State introduces county travel status app

The State of Indiana has created a free mobile app to provide Hoosiers with county travel status updates and alerts directly to their mobile devices.

"This new app will be a great onthe-go resource for citizens and visitors to Indiana," said Governor Mike Pence. "The travel advisory map has been one of the most popular pages on the State of Indiana website, particularly during times of inclement weather. The app will be even more convenient, and we hope many people will use this as a resource to make informed travel decisions."

In addition to weather, the app will so include notifications with regard to flooding, hazardous materials spills and other events that could affect trav-

Last winter, the Indiana Department of Homeland Security (IDHS) County Travel Status Map was the most visited page on IN.gov, generating nearly 5 million unique visitors between December 1, 2013, and March 31, 2014.

The Indiana Office of Technology and IDHS collaborated on the project. The Indiana Travel Advisory app is available to download for iPhone (<u>https://appsto.re/us/QHVw4.i</u>) in the Store, and (https://play.google.com/store/apps/de tails?id=gov.in.traveladvisory) in the Google Play Store.

Features include:

Ability for users to set alerts for any county or counties they choose, up to every county in the state. When the travel status in a selected county is changed, the user will receive an alert notification.

Weather conditions for each county. Tapping on a county will display the temperature and an icon with the current conditions.

Contact information for county emergency management agencies, which are responsible for the status updates.

County visitor spending tops \$100 million

Visitor spending in 2014 as a result of regional advertising initiatives by Hamilton County Tourism, Inc. exceeded \$100 million, a 42 percent increase from 2013, according to a research study released today by the agency.

ducted the annual research study to measure the success of advertising campaigns in influencing travelers to visit Hamilton County. The report revealed visitors spend \$225 for every dollar the organization spent on advertising in 2014, as compared to an already record \$158 in 2013.

Among all visitor trips to Hamilton County in 2014, about 193,000 household trips can be attributed to the agency's advertising and promotions efforts, resulting in more than \$105 million in visitor spending.

Hamilton County Tourism spent less to reach a potential traveling household in 2014 at 36 cents per household compared to 65 cents in 2013, or 80 percent less. Hamilton County Tourism spent \$468,000 in direct media buys in print, radio, television and digital Hamilton County, Ind. each year. media targeting the direct marketing areas of Chicago, Champaign,

Louisville and Fort Wayne. Digital advertising initiatives also allowed the organization to extend into Dayton (Ohio), Cincinnati and South Bend.

The advertising campaign that ran from April to September 2014 reached 23 percent of targeted consumers, an 8 percent Carmel-based Strategic Marketing and Research Insights conincrease from a 15 percent awareness rating in 2013. The study also revealed a 57 percent increase in ad-influenced trips.

"Hamilton County has grown into a regional tourism destination through the investments our cities, attractions and businesses have made," said Brenda Myers, Hamilton County Tourism executive director. "The ability to accurately target potential consumers through very tailored messages, and advertising and promotions plans, combined with great things to see and do has made this a win-win for the community."







Big weekend for 3 county teams

Playing back-to-back Friday/Saturday double headers can be tough on high school teams. Especially this year when because of the increase of 20 games to 22 games allowed by the IHSAA, more back-tobackers are dotting the schedules.

Then, toss in a conference game and a rival game, well, it becoming a challenge. That's the way this weekend is shaping up for Noblesville, Hamilton Heights and Westfield.



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

Modifications made to instant replay...

WNBA announces rules changes for 2015 season

The WNBA announced today that its Board of Governors has approved an additional "trigger" for instant replay review as well as five modifications to existing instant replay rules. In addition, the Board approved four other playing rules changes for the upcoming 2015 season.

Expansion of Instant Replay Rules:

· Officials may utilize instant replay whenever they are not reasonably certain a team had an improper number of players on the court while the ball was in play.

Modification of Instant Replay Rules:

• Instant replay triggers that are currently in effect only during the last minute of regulation and the entire overtime period(s) -- out-of-bounds, restricted area, goaltending/basket-interference, clock resets -- instead shall be in effect during the last two minutes of regulation and the last two minutes of any overtime period.

• Officials may now during the last two minutes of regulation and the last two minutes of overtime period(s) conduct an instant replay review whenever they are not reasonably certain as to which team should be awarded possession after a ball becomes out of bounds or whether an out of bounds in fact occurred. Officials also may award the ball to the team that last

touched the ball if the ball going out of bounds was clearly caused by an obvious foul on the team that did not last touch the ball. Previously, officials could only use replay if they weren't reasonably certain as to which of two players on opposing teams caused the ball to become out of bounds and were limited as to what they could review once the instant replay was triggered.

• Officials may now utilize instant replay to review the timing of all off-ball fouls (offensive or defensive) that occur near the timing of a successful shot, to determine the actual sequence of events. Prior to this change, officials could only review the timing when an offensive player without the ball was fouled.

• Officials are now permitted to utilize instant replay whenever they are not reasonably certain whether a foul that was called meets the criteria of a flagrant foul. Previously, the foul had to be called a flagrant on the floor in order to utilize instant replay.

• Officials are now permitted to utilize instant replay whenever they are not reasonably certain whether a foul that was called meets the criteria of a clear-path-tothe-basket foul. Previously, the foul had to be called a clear-path foul on the floor in order to utilize instant replay.

Rules changes:

• The shot clock will no longer be reset to five seconds when a held ball is caused by the defense with fewer than five seconds remaining on the clock.

• On any midcourt throw-in, the ball shall be put in play from the sideline one step in the backcourt, allowing the team to pass the ball into either the back or frontcourt. (Under pre-existing rules, the ball could only be passed into the frontcourt).

• Teams may freely substitute players whenever any timeout is called. Prior to this change, there were limited circumstances in which a team couldn't substitute for certain players at timeouts.

• If a team has too many players on the court while the ball is in play, (i) the offending team would be assessed a nonunsportsmanlike technical foul and (ii) the non-offending team would continue to have the option of either accepting or nullifying the game action that occurred during the violation and, if the ball is put back into play via a throw-in, would be awarded the ball. Previously, if the offending team had possession, it would keep possession of the ball despite the violation.

Each of these rules was recommended by the WNBA's Competition Committee at its meeting on Dec. 3.

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
