## **U.S. 31** traffic shift scheduled for today

Today is a big day in the U.S. 31 Hamilton County project, as major changes are set to take place in Westfield.

The U.S. 31 traffic shift in Westfield is expected to take place today. When the shift takes place, this is what motorists can expect to see:

US 31 / 196th Street: Traffic signal will permit access to and from US 31

US 31 / 191st Street: No direct access to and from US 31

US 31 / 181st Street (Hoover Street): No direct access to and from US 31 / 181st Street (Hoover Street) will pass under US

US 31/ State Road 32: Traffic signal will permit access to and from US 31

US 31/ 169th Street: No direct access to and from US 31 / 169th Street will pass under US 31

The traffic signal on State Road 32 will be a single-point urban interchange (SPUI), where one stoplight will direct traffic on and off SR 32 onto U.S. 31. Drivers on SR 32 will pass under US 31. The interchange is similar to the one at Interstate 465 and Allisonville Road.

There will be a period of time during the traffic shift where drivers on SR 32 will not have access to or from US 31, as crews finalize the shift. Traffic will continue to flow through on both highways, and motorists can access US 31 from either 161st or 196th streets.

Look out for possible additional restrictions on both highways as the shift takes place. The shift should last about one day.

After six months of remodeling Fishers Fire Station 92, located at 116th and Brooks School Road, is open for business today. In addition to the fire engine that is always staffed with a paramedic and two other firefighters, a ladder truck staffed with a minimum of three people will be stationed here as well. Equipment and personnel are moving in today and it will take a few days to get settled, but are responding from the station effective immediately.

All Fishers firefighters are either Emergency Medical Technicians or Paramedics allowing all apparatus to respond to both fire and medical emergencies. The additional apparatus will allow more personnel on the scene faster or will allow two calls to be handled without delay of another station responding.

Engine 392 has been operating from a rented house since The \$820,000 project has expanded the size of the station to September. Understanding the importance of continuity of protection for this area, fire officials rented the house down the street. This option saved over \$50,000 instead of building temporary housing on site.

We have to be aggressive, and we have been," Taylor believes. "We've won a few and lost a few. It's tough in this area because everyone is going after the same thing. We're in competition with Carmel, Fishers and Westfield.

"Finding new revenue is a must," Taylor continued.

He pointed out that even when Noblesville does land a new, large business, because of tax abatements seeing an increase in revenue might take 5 to 10 years before Noblesville receives the taxes and an increase in revenue.

"We have to continue to be aggressive with economic development."

A key project in economic development on its way is the Cabela's, under construction at Noblesville Town Center.

"It's going up quickly," Taylor said. "I think it will bring in new restaurants and maybe even a motel. That seems to happen in other locations Cabela's (an outdoor recreation department store) has built."

Taylor believes that the City is doing a is not forgetting "Old Town." good job with residential development. A couple of large housing developments are area," he said. "New street lights, new about to open.

"Problem is," he said, "new housing requires new services, such as police and fire protection. That's expensive.'

Taylor is keeping an eye on the development of the area east of White River.

"Some think that developing that area will hurt downtown Noblesville," he said. "It won't. It will bring more business to the downtown."

One project is the City's planned Federal Hill Park.

"I didn't like the plan when first announced," said Taylor. "But, now that the budget has been cut, I think Federal Hill is a good idea."

Taylor also is watching Riverview Health. In a story which broke in The Hamilton County Reporter, Riverview announced plans to build a parking garage, which along with serving the hospital also could add needed parking spots for Federal Hill Park.

Taylor thinks Riverview will expand all the way to White River.

"It's valuable property and land Riverview has said it will not sell."

While moving to a new district, Taylor

"The City needs to do things in that sidewalks. We need to make that area more beautiful for those who live there. And we need a way to connect the area to the downtown.'





A large host crowd at The Mill Friday ening got a first game treat in the girls/boys double-header Friday evening as Noblesville's girls blasted Zionsville 77-26.

But, it was a different ending to the evening in the nightcap as Zionsville pulled out a 55-41 victory over Noblesville's boys.

The win by the Lady Millers moved Noblesville's record to 15-1 and left Noblesville in charge at the top of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference standings. Noblesville now is 5-0 with only a Jan. 31 contest with Hamilton Southeastern remaining.

Noblesville blew to a 27-5 first quarter advantage and had the Eagles put away at 42-12 at halftime.

But, it was a different story in the nightcap as the Millers spent the night trying to rebound with and trying to shoot with a much taller Zionsville team.

Still, entering the fourth quarter, Noblesville led the Eagles, 35-34. But, in that fourth period nothing much good happened for Noblesville. Zionsville scored the first six points in the quarter to take charge of the game.

"They had the ball first and scored," said Miller coach Brian McCauley. "That was a huge basket.'

Zionsville outscored Noblesville 21-6 in the quarter, most of the points coming on the Eagles hitting 12-of-14 free throws down the stretch as the Millers battled to get the

We had to foul at the end," McCauley said. "The game was closer than the final score."

Indeed it was as the Millers and Eagles fought it out for three periods. Zionsville led 11-10 after one period and 20-18 at halftime. Noblesville outscored Zionsville 17-14 in the third quarter and took the 35-34 lead entering the fourth period.

The numbers were ugly for Noblesville, especially on the boards. Zionsville won the rebounding battle 30-13.

"You can't win with only 13 rebounds," McCauley said. "They outrebounded us 15-4 on the offensive boards and outscored us 15-4 on second chance points.'

In order to win against Zionsville's size, the Millers needed a sizzling shooting night. That didn't happen, either. Noblesville was 15-of-37 shooing the ball and only 6-of-20 from three-point range. Also, while Noblesville was just 5-of-5 at the charity line, Zionsville hit 13-of-17 free throws.
