be quicker and more physically strong when she returns. She has a Division I college scholarship to attend the University of Missouri."

Shaw averaged 10.1 points a game last season. Abel scored at a 10.7 clip and Kmec led the Greyhounds in scoring as a sophomore with an 11.6 average.

Kmec also led Carmel in rebounding (4.6), followed by Shaw (3.7) and Larson (3.2).

Windlan said Dilk and Smith are ready for varsity play.

"They had a great summer and earned their way onto the varsity team," said the coach.

"We've got kids who on a given night are capable of scoring 15-20 points," Windlan predicted. "We've got length, which will make us quicker on defense."

Defense is where Carmel fans will see a different type of Carmel team. For Windlan, defense begins when and from where the opposing team throws in the basketball after a Carmel goal.

"We will not sit back in a 2-3 zone and wait for people to come to us," he said.

Carmel was 8-12 last season and 11-11 in each of the two previous seasons. Those three years followed a march to the semi-state championship game, where the Greyhounds lost to Jeffersonville and finished 22-6.

So, Carmel Nation is hungry for a winning season. In fact, by Carmel's standards, Greyhounds fans are starved for a winning season.

"We're going to win," Windlan predicted. "We've got good freshmen to add to those players returning," he added.
