Kim was found dead in Windermere Park on November 1st. An autopsy report indicated Kim had been shot three times and his throat had been slashed. During the hearing Voyles argued the sentencing enhancement of life without parole would not apply if Winkler was proven to be an individual with mental retardation. "We haven't raised that issue, but we do have an insanity

defense that will provide for a mental evaluation." Based on the defense's notice of an insanity defense Judge Hughes ordered a mental evaluation to be conducted by two individuals appointed by the court. Hughes stated, one would be a psychiatrist and the second would be either a psychiatrist or a psychologist. Winkler is schedule for a jury trial on April 7, 2015.

Blackhawks upset Lapel

The start of the holidays this season has a brand new special flavor in Sheridan. Coach Jeff Guenther's Lady Blackhawks have moved high school basketball to a fever high.

Sheridan has proven to the state Class 2A basketball world that the Lady Blackhawks are for real, and you better believe it, there is much more to come.

The excitement started Monday when unranked Sheridan, playing in Larry Hobbs Memorial Gym, defeated Lapel, 59-56, handing the Class 2A, No. 4 rated Bulldogs their first loss of the season after 10 consecutive wins.

Also in Hobbs Hall, starting Monday, Sheridan will host an eight-team holiday tourney, an event which could, in Round 2 on the morning of Dec. 30, match Sheridan against one of the state's top 3A teams, Hammond Gavit.

Sheridan, now 10-2 entering the tourney, has lost only to Class 3A Tri-West, 56-43, and Class 2A Carroll, 36-35. Tri-West in No.14 in the Class 3A poll. Carroll is No. 15 in Class 1A. Carroll was a Hoosier Heartland Conference game for Sheridan.

The matchup between Sheridan and 8-3 Hammond Gavit in the tourney seems in the making. Sheridan will open on Dec.29 at 11 a.m. against a 4-5 Indiana Math & Science. Hammond Gavit will play the same time against a 5-4 Liberty Christian team. The winners will square off at 10 a.m. on Dec. 30 in the two-day tournament.

The Monday victory over Lapel was a classic. Sheridan led 10-9 after one quarter; 21-19 at halftime and 41-36 entering the last period, and then had to fight off a strong comeback bid by the Bulldogs.

In the fourth quarter, Sheridan got up by as many as eight points and then Lapel battled back to go up by three.

"I am very proud of our physical and mental toughness to come back and hold them off," Guenther said.

"We defended well. We had some breakdowns, but we made Lapel work to score.

"We were 14-of-16 at the line in the fourth quarter," Guenther continued.

Faith DeVaney was 4-for-4 the at the line in the quarter and 8-of-9 for the game. Audrey Reed was 8-of-8 hitting free throws in the fourth quarter and 11-of-12 in the game.

Sheridan was 24-of-35 shooting free throws.

"Reed did a good job getting to the basket," said Guenther. "Brittany Welch was solid and did a great job defending Lapel's 6-2 player. Katie Hybarger was outstanding on the boards, and we got great minutes from (Payton) Buckner off the bench."

Welch, a sophomore, led Sheridan with 22 points and Reed, a freshman, finished with 15 points. Hybarger, the place-kicker from Sheridan's football team, finished with 13 rebounds.

Hill makes season debut, leads Pacers to 2nd straight win

After a three-game Western Conference road trip, the Pacers returned home for the holidays. So it was rather fitting that the Blue-and-Gold got a big lift from their "Hometown Hero" in their final game before Christmas.

Indianapolis native George Hill scored 15 points in his regular season debut to lead Indiana (10-19) to a 96-84 victory over the New Orleans Pelicans (14-14) on Tuesday night at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

Coming off the bench in limited minutes, the former Broad Ripple and IUPUI standout played a total of 21:15, receiving one extended shift in each half and re-entering the game in crunch time. Hill was 5-for-8 from the field and 2-for-3 from 3-point range. The Pacers point guard also tallied four rebounds and three assists.

"It was just making a play when you can make a play," Hill said. "I wasn't worried about how many points I was scoring, or how many rebounds or assists. I just tried to focus on playing each play hard and try to win the game."

Hill's minutes were limited out of concerns for his conditioning. Though he appeared rather winded during one timeout in the fourth quarter and said postgame he still feels "out of shape," Hill showed no signs of fatigue during live action, displaying what teammate David West described as "world-class speed."

"He looked great out there," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel said. "He made a lot of heady offensive plays. He just played a great basketball game at both ends."

The Blue-and-Gold led by four points at halftime and the Pelicans trimmed the deficit to just one on Tyreke

Evans' fastbreak jumper with 7:41 remaining in the third quarter. But the Pacers responded by scoring on their next six straight possessions, reeling off a 13-2 run that pushed the lead to double digits for the first time.

The Pelicans hung around for most of the rest of the night, cutting Indiana's lead to five on Jrue Holiday's bucket with 3:15 to play, but never trimmed the deficit to a single possession. The Pacers closed the game with a 9-2 run.

Hill may have been Tuesday's headliner, but the Pacers also boasted a deep supporting cast. Five other players scored in double figures for the Blue-and-Gold and three more combined to add an additional 20 points.

After shooting a season-high 50 percent in Sunday's win in Minnesota, the Blue-and-Gold just as good offensively on Tuesday. They again shot 50 percent from the field and only committed nine turnovers.

"We're trying to take care of the basketball and improve our system offense," West said. "Move the ball, screening, getting guys involved, and putting passes on time, on target."

Solomon Hill had 13 points on 6-of-11 shooting. C.J. Miles finished with 11 points, while C.J. Watson added 10. West stuffed the stat sheet, finishing with 13 points, seven rebounds, and five assists. And Roy Hibbert turned in a strong performance on both ends, scoring 14 points and blocking seven shots to match his season high (all of his rejections came in the first half).

Defensively, the Pacers did an admirable job on Pelicans forward Anthony Davis, the NBA's third-leading scorer. The 21-year-old phenom managed a game-high 21 points, but needed 18 shots to do so.

"We just played with a lot of effort," Miles said of the team's defensive performance. "We helped each other out on that end. Guys covered for each other. Big Dawg (Hibbert) was great protecting the rim and everybody else just tried to scrap and contest all their shots."

Holiday added 16 points, five rebounds, and five assists for New Orleans. Evans recorded his fifth double-double of the season, finishing with 14 points and 11 boards.

The Pacers now have two days off before heading to Detroit on Friday.

With the win, the Pacers have now won back-to-back games for just the third time this season. They last accomplished that feat Nov. 15-19, when they won at Chicago and then at home against Charlotte.

The Pacers forced the Pelicans into 16 turnovers (one shy of their season high) and converted those 16 giveaways into 18 turnovers. New Orleans entered Tuesday's contest averaging just 12.1 turnovers per game, the third-best average in the NBA.

Six of the nine Pacers players who saw the floor on Tuesday scored in double figures, but the other three also had solid performances. Rodney Stuckey finished with six points, five rebounds, and four assists. Lavoy Allen had eight points off the bench on 4-of-5 shooting and seven rebounds. Luis Scola contributed six points and three boards.

Indiana won despite being outrebounded, 46-38. The Blue-and-Gold had a season-low three offensive boards. The Pacers are now 2-10 on the season when losing the battle of the boards.

Lawrence, King, Kikendall pace Players of the Week

A 46-point effort and a pair of record-setting efforts highlight the achievements by those recognized in this week's IBCA/Subway Player of the Week program.

South Bend Riley junior Reontre Lawrence poured in 46 points en route to a 32.5 average in two games, while Roncalli senior Jimmy King and Morristown senior Michaela Kikendall each set school records to headline the honorees for the week of Dec. 15-20.

Those players are joined by Columbus North senior Josh Speidel, Fort Wayne Canterbury senior Darby Maggard and Mt. Vernon (Fortville) junior Sydney Shelton as recipients in the weekly awards program overseen by the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association.

Lawrence, King and Speidel are the respective boys' winners for District 1, District 2 and District 3. Maggard, Shelton and Kikendall are the girls' recipients for the three districts.

A 6-1 guard, Lawrence exploded for 46 points with four rebounds and five assists as Riley dropped a 90-88 overtime thriller to South Bend Adams. He converted 15-of-26 shots from the floor, including 1-of-4 3-pointers,

plus 15-of-22 free throws for his big game. Later in the week, Lawrence scored 19 points on five field goals, one 3-pointer and 8-of-8 free throws in a 60-50 victory over Mishawaka as the Wildcats moved to 3-3.

King set one school record and equaled another while averaging 29.5 in a pair of wins for Roncalli (4-1). First, he tied a school record with 38 points in a 73-72 triumph over Seccina, including a pair of decisive free throws in the final seconds. The 6-4 guard also added five assists in that game, moving him past former standout Jason Werner for the Rebels' school record for career assists. King then tallied 21 points, three assists and three steals in a 75-50 win over Brebeuf Jesuit, pushing his career assist total to 220. For the week, King hit 17-of-28 shots, 8-of-15 3-pointers and 17-of-18 free throws.

The 6-8 Speidel claimed honors after averaging 26.0 points, 6.5 rebounds and 3.5 assists as Columbus North (6-0) posted victories over rival Columbus East and previously undefeated Terre Haute South. The Vermont signee opened with 20 points, six rebounds and five assists as the Bull Dogs knocked off Columbus East 65-51 in front of

about 6,000 fans. He followed with 32 points, seven rebounds and four steals as CN surged to an 86-59 triumph over Terre Haute South. For two games, Speidel sank 21-of-32 shots, 3-of-4 3-pointers and 7-of-12 free throws.

Kikendall averaged 37.5 points in leading Morristown (5-3) to a pair of wins, including a school-record 44 points in a 92-66 victory over South Decatur. The 5-7 guard added six rebounds, eight assists and four steals while sinking 17-of-22 shots, 4-of-5 3-pointers and 6-of-9 free throws against the Cougars. Kikendall then tossed in 31 points with three rebounds, four assists and five steals as the Yellow Jackets defeated Milan 67-47. The Purdue-Calumet recruit pushed her career point total to 1,131 points, 79 points shy of the Morristown career record.

The 5-4 Maggard claimed Player of the Week accolades for the second time this season after she averaged 33.5 points in two victories for Fort Wayne Canterbury (10-0). The Belmont-bound guard opened with 29 points, five rebounds, five assists and five steals in a 65-45 win over Fort Wayne Blackhawk Christian.
