"Dean" of the county council leaving office

After 32 years of service, Meredith Carter, the "dean" of the Hamilton County Council, is leaving office next month. He did not run for re-election this year. His

last meeting with the council will be December 3.

When Dr. Carter was first elected in 1982 Hamilton County was a different place. Not only has the population tripled, but county facilities and services have grandchildren. A 50-year resident of Clay Township, he was born and raised on a farm near Cutler, Indiana, one of 14 children. He played high school basketball and was offered a schol-

Dr. Carter's entire career has been spent in education. first as a science teacher in Lawrence Township, then 38 years with IVY Tech College where he spent his last 22 years as chancellor before retiring in 2005.

During Carter's time on the County Council funding was elected this fall. was approved for such county improvements as the Judicial Center, the vast County Corrections complex, new

acquisition of Executive Airport, an animal shelter and dozens of new bridges and roadway improvements.

All these projects have given the county a very different look and have been achieved without substantial increases in taxes. The council where Carter served as president several times is responsible for arranging funding of capital projects and operating budgets each year.

On December 3 at 4 p.m. fellow county officials will hold an open house for the retiring councilor. On January 1 Carter will hand over his council seat to Fred Glynn who

The HCHS has another major event coming up during the holidays: Its annual dinner. The society always conducts its dinner on the first Sunday of every December; this year's dinner is scheduled for 6 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 7 at the First Presbyterian Church.

That date is Pearl Harbor Day, a remembrance of the Dec. 7, 1941 attack on the Hawaiian naval base. The attack pulled the United States into World War II.

The dinner will feature a program called "Songs My Mother Sang: A World War II Tribute" by Indianapolis-based performer and historian Glory-June Greiff. Both of Grieff's parents served in World War II, and she reads their letters and talks about the war.

The program costs \$18 and is open to the public, but reservations are required and due by Tuesday, Dec. 2.

The Historical Society also runs the Santa House, which opens at 3 p.m. today following the Noblesville Christmas Parade. Nevitt said the HCHS coordinates the Santa House with the city and Noblesville Main Street. The Santa House will be open at various dates through Christmas Eve.

Miller's defense is outstanding in...

Noblesville's win over Howe

In most high school basketball games there is a key to victory.

Noblesville's Millers left The Mill Saturday evening with a pocket full of keys.

They left with their second consecutive victory of the season, a 65-55 decision over a good Indianapolis Howe team.

Keys?

*The defense was outstanding. Howe had scored 93 points in its season opener. Noblesville's defense held the Hornets to half that many. Harris Brown and Brian Warren had combined to 75 points in Howe's opener. Noblesville held Brown to 17 points on 6-of-15 shooting and held Warren to 16 points on a 6-of-16 night.

*Noblesville's ball-handling and passing was strong, just as it had been earlier in the week in a victory over Northwest. This time the Millers came away with 14 assists, including eight by Sean Wilson and five from John Kiser.

*The rebounding was solid. Led by seven boards from Wilson, Noblesville outboarded the Hornets 23-12.

*Noblesville's shooting would have knocked your eyes out. The Millers hit 20-of-35 total shot and were 11-of-15 from 3-point territory.

It doubtful if new coach Brian McCauley, so early in the season, could expect any better team victory than the one the Millers turned in last evening.

"We played a great game against a high-level team," said McCauley. "It was a great team win."

McCauley said an example of that was the overall game turned in by Wilson. The 5-10 senior scored nine points, collected seven rebounds and dished out eight assists.

"Our kids were efficient with their shooting," McCauley said. "(Jake) Mills had another good night shooting the ball."

Mills, who had six 3-pointers in Noblesville's opener, nailed 5-of-6 against Howe and led all scorers with 20 points.

Also scoring in double figures were John Kiser with 17 points and Joey Brewer with 13. Kiser also pulled five rebounds. Brewer hit 4-of-5 shots from 3-point range.

"Kiser showed his extreme toughness," said McCauley. "Brewer hit some key 3-pointers."

Although Noblesville won by 10 points, it wasn't an easy win for the Millers. They led by only four point at halftime, that advantage coming on a 3-pointer by Brewer.

In the second quarter, Howe took the lead at 25-24. Mills got the lead back for the Millers on a four-point play, a 3-pointer and a free throw. Wilson in the second half also contributed a four-pointer.

Noblesville, leading 51-43 entering the fourth quarter, opened the period with buckets from Kiser and McGwire Plumer and a 3-pointer by Brewer.

The Millers, with the lead, played a little cat and mouse basketball with Howe during the final four minutes.

Noblesville now is idle until next Friday evening when in The Mill the Millers will open their Hoosier Conference game, against Fishers.



There are times during this remarkable season for Noblesville's Lady Millers that the awesome numbers put on the board by the "Twin Bombers," juniors Alexis Shannon and Katelyn O'Reilly, sort of hide contributions by others.

Take center Erin Wood, for example.

In Saturday's 90-27 Hoosier Crossroads Conference victory over Avon, Shannon scored 26 points and O'Reilly powered in 22.

Wood scored eight points.

"Erin's stats don't tell how valuable she is to the team," said Noblesville coach Donna Keck. "She does so many different things that do not show in the stat column.'

One of those things is Wood being on the start of the torrid Noblesville press. When the 6-2 Wood, or 6-2 freshman Emily Kiser, are guarding the in-bounds pass, it's tough for the opponents to even get started.

Wood also yanked four rebounds and she had one steal. One steal, but at least four or five deflections which enabled other teammates to get steals.

Noblesville had 21 steals in the game and Avon had 31 turnovers. O'Reilly led in steals with five. Brooke Herron had four. Cori Cain and Shannon each collected three.

The game was, as Star of the Game: expected, blowout. а Noblesville led 29-4 after one quarter and 53-13 at halftime.

It easily could have been Noblesville's third 100-pointplus performance of the season. Keck called off the dogs (the starters) with the Millers leading 83-22 and still

4:41 to play.

O'Reilly finished with a double-double, adding a dozen rebounds to her 22-point afternoon.

Noblesville outrebounded Avon 44-22.

The Millers hit a sizzling 37-of-69 shots from the field; canned 11-of-14 free throws and also tossed in 5-of-13 attempts from 3-point range.

With the victory, Noblesville moved to 7-0 on the year and to 2-0 in the conference, with a tough stretch of road games coming up. Before returning to the Mill, Noblesville will play at North Central, Fishers and Anderson. North Central and Fishers will be in the same sectional as the Millers. Fishers is a huge early season conference game.

"North Central has a couple of quick guards," Keck said. 'Fishers is tough. After that stretch of games we come home to play Westfield. Then we drew Homestead in the first round of the (Jan. 2-3) Greenfield Tourney."

In last week's coaches association poll Homestead was ranked fifth in the state (all classes combined) and Noblesville was 18th. Homestead is the third highest scoring team in the state. Noblesville is 6th.





The Pacers showed resilience in cutting a 19-point first quarter deficit to as little as 1 before heading into halftime trailing the Cavaliers 52-49 at Quicken Loans Arena. But Cleveland ran past Indiana in the second half, opening the third period on a 15-5 run en route to defeating the Pacers 109-97.

Kevin Love caught fire out of the gate, scoring 22 first-half points and finishing with a game-high 28 points

rebounds to register a double-double. Kyrie Irving also had a double-double, with 24 points and 10 rebounds to go along with five assists. LeBron James, who had just eight points on 4-of-11 shooting in the first half, finished with 19 points. James was 5-of-7 from the field in the second half, leading the Cavaliers' up-tempo transition attack early in the third to put the game out of reach for the Pacers.

season after recovering from an ankle injury, led Indiana with 14 points on 7-of-16 shooting, all but two of those

on 9-of-13 shooting in 33 minutes. Love also had 10 points coming in the first half. Solomon Hill added 13 on 4-of-11 from the floor, including 2-for-5 from 3-point range.

As a team, the Pacers shot just 39 percent, while Cleveland shot 53 percent from the field.
