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We should not be too busy for God

Busy for busy sake. This is one of the great ones in regards to idols of the modern American society. We love to be busy. We relish the accomplishment of whatever task it is that we have busied ourselves with. Each of us have subjected ourselves to differing lists of busy work- kids, housecleaning, lunch with girls; work, housecleaning, college course; work, gym, take out trash, pay the bills; work , work, and work some more, and don't forget the great American past time – shopping– every dime spent often well in advance of its actual obtainment. Parse it any way you like, we fill up our days with, yes, things that need to be done but also with a lot more that could easily fall by the wayside without any long term ill effect. Could it be that this is merely a selfish trade of what is important for a sense of self-importance? Ok, maybe I am being a little facetious but, as Christ followers we are charged to put nothing ahead of God. Rather than conform to the pattern of the world-ly (Rom12:2) we instead are to “**seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness**” Matt 6:33 (NKJV). If God himself were to hand us a task list, me thinks it would be quite different from the lists we create on our own accord. On our own we lose sight of what is truly important and become focused on our busyness, and in the process we miss what God has for us just as the Jews did in the days of the Prophet Haggai.

In 539 BC Cyrus the Great, King of Persia, conquered Babylon. Quickly following the change of power, in 538 BC Cyrus frees the Jewish people who had been held in captivity under King Nebuchadnezzar then under Evil-Merodach, Neriglissar, Nabonidius and finally under Belshazzar. Cyrus sent the children of God back to the homeland with instructions to rebuild their temple which had been destroyed along with the entire city at the time Nebuchadnezzar laid siege to Jerusalem. Along with his decree to rebuild, Cyrus gave them back the temple furnishings that had been looted from Jerusalem along with large sums of gold, silver and livestock. All told, they returned home with approximately 9 million dollars by 2004 standards. The one thing that Cyrus asked of the people was to say a daily prayer for him as they rebuilt –



how many times do we make ourselves too busy to pray for those who have asked us to pray for them!

Once home, revival strikes in the Jewish nation and according to book of Ezra in the first year they get busy restoring worship services, they rebuild the altar and start daily sacrifices and burnt offerings, and they celebrate the feast of Tabernacles. Then finally, during the second year back, work is begun on the Temple and the foundation is laid for the House of the Lord. As soon as the Foundation was completed we are told of great praises being sung to God. With the Priests dressed in their Temple apparel, the trumpets blew and the cymbals played and they sang “For *He is good*, For His mercy *endures* forever toward Israel” and the people shouted praises to the LORD (Ezra 3:10-11). After such a great start with God rightly first on the throne of their hearts what could go wrong? But wrong it went; it seems that all the cares of life crept in. First the non-Jewish neighbors and Samaritans balk at the rebuilding then the populous gets busy with the burdens and undertakings of day to day life. As a consequence, the ecclesiastical project is stalled for 15 years. Hence, God sent a message through the prophet Haggai: “Thus speaks the LORD of hosts, saying: ‘This people says, “The time has not come, the time that the LORD's house should be built.’ Then the word of the LORD came by Haggai the prophet, saying, ‘*Is it time* for you yourselves to dwell in your paneled houses, and this temple *to lie* in ruins?’ Now therefore, thus says the LORD of hosts: ‘Consider your ways! You have sown much, and bring in little; You eat, but do not have enough; You drink, but you are not filled with drink; You clothe yourselves, but no one is warm; And he who earns wages, Earns wages *to put* into a bag with holes” Hag 1:2-6 (NKJV)! God in past time through prophecy and revelation had given instruction for His Holy Home to be rebuilt and the task was being neglected! They had rebuilt their homes, they were running their farms and businesses, they were caring for their families, and they were spending their money all the while neglecting the very thing God had instructed them to do. Sound familiar? Basically God is saying snap to it, what's wrong with the people, what are ya doin? What they were doing was spinning their wheels. They were missing the benefits and blessings that God had planned for them. They were getting by but just barely according to the message delivered by Haggai. They were not prospering because they

were not doing what they were supposed to be doing. “ Thus says the LORD of hosts: "Consider your ways! Go up to the mountains and bring wood and build the temple, that I may take pleasure in it and be glorified," says the LORD. "*You* looked for much, but indeed *it came to* little; and when you brought it home, I blew it away. Why?" says the LORD of hosts. "Because of My house that *is in* ruins, while every one of you runs to his own house. Therefore the heavens above you withhold the dew, and the earth withholds its fruit. For I called for a drought on the land and the mountains, on the grain and the new wine and the oil, on whatever the ground brings forth, on men and livestock, and on all the labor of *your* hands" Hag 1:7-11 (NKJV). The Jewish children knew from the law of Moses and from experience that if they were obedient to God they would be blessed with all the blessings that would make them “the head and not the tail” but disobedience would bring ruinous curses that would overtake them (Deut 28:1-68). Having ever so recently been freed from the curse of the Babylonian captivity, they were well versed in the sureness of this promise and quickly heeded the words of God. As the account goes, “all the remnant of the people, obeyed the voice of the LORD their God, and the words of Haggai the prophet, as the LORD their God had sent him; and the people feared the presence of the LORD. Then Haggai, the LORD'S messenger, spoke the LORD'S message to the people, saying, "I *am* with you, says the LORD" Hag 1:12-13 (NKJV). Work resumes September 21, 520 BC and the Temple is finally finished on March 12, 515 BC after which the children of Israel celebrated a Temple dedication and then the Passover feast.

We may have good intentions. We start well, but our goal is to finish well. Jesus warned the church at Ephesus, whose people were busy with doings, not to forget their first love and cautioned them to return to their “first work” (Rev 2:1-5) which, in a nutshell is to “**seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness**” Matt 6:33 (NKJV). Seek Him. It is only with time spent (quality time) in study and in prayer that the relationship grows and matures. You may know God is there but do you know God. Do you know Jesus, do you know the Holy Ghost? God's character, His attributes which are many, His love is known only through prayer and deep study of the Word. You want to know about why there is evil, why the only way to salvation is through Jesus, the difference between law and grace

– study His word including the Old Testament. You want to recognize and experience the Holy Spirit which dwells in you – pray and immerse yourself in the epistles. You want to be rooted in the vine – Put Him first, lay hold of Him in prayer! We do no labor for what parishes laboring in vain (read 1 Cor 15).You will never have the peace that surpasses all understanding (Phil 4:7) or know the joy in the midst of the storm (Neh 8:10) unless you discover, know and take Him in. God promises to meet not just your day to day needs as referred to in Matt 6:33, but has made provision for the love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Gal 5:22-23) that all come and will be added unto you when you seek Him first. He says “seek the one to come” (Heb 13:14). “The LORD *is* with you while you are with Him. If you seek Him, He will be found by you” (2 Chron 15:2). “He is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him” (Heb 11:6) and “Blessed *are* those who keep His testimonies, Who seek Him with the whole heart” (Psalms 119:2). “The poor shall eat and be satisfied; Those who seek Him will praise the LORD. Let your heart live forever” (Psalms 22:26)! Glory in His holy name; Let the hearts of those rejoice who seek the LORD” (Psalms 105:3)! “The LORD looks down from heaven upon the children of men, To see if there are any who understand, who seek God” (Psalms 14:2) and "The hand of our God *is* upon all those for good who seek Him” (Ezra 8:22). "Seek Me and live” (Amos 5:4-6)! There is a theme here, do you see it? “**Do not labor for the food which perishes, but for the food which endures to everlasting life, which the Son of Man will give you**” John 6:27 (NKJV). His voice is quiet as a whisper (Job 4:12-16), it is a still small voice (1 Kings 19:12) - listen for it. The more time you spend seeking Him the more your priorities will realign with what is really important in life. In Haggai's day the Jews built a physical temple as the dwelling place for God. This dwelling place is now in our hearts (Eph 3:17 & Heb 8:10). The Jews had let God's house lie in ruins, in our heart we still do this today when we are too busy for God.

“Surely every man walks about like a shadow; Surely they busy themselves in vain; He heaps up *riches*, And does not know who will gather them. "And now, Lord, what do I wait for? My hope *is* in You.” Psalms 39:6-7 (NKJV)

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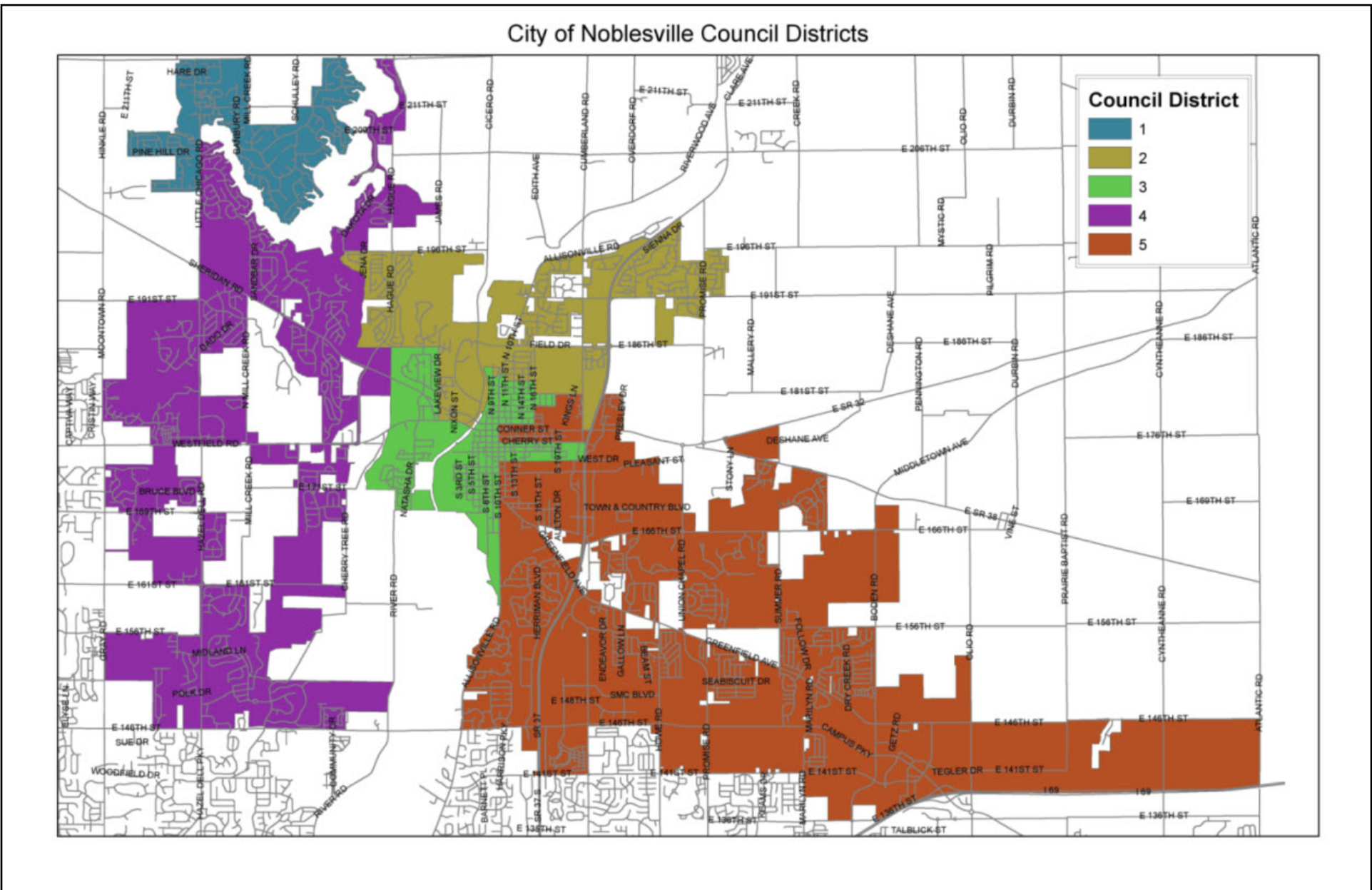
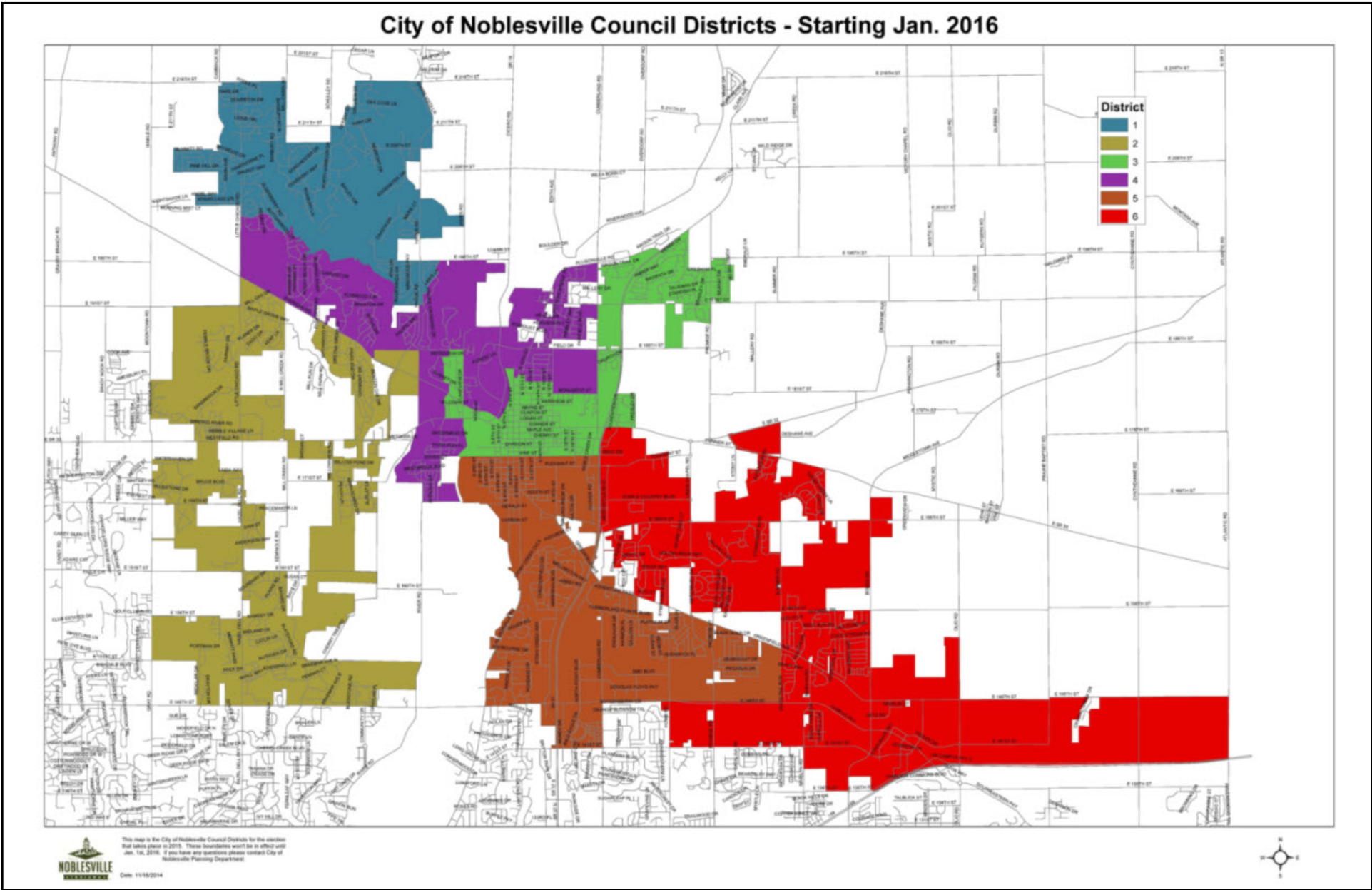
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Westfield Police looking for tobacco thief

Kiser led his team with five rebounds.

The loss left Noblesville with a 9-5 record going into a home court contest with Carmel next Friday.

Pacers offense stalls in overtime against Charlotte

Looking to snap a three-game losing streak, the Pacers had an opportunity to pick up a win Saturday night in Charlotte against a team missing its two best players. But instead, an already tough week wound up getting worse.

Indiana's offense struggled in the second half and stalled out in overtime. The Hornets (16-25) outscored the Pacers (15-27) 12-3 in the extra session to come away with an 80-71 win at Time Warner Cable Arena.

Charlotte was playing without both power forward Al Jefferson and point guard Kemba Walker, the team's two leading scorers. Jefferson missed his ninth straight game with a left groin strain. Walker, who had scored 28 or more points in each of his last six contests, missed Saturday's game due to a cyst in his left knee.

Indiana, meanwhile, was again without starting point guard George Hill. Hill missed his eighth straight game with a strained left groin.

"It's hard (not having Hill), but every coach has guys in and out of the lineup," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel said after the loss. "We've got to do better."

The Pacers failed to score on their first eight possessions in the extra session, missing six shots and committing two turnovers. By the time C.J. Watson finally banked in a 3-pointer with 29.3 seconds left, the Hornets had already built up a double-digit lead.

"You want to, I always think, be the first to score in overtime and get a stop," Pacers center Roy Hibbert said. "Then you keep the momentum. I felt like they were able to do that. We were on our heels and it got away from us."

The lead had seesawed back-and-forth several times in the fourth quarter. The Pacers entered the final period clinging to a one-point lead, Charlotte briefly surged in

front, then Indiana again took control. Donald Sloan scored six points off the bench to give the Pacers a 61-55 lead.

The Hornets, however, slowly clawed back. The home team got within one point on four separate occasions and finally took the lead on Marvin Williams' 3-pointer that gave Charlotte a 68-66 lead with 51.3 seconds remaining.

After C.J. Miles airballed a 3-pointer on the next possession, the Hornets had a chance to put the game away, but Gary Neal missed a triple and Rodney Stuckey drew a foul on the other end. Stuckey calmly knocked down two free throws to tie the game with 13.1 seconds left.

The Hornets had a chance to win in regulation, but Gerald Henderson's shot missed just before the buzzer.

It was an offensive struggle for both teams after half-time. Charlotte shot 24 percent in the third and fourth quarters, while Indiana hit just 28 percent of their shots. The Pacers then made just 1-of-9 shots in overtime, dooming them to their fourth straight loss.
