Noblesville man injured in accident

Thursday morning at approximately 7:11 a.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to the 16100 block of Union Chapel Road in reference to a report of one-car motor vehicle crash. Officers arrived on the scene and located the crashed vehicle and one occupant, identified as Joshua D. Coleman, 34, of Noblesville.

Based on witness statements and evidence at the scene, preliminary information suggests that a 2001 Dodge Dakota pickup truck was traveling southbound on Union Chapel Road when the vehicle left the right side of the roadway and struck a tree. As a result of the crash, the driver was trapped in the vehicle and required extraction by the Noblesville Fire Department.

The driver suffered injuries as a result of the crash and was transported by air ambulance to St. Vincent Health (Indianapolis). His injuries do not appear to be life-threatening.

Members of the Accident Reconstruction Unit were called to the scene to collect evidence and investigate the crash. A portion of Union Chapel Road was closed for approximately two hours while investigators gathered information and spoke with witnesses.

The case remains an ongoing investigation. It does not appear that weather was a factor.

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# Indiana home sales increase year-to-year in October

For the second time in a row, monthly home sales outpaced last year. There were 574 more homes sold statewide in October than during the same month of 2013, a 9.0 percent increase. This is according to the Indiana Real Estate Markets Report today released by the state's REALTORS.

October home sale prices were also better than last year. The median sale price of \$126,000 is a 4.1 percent increase from 2013, and the average of \$153,094 is a 5.7 percent increase.

Other year-over-year comparisons from the report show -

-The number of pending home sales increased 8.3 percent to 6,142

-The percent of original list price received increased 2.4 percent to 93.9 percent

-The number of new listings decreased 0.8 percent to 9,050

-The inventory of homes for sale decreased 2.8 percent to 42,995

"The year started slowly, but a strong fall brings balance to 2014 home sales statewide," said Kevin Eastridge, 2014 Presi-

dent of the Indiana Association of REALTORS. "Prices continue to gain traction and housing seems to be settling into a more sustainable growth pattern. What local markets needs most is further job creation, meaningful wage growth, and credit availability."

The 63,680 homes sold statewide thus far in 2014 is just a 2.4 percent decrease from the same point in time of last year. The median sale price of those homes, \$126,500, is a 3.3 percent increase from 2013; the average sale price, \$152,273, is a

4.3 percent increase. The number of pending home sales, 63,802, is a 0.3 increase.

## Visit businesses along US 31 this holiday season

Holiday shopping season is upon us, and INDOT wants to remind patrons to visit their favorite shopping centers near US 31 in Hamilton County. Access is available to all businesses in the US 31 project area.

### REMINDER: US 31 is now open in Carmel

As of Nov. 25, US 31 is now open between Old Meridian and 136th streets, after closing in April to further expedite freeway construction in Carmel by approximately one construction season.

Businesses at 126th Street/Carmel Drive: Construction continues on the 126th Street/Carmel Drive overpass through spring 2015. However, access to businesses on 126th Street/Carmel Drive remains ac-

cessible. Motorists may exit US 31 at 116th Street, Old Meridian Street (from northbound US 31 only) or 131st/Main Street, then use Illinois or Pennsylvania streets for access to these businesses.

Businesses at 131st/Main Street: The 131st/Main Street interchange is now open, providing direct access to/from US 31. Motorists may exit US 31 at 131st/Main Street for direct access to businesses in this area.

Businesses at 136th Street: The 136th Street interchange is now open, providing direct access to/from US 31. Motorists may exit US 31 at 136th Street for direct access to businesses in this area.

Construction continues through late 2015 on the US 31 Hamilton County corridor between I-465 and SR 38.



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## Indianapolis International Airport offers travel information and tips

With Thanksgiving one of the most popular travel times of the year, flights are typically very full and airports extremely busy on peak days during the week of the holiday. This year, that will be met with a 5.3 percent increase in airline capacity at the Indianapolis International Authority to the largest total since 2010.

According to Airlines for America (A4A), an industry trade group, 24.6 million passengers will fly nationwide during the Thanksgiving travel period, which it defines as the 12-day range from Nov. 21 through Dec. 2. This represents an increase of 1.5 percent – or about 31,000 passengers per day – over last year. Days that will see the highest demand are projected to be Sunday, Nov. 30; Monday, Dec. 1; and Wednesday, Nov. 26. Lowest passenger demand will fall on Thanksgiving Day and the Friday after. (Nov. 27 and 28)

Meanwhile, according to AAA Travel, the average airfare for Thanksgiving travel is up slightly from last year, about one percent, even though the number of people travelling by air is expected to be at the highest level since 2007.

### TAKE ADVANTAGE OF NEW IND SERVICE PLAZA

The IND Service Plaza is located on the south side of Col. H Weir Cook Memorial Drive and is easily accessible to all vehicles arriving and departing the passenger terminal. The Service Plaza offers 24 fuelling positions, with fuel options including all levels of unleaded gas as well as diesel and compressed natural gas. It also offers automotive services, a Circle K convenience store, Subway restaurant, and designated parking for people awaiting arriving parties at IND. (IND also offers a designated cell phone lot across from the Service Plaza, with over 200 spots).

### HOLIDAY TRAVEL TIPS

--Be aware of fees for checked bags and surcharges that may apply for traveling on certain holiday dates.

--To make for a smoother arrival experience, parties can drop off passengers and luggage before parking. The driver can access the curbside without any parking fees to drop off passengers and their luggage and then easily return to park at either the Terminal Garage or the Economy Lot.

--Drivers who simply want to park and wait for arriving passengers should take advantage of available parking at the IND Service Plaza or the Cell Phone Lot.

--When freezing rain, ice, or snow is predicted – whether in Indianapolis, at a final destination, or a connecting airport in between – flights may be delayed or cancelled.

--Check the status of flights online before departing for the airport:

--Passengers can check the real-time status of flights on the airport's home page at [www.indianapolisairport.com](http://www.indianapolisairport.com). Select arriving or departing flights by airline to find information about estimated arrival and departure times, gates, and flight status. The information is refreshed every 60 seconds.

--Obtain real-time airport status and the latest information on flights across the U.S. at [www.fly.faa.gov](http://www.fly.faa.gov), which utilizes the FAA's Air Traffic Control System Command Center. Its color-coded, state-by-state flight-delay information includes details on delays as well as airport closures.

--Arrive early: for stress-free travel, passengers should allow ample time for parking, checking bags and obtaining boarding passes, and clearing security. Passengers should check with their airlines for specific arrival time recommendations.

--Checking in online/printing a boarding pass at home can save time at the airport.

--To save even more time, premium parking, including both valet and self-park options, is available on Level 3 of the Terminal Garage. For those who self-park, there are about 6,000 spaces in Economy Parking and nearly 6,000 spaces in the garage.

--For the latest news and information about airport security procedures and policies, visit [www.tsa.gov](http://www.tsa.gov), the Transportation Security Administration website. In general, travelers should be aware of the following:

--Passengers 75 and older or 12 and under can leave shoes on when going through security checkpoints

--TSA's Secure Flight Program is in effect. The program compares the names of passengers booking flights against names on national watch lists, fulfilling a key recommendation of the 9/11 Commission. This program requires airlines to collect passenger information including full name, date-of-birth, and gender as it appears on the government-issued photo IDs presented to TSA screening officers at airport checkpoints. Be sure you use the information that appears on your photo ID when booking your flight or your airline may not be able to issue a boarding pass

--All passengers are now subject to varied layers of security screening protocols, including pat-downs by TSA officers to detect hidden, dangerous items between legs, around the chest, and other areas of the body. Other security layers include Advanced Imaging Technology, explosives trace detection, and canine teams, among others.

--Wear slip-on shoes, if possible, avoiding those with laces and zippers. Pack properly. Remember TSA requires travelers follow the 3-1-1 rule for liquids, gels, and aerosols in all bags going through security checkpoints. This includes holiday food and gifts.

--The TSA's TSA Pre ® program offers travelers a streamlined screening process. More information is available at <http://www.tsa.gov/tsa-precheck>.

A new era of high school basketball opened at The Mill on Thanksgiving Eve, and all was good.

Playing their first game under new head coach Brian McCauley, the Millers unloaded on Indianapolis Northwest, 71-36.

“It was a good start,” McCauley said. “We’ll get better. We have a long way to go.”

Noblesville, led by some long-range bombing from veteran senior guard Jake Mills, hit the Pioneers from all directions. Seven different Millers scored six or more points

Mills was on fire, canning 8-of-9 shots and finishing with 22 points. He was 6-of-7 from 3-point range.

“He had a great night shooting the ball,” McCauley said of Mills. “He had good shot selection. His teammates got him good shots.”

What pleased McCauley the most about the Millers’ play was passing.

“We had 19 assists,” said the coach. “The kids moved the ball and made the extra pass.”

McGwire Plumer, a sophomore coming off the bench, led Noblesville in assists with six. Sean Wilson, a veteran returning from last season, had five and David Cory dished out four.

It was Cory’s first game back on the court after missing all of last season. He also missed, with another injury, most of the preseason. Cory started, and McCauley said that was a surprise.

“I really didn’t think he would be back this soon,” said the coach. “Our training staff did a good job helping him get back that soon, and Cory did a great job of rehabbing.”

Cory brings good leadership and toughness from the football team.

“It’s great having him out there,” McCauley said.

Joining Mills in double figures was 6-5 junior John Kiser. He got into foul trouble with three fouls in the first half, but came back without fouling in the second half. Kiser finished with 13 points and a team-leading six rebounds.

After Mills and Kiser, Noblesville’s scoring depth kicked in. Plumer scored eight points; Wilson and Joey Brewer seven each and Cory and Brandon Barthel six each.

Noblesville burned the nets, hitting 28-of-44 shots, including 9-of-14 attempts from 3-point range.

Mills canned four of his 3-pointers as Noblesville raced to a 35-17 halftime lead. He hit two more as Noblesville bolted away by outscoring Northwest 21-2 in the third quarter.

The only negative number for the Millers in this opening game was Northwest’s 23-17 edge on the boards. The Millers pulled in just one offensive rebound on a night when 64% of Noblesville shots connected. Kiser led the team on the boards with six rebounds. Brewer and Barthel each collected three.

A third bright spot of the evening, along with passing and shooting, was that the Millers committed just 13 turnovers and

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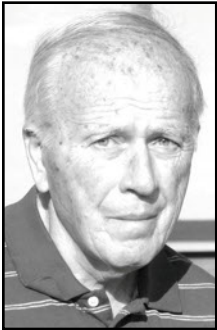


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# Fun Saturday at The Mill

At approximately 12:30 in the afternoon, immediately following the junior varsity game, the Lady Millers will be in The Mill to take on Avon in a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game. Then at approximately 7:30 in the evening, immediately following the junior varsity game, Noblesville's boys will entertain Indianapolis Howe. You Miller fans might like to attend both, but if you're looking for what likely will be the most competitive game of the two, it's probably going to be the boys game. But, if you're interested in watching one of the state's best girls basketball teams, then the Lady Millers will be your ticket. In this week's high school coaches basketball poll, Noblesville is No. 18. The coaches throw every team in the state, regardless of class, into one poll. If there are 17 teams

in Indiana any better than Noblesville, then this is going to be a banner year in high school girls play. The Lady Millers can play. After Noblesville defeated Hamilton Heights 103-48 earlier in the season, lots of folks asked me if notching 100 was a first for Noblesville girls basketball. I couldn't come up with an answer. But, after hanging 102 points on Carmel earlier this week, I feel safe in writing that no other girls team ever notched two 100-point games in the same year. And, of course, the season is barely a third over. Noblesville is averaging 81.5 points a game. That's a bundle. According to the John Harrell's web-site, Noblesville is the sixth-highest scoring team in Indiana. Tindley (1A) is No. 1 at 92.5, followed by Heritage Christian (2A) at 86.20; Homestead (4A) at 83.67; Oregon Davis (1A) at 83.00 and Lawrence North (4A) at 81.5. After a good start, Fishers lost six of its last nine games, including a 62-34 sectional licking from rival Hamilton Southeastern. # Greyhounds return to State

Few opponents who play high school football in Indiana know each other better than the two state finalists who will go head to head tonight for the Class 6A state championship.

Carmel and Ben Davis were big rivals even before the days of the Metropolitan Conference.

This season, back on Oct. 3 at Carmel, the Greyhounds defeated the Giants, 37-14.

Since, Carmel has gone on to an undefeated season, bringing a 13-0 record to Lucas Oil Stadium for the title matchup. Even so, it hasn’t been a cakewalk for Carmel, the Greyhounds winning seven games by a touchdown or less, including a 14-13 thriller in the semi-state at Penn last week.

Ben Davis is 11-2. The Giants’ only other loss was to Warren Central, 28-21. Ben Davis has survived some close tests, just like Carmel. In the Giants’ last three playoff games, Ben Davis has edged Avon 34-27 in the sectional finale; Warren Central 40-36 in the regional and Center Grove in a 49-45 semi-state battle.

“This is a very talented Ben Davis team across the board,” said Carmel coach Kevin Wright.

“Their offense is led by quarterback Kyle Castner. That offense is as explosive as it gets. They spread you from sideline to sideline and force you to defend the entire field. They have multiple playmakers who can score from anywhere on the field.”

Wright said playing inside at Lucas Oil is an advantage for Ben Davis.

“That will be a tremendous challenge, especially playing indoors in a perfect setting to throw the football, which they do very well.”

Carmel, on the other hand, has been a ground-gaining machine throughout the season.

“Defensively, they blitz more than any team we play,” Wright continued. “They like to pressure you and play a lot of press man coverage.”

Wright said Carmel played a complete game in the Greyhounds’ earlier win over Ben Davis and the coach believes it will take

the same type of performance tonight to win the state championship.

“We played our most complete game of the year the first time we played Ben Davis,” said the coach, “and it will take that same type of effort to beat them again.”

Wright thinks the bye week last week has been huge for his football team.

“The bye gave us an opportunity to get healthy,” Wright said. “I really like the focus and business-like approach our kids have had the past two weeks.

“To be successful,” Wright said, “we must limit their big plays, while at the same time creating explosive plays of our own.

Ball security will also be a key. We need to create some turnovers. Both teams are no-huddle, up-tempo style teams, so there should be multiple possessions and plays in the game.

“The team that best handles the up’s and down’s that almost always occur in a game like this should prevail.

“Our players and coaches have worked very hard to get back to this point, and the journey hasn’t been easy. I am very proud of this group. At this point we just have to find a way to finish,” Wright concluded.
