*Away we go:
Superintendent running for Westfield Council....*

Demo files in Noblesville

The election of 2015 in Hamilton County is, shall we say, starting to get interesting. Noblesville has a Democrat running for a Common Council seat and Westfield has a school superintendent running for a Council spot.

Both are rare events in Hamilton County. Paula J. Gilliam, 575 Walnut Street, is the first Democrat to file in the Noblesville Common Council race. Rarely is a Democrat on the ticket in any Noblesville election.

As Noblesville becomes a Second Class City in 2016, the number of council members in the County Seat city will move from five districts and two at-large spots to six districts and three at-large positions.

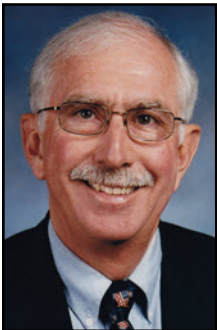
In some districts, there already is competition.

Rick Taylor is running for reelection in District 3. He is joined by newcomer Gary Duvall, a current member of the Noblesville School Board.

Stephen Wood is facing opposition from newcomer Darrel Peterson in District 4.

With Gilliam, the Democrat, filing, there now are seven candidates running for the three at-large seats in Noblesville. They are Mark Boice, Jeff Zeckel, Dave Johnson, Ray Ade, Brian Ayer, Patrick Berghoff and Gilliam

Boice currently is Councilman for District 4.



Westfield-Washington Schools Superintendent Mark Keen wants to join this group

Zeckel and Ayer are the two current Councilmen at-large.

Dave Johnson, Ade and Berghoff are running for the first time. Berghoff has served on the Noblesville School Board but chose not to run for another term.

The biggest and perhaps most surprising news of the week was Westfield School Superintendent Mark Keen filing for the District 1 seat as a Republican.

Veteran election followers in Hamilton County, contacted by The Reporter, could not think of a superintendent having run for a city council seat ever in Hamilton County.

So far, no other candidate has filed in District 1.

The current Councilman in District 1 is Robert Stokes. It is rumored that Stokes does not plan to run for reelection. The Reporter left two unanswered calls at Stokes' listed telephone number.

Westfield has a seven-member Council, including Stokes in District 1, Steve Hoover in District 2, Bob Smith in District 3, Chuck Lehman in District 4, Robert Horkay in District 5 and at-large members Cindy Spoljaric and Jim Ake. All but Stokes and Spoljaric have filed for reelection.

Keen's announcement shook the world of politics in Hamilton County, and brought about questions.

Is it a conflict of interest being a school superintendent and councilman? Legally, it is not.

One hundred residents gather as...

Sheridan Smart Future begins

Nearly one hundred area residents gathered at Sheridan Elementary School on Wednesday to kick off Sheridan Smart Future.

A grant provided by Duke Energy will provide Sheridan Community Schools the opportunity work in collaboration with members of Marian University's Academy for Teaching and Learning Leadership to conduct a district-wide needs assessment.

"We realize Hamilton County is the fastest growing area in the state. This growth will inevitably affect the town of Sheridan, especially our school system. We want to be very cognizant of what the community desires and how we can meet the needs of our families," said Sheridan Community Schools Superintendent Dr. David Mundy.

"We are fortunate to be one of three schools in the state to receive a portion of the grant," said Mundy. Clarke County and Vincennes Community Schools were also selected to receive grant money from Duke

Mark LaBarr, Area Manager for Duke Energy said, "Education is one of our company's top priorities."

Wednesday meeting was led by Marian College's Dr. Lindan Hill.

Hill explained the project will consist of a total of four meetings. Hill told the crowd, "Tonight we want to identify everything you like about Sheridan schools."

Hill then turned the meeting over to those in attendance. He asked attendees to meet in small groups to compile lists of all that is good in Sheridan Community Schools. Hill explained his team will analyze the lists and will disseminate the data for the next meeting on February 18.

"The February meeting will focus on how we make Sheridan a better school system. What are we not doing that we should be doing," said Hill.

Use your brains and feet to start a healthier lifestyle

“You have brains in your head. You have feet in your shoes. You can steer yourself any direction you choose.”
Dr. Seuss - *Oh, The Places You’ll Go!*

In which *direction* do you plan to go in 2015? Are you “so done” with all the infomercials and ads about losing weight? Dropping 4 dress/pants sizes in just a few weeks? Ringing up the shopping network to order the “total gym” so that you will be transformed? The majority of Americans spend more than any other industrialized nation in their quest to be more fit and healthy.

In working with my fitness class participants, personal training, and nutrition clients, I find that initially they are either buoyed up by the rhetoric or defeated by it. Neither is particularly helpful in a quest to be the healthiest one can be. The January hype will die down a bit, and then the “get ready for swimsuit season” ads will begin. I sincerely believe that this type of encouragement can lead to yo-yo dieting and undermine our fitness goals. We are expected to indulge in holiday fare and then get to work to take it off, sometimes to the tune of spending quite a lot of money to do so.

Referring to the quote this week, let’s use our *brains* to acknowledge that no advertisement, spokesperson, or magazine article can address our specific life situation. Over eating and a sedentary lifestyle are both behavior issues and very individual. A good personal trainer, nutrition consultant, or health care professional can work with you to get started in the direction that you want to go.

Yes, you do have *feet in your shoes* and you can begin any day, at any time, moving those feet to incorporate more action in your daily life. Walking...who knew? And, finally, steering yourself in the direction you choose; vitally important. A per-

sonal trainer or certified fitness consultant can work with you to determine *your* goals, not goals set for you by another person or a corporate entity!! A realistic *direction* in which you can go to achieve that goal will take you there.

Remember that a total fitness package incorporates the “three-legged stool” incorporating aerobic activity (increasing the heartbeat) along with strength training and of course, flexibility. The seat of this three-legged stool is nutrition. Your body needs fuel on which to run. If your car’s manufacturer recommends premium gas to run most efficiently are you going to pump regular unleaded...probably not. Think of your healthy lifestyle as an investment, a much greater investment than any automobile!

Finally, do your homework. If a group fitness class works best for you then sign up and actually attend! Sometimes making a connection with a class partner can be encouraging. If your schedule or personal preference works best to hire a personal trainer, that might work best for you. In either case, be sure to ask about the class instructor’s or personal trainer’s qualifications; both experience and credentials. Otherwise, pick up those light weights at least three times weekly, get outside in a safe area to begin a walking routine (check with your neighbors, form a “walking club”) and incorporate stretching on a regular basis. Your activities should never leave you in pain or acute discomfort but should be challenging and invigorating. The endorphins will also encourage mental clarity and a feeling of well-being.

Next time I’ll discuss one of my favorite topics; healthy (and yummy!) eating!

Westfield Schools and the City of Westfield under Mayor Andy Cook, who is running again, always has been close. Not often at a Westfield School Board meeting isn’t a member of the city administration not present. That’s unique, especially in Hamilton County.

The bigger question concerning Keen’s bid for a Council seat is whether or not the superintendent is in violation of the dual office holding law. The 20-page document addresses anyone holding a second public service position and whether or not the two positions being served are “lucrative” positions.

The word “lucrative” is very hard to define. The law has been tested a few times in Hamilton County.

Should anyone contest Keen running for office, the outcome would be settled for the County Election Board.

Heights faces big conference game

Huskies, 'Hawks meet Saturday

From Day 1 of this 2014-15 basketball season Hamilton Heights has said loud and clear that one of the team's top priorities was to win the Mid-Indiana Conference championship.

The last Mid-Indiana Conference basketball race. The conference is disbanding after this season.

Heights has owned the MIC in recent years. They are two-time defending conference champion. In the last four years the Huskies also tied for the title.

So, long-time basketball fans will have to forgive Heights this week for not labeling long-time rival Sheridan as the top game of the weekend. Heights will host Eastern on Friday before hosting Sheridan on Saturday. Eastern is a conference foe.

Currently, Heights is 2-0 in the conference, trailing Northwestern, which is 3-0. The Huskies will play at Northwestern on Feb. 17.

"Sheridan always is an important game to us," said Heights coach Chad Ballenger. "Anytime you play another Hamilton County team, it is important. But, we will worry about them on Saturday morning."

Meaning, Eastern is first on the Huskies' minds.

The Comets could be a "trap game" for the Huskies. Eastern, with a 6-7 record, is a good basketball team. Last weekend the Comets defeated conference foe Taylor 55-42 and lost to Northwestern 51-36. Neither game was a conference game. Both games were in the Howard County Tourney.

"Eastern is Senior Night and a big MIC game," Ballenger said. "They've been playing a lot of kids and have got some good wins. They are led by Braden Evans with 13 points and 8 rebounds a game and Noah Cope with a 10-point average. Those are two kids we need to key on."

"They run a nice spread offense and try to back door and put you to sleep with their passing game. We must defend cutters or it will be a long night," Ballenger added.

"Sheridan got a nice win over Elwood (last Saturday)," Ballenger talked about the Blackhawks. "Coach (Chris) Schrank is doing at great job. He was an assistant at Union County for one of my best friends, so I have known him for a while. He works hard and the kids will be prepared. They are capable of putting points on the board."

Hamilton Heights is Sheridan's only foe this weekend.

"It is definitely going to be a challenge," Schrank said. "They have talent all over the floor."

"We will have to work incredibly hard on the defensive side to get stops. Our guys are going to have to completely buy into the game plan that our coaching staff establishes. It will be a great opportunity to see where we are at this point. These are the kind of challenges that we need," Schrank said.

Sheridan is 4-7. The Blackhawks broke a six-game losing streak when beating Elwood 65-62 last Saturday.

"We are coming along," Schrank said. "Our effort is continuing to improve and we are starting to see more consistently. I was really proud of the way we finished the game against Elwood. Being down by nine with four minutes to play was a tough spot and it took tremendous effort to get that victory."

"Hopefully, we will continue to see growth. It is a process, and it takes work

each day in practice and our guys are making strides in the right direction. We still have goals that we can achieve and we continue to work towards those," the Sheridan coach said.

Sheridan has three Blackhawks leading in scoring. The leader at 15.1 points a game is Brock Kitchel, followed by Jake Chesney at 10.9 and Chris Roberts at 9.9. Kitchel also leads in rebounding, pulling 6.4 boards a game. Roberts is averaging 4.2 rebounds a contest.

Heights has plenty of offense, Hunter Crist is the leader at 15.3 points, followed by Jadon White at 12.3, Garrett Paull at 12.0 and Grant Weatherford at 11.5

Paull, who is the rebounding leader at 7.7 boards a game, is recovering from an injury, and so is Sterling Weatherford, one of Heights' top threats off the bench.

"We are coming down the home stretch, still trying to get healthy," said Ballenger. "We are without Paull and Sterling. They will eventually make it back."

Heights will enter the Eastern game with a 9-6 record.

With a 1-2 conference record and a 4-10 overall mark, it's difficult to paint Hamilton Southeastern back in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference boys basketball race.
