Giants stun 'Hounds

The Carmel football team played a nearly perfect first 13 minutes of Friday's Class 6A state championship game. Unfortunately for the Greyhounds, Ben Davis played

nearly perfect the next 35 minutes. The Giants recovered from a 17-0 deficit to stun previously unbeaten Carmel 42-24 in the 6A title game at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis. It was the first time the Giants had won a big trophy since 2002 - they had to wait a while to pick up their eighth state championship.

The Greyhounds, meanwhile, were playing in the title game for the seventh time in nine years. Carmel started off championship's final three quarters.

"When you're ahead 17-0, as the head coach and the offensive coordinator, you got to do a better job calling plays the second half," said 'Hounds coach Kevin Wright. "I took some shots, it didn't work out. It's on me.

"But obviously, they've got a very good football team. We knew we had to control the football. We weren't able to control the football."

Perkins went first, making a 15-yard touchdown run to get the margin at halftime. the Greyhounds on the board. Carmel's defense then got Ben Davis to turn the ball over on downs; Andrew Verhulst and Kendall Hune stopped the Giants run on fourth-and-1.

The Greyhounds got all the way to the Ben Davis 2, but were pushed back a little on third-and-2. No problem: Nick Stacy's 21-yard field goal got Carmel ahead 10-0. The Greyhounds' defense stepped up again, with Alex Akins intercepting a Giants pass. That turned into another Perkins touchdown; Chris ran it in from 11 yards. Stacy converted both extra-point kicks.

Ben Davis scored two more touchdowns in both the third and fourth quarters. Both of the third period scores came after turnovers: A fumble led to the first touchdown, with Tate scoring from the 1-yard line. The 'Hounds had a nice drive going after that, but the Giants ended that with an interception. That would lead to a three-yard touchdown pass from Castner to Brennan Gillis, to make the score 28-17.

Carmel was held to three and out in its next possession, which straddled the third and fourth periods. Ben Davis Perkins' second touchdown came at the 11:38 mark of took over at the 11:47 mark and began draining the clock, getting down to 4th-and-3 on the Carmel 3.

The Giants set up for a field goal, but it turned out to be a fake attempt. Instead, Castner ran the ball 10-yard to score. Ben Davis' last touchdown came with 1:46 left; Chris Evans ran in from 38 yards.

Noblesville Tree Lighting Ceremony conducted at the Hamilton County Judicial Center **Presented by the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce**



He has contributed to the IHSAA Champions Together initiative and helped oversee a new Fellowship of Christian Athletes chapter at Carmel High School. 

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



Hamilton County Reporter Football Players of the Year

Isaac James, Shakir Paschall and Chris Perkins, Carmel

In an unprecedented move, the Hamilton County Reporter is choosing three players as its Football Players of the year: Carmel's Isaac James, Shakir Paschall and Chris Perkins. This is the first time ever that such a choice has been made, but there's no way to choose between a trio of young men who have meant so much to the Carmel football program.

James (right, #13), was a First Team All-State player as a junior. He finished his career with 842 rushing yards and six touchdowns, 25 receptions and - filling as quarterback during part of the season - threw for four touchdowns.

Paschall (below, #5), was also a junior First Team All-State player. He ran for 1266 yards, scoring 12 touchdowns on the year.

Perkins (below right, #21), was the first player to start on a Carmel team all four years on varsity in the past 30 years. Perkins collected 1165 rushing yards and scored 16 touchdowns for the Greyhounds.

Boys basketball preview: Guerin Catholic...

Eagles enter year as No. 1

A year ago Guerin Catholic was ranked No. 2 in the preseason poll and then finished the season losing to Greensburg in the semi-state. No. 1 rated Greensburg went on to win the state championship.

A year later, Coach Pete Smith's Golden Eagles are ranked No. 1 in Cass 3A.

While pleased, Smith believes that the No. 1 tag may be the results of what his team did last year.

"Being ranked No. 1 is another first in our program," said he coach. "That's neat for our program. However, I think voters based it a great deal on the past efforts of Aaron Brennan, Whit Rapp and Chris Burroughs the past three seasons, and now all three are playing college basketball this season.

"It puts a bull's eye on our team every game, which can only require us to play at a high level night in and night out to stay No. 1.

"Our team this season is not even close to as good as it was last season, right now."

With Guerin Catholic set to open the season on Tuesday, Dec. 2 hosting Herron and then facing a Friday-Saturday, back-toback assignments at Hamilton Height and at home against Fort Wayne South, Smith said he isn't ready to name a starting lineup.

"With Matt Labus and Brian Matthews just joining us from the football team, I haven't decided on a lineup," Smith said. "I can say that Matt Holba and Christian Munson both are off to good starts in practice, and they will be in the starting lineup somewhere. I believe Munson's offensive numbers will really pick up, and I'm expecting Holba to have a super year on both ends of the court. Holba played mostly on the perimeter last year, but with him being our tallest player (6-6) he'll be around the basket more to take opportunities of size advantages and his athleticism."

Holba averaged 15.8 points a game and grabbed 179 rebounds in 26 games last

season. Munson is the second-leading scorer returning from last year's team. He averaged 6.4 points a game.

"Coming into the season, we have bigtime rebounding and floor leadership concerns," Smith continued. "We just graduated our all-time leading scorer, rebounder and a guy who blocked shots, Brennan. And we lost one of the sate's all-time leading assist men in Rapp. So, calling it concerns is likely an understatement. "I cannot say I've been happy with our defensive play in practices so far. That has to get better . Staying in front of the basketball is premium this season without Burroughs and Brennan back guarding the basket," said the coach.

"Matt Labus brings toughness and experience, as he started parts of his sophomore and junior seasons."

Labus averaged 5.0 points a game last season.

"The competition for the point guard position has been good so far among sophomore Mathew Godfrey, junior Cameron Lindley and sophomore Grant Fremion, although right now Fremion is running third, which means started on the junior varsity at the start of the season."

Smith believes this can be an explosive offense, but lots depends on decision making of floor general Godfrey and on Lindley.

"We lack a true post influence," Smith said. "We don't really have true back to the basket players this season. But, Alex Mazanoski (6-4 senior) and Calen Cunningham (6-2 junior) have been playing forwards in practice, and we'll get senior Nick Schneider back in practice after he suffered an ankle injury in the preseason. He definitely will get in the mix to start upon returning."

Mazanowski hit 10-of-11 shots in varsity games as a freshman when Guerin won the state, but has played very little varsity since

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due to injuries. Cunningham started on the Grant Buntin junior varsity team last season.

Nick Sahm has decided not to play this Andrew Sharpe season after being injured and being out for Tripp Burton the season early in football.

"He was one of our best 3-point threats," said Smith.

Guerin Catholic went 22-4 last season Zach Munson after going 17-6 the year before, the year Xavier Dunham following the state championship.

With the IHSAA allowing two extra games this season, the Golden Eagle play in 20 games and the Dec. Noblesville Holiday Tourney.
