Westfield City Council awards grant to **Washington Woods Elementary**

During the November 10th City Council meeting, the Councilors voted unanimously to award \$5,000 to the Washington Woods Elementary School's Leader In Me initia-

"The positive impact this program will have on our children goes beyond the school yard for this generation and beyond," explains City Council President Jim Ake. "This investment in our children will receive benefits far outweighing the initial cost. This initiative will add another aspect to our school district that makes it stand out from the rest, as one of the best districts in the state and in the country."

The council agreed to provide a \$5,000 maximum matching grant. The money will be used for the school's participation in Leader In Me, which uses Dr. Stephen Covey's 7 Habits of Highly Effective People to transform the students, staff and com-

"Infusing the school population with grit, perseverance, and leadership skills is far more complicated than teaching an academic curriculum," explains Dr. Scott Williams, Washington Woods Elementary School principle. "Leadership In Me gives us the tools to instill these attributes."

The three year program costs \$75,000; so far the school has received commitments totaling \$20,000.



They had seen this type of defense from this coach and, yes, on this court. It wasn't so much fun on this occasion as former Heights coach Tod Windlan brought his new Carmel team into the Husky Dome.

Windlan played the same type of defense he used to lead Hamilton Heights to the Class 3A state championship game three years ago. Last evening that defense forced the very young Huskies into 15 first quarter turnovers and a 31-6 lead.

Carmel went on to win the game, 91-30, in a contest which saw Hamilton Heights commit 41 offensive turnovers.

"We're getting better; we're improving," said Windlan before leaving the Heights gym with a 2-1 record.

"We came out very focused; shot the ball well, and applied defensive pressure which hurt Hamilton Heights.'

The Huskies are now 1-2 and must be relieved a little after back-to-back losses to 4A powerhouses Noblesville and Carmel.

Everyone Windlan brought to the game got into the act. Ten different Greyhounds scored. Three got into double figures, led by Amanda Shaw with 18 points. Carrie Larson notched 16 and Emily Kmec added 14.

Shaw and Larson got Carmel off to a roaring start, scoring nine and eight points, respectively, in the first quarter.

Scoring leaders for Coach Scott Fernung's Huskies were Kayla Kirtley with 10 points and Ashton Runner with nine.

Carmel's next game is Nov. 25 at home against Noblesville. Hamilton Heights won't play again until a Nov. 29 trip to Mt. Vernon in Fortville.

The Lady Millers like to run, and they've now run their record to 3-0.

Noblesville's girls basketball team stayed perfect by taking care of Lebanon 77-60 Tuesday night at The Mill. The Tigers stayed close with the Millers in the first quarter, but Noblesville outscored Lebanon 25-11 in the second period to gain a 42-27 halftime lead. The Millers held that advantage for the second half.

Noblesville turned a 17-16 first-quarter lead into a 30-18 lead by the midway point of the second. The Millers' depth came through, with Audrey Defoe coming off the bench to hit a pair of 3-pointers.

"Audrey came in, hit a couple big shots for us," said NHS coach Donna Keck. The bench players never missed a beat whenever they came in, which is just what Keck wants.

"We expect them to maintain the intensity and to do the things that our starters do," said Keck. "We definitely have that same expectation for everyone."

The Millers stretched their lead to 20 points at a couple points during the third quarter. Katelyn O'Reilly scored on backto-back putbacks, and Alexis Shannon banked in a basket, then converted a 3-point play to push Noblesville ahead 53-33. Keck said there are "very few people" that are as athletic as Shannon.

"When we can get out and play defense and run, she gets easy transition baskets," said Keck. "She's hard to stop."

Shannon scored 25 points for Noblesville. O'Reilly had a double-double, with 16 points and 14 rebounds. Becca Bergman scored all of her points in the first half, with 10 points. She also handed out five assists.

Lebanon was led by Kristen Spolyar's 34 points. Keck said the Tigers are capable of a run in Class 3A, and called Spolyar "the real deal."

Four cited as IBCA/Subway **Players of the Week**

Three players who opened their seasons with 40-point games and a fourth who averaged 32.5 points over two games have been selected as the initial winners of the IBCA/Subway Player of the Week program for 2014-15.

Columbus North senior Ali Patberg, Wabash senior Claire Cromer, Princeton junior Jackie Young and Roncalli junior Lindsey Corsaro are the Week 1 recipients (for games played Nov. 10-15) in the player recognition program overseen by the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association.

Cromer was chosen as the winner for District 1, Corsaro was selected in District 2, and Patberg and Young garnered co-recipient laurels in District 3.

Patberg, a 5-10 guard who has signed to attend Notre Dame, scored a school-record 44 points while grabbing 11 rebounds and adding five assists and four steals as Columbus North opened its season with a 75-40 victory at Martinsville. Patherg also moved into first place on her school's all-time scoring list and now has 1,319 career points. She made 15-of-24 shots and 14-of-18 free throws against the Artesians.

The 5-3 Cromer averaged 38.0 points over two games to earn accolades. She opened with 42 points, three rebounds and four steals in a 60-44 win over Mississinewa. Cromer followed with 34 points, three rebounds and two steals in a 62-55 triumph over Marion. Over two games, Cromer made 20-of-35 field goals, 12-of-20 3-pointers and 24-of-26 free throws.

Young, another Notre Dame recruit, tallied 40 points, 22 rebounds and five assists as Princeton defeated Southridge 60-46 in its opener. The 6-0 standout followed with 22 points, nine rebounds and six assists as the Tigers rolled past Evansville Bosse 72-28 later in the week. Young also became her school's all-time scoring leader in the first game and finished the week with 1,349 points.

The 6-1 Corsaro averaged 32.5 points over two games as Roncalli defeated Carmel 97-75 but lost to Pike 66-63. A University of Kentucky recruit, Corsaro amassed 34 points, 17 rebounds and three assists as the Rebels beat the Greyhounds. Corsaro totaled 31 points, eight rebounds and four assists in the setback to the Red Devils.

This is the seventh season for the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association Player of the Week program and the third season it is presented by Subway Restaurants of Indiana, a banner sponsor of the IBCA. Subway, in its fifth season as an IBCA sponsor, encourages athletes to "train hard and eat fresh."

Player of the Week winners are chosen each week from each of the IHSAA's three districts. Girls winners will be chosen from now through the week following March 7. Boys winners will be chosen starting in two weeks and through the week following March 28.

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

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
