Building a training center

United we stand; divided we

There were little doubt Thursday evening at the Hamilton County Judicial Center that most of the folks who came out on a cold evening were united in their desire to move forward on a proposed training center for Hamilton County firefighters, police and other public servants who put their lives on the line to protect the citizens of this county.

Minus, it must be added, dotting a few "T's" and crossing an "I" or two.

It was an impressive gathering of Hamilton County government leaders, perhaps the most impressive gathering of county leaders ever to turn out for a government meeting.

"Very impressive," Hamilton County Commissioner Christine Altman as she opened the evening.

Altman said the meeting had been called to promote public safety in Hamilton County.

Westfield has offered 96 acres for this project," Altman said. "The location is in the center of the county and is in the center of the state.

Altman pointed out that the land includes a gravel pit and a river, which will better aid in rescue training.

"We first started talking about this in 1980," Judge Nation said. "Every (fire, police, etc.) department wants it. We didn't have the land in 1980. We do now. It is time."

Altman was joined by fellow commissioners Steve Dillinger and Mark Heirbrandt, both announcing their support of the project.

Also in the audience were Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear, Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard, Westfield Mayor Andy Cook and recently elected Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness. Also present were four township trustees; members of the Hamilton County Council and members of city and town councils.

The absence of some County Council members led to this remark by Councilman Steve Schwartz. "This is a no-brainer. You need to lobby your council."



Moderation is key for holiday consumption

Consider this "part II" of my last article, "Holiday



Indulgence" but really who in the world wants to be reminded about that at this time of year?? Please recall that I mentioned last week that I, too, have to remind myself to keep in mind the various delicacies we are bombarded with this time of year and how we respond to those goodies!

However, let us move on to a more potentially serious indulgence, that of The obvious and most important reasons aside, that one

should not over-indulge in alcohol (breaking the law and endangering lives) leaves us with the potential damage to our bodies and overall health. Many times during the holiday festivities we are faced with more opportunities to imbibe at holiday dinners, parties, and other social gatherings. An extra glass of wine or cocktail here and there is usually prevalent during these festive occasions.

While much has been put forward regarding this it is important that we remember that we are talking about day, according to the U.S.D.A. Dietary Guidelines for Americans.

The holidays can bring on a certain level of stress on their own: schedule changes, dietary changes, financial issues, etc. Alcohol consumption can rise easily. There are several repercussions from over-indulgence of alcoholic beverages. Dehydration is a problem and one should remember to drink plenty of water when drinking alcohol. Many people think that a glass of wine, in particular, is helpful for a good night's sleep. You may fall asleep faster, but the sleep will not be as deep as what you require. Alcohol can prevent restorative deep REM sleep, which is needed to regenerate cells and allow you to feel rested. Excessive calorie intake is another issue; alcohol is not calorie free!

Finally, your body is left hungry. "When consumed excessively, alcohol can have detrimental effects on how your body uses, stores and excretes nutrients," according to Sara Haas, R.D.N. L.D.N. a registered dietician and spokesperson for the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics.

I am sometimes asked by my clients about the health nutrients, including vitamins B, A, and C which are all benefits we hear relating to red wine or more recently, beer. critical for metabolism, antioxidant use, bone growth, and

Moderation is the key in your holiday consumption of moderate alcohol consumption, not more than one drink per both food and beverage. Make sure that you are consuming nutritional and filling items when you are enjoying your wine, beer, or eggnog. Hydrate your body with water along with your "adult beverages" and make sure that you are socializing responsibly with these items. You will feel better, look better, and be better if you practice moderation.

> Regarding the quote at the beginning of this article, water really is your best choice for a "go to" drink at any time of year! However, I plan to enjoy a glass of wine here and there during the holiday season, along with dinner or hors d'oeuvres, of course. And refreshing eggnog will be a delicious addition to my palate along with some special Christmas cookies.

> So – enjoy, my friends. If you plan to indulge in any alcoholic beverages, please plan ahead and be safe, be happy, and be well!

The Westfield Fire Department recently received a donation of 1,200 hard-wired smoke detectors from Citizens Energy Group to be handed out to low-income resi-



Royals are ready to "Gunn"

Lots of eves this high school basketball season will be on a 6-6 Hamilton Southeastern sophomore who a year ago led the Royals to a sectional championship and to a near-miss regional championship win over Homestead, losing 59-57.

With sharp-shooters Eric Davidson and Tyler Jenkins gone, Gunn is HSE's top scorer returning from last season. He averaged 11.7 points and was second in rebounds with a 5.3 average a game.

"He probably will have a target on his back," said Southeastern coach Brian Satterfield. "It will be different for Gunn this season with Davidson (18.7) gone. He'll have to play more under and mix it up. There are lots of things he can do. He has great passing skills. Defenses will key on him"

Gunn will be surrounded in the starting lineup by seniors on a team which has just five seniors on its roster. Chris Ford, Tyler Janney and Ty Scholl could be in the starting lineup when Southeastern opens on the road on Nov. 29 against new foe Lake Central.

Among the group of seniors, Ford returns with the highest scoring average (6.3).

"Ford is so quick," said Satterfield. "He's amazing off the first step. He can attack off the dribble and he can shoot. Janney can guard at any position. He could even guard in the post. Scholl is a good team player. He does all the dirty work."

The fifth spot in the lineup is still up for grabs. If Satterfield decides to go big, the spot will be filled by 6-6 senior Tiger Gillory or 6-5 junior Jaylon Tapplar. If the coach is looking for another guard, the fifth starter could be senior DeAndre Johnson or junior Greg Miller. Johnson is a move-in from a charter school in the Indianapolis

This is a big Hamilton Southeastern team, and, likely, a physical HSE team. About half of the players on the roster are football players.

Even with the size, Satterfield has some concerns about rebounding.

"Rebounding will take some time," said the coach. "It's a mind-set these players will need to develop.'

Overall, this is a young team. Satterfield, as yet, hasn't made the cut between varsity and junior varsity. But, on the 24- player roster are 11 sophomores and a freshman. Satterfield said the freshman, 6-7 Brennan Schofield, could help at the varsity level once he gains experience.

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
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
