to help secure sizable parcels in Washington, Jackson and White River townships that will be preserved as nature parks.

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Indiana State Teachers Association announces legislative priorities

Press Release

The Indiana State Teachers Association announced its legislative priorities on education issues for the 2015 session of the Indiana General Assembly at a news conference today.

ISTA President Teresa Meredith outlined the Association's plan to improve student learning and the practice of teaching. Meredith told reporters that ISTA supports ensuring that all public school students have the tools and resources necessary to help them improve their learning and to reach the college and career-ready standards this state has established.

ISTA's news conference focused on five areas of its 12-point proposal:

- School Funding-Including Testing vs. Remediation Funding
- A-F Pause/Evaluation
- Compulsory Attendance School Age
- National Board Certification for Teachers
- Support for All Learners

Meredith stated that a freshman in any Indiana high school today has seen multiple changes to education standards in 10 years of education. Changes in state standards dictated changes in state tests. "Those test scores are also being used to tell the community and state if schools are rated A, B, C, D, or F schools," said Meredith.

Today's freshman has also endured steady class size increases and less one-on-one instructional time with teachers. "Class size has changed so much so that Indiana now has the fourth-highest enrolled student to teacher ratio."

Yet Meredith told reporters that a student's academic achievements include so

much more than state test scores. "Are the academic needs of Indiana students being met? Are we truly focusing on meeting every student's needs in the here and now as well as working to prepare them for the future? We must first begin by acknowledging that not everything that counts can be measured and not everything that can be measured counts."

The ISTA proposal asks the General Assembly to provide a 3 percent statewide average increase each of the next two years of regular education funding.

"Wouldn't it be great," said Meredith, "if by the time today's Indiana high school freshmen graduate, they could reflect back and see more one-on-one instruction in classrooms with fewer students? Wouldn't it be great if test scores weren't the focus on their worth to a school and community? Wouldn't it be great if teachers were seeking National Board certification because the state chose to believe in its impact on students' learning? Wouldn't it be great if our state really and truly chose to instill the most important thing of all -- the gift of the love of learning?"

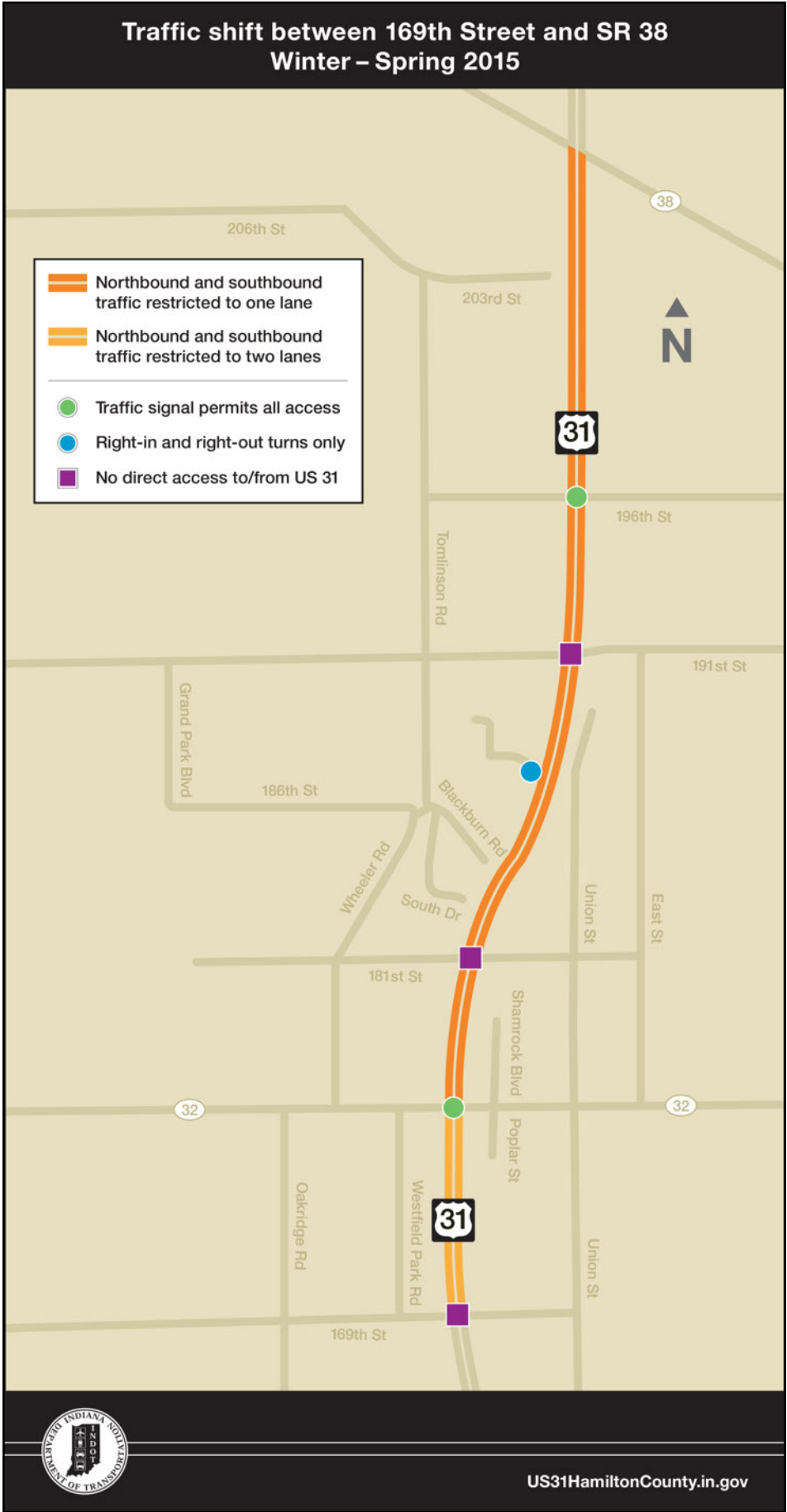

LC convinces HSE in 2 OTs

Folks in the powerhouse MIC Conference might want to take special note of a basketball game played last evening at Hamilton Southeastern. Folks like Ben Davis, North Central, Warren Central, and, yes, folks like Carmel.

Southeastern doesn't play in the MIC, but Lawrence Central now does. Last evening, Lawrence Central slipped by Southeastern, 71-66 in double overtime.

Just so happens Al Gooden is in his first year of coaching at LC. Gooden, the former Warsaw mentor, is five wins short of 400 in his coaching career. Probably not this year, maybe not even next season, but soon Lawrence Central will be a contender in the MIC.

Lawrence brought only a 2-9 record to Southeastern, but ever since back to back lickings by Homestead and Lawrence North in early December, the Bears have been playing like one most expect a Gooden team to play.

They stole a basketball victory last evening in a gym opposing teams have trouble winning.

Southeastern?

The Royals still are a work in progress. They, too, are playing better, but HSE has lost its last three games by a total of nine points, including the double-overtime to Lawrence Central.

Southeastern is improving. Don't expect an easy out of the defending champions come sectional time.

"We're better; we're getting better," said Coach Brian Satterfield last evening, following lots of basketball. The junior varsity game went overtime even before the Royals and Bears went two extra sessions in the varsity game.

"I love our effort," Satterfield said. "I can't fault the effort."

"But, we have to learn to finish."

Both teams had chances to finish even before Lawrence Central outscored Southeastern 11-6 in the second overtime. Both teams did a good job of coming back after they appeared to be dead in the water.

For example, Tyler Janney stuck a 3-pointer after grabbing a long rebound to bring the Royals from behind and force the first overtime at 55-55.

"Janney still isn't 100 percent, but he has made us a better team since coming back from his injury," Satterfield said.

Janney finished the game with 14 points and six rebounds

Same thing happened at the end of the first overtime, although this time it was super-shooter Kyle Guy canning the 3-pointer for the Bears, sending the two teams to extra period two deadlocked at 60-60.

Guy, who finished with 27 points, hit to open the second overtime and after that things kind of got away from the Royals.

Like Satterfield said, this team still hasn't learned to finish.

Zach Gunn and Chris Ford tied for Southeastern scoring honors, each with 17 points. Gunn had a special double-double night, grabbing 15 rebounds. Janney followed with his 14 points and then came Greg Miller with 13, as Southeastern spread the scoring wrath throughout the game.

Southeastern didn't shoot real well, going 23-of-63 overall and just 10-of-26 from 3-point range.

Southeastern, with Gunn doing his thing, did outrebound LC, 41-33.

Janney had five assists and Ford four.

"We just have to play smarter and we have to learn how to finish," said Satterfield of his now 3-9 Royals.

Carmel holds Trojans to 39

What was labeled, kind of, a mid-season key game in the MIC Conference Friday at Center Grove turned into another Carmel cakewalk.

Coach Scott Heady’s defense can do that to opposing teams.

Actually, nothing wrong with the Carmel offense, but it was the defense which led to Carmel’s 8th victory in 9 games and left Carmel with a 3-1 record in the MIC.

Carmel won going away, 56-39.

That defense, which held a third straight Carmel foe to 40 points or under, allowed Center Grove just 15 points in the first half. The game was all but over at halftime, with the Greyhounds leading 34-15 after a 17-5 run in the second quarter.

Center Grove hit just 11-of-36 shots in the game.

On the offensive side, Ryan Cline poured in 20 of Carmel’s 56 points and Preston Flamion also was in double figures with 10.

Pacers shake off jet lag, beat Celtics

Back at Bankers Life Fieldhouse after a four-game West Coast road trip, the Pacers

looked at times like they were still getting adjusted to a new time zone, but did just enough to beat the Boston Celtics in overtime on Friday night, 107-103.

With a win over the Celtics (12-22), Indiana (15-23) has now won seven of its last 11 and is just a game back of Miami for the eighth and final playoff spot in the Eastern Conference.

"I was just proud of our team," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel said. "Because you play a game 36 hours after you land coming back from the West Coast, that's always a tough energy game."

Evan Turner's pull-up jumper with 1:45 left in overtime gave the visitors a 103-102 lead. David West missed a wide-open fast-break layup with 1:10 to play, but made up for his mistake by drawing a foul and knocking down both free throws to put Indiana back in front with 31.2 seconds remaining.

Roy Hibbert blocked Turner at the rim on the next possession and Marcus Smart stepped out of bounds trying to corral the rebound, giving the Pacers possession with 12 ticks left on the clock. C.J. Miles buried two free throws to push the lead back to three.

Kelly Olynyk missed a 3-pointer on the other end and C.J. Watson came down with the rebound to seal the victory.

"We grinded it out," Hibbert said after the win. "Earlier in the season we would have lost that game, but we're coming along."

Hibbert had left Wednesday's loss at Golden State with a sprained ankle, but it didn't appear to bother him on Friday. The

7-foot-2 center scored 11 points in the first quarter and led the Pacers with 19 points and 11 rebounds on the night.

Miles added 17 points and Luis Scola had 14, while Watson scored 15 and dished out eight assists. West had just 11 points on 3-of-11 shooting, but scored nine points down the stretch in the fourth quarter and overtime.

Celtics guard Avery Bradley led all scorers with 23 points on 10-of-20 shooting. Five other Celtics players reached double figures. Turner struggled from the floor, making just 3-of-15 shots, but the former Pacers guard did manage to tally 15 rebounds and seven assists against his former team.

The Pacers looked to have another victory locked up in regulation, but Bradley buried a 3-pointer from the right corner with 4.3 seconds remaining to force the extra session.

Indiana started the fourth quarter off strong, with backup point guard Donald Sloan sinking a pair of 3-pointers and getting another bucket at the rim to push the Pacers' lead to 13. But Brad Stevens' Celtics didn't fold, responding with a 20-8 run to climb within one point with 4:10 remaining.

The Celtics later tied the game at 87 on Bradley's jumper with 2:06 to play, setting off a wild finish.

Indiana won't have much time to rest — the Pacers play again Saturday night in Philadelphia.

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
