The landmark real estate, located at State Road 47 and State Road 38 in Sheridan, which served as home to Reynolds Farm Equipment recently sold at auction.

'Rocks hope to end string

You've probably heard that old saying about third time being charm.

Not so earlier this week for Westfield's Shamrocks.

After knocking off Plainfield in overtime to start the season and then playing Kokomo tough in game two, the Shamrocks lost game three to Pendleton Heights, 71-31.

"Pendleton Heights is REALLY good and we did not play our best," said Westfield mentor Eric Rauch.

Now, tonight, Westfield will again go on the road, for a third time in four games, to take on Zionsville in a Hoosier Crossroads Conference matchup.

That's a challenge. Zionsville is good. Plus, Westfield hasn't defeated the Eagles in eight years, last winning 58-56 in 2005-06.

But, the Eagles had their own problems last time out. Zionsville with 7-foot Derrik Smits in the middle, scored only 37 points in a 14-point loss to No. 1 ranked Carmel.

Rauch will throw a 1-2 scoring punch at the Eagles. Charlie Warner, a 6-5 junior, is averaging 19 points a game and Ian Kristensen, a 6-3 sophomore, is scoring at a 10.0 clip.

"We really struggled to shoot the ball and they were a well-oiled machine on offense," Rauch talked about the loss to Pendleton Heights.

Westfield lost to the Eagles 50-34 last year after dropping a 67-66 overtime thriller two years ago.

"Zionsville is a very good team with great size and an outstanding point guard who does not get near the credit he deserves," Rauch added.

"We will have to be physical and tough."



"We are excited for our tough double header weekend against Baptist Academy and 2A Speedway. Baptist is new to our schedule. Speedway is always a very tough


"These are the types of games that help us improve and show us where we are at this early in the season," the coach added.



A.J. Foyt released from hospital after triple bypass surgery

Verizon IndyCar Series team owner and four-time Indianapolis 500 winner A.J. Foyt was released Dec. 2 from Baylor-St. Luke's Medical Center in Houston and is recovering at home from a Nov. 12 triple bypass heart surgery.

Although surgery was successful, Foyt developed serious complications with his lungs. He was kept on a ventilator for eight days to allow his lungs to recover full functionality. Ten days in the Intensive Care Unit was followed by an additional 10 days in the hospital.

"It's been pretty rough but I guess I slept through the roughest part," said Foyt, who will turn 80 in January. "I had some problems that most people don't have after open heart surgery so I made my doctors work extra hard, but they saved my life. We've turned a corner so everything's pretty good. I've got a long way to go but I'm feeling better every day."

Pacers fall to 'Blazers despite strong defense

An all-too-familiar script played out for the Pacers at the Moda Center as they took on the Western Conference powerhouse Portland Trail Blazers on Thursday night. After playing a top-tier opponent tough all night, they couldn't finish the job in an 88-82 loss, their third consecutive defeat and fourth straight loss away from Bankers Life Fieldhouse.
