It takes time to plan major celebrations, so what is going to be underway this year in preparation for the Bicentennial? Quite a bit actually.

In other words head a committee made up of representatives from most communities, historical societies, parks departments, and cultural organizations which will plan a year of programs, celebrations and events to mark 200 years of local history.

> The first decade or so of county history is pretty much a blank slate. There was no Hamilton County in 1816. Almost all of Indiana's population was found along the Ohio River. Our area was one vast forest with only a few frontiersmen pushing into the area.

> But, change came rapidly after the mid-1820s. The county had been organized in 1823 and most of our com-

The Hamilton County Tourism Bureau is taking the munities were platted by the late 1830s. And, before the end of the 1840s nearly all the land had been purchased from the federal government by individuals for farming.

The county has contributed greatly to the state's wealth, culture and prominent citizenry. And, it this contribution that will be highlighted next year. The state Bicentennial Commission has suggested a four pillar structuring for the celebration featuring nature conservation, youth and education, community involvement and historical celebration.

For the nature conservation portion, state matching grants are available and the county hopes to secure funds

The driver of the Honda van was unable to provide a good description of the vehicle that left the scene other than it



ISTA President Teresa Meredith outlined the Association's plan to improve student learning and the practice of teaching. Meredith told reporters that ISTA supports have the tools and resources necessary to help them improve their learning and to reach the college and career-ready standards this state has established.

Meredith stated that a freshman in any Indiana high school today has seen multiple changes to education standards in 10 years of education. Changes in state standards dictated changes in state tests. "Those test scores are also being used to tell the community and state if schools are rated A, B, C, D, or F schools," said Meredith.

Today's freshman has also endured agenda steady class size increases and less one-onone instructional time with teachers. "Class size has changed so much so that Indiana now has the fourth-highest enrolled student to teacher ratio."




