# Riverview expanding

In what could become the first chapter of the long-proposed redevelopment of the west side of White River, the Reporter has learned that Riverview Health officials are preparing to send out a Request for Proposals to design and engineering firms.

The invitation to interested firms seeks feasible plans for the development of land the hospital owns on Conner Street east of Riverview. The parcel was the former site of the Kahlo auto dealership, now an open lot and the site of the Noblesville Farmers Market during the summer season.

### Noblesville announces holiday trash pickup schedule

Due to the holidays, there will be no trash pickup on Thursday, December 25 and Thursday, January 1. During those two weeks, the regular trash pickup schedule for Thursdays and Fridays will be delayed by one day. This means that those who regularly have Thursday pickups will instead have pickups on Friday, December 26 and Friday, January 2. Regular Friday pickups will instead be on Saturday, December 27 and Saturday, January 3.

Beginning Monday, January 5, Republic Services will then return to its normal pickup schedule.

In addition, Republic Services will pick up Christmas trees from Friday, December 26 until Friday, January 16, 2015. Trees will be collected on the same day and in the same location as residents' trash/recycle collection. Please note that trees longer than four feet must be cut into sections of no more than four feet per section so that the automated arm of the trucks will be able to pick up the sections and place them in the truck.



Christman did say that the garage on weekends likely would not be filled with Riverview traffic and possibly could serve as usage for people attending the Farmers Market and other activities at the park, which will be located north of Riverview, across highways 32 & 38.

"We're not there, yet," Christman said concerning sending out the RFP. "But, the time has come to develop 205 (the address of the former Kahlo)."

Riverview purchased the land several years ago for its future needs. The ever-expanding county hospital is known to be seeking additional parking. Also possible would be office space for medical staff or residential nursing facilities.

A professional firm, yet to be selected, would review possible best uses for the property which borders White River and outline how development could be laid out to make the best use of the land. Findings will be reported back to the Riverview Board of Trustees next year.

Development on the ground has been rumored since the hospital purchased it. The city of Noblesville has great interest in what happens on the ground because city officials see the west bank of the river as a prime area for economic development.

City and county officials also want to see to it that whatever is built fits with the plans for the new Federal Hill Park across Conner Street, and possibly a new river bridge further south. There are also hopes of seeing the riverfront developed to draw business investment and visitors to the city.

## **'Hawks fly past Bulldogs**

For Sheridan folks who haven't yet seen new coach Chris Schrank's Blackhawks play this season, here are a couple of reason to do so.

After losing a heart-breaking two-point decision to Rossville to start the season, Sheridan last evening in Larry Hobbs Memorial gym won its third straight game by taming Clinton Central's Bulldogs, 67-52, in a Hoosier Heartland Conference game.

Sheridan got the job done even though the Blackhawks were in all kinds of foul trouble in the first half and even though Sheridan was an unbelievable 16-of-39 at the charity line.

Trailing 34-31 at halftime, Sheridan went on a 19-5 run in the third quarter and never looked back.

"We all have a common goal of being successful this season," said Schrank, Hamilton County's youngest coach in age and in experience.

This team is Schrank's first varsity team and his first year at Sheridan.

The common goal was shared by lots of

Blackhawks last night. Two starters, senior Brock Kitchel and junior Jake Chesney, led the scoring with 19 points each.

The other Sheridan senior, center Elliott Barker, scored all five of his points in the

fourth quarter as Sheridan turned a runaway into a cake walk.

the bench to notch 10 points and lead Sheridan with eight rebounds.

Junior Chris Roberts, who missed nearly all the first half while in foul trouble, finished with nine points.

Junior guard Taylor Ly came off the bench and canned a 3-pointer and scored five points as Sheridan began to move ahead in the third quarter.

"Everyone played a part in this victory tonight," Schrank told his team in the dressing room following the game.

Only the poor free throw shooting kept Sheridan from completely blowing away Clinton Central. Schrank said this isn't a bad free throw shooting team, and in his postgame talk encouraged the Blackhawks to El "get into the gym on Saturday (today) and work on free throw shooting."

"We hit 14-of-18 free throws in our last game, but free throw shooting cost us a win P at Rossville," Schrank said.

Sheridan's bench played a huge role in the victory with Roberts out with early foul trouble (two quick fouls to start the game) and Kitchel picking up his third foul with 1:14 left in the first half.

"Our bench really helped," said Schrank. "Weitzel came in and gave us scoring and rebounding."

In the big third quarter, Sheridan was 8-of-13 from the field, including 3-pointers Patrick Weitzel, a 6-2 junior, came off by Kitchel and Ly, but 1-of-5 at the line.

The Blackhawks' free throw woes improved a ton in the fourth quarter when they cashed in on 8-of-11 attempts.

The win evened Sheridan's conference

"The conference is wide-open this year," Schrank said. "We can win it."

The new coach is making believers out of his players and also out of the fans who watched Sheridan perform in beating Clinton Central.

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## Millers come back to win - again

The Noblesville girls basketball team found itself in a familiar scenario Friday. You could even call it a re-run.

The Millers trailed Fishers in the third quarter in what was a defensive Hoosier Crossroads Conference battle. But Noblesville's offense exploded for 25 fourth-quarter points, and that gave the Millers a 45-33 victory over the Tigers.

Noblesville is still undefeated for the season at 9-0. In their last game, the Millers trailed North Central even later in the game before coming back.

"North Central, we were down until five minutes to go in the fourth quarter," said NHS coach Donna Keck. She credited her team with continuing to fight, which it did against a Fishers team that was ready to pull the upset.

For most of the game, it looked like the Tigers would. They scored the first four points, from baskets by Kara Gerka and

"I thought our defense was fantastic all late in the game that came off of a couple of our misses," said Tigers coach Michael Gaines. "That transition defense was a big key to our success throughout the game."

Both defenses were playing well. Fishers led 11-6 after the first quarter and 15-13 at halftime. The Tigers were up 14-8 in the

second quarter, after Brooke Sugg hit a 3-pointer. Foul shots by Brooke Herron and a '3' from Becca Bergman got NHS to within two at the break.

Shannon scored all seven of Noblesville's points in the period, and her free throws with 1:04 to go in the quarter got the Millers to within 22-20.

It turned out Shannon was just getting Noblesville 45, Fishers 33 warmed up. She got Noblesville in front for the first time by converting a three-point play, then a pair of Cori Cain free throws pushed the Millers ahead 25-22.

Gerka scored four straight points to give night, and then they got a couple leak-outs Fishers the lead back, but Brooke Herron answered with a 3-pointer. Kroehler's layin tied the game, but Shannon scored on a iumper to give Noblesville a 30-28 lead.

> The Millers never trailed after that - in fact, Shannon's basket was the start of a 17-5 run that would carry the Millers through to the buzzer. Shannon scored 12 points in that run, ending up with 23 on the night, 15 total in the fourth quarter.

> "In that fourth quarter we finally started hitting some shots," said Keck. "From there I thought that momentum just kept rolling."

> Cain grabbed seven rebounds, while Katelyn O'Reilly added eight points and had five boards. Herron handed out five assists. Cain, Erin Wood, and Emily Kiser all provided good minutes off of the bench.

Gerka and Murphy both scored 11 points, with Gerka and Kroehler both getting six rebounds.

"If we play them in the sectional, which Fishers led 20-14 in the third quarter, there's a great chance that we'll see them after Hannah Kroehler made a layin. 

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



## Toronto's rebounding sends Pacers to defeat

In trying to snap their second six-game losing streak of the season, the Pacers had a tall order at Air Canada Centre on Friday night, taking on the No. 1 team in the Eastern Conference. And while the Raptors came into the contest ranked 26th in the NBA in rebounding, it was Toronto's superior performance on the glass that sent Indiana to another defeat, 106-94.

Up until their home loss to the Clippers on Wednesday, the Pacers had been an elite rebounding team, and had been dominant on both ends of the floor in that department. Indiana entered Friday's contest against Toronto limiting opponents to just 10.1 second-chance points per game, best in the Association.

But the Raptors dominated the Pacers under the basket, grabbing 16 offensive boards, compared to Indiana's six. The resulting second-chance points for Toronto defined this game. Both teams had trouble shooting, with the Pacers connecting on 41 percent of their field goal attempts and the Raptors connecting at a 42 percent clip. But with all those second-chance possessions, the Raptors ended up taking 11 more shots.

The biggest rebound disparity position-wise was at center, where in the matchup between Roy Hibbert and Jonas Valanciunas, Hibbert had only two rebounds in 28 minutes while Valanciunas grabbed 14 of them in 27 minutes. Valanciunas did most of the glass work for Toronto; no other Raptor finished with more than eight boards.

Lou Williams came off the bench to lead Toronto with But both went cold after that: the Pacers hit just three of 26 points on 9-of-18 shooting in 30 minutes on the floor. their last 13, while Toronto went 5-for-16. He hit five of seven 3-point attempts. Four other Raptors finished with double-figure scoring efforts: James Johnson scored 13 points on 6-of-9 from the field, while Patrick Patterson added 11, and both Greivis Vasquez and Valanciunas added 10 apiece.

The Pacers were led in scoring by Solomon Hill, who came off the bench for the first time this season as Frank Vogel went with his seventh different starting lineup in an effort to avoid another slow start. Hill finished with 16 points on 5-of-8 shooting.

C.J. Watson and Rodney Stuckey, who made up the starting backcourt for Indiana, added 13 points apiece, and David West finished with 12. The slow start the Pacers hoped to avoid reared its ugly head once again, as they only managed 20 first-quarter points (Indiana came in averaging 22 first-quarter points per game, fewest in the NBA).

Despite trailing by 11 at the half, the Pacers made a run in the third quarter, fueled by a 9-2 burst that brought

Mainly as a result of so many offensive rebounds for Toronto, the Pacers were outscored in the paint, 50-32.

Both teams were hot from 3-point range in the first half, at one point combining to go 10-for-19 from long distance.

Indiana's free-throw shooting was above its season average: the Pacers made 20 of 23 attempts (87 percent) from the line. Toronto was 20-of-22 (91 percent).

The Raptors "pulled a Pacers" on the Pacers: Led by Williams' 26, Toronto's bench outscored Indiana's by a 64-45 margin. On Wednesday against the Clippers, the Pacers' bench outscored Los Angeles' bench 66-30.

"Their bench outplayed our bench. I think that stretch towards the end of the third and into the fourth They went on a tear, seemingly scored on every time down for about four or five minutes, so that separated the game." - Coach Vogel

"We will keep fighting, keep playing hard, keep trying to figure out ways to win games, and stay in games. That's the biggest thing; give ourselves a chance to win. It is not enough just to stay in them, but find a way to win games."
