“We have to be aggressive, and we have been,” Taylor believes. “We’ve won a few and lost a few. It’s tough in this area because everyone is going after the same thing. We’re in competition with Carmel, Fishers and Westfield.”

“Finding new revenue is a must,” Taylor continued.

He pointed out that even when Noblesville does land a new, large business, because of tax abatements seeing an increase in revenue might take 5 to 10 years before Noblesville receives the taxes and an increase in revenue.

“We have to continue to be aggressive with economic development.”

A key project in economic development on its way is the Cabela’s, under construction at Noblesville Town Center.

“It’s going up quickly,” Taylor said. “I think it will bring in new restaurants and maybe even a motel. That seems to happen in other locations Cabela’s (an outdoor recreation department store) has built.”

Taylor believes that the City is doing a good job with residential development. A couple of large housing developments are about to open.

“Problem is,” he said, “new housing requires new services, such as police and fire protection. That’s expensive.”

Taylor is keeping an eye on the development of the area east of White River.

“Some think that developing that area will hurt downtown Noblesville,” he said. “It won’t. It will bring more business to the downtown.”

One project is the City’s planned Federal Hill Park.

“I didn’t like the plan when first announced,” said Taylor. “But, now that the budget has been cut, I think Federal Hill is a good idea.”

Taylor also is watching Riverview Health. In a story which broke in The Hamilton County Reporter, Riverview announced plans to build a parking garage, which along with serving the hospital also could add needed parking spots for Federal Hill Park.

Taylor thinks Riverview will expand all the way to White River.

“It’s valuable property and land Riverview has said it will not sell.”

While moving to a new district, Taylor is not forgetting “Old Town.”

“The City needs to do things in that area,” he said. “New street lights, new sidewalks. We need to make that area more beautiful for those who live there. And we need a way to connect the area to the downtown.”

A large host crowd at The Mill Friday evening got a first game treat in the girls/boys double-header Friday evening as Noblesville's girls blasted Zionsville 77-26.

But, it was a different ending to the evening in the nightcap as Zionsville pulled out a 55-41 victory over Noblesville's boys.

The win by the Lady Millers moved Noblesville's record to 15-1 and left Noblesville in charge at the top of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference standings. Noblesville now is 5-0 with only a Jan. 31 contest with Hamilton Southeastern remaining.

Noblesville blew to a 27-5 first quarter advantage and had the Eagles put away at 42-12 at halftime.

But, it was a different story in the nightcap as the Millers spent the night trying to rebound with and trying to shoot with a much taller Zionsville team.

Still, entering the fourth quarter , Noblesville led the Eagles, 35-34. But, in that fourth period nothing much good happened for Noblesville. Zionsville scored the first six points in the quarter to take charge of the game.

"They had the ball first and scored," said Miller coach Brian McCauley. "That was a huge basket."

Zionsville outscored Noblesville 21-6 in the quarter, most of the points coming on the Eagles hitting 12-of-14 free throws down the stretch as the Millers battled to get the basketball.

"We had to foul at the end," McCauley said. "The game was closer than the final score."

Indeed it was as the Millers and Eagles fought it out for three periods. Zionsville led 11-10 after one period and 20-18 at halftime. Noblesville outscored Zionsville 17-14 in the third quarter and took the 35-34 lead entering the fourth period.

The numbers were ugly for Noblesville, especially on the boards. Zionsville won the rebounding battle 30-13.

"You can't win with only 13 rebounds," McCauley said. "They outrebounded us 15-4 on the offensive boards and outscored us 15-4 on second chance points."

In order to win against Zionsville's size, the Millers needed a sizzling shooting night. That didn't happen, either. Noblesville was 15-of-37 shooring the ball and only 6-of-20 from three-point range. Also, while Noblesville was just 5-of-5 at the charity line, Zionsville hit 13-of-17 free throws.

Noblesville's best quarter was the third quarter when John Kiser hit 4-of-6 shots and Jake Mills popped two 3-pointers.

But, in the fourth quarter all six Noblesville points came on two more 3-pointers from Mills.

Kiser, who missed most of the first half in foul trouble, and Mills tied for Noblesville scoring honors, each with 12 points.

Zionsville's 7-foot center Derrik Smits was the big difference in the game for the Eagles. He scored 21 points and yanked nine rebounds, just four boards short of the Millers' total of 13. Sharp-shooting guard Jake Mann added 19 points.

The night's opener, the girls game, was another display of power by the powerful Noblesville team.

On offense, the Lady Millers got off 80 shots and hit 30 of them, including a 6-of-21 game from 3-point territory. On defense,

Trailblazers beat Ritter

Watching the University boys basketball team's 69-63 overtime victory against Cardinal Ritter Friday evening was the hoops equivalent of taking a ride on Space Mountain.

There were many twists and turns, quite a few thrills, and the occasional feeling that the action was getting a little out of control. But once the game hit the extra period, the Trailblazers went into overdrive, using an 11-0 run to dominate the OT and grab their first win this season over a school in a higher class.

University is a 1A school, and Ritter is 2A. The 'Blazers had played five 2A teams, and a 3A team in Bishop Chatard prior to their win over the Raiders. One thing is certain, University does not play a "Mickey Mouse" schedule.

On to overtime. Robert Owens hit a 3-pointer for the Raiders at the start of the period, putting his team up 59-56. That would be Ritter's last score until there were 15 seconds left in the game.

Diehl brought UHS within one with a pair of foul shots, and Holly drained a 3 to give the Trailblazers the lead at 61-59. Holly's shot turned out to be the game winner, although the score would stay at that margin for a while.

Diehl made a big rebound around the 1:20 mark to give University the ball, and that led to a layin by Jazen Cosby. The

'Blazers then got a quick score from Jacob Daniels, and Holly made a couple free throws with 19 seconds left to push UHS ahead 67-59.

The Trailblazers struggled on the boards during the first half of the game, so their rebounding fixed itself at the perfect time.

"I didn't think we rebounded well in the first half," said Lafferman. "The second half got better and then overtime, to me, we just looked like we had a little more energy in the tank. They threw up some deep shots and earlier, those were usually offensive rebounds. In OT, we got what we needed."

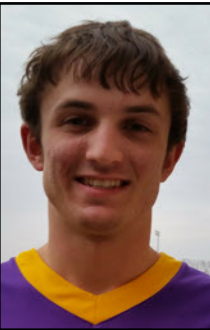

Cloverdale's Rady named National Coach of the Year

Pat Rady of Cloverdale High School has been chosen National High School Coach of the Year in boys basketball by the NFHS Coaches Association.

Rady, now in his 51st season as a high school head coach, has guided the Clovers to a 10-4 record entering a home game Friday (Jan. 16) against Cascade and a road game Saturday (Jan. 17) at Clay City.

The veteran coach has compiled a 131-105 in 11 seasons at Cloverdale. He is 749-419 during his career.

"It is a very humbling award," Rady told the Greencastle Banner-Graphic. "It really got me. ... When the IBCA and IHSAA said they were submitting my name to represent Indiana, I thought that was an honor. Just for me to represent the 400 coaches in the state of Indiana, that's enough right there."

Rady is one of 21 coaches recognized by the National Federation of State High School Associations in various sports as a national coach of the year for the 2013-14 school year. He is the only coach from Indiana honored for this particular year, and

he is the only boys basketball coach chosen for this year.

The NFHS has been recognizing coaches since 1982.

Rady began his career as eighth-grade coach for one season at Scribner Junior High in New Albany. He then became a high school varsity coach and coached five seasons at Bainbridge (83-33), five years at Winchester (79-33), one year at Southmont (9-12), five years at Shelbyville (72-56), 24 years at Terre Haute South (375-180) and now is in his 11th season at Cloverdale.

His teams have won 19 sectionals, eight regionals and one semistate. He was the Indiana All-Star coach in 1989 and has been inducted into the Hanover College, Indiana Basketball, Terre Haute South and Montgomery County halls of fame.

Earlier this season, on Dec. 26 just before the start of this season's Pizza Hut Wabash Valley Classic, Terre Haute South named its basketball coach in honor of the school's former coach.

There also is a street named after Rady -- "Pat Rady Way" -- in Bainbridge.

Rady is a 1959 graduate of Roachdale High School and a 1963 graduate of Hanover College. He earned a master's degree from Indiana State in 1970. He and his wife, Margaret, have two sons and three grandchildren.

As Brandon Jennings, who scored a game-high 37 points, sprinted towards the basket in a tie game with just seconds remaining, the Pacers defense collapsed on him. Although his floater rimmed in and out, it was met by the hand of center Andre Drummond, who tipped in the game-winning basket as the Pacers fell to the Pistons 98-96 on Friday night at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

With 1:30 remaining in the game, David West found himself open at the elbow, one of his favorite spots on the floor. West (13 points) rose up and hit a jumper to give the Pacers a 95-94 lead as the Fieldhouse rocked with noise. After a pair of Brandon Jennings free throws gave the Detroit the lead once again, a West free throw on the other end tied things up at 96, with just a minute remaining.

It was then however, in the final 60 seconds of the game, that Roy Hibbert was whistled for an offensive foul while backing down Drummond, giving Detroit the game's final shot, which turned into the eventual game-winner.

After scoring 14 first-half points, Detroit guard Brandon Jennings erupted for a 19-point third quarter in which he drained four of his seven 3-point attempts. And although making on just six of his 14 attempts, center Andre Drummond hauled in a game-high 16 rebounds while scoring 16 points.

"He just caught fire from the perimeter much like Mo Williams did," Pacers coach Frank Vogel said of Jennings. "(Solomon Hill) did a great job on him. We did everything we needed to do to win the basketball game."

After starting the second half on an 11-2 run, Pistons head coach Stan Van Gundy called timeout to regroup his team. Following the stoppage, the Pistons were able to close the gap, eventually tying the game at 68, and leading by as much as six in the final frame.

But it was then that the Pacers' bench unit, which combined for 50 points on the night, came in and swung the game back in Indiana's favor. Center Ian Mahinmi had his best game since returning from a foot injury that had sidelined him since the start of December, as the reserve scored 12 points and grabbed nine boards. Damjan Rudez

had a memorable game as well, as he connected on 5-of-8 shots for 13 points; including a 3-pointer with just under 10 minutes remaining to bring the Pacers within one point of the lead.

Also with a strong performance was Roy Hibbert, who scored 14 points and shot on 7-of-11 shots from the field. Although the Pistons shot just 38 percent from the field, their inside-out offense was able to connect on 13 3-point shots, eight of which were from the hot hand of Jennings.

It was a win that the Pacers fought desperately to have as they face an impending five-game road trip which begins tomorrow night in Charlotte. But on a night when they shot a higher percentage than their opponent. A night when they had more assists, steals, points in the paint and fewer turnovers, it was one offensive rebound that made all the difference.

"It's tough right now, I thought we fought throughout this whole game," said Mahinmi, as he sat in front of his locker with his feet dipped in ice. "We played our brand of basketball. It's just tough to lose like that."

Treanor returns to manage Indy Indians

The Indianapolis Indians announced on Friday that the club's sixth-winningest manager, Dean Treanor, will return to guide the Tribe in 2015. The skipper is entering his fifth consecutive season at the helm of the Indians and will be joined by the new additions of hitting coach, Butch Wynegar, and pitching coach, Stan Kyles, and the welcome returns of trainer, Bryan Housand, and strength and conditioning coach, Ricky White.

Treanor is just the sixth skipper in team history to manage the Tribe for five or more seasons. The San Luis Obispo, California native notched his 300th Indians victory last year and currently boasts the best overall record (317-258) among skip-pers in the franchise's prestigious 300-Win Club. He has led the Tribe to four straight winning seasons and will return with the opportunity to become the first team skipper to post a winning record through five consecutive campaigns.

"Dean has shown that you can both win at Triple-A and develop players for the Pirates when you insist that the game is played the way it is supposed to be played," Indians Vice President of Baseball and Administrative Affairs, Cal Burleson, said. "Dean does that as well as anyone we have ever had as our manager."

Treanor's tenure has also featured four straight top-two finishes in the division with back-to-back IL West crowns from 2012-13. The all-time managerial great is currently overseeing a playoff-bound Estrellas squad in the Dominican Winter Leagues – a circuit in which he recently won his third Manager of the Year award – and his return to the Indians will mark his 29th year of minor league instruction.

"We believe we have the best Manager in Triple-A Baseball in Dean Treanor,"

Burleson said. "Dean has led us to two first-place finishes and two second-place finishes in his four years here as our manager, and we feel confident that he will once again get the most out of the talent we receive."

A new addition to the staff, but familiar face of the International League, is hitting coach Wynegar, who has served in that same capacity with Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre from 2007-14. While with his former IL team, the York, Pennsylvania native guided an offense that powered playoff appearances in 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010 and 2012, and a Governor's Cup title in 2008. Wynegar is a 13-year Major League veteran and is coming off a 2014 season in which his Scranton offense ranked first in the league in batting average and fifth both homers and runs scored.

Wynegar's fellow newcomer on staff, Kyles, joins the Tribe ranks after overseeing Double-A Altoona's pitching staff over the previous two seasons. The Chicago, Illinois native facilitated the successful development of several of the Pirates' top prospects during his time with the Curve, and after a strong sendoff of top farmhand Jameson Taillon in 2013, mentored three Eastern League All-Star selections in 2014 in Ryan Beckman, Kenn Kasperek and Adrian Sampson. Kyles previously coached the Indians' pitching staff in 2004, but the upcoming season will mark his first on staff during Pirates affiliation.

Rounding out the Indians staff is Tribe trainer Housand, who returns to the Indians for his fifth year of service, and strength and conditioning coach White, who enters his second season with the team.

Stroh's four points lead Fuel to 4-2 win

In the second of three head-to-head meetings between the two teams this season, the Indy Fuel coasted to a 4-2 victory over the Greenville Road Warriors on Friday at Bon Secours Wellness Arena in Greenville South Carolina. With the win, the Fuel improved to 8-21-4-3 overall this season and with 23 points, remain alone in seventh place in the ECHL's North Division standings.

For the second consecutive game, the Fuel struck first on Friday, as an opportunistic Kyle Stroh goal made it 1-0 Indy at 12:19 of the opening period with Garrett Bembridge and Vincent Arseneau tallying assists on the play. Then, less than two minutes later, Rhett Bly chipped a sharp-angle power-play rebound past Greenville goaltender Jeff Malcolm to extend the Fuel lead to 2-0 thanks to a slick setup from Stroh and Nick Brunteau.

In a wild middle frame, the Fuel claimed a 4-1 lead with back-to-back goals from Mike Duco and Sam Posa, at 13:39 and 15:15 respectively, but the

Road Warriors answered late in the frame with a Trevor Parkes marker at 16:09 that cut the Indy advantage to 4-2 heading into the final period of regulation.

The Fuel clamped down in a score-less third period to claim the victory, the Fuel's second in their past three road games. After snapping a 14-game road winless streak with a 3-0 win in Wheeling on Sunday, Indy has now claimed five of a their last six possible points away from Indiana Farmers Coliseum.

Next up for the Fuel, the road trip continues at the North Charleston Coliseum in Charleston, South Carolina in the first-ever game between the Fuel and South Carolina Stingrays with the opening faceoff set for 7:05 pm on Saturday.
