County Commissioners make board appointments

Every year some members of the important boards which oversee our public facilities and institutions are appointed to carry on the operation of Hamilton County's hospital, parks, libraries, health department, plan commission and community corrections among others.

County Commissioners made appointments Monday to most of these boards. Most members were reappointed to new four year terms, but commissioners elected new officers, naming Mark Heirbrandt as president and Steve Dillinger, vice president. They also voted to retain County Attorney Mike Howard, Director of Administration Dan Stevens, County Highway Director Brad Davis.



A new appointment was Veteran Service Officer Lynn Epperson who replaces retiring Wayne Long. Building and Grounds Director Steve Wood, Weights and Measures Inspector Cary Woodward and Liquor Board member Sean Fleck were all reappointed.

Riverview Hospital Board members Leann Murray and Dr. Charles Mulry were reappointed as were County Health Board members Laurie Pylitt and Scott Thompson, Doris Beason, Jeff Juday and Dan Maynard will continue to serve on the Property Tax Assessment Board of Appeals.

County Plan Commission member Jim Galloway was reappointed. Connie Pearson was named to the Sheridan Plan Commission replacing Rachel Hammack. Dennis Lockwood was retained on the Carmel Plan Commission. Appointments to the Fishers Plan Commission were tabled pending determination of eligibility under Fishers' new second class city status.

Jeff Sealey replaces Todd Roberts on the Hospital Authority for St. Vincent Hospital.

Accident on SR 37 sends two to the hospital

Hamilton County Sheriff deputies were dispatched to the area of State Road 27 and State Road 13/256th Street in the far northeast section of Hamilton County on a personal injury crash shortly before 10:30pm Saturday.

According to a Sheriff's Office report, a gold Chrysler Town and Country van driven by Richard Godfry, 65, Lafontaine, was traveling north on State Road 37 when it crossed the centerline and struck a silver Scion driven by Maleri Moody, 22, Indianapolis. The report stated Moody's vehicle had also crossed the centerline and Godfry swerved into the northbound lane to attempt to avoid the collision. The vehicles struck head-on and came to rest in the southbound lanes of State Road 37.

Both drivers and two passengers in the vehicles were taken by air ambulance to local hospitals for treatment of non-life threatening injuries including fractures and lacerations. Neither alcohol nor drugs were suspected as a cause of the crash but driver fatigue was listed as contributing factor. Not using seatbelts was also noted in the crash report.

The Sheriff's Office Crash Team responded to assist with the crash investigation and reconstruction. State Road 37 was closed to traffic during the investigation but has been reopened to traffic.

Westfield City Council approves Grand Park leases

The Westfield City Council approved two 10-year agreements to lease portions of the Grand Park Sports Complex in a 7-0 vote Monday night.

The approved agreements are with Byrd Enterprises and Indiana Sports Properties. The city will collect a combined sum of \$2 million a year, which leaves an annual surplus of an estimated \$250,000, that money will be put back into the maintenance and upkeep of the facility.

"Grand Park Sports Complex, will turn Grand Park into a magnet for year round play in the youth sports industry," explains Mayor Andy Cook. "In its first year of operations, Grand Park far exceeded our attendance goals, the indoor facility will attract even more teams and players and in turn expand Westfield's industry, of travel youth sports. These agreements are with highly regarded

Firefighters brave cold Tuesday morning... Fire damages unfinished building at The Flats in Fishers

A new apartment complex in Fishers suffered a setback Tuesday morning, as a fire broke out in an unfinished building at the Flats in Fishers on 131st Street between SR 37 and Cumberland Road.

Fishers Department of Fire and Emergency Services responded to a report of smoke coming from the apartments at 4:56 a.m. Upon arrival, firefighters found fire on the third floor of the apartment building, which is still under construction. Firefighters made an aggressive interior attack to control the fire but were pushed off the floor by the heat.

Since the units were still under construction, that allowed fire to spread rapidly through the third floor and attic space. Firefighters changed to an exterior attack using elevated master streams from the ladder trucks and continued to utilize hand lines through window openings. Interior attacks continued in portions of the building where master streams were not being used.

Approximately 50 firefighters from Fishers, Carmel and Noblesville battled not only the blaze but freezing temperatures as well. Equipment and firefighters were coated in ice, making operations more difficult and dangerous. The fire took nearly four hours to extinguish. Firefighters were able to take short breaks in a school bus provided by Hamilton Southeastern School District with drinks provided by nearby Wal-Mart and the Fishers Fire Corp. At this time, there is no report of any injuries.

The fire likely started earlier. At 4:09 a.m., a passerby called 911 to report seeing a flicker of light inside the structure. A police officer was in the area and responded. The officer observed the building from the exterior and noted several portable heaters operating inside the building. The officer did not observe any signs of a structure fire and disregarded the fire department prior to their arrival.

Due to the size of the structure and the damage incurred, the investigation will take a number of days to determine cause and origin. The investigation is ongoing at this time and there is no estimate of loss.

Agencies that assisted with the incident were: Carmel Fire Department, Noblesville Fire Department, Hamilton County Emergency Management, Fishers Police Department, Fishers DPW, Hamilton Southeastern School System and Fishers Fire Corp

The Flats is part of the Fishers Marketplace, a new shopping center that began opening last fall. The Flats had its first move-ins in September, but construction on all four buildings was not set to be complete until July.

In addition to her parents, she was preceded in death by her husband, Carl Richard Lamb.

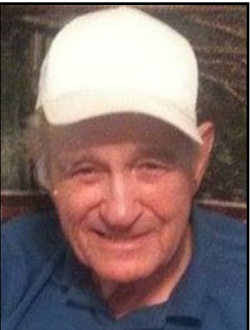

Janna Watters welcomed to Sheridan Rotary



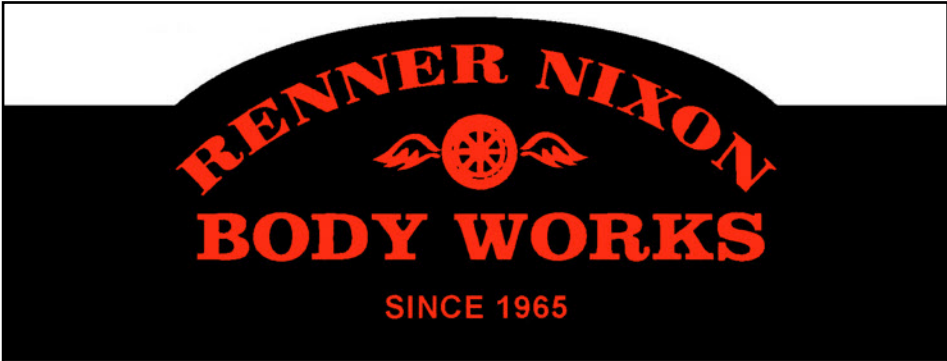

Two players who reached 40 points in a game headline this week's honorees in the IBCA/Subway Player of the Week program.

Westview senior Chandler Aspy poured in 42 points in his only game of the week, while LaCrosse junior Johnny Rosenbaum erupted for 40 points in his only game for the tandem to share boys' District 1 accolades in the awards program overseen by the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association.

Bacon is the boys' District 2 winner, while Speidel was recognized for boys' District 3. Evans, Corsaro and Krueger are girls' respective recipients in District 1, District 2 and District 3.

Aspy scored 42 points -- with 15 field goals and 12 free throws -- as Westview knocked off East Noble 65-60 in double overtime to improve to 5-5. The 6-3 forward also surpassed 1,000 career points in the game.

The 6-3 Rosenbaum tallied 40 points with 18 rebounds, two assists and four steals as LaCrosse posted an 89-44 win over Valparaiso-based Victory Christian Academy. Rosenbaum sank 17-of-26 from the field and 6-of-8 free throws.

Bacon propelled Lawrence North (9-1) to a pair of victories. First, the 6-0 guard scored 35 points with four assists and three steals in a 98-86 triumph over Indianapolis Tech. Bacon followed with 27 points and a strong floor game as the Wildcats defeated Warren Central 68-60. For the two games, he averaged 31.0 points.

Williams’ 52 points leads Minnesota past Pacers

For much of Tuesday night, the Pacers looked on their way to a win, continuing their slow but steady march toward a play-off position in the Eastern Conference standings.
But Mo Williams had other plans.
The 12th-year point guard scored a career-high 52 points to help Minnesota (6-31) snap a 15-game losing streak, beating the Pacers (15-25) at Bankers Life Fieldhouse, 110-101. Williams scored 37 points in the second half, 21 in the fourth quarter.


He finished the night a mind-boggling 19-for-32 from the field and 6-for-10 from 3-point range and also dished out seven assists.
"He was in a ridiculous zone," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel said. "...We tried multiple defenders on him. We tried sending him one way. We tried trapping him...You have to give him credit."
Though Minnesota entered Tuesday's contest winless since Dec. 10, the T-Wolves actually led by four after the first quarter. However, Indiana quickly erased the deficit with an 11-2 run to start the

second quarter and didn't trail for the next 2+ quarters.
But the Blue & Gold were never able to create much separation, only managing to extend the lead to as many as nine points.
It didn't help when Williams caught fire. The veteran point guard led all scorers with 15 first-half points, but he took his game to a whole other level after halftime.
Williams played the entire second half, scoring 16 points in the third quarter on 7-of-10 shooting.
Indiana was dealt another blow midway through the third, when center Roy Hib-

bert's night ended prematurely. Hibbert pulled Minnesota center down Gorgui Dieng down by his jersey when fighting for a loose ball with 5:47 left in the quarter. Upon video review, the referees gave Hibbert a flagrant 2 foul, which results in an automatic ejection.
Meanwhile, Williams kept scoring. He hit three free throws with 7:10 to play to reach the 40-point plateau and tie the game at 83.
Williams later tied the game again when he hit a fadeaway 3-pointer from the left wing with 5:27 remaining, then found Andrew Wiggins for a fastbreak layup-plus-the-foul that gave the Timberwolves the lead with 4:29 left.


"I knew that I was in a zone," Williams said. "When you're hitting everything that you're throwing up, you pretty much know it. It's like you don't see anybody out there."
The Pacers attempted to mount a rally, but Williams provided the dagger, hitting one more 3-pointer with 1:19 left that pushed the Timberwolves' lead back to six.
It was a night that no one in attendance will soon forget. Williams' 52 points were the most by any player in Timberwolves history. They were also the most points ever scored by an individual opponent in the history of Bankers Life Fieldhouse (Amar'e Stoudemire held the previous record, scoring 49 for Phoenix on Nov. 5, 2008).
"Mo was unbelievable," Timberwolves head coach Flip Saunders said. "I've been in the league 17 years. I've had some guys have hot games and that, but I don't think anybody (was as) hot as he was at. Most of his shots were perimeter shots. Not many hit the rim. He did everything."
C.J. Miles led Indiana with 22 points on 8-of-17 shooting. C.J. Watson added 17 points and five assists.
Starting shooting guard Rodney Stuckey missed Monday's practice and Tuesday morning's shootaround, dealing with the effects of a nasty bout of food poisoning. Stuckey came off the bench on Tuesday night, tallying 13 points on 5-of-8 shooting and five rebounds.
The Pacers return to the floor on Friday night, when they host the Detroit Pistons at Bankers Life Fieldhouse at 7:00 p.m. ET.
"I'm sure we're going to have two very good days of practice," Pacers forward Luis Scola said. "Hopefully we'll play better."

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
