NHS teacher accused of inappropriate conduct with minor student

A Noblesville High School teacher has been accused of inappropriate conduct with a student, according to a media release published by the school district Friday afternoon.

The release stated, "It has come to our attention that a Noblesville High School teacher has been accused of inappropriate conduct with a minor student. Student safety is our number one priority and Noblesville Schools takes an allegation of this nature very seriously. As such, the teacher in question was immediately removed from contact with students, and based on the investigation of this claim we have begun the process of terminating employment. We also immediately contacted the Noblesville Police Department and are working closely with them on the investigation into this matter. We have no other information to share at this time."

School officials did not release the teacher's name.

Noblesville Police Lt. Bruce Barnes did confirm his agency is conducting an investigation. In a statement to the Hamilton County Reporter Barnes said, "I can't release any information at this time because it is an ongoing investigation. There have been no charges filed."



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


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Follow these Holiday safety tips

Driving

Avoid driving alone or at night.

Keep all car doors locked and windows alarm or use an anti-theft device.

If you must shop at night, park in a well-lighted area.

Avoid parking next to vans, trucks with

Park as close as you can to your destination and take notice of where you parked.

Never leave your car unoccupied with the motor running or with children inside.

Do not leave packages or valuables on the seat of your car. This creates a temptation for thieves. If you must leave something in the car, lock it in the trunk or put it out of sight.

Be sure to locate your keys prior to going to your car.

Keep a secure hold on your purse, handbag and parcels. Do not put them down or on top of the car in order to open the door.

When approaching and leaving your vehicle be aware of your surroundings. Do not approach your car alone if there

are suspicious people in the area.

Ask mall or store security for an escort before leaving your shopping location.

Fast start sends Millers to victory

Reporter Sports Editor A fast start propelled Noblesville to its

first Hoosier Crossroads Conference win of the season Friday night.

The Millers beat Westfield 60-46 in a big county and league rivalry game at The Rock. Noblesville led 21-7 in the first quarter, weathered a Shamrock storm in the second period, then slowly built up its lead in the second half.

The game was tied at 5-5 early on before the Millers went on a 16-2 run. Noblesville made three 3-pointers during the latter stages of that run; Jake Mills hit two downtown shots and Sean Wilson made one - and Wilson was just getting warmed up.

"Our guys got off to a great start," said NHS coach Brian McCauley. "Really proud of their intensity, their focus coming out to start the game. That was big. If we get off to a slow start, then we're probably down six rather than up six at halftime.'

The Millers kept their lead over 10 points for most of the second quarter, but Westfield finished the half strong when Conner Osswald scored five straight points. Osswald drained a '3,' then made a couple free throws to cut the score to 33-27.

"You start 21-7, you got to find a way to fight back, and I thought we did that in the second quarter," said WHS coach Eric Rauch.

The third quarter was more defensive, with Noblesville outscoring the 'Rocks 10-5. Wilson got the first basket of the period, hitting his fourth 3-pointer of the night to accompany the two he made in the second quarter. Wilson wound up leading all scorers with 21 points. He also handed out four

"He was wide open and nailed them," said McCauley. "That's what you have to do when you're open."

Charlie Warner accounted for all five of Westfield's points in the period, on a '3' and two foul shots.

The Shamrocks continued to fight in the fourth quarter, but Noblesville's efficiency kept it in front by a comfortable margin. The Millers shot 63 percent for the game, and were 57 percent from 3-point land.

"They shot the ball unbelievably well," said Rauch. "We got to find a way to guard."

Kiser added 17 points, and also led the NHS rebounding with nine. Joey Brewer grabbed six rebounds.

Stars of the Game: Sean Wilson hit four 3-pointers on his way to 21 points for Noblesville. Westfield's Spencer Tebbe had a solid all-around game with five points, four assists, four steals and three

"I think our kids played hard," said Rauch. "I just think we had some mental errors where we didn't catch the ball."



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

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
