Dr. Fink retires after 50 years of service

Longtime, prominent Noblesville dentist Dr. David Fink is retiring after 50 years in the practice. I'm personally sad to hear the news, because Dr. Fink was my dentist for many years.

Some people say they'd rather take a beating than go to the dentist, but I never did dread going to Dr. Fink. His friendly manner always put me at ease. I always felt he made procedures as quick and simple as possible.



As a young dentist Dave came to Noblesville nearly 50 years ago when the city had only a handful of dentists. Now there are 47. Through the years he had a wide range of patients from community leaders to jail inmates. In recent years he gave up his weekly "house calls" at the jail.

The Fink dental office is located in a modest stand-alone building on River Road a block or two south of Road 32. It will continue to operate under the new ownership of Dr. Wayne Kinney along with the existing staff.

Dr. Fink, now 75, had a bout with pneumonia earlier this year. Now much better, he says he is looking forward

to the next chapter in his life which I would bet includes more golf which he loves.

I, along with his other patients and friends, got a letter this week in which Dave expressed thanks for the "support and trust to let me be your dentist." He went on to say it is "always bittersweet when life changes around us..... but also hope and excitement for the new possibilities to come."

There will be an appreciation open house on December 10 from 4 to 7:30 p.m. at his longtime office hosted by his staff "to honor Dr. Fink for his years of service to our community."

Carmel edges Penn

Lots of high school football has been played in Indiana this season, from the far south to the far North. But, when the final two standing in Class 6A meet at Lucas Oil Stadium in two weeks, one of the teams will be from the west side of Indianapolis and the other from the north side.

Both from the MIC Conference.

Carmel, undefeated and ranked No. 1 in 6A, slipped past undefeated and No. 2 ranked Penn, 14-13, in the snow and cold of the South Bend area last evening. Ben Davis outslugged Center Grove, 49-45.

"It was a classic," said Carmel coach Kent Wright, whose team will return to the Big House for the Big Game in two weeks

after losing a 7-6 thriller to Warren Central for the state crown last year.

"Our kids played great tonight, and so did Penn," Wright added.

The final difference was a missed extra point.

Carmel took a 14-7 lead with 9:42 left in the game on a 69-yard run by Isaac James and a PAT kick by Nick Stacy.

With 3:41 left, Penn scored on a one-yard run by Cameron Bohn, but the PAT kick failed.

Both of Carmel's touchdowns came off long runs. On the third play of the game, Shakir Paschall ran 56 yards to put Carmel up 6-0, and Stacy followed with the extra point boot.

"We had four or five big plays in the game," said Wright, "and just like throughout the season they came from everyone. Paschall's touchdown was huge, getting us out ahead. Then James scored the winning touchdown. Chris Perkins had some big runs, too."

Paschall had a 40-yard run to Penn's 18 late in the game. But, Carmel couldn't score on this drive and finally turned over the football to Penn at the Kingsmen's 18 with 54 seconds left.

"They were out of time outs," Wright pointed out.

Penn, like Carmel, also scored in the first quarter, this time on a 10-yard run by Bohn.

Cicero ambulance involved in crash

Hamilton County Sheriff deputies responded to a crash involving a Cicero ambulance on Friday, November 14, at approximately 8:15am. The ambulance was not transporting any patients and no one was seriously injured in the crash.

According to deputies, Cicero Ambulance 21 was northbound on Hazel Dell Parkway crossing 146th Street when it was involved in a crash with a Bolden’s Cleaning and Restoration van that was southbound making a left turn. Both vehicles sustained damage and the ambulance ended up straddling the center median after it came to rest.

The driver of the Bolden’s van, identified as James Darin McCoy, age 37 of Sheridan, was detained for investigation of Operating While Intoxicated. McCoy was later arrested and faces preliminary charges of Operating While Intoxicated, Possession of a Controlled Substance, and Possession of Marijuana. He is currently being held at the Hamilton County Jail on a \$10,000 bond.

The driver and two (2) other personnel on board the ambulance were checked per their agency policy but did not sustain major injuries.

"Penn Mark I and II are located along one of the most dynamic real estate corridors in the Indianapolis MSA," said Martin. Penn’s missed extra point which cost the Kingsmen a tie late in the fourth quarter hit the top of the upright on the left side and bounced out.

“It was just a great football game,” said Wright.

The State Finals will be the second meeting between Carmel and Ben Davis this season. Carmel won the first on Oct. 3, 37-14, at Carmel.

“Ben Davis is one of our rivals,” Wright looked ahead. “Ben Davis, Warren Central and Center Grove. I think we’ve split with Ben Davis in our last four meetings.

“I’m really proud of our kids,” Wright continued. “The win tonight is our seventh victory by a touchdown or less,” he said of his 13-0 Greyhounds.

Game time temperature in South Bend was 26. Carmel came out wearing its all-white uniforms.

The game was a ground battle. Carmel ran for 297 yards and Penn for 218 yards.

For Carmel, Paschall carried 12 times for 130 yards; James nine times for 112 yards and Perkins seven times for 58 yards.

Penn was led by its 6-5 junior quarterback, Bohn. He carried 17 times for 131 yards and both Penn touchdowns. He also completed 11-of-16 passes for 72 yards.

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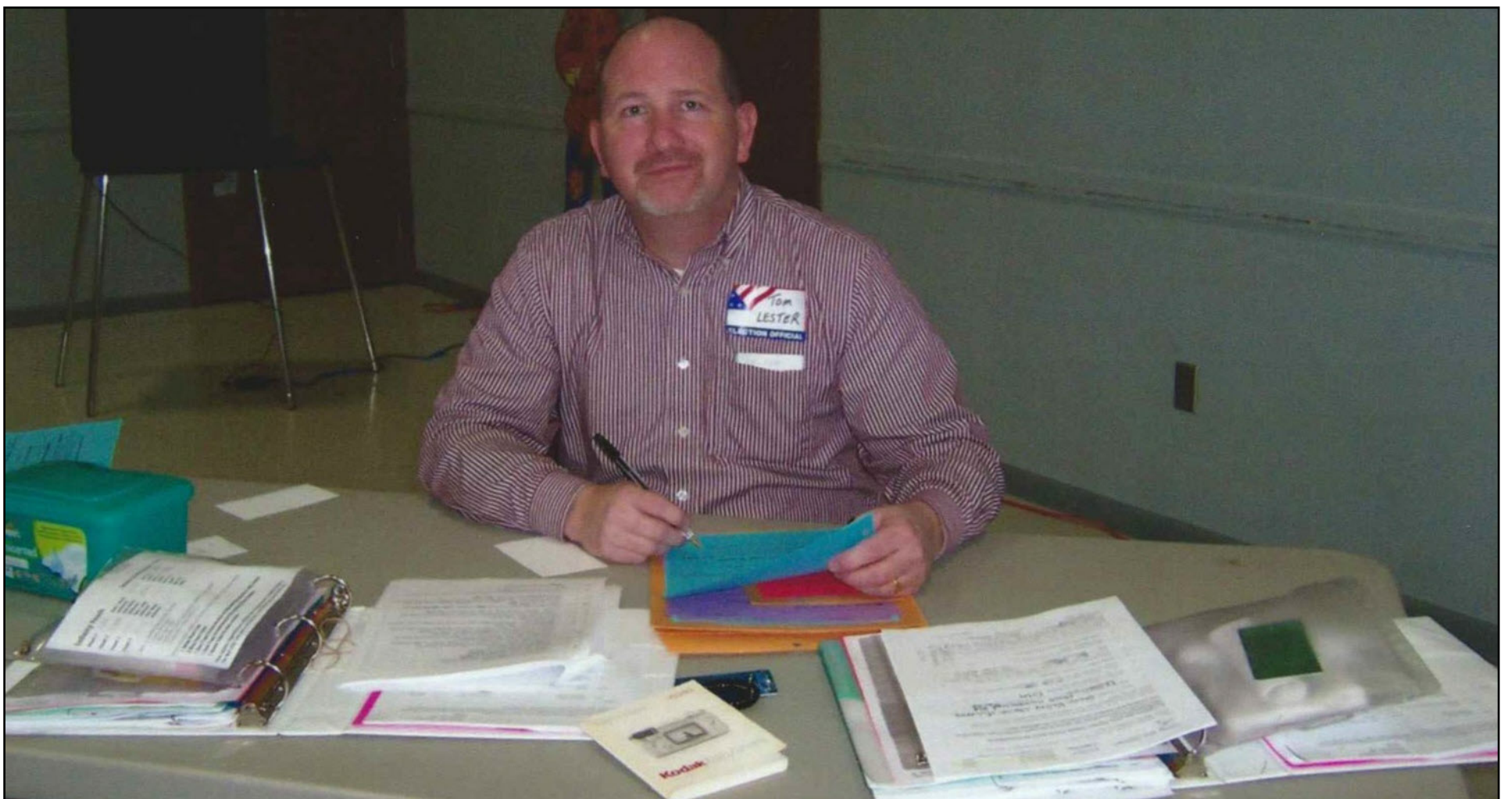

With two late touchdowns...

Snider stops Shamrocks in regional

Westfield was dealt a tough defeat on a chilly Friday, as Fort Wayne Snider came from behind to beat the Shamrocks 32-24 in a Class 5A regional championship game at The Rock.

After a shaky start, Westfield took control of the game in the second quarter, enjoying a halftime lead of 21-13, and increasing that advantage to 24-13 midway through the third quarter. But a big defensive play by the Panthers changed the momentum late in the third period, and Snider scored three straight touchdowns, including two within 33 seconds of each other late in the fourth quarter.

"They just wanted it more than us down the stretch," said WHS coach Jake Gilbert.

Snider was aggressive from the outset, recovering a Westfield fumble during the opening kickoff. The 'Rocks were able to hold the Panthers to a field goal, then answered that score quickly when Ben Lotfalian caught a Ryan Pepiot pass and ripped down the field for a 64-yard touchdown.

It looked like the game would become a shootout after Snider took the lead back on a two-yard running touchdown with 5:35 left in the first quarter. That made the score 10-7,

and that held into the second quarter - but not for long.

Elvin Caldwell then took over the game, scoring a couple quick touchdowns for Westfield. His first was a two-yarder 33 seconds into the second period, and Caldwell then did it again three minutes later, this time on an 11-yard run. Nick Dowd kicked all three extra points.

Dowd also made a 35-yard field goal with 6:56 left in the third; that put Westfield up 24-13. It looked like things would be fine for the 'Rocks, but Snider grabbed the momentum when it forced a fumble, and then got itself in position to score.

It only took three plays, but the Panthers got in when Money Woods ran into the end zone on a three-yard run. An extra point kick cut Westfield's lead to 24-20.

Still, the Shamrocks had the lead well into the fourth quarter. But Snider halted a long Westfield drive, then regained the ball at the 5:37 mark. The Panthers used a couple big pass plays to get it to the 'Rocks 19, and Neandre Billingsley ran it in from there.

That gave Snider the lead, although Westfield blocked the extra point kick. So the Shamrocks still had a chance, but Snider stopped them on a 4th-and-6. The Panthers took over in Westfield territory, and Billingsley scored again, this time from 13 yards.

But Westfield blocked that extra point kick, which meant there was still hope. Once again, though, Snider made the big play, grabbing an interception to seal the win.

"I think they deserved to win," said Gilbert. "The team that wanted it most won it tonight, and unfortunately that wasn't us."

Caldwell had a good game, with 101 yards and the two touchdowns. Pepiot totaled 156 yards passing.

The Shamrocks finished their season at 7-5, winning a second consecutive sectional championship.

Host Tri-West took a 6-0 lead in the first quarter, went to halftime with a 16-7 advantage and then fought off Guerin Catholic in the second half to defeat the Golden Eagles, 23-15, in Class 3A regional football action.

The winners held Guerin Catholic to just 52 yards rushing, while gaining a 143 yards of their own. Tri-West also passed for 207 yards.

Most of Guerin Catholic's offense came on the passing combination of quarterback Matt Labus to receiver Brian Matthews. Labus was 18-of-38 slinging the football for 238 yards and both

The question last evening in The Mill when Hamilton Heights came to visit Noblesville wasn’t: How good is this Noblesville basketball team? The Lady Millers in two games this season have played well enough to be in the state’s top 20 when the second poll of the young season is released next week.

You think?
Nor, was the question: Will this young Heights team get better with age this season? Of course it will.

The real question was: Should this series, this often labeled rivalry between the Huskies and the Millers, continue.

The two coaches, Donna Keck of Noblesville and Scott Fernung of Hamilton Heights, following NHS’s 103-48 win, suggested, strongly suggested, that the series continues.

The game last evening was the most one-sided win in the series, even bettering Noblesville’s 73-24 win over the Huskies back in 1990.

Heights has not defeated Noblesville since back-to-back victories in 1984 and 1983.

Dating back to when the two schools first met in 1975, Noblesville holds a 16-4 edge over Heights. In that time period Noblesville has grown to become the 10th largest high school in the state. Currently, Noblesville is 4A and Heights is 3A.

“I like playing Noblesville,” said Fernung. “They have one of the top teams in the state. I always enjoy the game. We bring a good crowd and so does Noblesville.

“This game tonight will make our team a better team,” Fernung said. “We’ll go back at it again tomorrow in practice. We’ll learn from this game tonight.”

“We have a senior dominated team with lots of physical ability,” said Keck. “Hamilton Heights, with two very good freshmen, is young. They have good young talent with a chance, I believe, to win their sectional.”

There have been more exciting evenings of basketball in The Mill. Biggest cheer of the night, coming from Noblesville, was

Hot Nuggets cool Pacers, 108-87

The Pacers headed into Friday night's game riding a two-game winning streak and coming off an 81-76 win in Miami. Their opponent, the Denver Nuggets, entered Friday's contest mired in a six-game losing streak and gave up 84 first-half points in a blowout loss to Portland on Wednesday.

But the tables turned on Friday, as Denver (2-6) rolled to a 108-87 victory over the Pacers (3-7) at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

The Nuggets shot 56 percent in the first half and closed the second quarter with a 21-9 run to open up an 18-point halftime lead. After giving up just 76 total points in

Wednesday's win in Miami, Indiana allowed Denver to score 64 in the first half on Friday.

"If you start the way we did tonight, you're not going to be successful in the league," Pacers forward Solomon Hill said of his team's early effort. "...They came out with a good mindset. They were revved up from that last game and we didn't have the same mindset to come at them."

Denver quickly extended that margin in the third quarter, leading by as many as 33 points en route to a comfortable win. Their 108 points were a season-high for a Pacers opponent.

"I think you've got to give credit to the Nuggets," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel said. "I think they got embarrassed the other

night by Portland and clearly played with great desperation for 48 minutes and really took the fight to us, had us back on our heels all night."

A.J. Price led Indiana with 15 points on 5-of-9 shooting. Reserve forward Lavoy Allen added 12 points and eight rebounds. Solomon Hill and Donald Sloan also had 12 points in the loss.

Pacers guard-forward C.J. Miles returned to the lineup after missing the last four games with migraine symptoms, but left the floor after 4:07 of action with a sore right calf. He did not return.

Nuggets guard Arron Afflalo led seven Nuggets in double figures with 17 points. Ty Lawson (11 points and 10 assists)

recorded a double-double for the visitors and former Hamilton Southeastern High School standout Gary Harris scored 13 points on 6-of-10 shooting in his NBA debut.

The Pacers will have to put Friday's outcome behind them quickly, as they head to Chicago on Saturday for their first game of the year against the Bulls. The Central Division rivals will tip off at 8:00 p.m. ET at the United Center.

"It's the beauty of the NBA, we've got another game tomorrow," Price said. "We can hang our heads and let this linger over tomorrow or we can look at it in a positive way and say we've got another game and rectify what we didn't do tonight."
