Hamilton County wins Community **Service Award**

Hamilton County has won the prestigious Community Service Award from the Indiana Association of Counties. The award was presented to the county showing best cooperative efforts with other units of government.

The specific award in the cooperative category was given for the county's work in bringing together city, school and state entities to locate the new IVY Tech College regional campus in Noblesville.

Noblesville Schools, the city of Noblesville, and IVY Tech, a state institution, joined the county to each contribute toward establishing the new educational facility here.

The award was presented this week at the annual meeting of the Association of Counties in Indianapolis. Hamilton County has received the citation a half-dozen times in the past 20 years for a variety of projects and programs designed to improve quality of government and community life.





Jackson Fire Territory receives three cardiac monitors

The Jackson Fire Territory recently took delivery of three LifePack 15 cardiac monitors. Funded by a \$105,000 FEMA grant, the new monitors will be replacing two monitors over a decade old and will provide paramedics the latest technology for providing rapid cardiac diagnosis and care in the field.

Some of this technology includes advanced carbon monoxide detection in a patient, lithium-ion batteries that last up to three continuous hours, water-proof, drop tested up to 30" high, and improved restiveness to vibration.

One of the critical components is the ability for these monitors to transmit real-time information from the scene or the back of an ambulance to the doctor in the emergency room. This allows doctors to rapidly evaluate the patient's cardiac condition, determine additional treatment, or to prepare the heart catheter lab to be ready when the patient arrives at the hospital. Jackson Fire Territory utilizes the LIFENET management system provided by Riverview hospital to send this information to the hospital.

These cardiac monitors are a vital link in the emergency response system, as our goal is to have a cardiac patient into the heart catheter lab in 90 minutes or less from the time we contact the patient. Having these monitors in conjunction with well-trained firefighter paramedics will greatly increase the survivability of a patient experiencing a cardiac event.




