Carmel resident selected to fill District 4 **House seat**

Hamilton County has gained another voice in the state legislature following a caucus of precinct committeemen last evening.

Donna Schaibly, a Carmel Republican, was elected to fill a vacancy in House District 24 when GOP committeemen met at Zionsville. Schaibly takes the seat formerly held by Rep. Steve Braun who resigned following his November 4 re-election to take a position as director of Indiana Workforce Development.

The district includes parts of Clay and Washington townships in this county and portions of eastern Boone County. It is the first time the district has been represented by a Hamilton County resi-

The new legislator was formerly secretary of the county Republican Central Committee and has been active in GOP politics both in Carmel and the county.

She and husband, John, reside in the Crooked Stick neighborhood of west Carmel.

On December 15 another caucus will be held to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of longtime Rep. Eric Turner (R-Cicero). District 32 includes most of northern Hamilton County as well as parts of several other counties. Tony Cook, Cicero, appears to be the favorite and possibly only candidate for the seat.

New marshal in town

Monday afternoon the Arcadia Town Council voted unanimously to appoint Todd Uhrick as the new town marshal. Town council president Bill Cook said "This was a very tough decision, all six applicants were good qualified candidates and presented themselves well". Councilmen Maurice St. Louis and Glenn Shrock agreed that all candidates were well qualified but saw Uhrick as the most qualified for the job.

Uhrick steps into the Arcadia marshal job with 33 years of law enforcement experience and a 27 year resident of Arcadia. Captain Uhrick is currently the head of the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office's criminal investigations division. Uhrick has spent his entire law enforcement career with the Sheriff's office and the last 21 years as an investigator. Uhrick was promoted to Captain under former Sheriff Doug Carter and remained in that position under current Sheriff Mark Bowen.

Uhrick said in an interview after his appointment that he was very pleased to accept the position and was looking forward to a new chapter in his career. "My first priority is to restore the people of Arcadia's faith in their police department" said Uhrick. "I'm a big believer in community policing and want to see officers not only stopping crime but stopping to help the woman walking down the street with an arm full of groceries". Cicero man killed in northern county crash

A Cicero man died after a two-car crash in northern Hamilton County Wednesday

At approximately 8:50am, Hamilton County Sheriff deputies responded to 276th Street and Devaney Road in northern Hamilton County in reference to a report of a two-vehicle crash involving injuries. Deputies arrived at the location and found a semi-truck with a grain hauler trailer and a black pickup involved in a crash, both of which were off the road and the semi-truck was on its side. Pronounced dead at the scene was Jeffrey L. Vanhorn, 57, of Cicero.

Crash Investigation Team report, the semitruck, driven by Michael L. Landrum of

Lebanon, was eastbound on 276th Street when it collided with the northbound truck driven by Mr. Vanhorn. The grain hauler was fully loaded with soybeans and lost its load during the crash. Per Indiana State law, Landrum was taken to the hospital for a blood draw but otherwise had only minor

In addition to Mr. Vanhorn, Julie L. Vanhorn, 56, of Cicero, was also in the truck at the time of the crash. Mrs. Vanhorn was taken to the hospital for complaints of pain.

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

Chrysler plans to invest \$266 million in new manufacturing equipment in Kokomo

Press Release

Christmas comes early to Kokomo, as the Chrysler Group LLC has announced plans to invest \$266 million in new manufacturing equipment in Kokomo. The investment will enable the company to expand production of its 8-speed transmissions at two of its four Kokomo plants.

'Rocks score county win over Millers

The Westfield wrestling team dominated a county dual meet to Noblesville Tuesday, beating the Millers 47-18 at The Mill.

The Shamrocks won the first 10 matches of the dual, which gave them a spring-board into what will be a difficult weekend at the Calumet Invitational. It was a good confidence builder for Westfield, when one considers how young the team was that took to the mat on Tuesday.

"This team tonight was a team of all underclassmen," said WHS coach Terry O'Neill. "We did not have one senior in the lineup. So when you think about that, and you think about the fact that some of these young men have never been in a varsity lineup before. Some of them have never been in a leadership position before, and they're starting to form together as a team. They're starting to bond and do some things really, really well."

Westfield's team may be young, but not completely inexperienced. Familiar names like Austin Holmes, Reid Huston, Zach Steele and Evan Eldred were winners. Holmes, Steele and Eldred won their matches by pin, as did a freshman, Luke Brogan, at 106 pounds. Nick Schaeffer took the 195 pounds match by a technical fall, which is a win by more than 15 points.

"It's just nice to get a good win against a quality program, and send us up to Calumet on a high note," said O'Neill.

The Calumet tournament will feature some of the top teams in the state, in an area known for producing state champions on a regular basis. Westfield gets Mishawaka right out of the gate, a perennial state power.

Meanwhile, Noblesville won the last four matches of the meet. The Millers' undefeated seniors stayed perfect, with 145-pounder Stephen Kitko a tech fall winner, and 152-pounder Derek Noon getting a pin in 33 seconds.

"We have so many spots in the lineup with inexperienced kids," said NHS coach Tom Knotts, whose team is also dealing with the flu going around. For now, the

Price, a sophomore defensive back, earned Defensive Player of the Game honors with three interceptions, which also snapped the program's single-season record. Price now has nine interceptions on the season.

Price has been a huge part of Marian's special teams unit this season. In addition to his team-leading nine picks, Price has returned six punts, one for a touchdown.

The championship game appearance is the second in three seasons for the Knights. overtime on Dec. 13, 2012 for the program's first-ever NAIA national title.
