

Crash in northern part of county kills New Castle man

A two-vehicle crash in northern Hamilton County killed a New Castle man Thursday morning.

At approximately 9:30 a.m., Hamilton County Sheriff deputies responded to 281st Street and State Road 213 in northern Hamilton County, east of Arcadia, in reference to a report of a two-vehicle crash involving injuries. Deputies arrived at the location and found a semi-truck with trailer and a passenger car involved in a crash, both of which were off the road. Pronounced dead at the scene of the crash was Ricky R. Dautrich, 51.

According to deputies on the Hamilton County Crash Investigation Team, Mr. Dautrich was westbound on 281st Street driving a Chevrolet Lumina, approaching the intersection with State Road 213 when it struck the side of a semi-truck traveling northbound on State Road 213. After being struck by the car, the truck went off the road and hit a tree. The driver of the Freightliner truck, James Lovett, was not injured in the crash but was taken for a chemical test per state law

The crash investigation continues and anyone with information should contact the Hamilton County Crash Team at 317-773-

Big third quarter sends 'Blazers to victory

University used a 15-0 third quarter run to open up a lead against Indianapolis Lutheran and made 16 of 19 fourth quarter free throws to pick up a 78-70 win Thursday night.

Senior Tyler Diehl poured in 27 points and junior Connor Holly had 26 points, including 11 of 12 free throws to lead University to their second win in four games this season. Senior Zach Duncan added a career high 16 points and senior Jacob Daniels pulled 10 rebounds for University. Holly had six assists and three rebounds, while Diehl corralled six caroms and had three blocked shots.

University led at each stop and never trailed by more than two points in the game. Diehl had 10 first quarter points to help stake UHS to a 16-10 first quarter lead. Holly had 13 of his points in the fourth quarter, including an eight for eight effort at the foul stripe. Diehl was 4 for 6 from behind the three point line, while Holly made all three of his three point attempts.

The win was just University's third in 10 meetings with Lutheran.

"This was our first win over Lutheran at home. It was a big win for our program" remarked second year head coach Brandon Lafferman.

Coach Lafferman noted that the 15-0 third quarter run was sparked by the defense.

"We made some adjustments in our zone and they worked well," he said. "When we rebound the ball we can get in our offense and get better execution on the offense end."

The Trailblazers racked up 11 assists on the night, many of them feeding the ball to Duncan on the block.

"This was Duncan's best game, we will look to continue to feed him the ball in the post" concluded Laffterman.

University will host Bethesda Christian tonight and attempt to move over the .500 mark for the first time this season. Tip off for the varsity game will be at 7:30 p.m.

Fishers comes back to beat Warren

For the first time since re-opening its gym in 2006, the Fishers boys basketball team is 4-1 to begin the season.

The Tigers earned it, too. Fishers came from behind to defeat Warren Central 55-53 in an exciting Thursday night game at the Tiger Den. Fishers was down as much as 12 points in the third quarter before rallying and outscoring the Warriors 21-9 in the fourth period.

In fact, the Tigers trailed 49-41 with 4:19 left to play. But two huge defensive plays in the next 54 seconds gave Fishers six consecutive points and got the Tigers right back into the game.

The run began when Cameron Wolter stole the ball, then got it to Luke Wehner, who drained a 3-pointer. The Tigers got another turnover out of Warren, and that led to Lance Dollison being fouled while making a layin. Dollison then made the free throw to convert the traditional three-point play

Just like that, a 49-41 deficit became a much more manageable 49-47. Fishers was still down by two, but the momentum change was obvious, especially to Tigers coach Joe Leonard.

"We went into our 1-3-1, which was been good to us because (Keegan) Kollmeyer's so quick out top," said Leonard. "We felt real comfortable doing that. And that was the one thing that finally seemed to work for us."

Both teams hit two free throws, then Warren called time-out with 2:29 left. The Warriors drained the clock down to 1:28, but eventually Fishers got the ball, and Kollmeyer delivered with a 3-pointer. Finally, Fishers had the lead at 52-51, the first time the Tigers had led since early in the game.

CJ Hardaway's layin put WC back ahead 53-52, but Wolter was fouled with 26.3 seconds left. He made both free throws, and the Tigers had the lead for good.

Fishers got another turnover with 13.5 seconds left, and a foul sent Dollison to the line, where he made 1-of-2 shots. Warren had one more look, but a 3-pointer missed the mark, and time ran out.

Star of the Game: Luke Wehner scored 12 points, including a huge 3-pointer, to lead Fishers. **Fishers' Record:** 4-1.

Next Game: The Tigers host Franklin Central in Saturday.

The last four minutes easily erased the memories of the earlier part of the game. The Warriors scored six straight points to lead 8-4, then were able to keep Fishers at a distance until the Tigers made their big rally.

"We had a hard time keeping them in front of us," said Leonard. "We were overhelping and they were getting layups, and we didn't work the ball around long enough on offense, and that led to run-outs for them in transition."

Still, Fishers never let the game get completely out of control. Various Tigers stepped up at different times. A good example was Reid Stephens, who scored five consecutive points in the second half. That cut a 12-point WC lead to 44-37, keeping Fishers within striking distance going into the fourth quarter.

"We got a deep bench, we play a lot of kids, and that's why because you never know who's going to step up," said Leonard.

Wehner and Wolter each scored 12 points, with Kollmeyer adding 10. Wolter also grabbed five rebounds.

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Peru brings 7-footer to Mill

There will be a new opponent in The Mill on Saturday as Noblesville's Millers try to bounce back from their first basketball loss of the season.

Peru's Tigers, from the Mid-Indiana Conference (that's the league in which Hamilton Heights plays) will be in town.

Peru will present a tall challenge for Noblesville. In the middle for the Tigers will be 7-foot center Seth Adelsperger.

"Adelsperger has committed to Belmont University," said Noblesville coach Brian McCauley. "He has great hands and footwork around the basket."

The big guy will present a big challenge for a Noblesville team which doesn't have lots of height. McCauley's tallest starter is 6-5 junior John Kiser, although the defensive matchup against Adelsperger in the middle likely will be 6-3 Joey Brewer.

Adelsperger is averaging 12.5 points and 10.5 rebounds a game. He hasn't shot much in the Tigers' first two games, going 11-of-17 from the field.

Peru is 1-1 on the year going into a home court battle tonight with Plymouth. The Tigers have lost to a good Logansport team, 79-58, and defeated a not-as-good Wabash team, 61-57.

Adelsperger isn't the only size, nor only talent, that Peru will bring to Nob City.

The Tigers' leading scorer is 6-4 senior Logan Primerano. He is scoring at a 22.0 clip and is pulling 6.5 rebounds a game. Primerano is a strong threat near the hoop and he also hit 3-pointers. He is 19-of-43 overall from the field and 4-of-11 from 3-point range.

"Primerano is extremely athletic and skilled," McCauley said. "He does a great job of attacking the basket for layups and drawing fouls.

"Peru will be a very challenging opponent," McCauley continued. "They have both excellent guard and post play."

Peru will be Noblesville's fourth consecutive opponent in The Mill this season. Six of the Millers' first seven games are at home.

Noblesville has defeated Northwest and Howe and last time out lost to Hoosier Crossroads Conference foe Fishers.

Noblesville has been a well-balanced scoring team through three games, led by senior guard Jake Mills and by Kiser. Kiser is averaging 15.3 points a game and Mills is scoring at a 14.7 clip.

Rebounding has been a problem for Noblesville. The Millers are averaging just 17.3 boards a game, led by Kiser at 5.0. Second on the boards is senior guard Sean Wilson with a 3.3 average.

Wilson leads the team in dishing out assists, averaging five per game.

Noblesville's shooting has helped the lack of rebounds. The Millers are shooting 50 percent from two-point range (34-of-68) and 59 percent from 3-point territory (27-of-46). They also are a strong 29-of-35 from the free throw line.

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


