Growing up in Noblesville... First day of school was an adventure

I will be writing a periodic article about growing up in Noblesville. My wife, Kim and I grew up in Noblesville and our parents and grandparents lived here all their adult lives. Kim and I just celebrated our 41st wedding anniversary. Kim lived on the north side of Noblesville, where her mother lives today, and I grew up on the old south side.

I was born in Noblesville in 1954 (makes me feel old) and the population of Noblesville at that time was

between 6,500 in 1950 and 7,600 people in 1960. Big difference from today! The population really did not

change much until the 1980's. Noblesville was a great bus stop the first day of school for the bus! The bus did not place to grow up, go to school, and to live life.

Most children remember some things about school. Kim went to school at the old First Ward School. Kim and I were actually in first grade together at First Ward. 

In the fall of

1976 my Dad was diagnosed with terminal cancer, Stage 4 kidney cancer, which the doctors feared may have metastasized into his bladder and other organs. He was sent home from the hospital to get his "life" in order. We knew what that meant.

The doctors decided that removing his kidney would be the next course of action to prolong his life. The surgery was scheduled for January. So until then, we would wait and pray.

One morning, shortly before Christmas, Dad was sitting in his recliner when a Redbird flew under the awning outside his window . It stayed there for a short time and then flew away. Dad prayed "Lord, if you bring back the Redbird I know that I will be ok." The Redbird never returned.

Until...

On that snowy January morning when Dad was to go to the hospital, he was up early. He was anxious to get the surgery over with and fearful of the days ahead. As he opened the door to the garage to pack his suitcase in the car, there on the railing of the garage door was a Redbird, in all its glory.

Dad knew...he just knew...he would be ok. He said that he had this amazing peace come over him.

He told my Mom what had happened. He told me what had happened.

The next day after a seven hour surgery to remove his kidney, we saw the surgeon, Dr. Mosbaugh, almost running down the hall at Methodist Hospital. He had the biggest smile on his face. We knew. We just knew. There was no cancer. They did remove his kidney because it was so damaged by "whatever" had been there.

Dad lived until June 28, 2006. He was 80 years old. He told his Redbird story every chance he had to tell it.

On the morning of his funeral, three Redbirds showed up on the roof of his neighbor across the street. I had



Ukrainian law enforcement delegation tours Indiana State Police Cyber Crime Office

This past Wednesday, the Indiana State Police provided training to Ukrainian law enforcement cyber crime investigators. Members of the Ukrainian law enforcement delegation also toured the Indiana State Police Cyber Crime Office, giving them insight into the cutting-edge forensic work performed by the Indiana State Police.

Today's training and tour was part of an exchange program coordinated by the United States Department of Justice and College of Technology, Purdue University.

Visiting members of the delegation included representatives from the Ministry of Interior of Ukraine, Cybercrime Division as well as personnel from the Kiev National Police Academy, Odessa Police Academy, Kharkiv National University of Internal Affairs, Dnipropetrovsk State University of Internal Affairs, Security Service of Ukraine, The Ukrainian Scientific and Research Institute of Special Equipment and Forensic Expertise and the Kiev National Academy of Prosecutors of Ukraine, Ministry of Justice. Issues associated with cyber crime know no borders. Forging working relationships with foreign governments allows all concerned to work together to detect and prosecute persons responsible for computer crimes, including network intrusion, online child exploitation, and online fraud.



The Hamilton Southeastern wrestling team won the Hamilton County Tournament Saturday at Westfield. The Royals won five individual championships and placed all 14 of their wrestlers in the top six.

Royals dominate Hamilton County meet

Hamilton County wrestling tournament on Saturday.

The Royals reclaimed their trophy, using five first-place finishes and placing all of their wrestlers in the top six to score 250 points, well ahead of defending champion Carmel's 182. Westfield hosted the tournament, and the Shamrocks edged out Fishers for third place 175.5-174.

But the story of the day was Southeastern. The Royals won their championships in all three categories: Light, middle and heavier weights. Klayton Anderson was the 113 pound champ, while returning state qualifier Austin Holmes was victorious at 120 pounds.

Keegan Stansberry won the 138-pound class, Spencer Irick was the 170-pound champion and Jimmy Ford won at 220 pounds. "Our guys had a really strenuous week in a lot of ways coming up to this," said HSE coach Kyle Poyer. "Finals, all the obligations of the season, and I was just really proud that they were able to maintain their focus and continue to work their way through it. I really like our team, I really like our attitude.' Carmel picked up a pair of champions, with Morgan Pruitt winning at 126 and Sam Hipple earning the 195 trophy. 

Pacers slow it down, but still fall to Denver

The Pacers had the pace of the game to their liking most of the game, but couldn't take advantage of it in their 76-73 loss at Denver Saturday night.

After being blown out by the Nuggets at Bankers Life Fieldhouse on Nov. 4, 108-87, the Pacers managed to grind this one down to a halfcourt slog. That helped them keep the game close, but they didn't shoot well enough to take advantage. Their field goal percentage, 30.7, was a seasonlow. With Roy Hibbert going scoreless, they had to settle for jump shots much of the game, and didn't hit enough of them to win.

The Pacers had the ball out of bounds on their own sideline with a chance to force overtime with 0.6 seconds left, but C.J. Miles' rushed 30-footer clanked off the backboard.

C.J. Watson missed the game with a sinus infection, leaving the Pacers severely shorthanded at point guard. With regular starter George Hill close to returning from the quad tear that has kept him out all season and Rodney

Stuckey playing with a headache, Donald Sloan started and was the only healthy player at that position.

David West led the Pacers with a season-high 19 points. He also had 10 rebounds, for his second straight double-double. Miles scored 16 off the bench. But nobody shot well enough to have a good offensive game.

Miles hit a three-pointer at the buzzer to give the Pacers a six-point lead after the first quarter. They led by one at halftime and were tied after the third period. They took a 60-55 lead early in the fourth quarter and had the ball twice with a chance to extend the lead, but Denver went on a 10-0 the officials during that stretch that he was called for a technical foul.

The Pacers rallied again, as Miles hit consecutive jumpers to make it a one-point game. They had the ball with a chance to regain the lead, but West was left with no choice but to take a fading shot in the lane that missed. The Pacers were still within a point, 69-68, after Lavoy Allen hit two foul shots, but Wilson Chandler hit a three-pointer – his only successful field goal in 10 attempts - to open a four-point lead for the Nuggets.

Allen's rebound basket with 1:10 left got the Pacers within four again, and his rebound basket with 13 seconds left did the same. Donald Sloan's three-pointer with 1.2 seconds remaining to make it a one-point game. Aaron Afflalo, fouled intentionally, hit two free throws to give Denver a three-point lead, setting up Miles' missed shot at the final buzzer.

West scored the Pacers first seven points, hitting two mid-range jumpers and a three-pointer from the left corner, to get them off to a fast start. He had 11 of their first 13 as well, as they took an 11-4 lead. Solomon Hill kept the run. Pacers coach Frank Vogel became so incensed with Pacers ahead with a three-pointer from the right wing and C.J. Miles wrapped up the period with another three-pointer for a 21-15 lead.

> You think that was low-scoring? The second quarter was a slogfest. The Pacers scored a season-low 12 points, but still took a 33-32 lead into halftime. That matched their season low point total for a half, and was Denver's lowestscoring half. The Pacers hit just 29 percent of their field goals in the half, but did manage to hit three (of 11) three-pointers. Denver missed all eight of its three-point attempts.
