Pre-trial hearing is Monday...

Coach Mac & Noblesville Schools

Former Noblesville High School basketball coach Dave McCollough on Monday morning will be in court. That's "in" court, not "on" the court. A pre-trial hearing will be held concerning McCollough's lawsuit against a Noblesville Schools, which fired the coach following last season. McCollough has since been replaced by former Kokomo coach Brian McCauley.

The hearing will be held in Hamilton County Circuit Court, which is presided over by Judge Paul. A.Felix. At the hearing, attorneys from both sides will discuss the lawsuit with the prosecutor's office and with Judge Felix. Likely, a trial date will be set at this time. The case is expected to go to trial. Neither side appears to want a settlement out of court. "We'll go to the hearing and see what happens," said Matt Cook from the Cook & Cook Attorneys at Law firm of Noblesville, which is representing McCollough. "I don't know what to expect," McCollough told The Hamilton County Reporter on Friday afternoon. On May 28, 2014, McCollough filed a tort claim notice announcing his intentions to later file the lawsuit.

While out of coaching, McCollough said he is watching lots of basketball games this season. He wants to remain in coaching. "I would like to find the right situation," McCollough said, "a situation best for my family." In 31 years as a head coach, McCollough won 465 games and lost 233. He is the all-time winningest coach at Noblesville with a 308-138 record. Last season McCollough was honored by Noblesville High School following his 300th coaching victory with the Millers.

The Noblesville Boy's Club

It was 1965 and I was 11 years old. I remember one of my class mates talking about going to the Noblesville Boy's Club. The Boy's Club was started in 1951 about 3 years before I was born. In 1965 it was still just getting off the ground. I wondered what the Boy's Club was about and I decided to go with my class mate. You had to join and pay a small amount to join. We got to the old Sears Roebuck Store and Kirk's Hardware. The address was 848 1/2 Logan Street. My friend said, "Here we are!" I wondered where we were. I did not see a Boy's Club. He said, "It is in this door that went up a huge long stairway between the two stores. We started walking up and kept going up! I was interested in the doors on the first landing. There were a few offices there, but most of the time they were vacant which always peeked all the boy's interest. Of course, some mischievous behavior did go on in the hall ways as well. We finally got to the top and went through a door on the left hand side. On the right as you entered the door there was a small gym. In the gym they had an old rope hanging from the ceiling. I was not too sure about climbing a rope, because I was scared of heights! But I finally climbed the thing! Right near the front entrance was a small office where the Executive Director had a desk and so did the Program Director. I remember two Executive Directors while I was growing up, Ralph Allen and Walter Smith. They were both great guys. If you turned left when you went into the door you would go past a coat room and then into a room with ping pong tables and pool tables. There was a room called a library at the end of the room on the right and beside it was a wood shop. You could go down a hall way by the coat room, turn a couple of corners, and there was a bathroom, wrestling mat, and a nasty old shower. Everything leaked in the shower! Nothing like the facilities the Boy's and Girl's Club have today. I really enjoyed going to the Boy's Club after school. We played a lot of dodge ball every day! I am a firm

As progress on The Switch mixed-use development continues, officials announced today that Another Broken Egg Café has signed on as the first retail tenant, leasing 3,400 square feet on the first floor of what will be The Flats at Switch along Municipal Drive.

The Switch offers a location in the heart of the Nickel Plate District where residents can become regulars, and we look forward to seeing our customers each week.”

Another Broken Egg Café has signed a letter of intent and plans to open early next year. With a variety of entrees, the café also has vegetarian entrees, appetizers for sharing and eggs prepared any way you’d like.

“Another Broken Egg Café will be a great addition to our downtown,” said Mayor Scott Fadness. “The Nickel Plate District offers a connected destination for a great meal, shopping and entertainment, and we are excited about the companies that are choosing to join the already established businesses in the area. We look forward to the lease being finalized and welcoming them to Fishers.”

The Switch, a Loftus Robinson development that broke ground the summer of 2014, will provide an upscale blend of residential, retail and office space in a pedestrian friendly, mixed-use development. The project includes a 400-space parking garage wrapped with retail space and more than 100 apartment units in partnership with TWG Development. Also in the project is a three-story, 33,150 square foot office building and a pedestrian plaza to promote connectivity within the community. Construction is slated for completion in the Spring of 2016.

The Switch is currently pursuing tenants for the available office and retail spaces. Office amenities include bike parking, shower/locker-room, and rooftop conference facility with rooftop deck.

A leasing office for the residential component is scheduled to open later this year. Future residents have the choice between studio, one-, and two-bedroom luxury apartments with fitness center, lounge, and sun deck overlooking the Central Green. believer it helped to develop my pitching arm and I think it was a huge factor for me developing a pretty good fastball that led to me being the 78th player taken in the 1973 free agent draft by San Francisco Giants for major league baseball. I could scorch people with a “murder ball.” As I got older I scared people with a “murder ball!” At Noblesville High School in gym class I could throw a ball from the center of the gym court and knock both gym doors wide open. It came from playing “murder ball” at the Boy’s Club.

I learned how to play pool, ping pong, and other activities. I also sang in a Boy’s Club group with my childhood friends, Larry Stidham, Randy Hatfield and Joe McKinley. I am not sure how good we were at it but we gave it a shot under the encouragement of Walter Smith. One year I went to summer camp at Bloomington. We sang songs, played games and swam in lake. They threw those “murder balls” off the deck at you. Ralph Allen threw one and hit me right in the face. Since I could not swim at the time and I was seeing stars, I thought it was all over! We went back to our cabin and a big snake fell out of the side canopy! Momma! No sleeping that night! I wrote my mom a post card telling about the snake experience. I must have been pretty scared because, Al Beadle, our mail man read it, and said, “He laughed pretty hard!” He later teased me about it. Al was a great guy who coached in the Little League program.

The Boy’s Club also had sports activities, especially, basketball against other

Boy’s Clubs across the state. I played basketball in 7th grade for Noblesville Jr. High School. In 8th grade, my childhood friends encouraged me to play Boy’s Club basketball instead of school basketball. It was a great debate for me, but I went with my friends that year. We ended up doing pretty well! Larry Stidham, Joe McKinley, Danny Gray, and I were on the team. We were all from the Old Southside of Noblesville. There were other players from other parts of Noblesville, I believe later played for NHS. We played basketball every day after school at the Boy’s Club and we traveled around the state playing Boy’s Club basketball. We played against some great players who were playing for their Boy’s Clubs and not school ball. Sometimes school grades played a part of that. Our team hosted the district tournament at North Elementary School. North Elementary was the “new” school at that time with a nice gym. We won the first two games and then we faced the dreaded Wilson Boy’s Club of Anderson. Back then Anderson had two high schools, Anderson and Madison Heights. Basketball was serious to these boys! Big strong and they could play! Our coach had a transfer with his job and had to quit and here we were in the championship game with no coach! The coaches were volunteers, and they drove us to games in their car. Uniforms were almost non-existent, or if we had them they were pretty ragged. But we had fun!

Walter Smith showed up at the last minute to be our coach. His advice, “You boys have been doing pretty well so just keep doing what you are doing!” Okay! I was pretty sure we were going to have our heads handed to us. They were bigger and probably better. One of the guys said in the locker room, “Hey, let’s do something different, let’s not wear tennis shoes or socks.” Boys do some pretty dumb things sometimes, but we went ahead and did it! My feet were sore for a week! What a dumb idea! It is kind of like Gomer Pyle saying to Barney Fife, “Barney that was a dumb thing you did and you call me dumb, that was a dumb thing!” The Anderson guys were laughing at us with good reason. Strategy right? They thought we did not know what we were doing. We didn’t, but we had been playing pretty well because we played together all the time. The game got started and we stayed with them. Danny Gray was a big guy in the middle and he held things down inside and got his share of rebounds and put backs. We also hit some outside shots. Believe it or not at half time we were just down three. We were now confident we could play them. Walter’s coaching advice was, “You guys are doing pretty well just keep doing what you are doing!” We were in it all the way to the end. A few seconds left and we are down one point and we have the ball. We called time out and went to Walter, he said, “Boys you have been doing pretty well so what do you want to do?” We agreed that Joe McKinley would take the ball out and pass it to me. Remember every day playing “murder ball?” I got open and Joe passed me the ball about 10 feet from where he passed it in. I grabbed the ball and threw it the length of the court toward our basket. Danny Gray went up and got the ball and laid it up off the glass and we won! No shoes and all! We beat the mighty Anderson! Everybody swarmed Walter Smith, and he was laughing and jumping up and down with us and saying, “I did not do anything. I did not know what I was doing you guys did it!” It was a great night for sore feet, excitement, fun, and a win!

We went on to the state finals in Shelbyville, Indiana. Four teams to play for the state Boy’s Club championship. Walter felt we deserved at least some jerseys and he worked hard to get a business to buy us some jerseys. We decided to wear our shoes this time! You know, burn me once you learned something. Don’t be that dumb again! We had a morning game against one of the Gary, Indiana, Boy’s Clubs. Again, I thought we would not win. The other three teams had fancy warm ups and looked like real basketball teams. We beat Gary, Indiana! So, wow, we thought hey we might win this thing. We had to play Shelbyville for the state championship in the evening game. Their gym was filled with people! After all we had beat mighty Anderson and Gary surely we could beat Shelbyville! They had other ideas and we lost by 7 points. What a great time for some boys who were friends who just thought they wanted to play together for a year. It was a great childhood experience that just started out in friendship with some young boys.

The Noblesville Boy’s Club influenced our lives positively by spending time at profitable things after school. It helped build confidence and character in our lives. On a meager budget doing the best they could to help us. They were also involved in the summer little league baseball program which was a great program as well. There were so many things that the Boy’s Club provided for us, but most of all they shaped young lives and were a huge focal point for a small community. Thanks to men in the community like Irving Heath, and other business men, who felt there was a need for the Noblesville Boy’s Club. I am sure glad those guys had the vision in 1951 and it has meant a lot down through the years to thousands of young people and I know it meant a lot to me.

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A nail-biter late in the game....

Carmel wins 55-45 in The Mill

Often times in big game, when the stars are being hounded by tough defenses, new stars are made. Carmel’s Ethan Merriweather was having a typical sophomore season until last evening when he stepped up big time and rescued No. 4 ranked Carmel at The Mill in Noblesville.

In what many thought would be a blowout became a typical Noblesville-Carmel slugout. Merriweather keyed a 55-45 victory in a game which was even closer than the final score might indicate.

“Merriweather was the difference,” said Carmel coach Scott Heady after his Greyhounds picked up their 13th victory in 14 games before a big crowd in The Mill. “He led our scoring with 20 points and also had six rebounds, five steals and 11 deflections.

Merriweather also canned 8-of-12 free throws.

“I’ll take that,” Heady said with a smile. “Noblesville was going after him by putting him on the line. I’ll take 8-of-12.”

Carmel, a great free throw shooting team, nearly got in trouble at the line by missing eight charity shots in the fourth quarter. The Greyhounds also hit 16 free throws in that last period.”

“We had to foul them trying to get the basketball,” said Noblesville coach Brian McCauley. “Our stats showed Merriweather as the best choice to foul.”

Carmel got off to a tremendous start, blowing to a 13-2 first quarter advantage.

But, typical Noblesville, the Millers kept battling and battling. At halftime Carmel led 23-15. The Greyhounds carried a 35-25 margin into the fourth quarter.

Noblesville got hot in the fourth quarter. John Kiser scored eight points and Jake Mills hit a couple of 3-pointers.

The Millers, on a 3-pointer by Mills, pulled to within two points, 45-43, with 1:32 left in the game. After two free throws by Keegan Culp, Mills fouled out and Noblesville couldn’t make another run.

“I’m proud of how our kids fought back after that first quarter,” said McCauley. “We played well in the second half. We played well for 24 of the 32 minutes. We need to play well for 32 minutes

“Carmel is a really good basketball team,” McCauley added.

After being shutout (he got just one shot) by Carmel in the first half, Kiser sparked Noblesville’s 30-point second half by scoring all of his 17 points. The 6-5 junior finished with a double-double by pulling 13 rebounds.

“Noblesville is a good team,” said Heady. “I thought we did a good job defending against the 3-pointer. They got eight, but a couple of those were off kickbacks.

Noblesville stayed in the game with good defense of its own. The Millers allowed Carmel just 35 points through the first three quarters and still trailed by 10.

“That’s frustrating,” said McCauley.

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Hard-fought win over Avon means...

Tigers still perfect in the HCC

Fishers has had to fight and claw its way to the top of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference standings this season, so why should its Friday game with Avon be any different?

The Tigers held off the Orioles 54-50 in a tough game at the Fishers gym. Once the buzzer sounded, the Tigers held a 4-0 record in the HCC, still a game ahead of Zionsville.

But Friday's focus was on Avon, a team that Fishers coach Joe Leonard said was "dangerous." The Orioles were without their best player, and Leonard noted that when a team is missing its best player, his teammates are going to take some shots.

"I was worried as heck about them, and rightly so," said Leonard.

The Tigers led 10-8 after the first quarter, and were able to keep Avon at arm's length in the second period, working their way to a 24-19 halftime lead. The Tigers did just that, with everybody helping out at some point. Example: Andre Small scored 11 points, including three 3-pointers. Small seemed to know just when Fishers needed one of those 3s - it was his downtown basket that tied the game at 30-all.

After that, Keegan Kollmeyer hit two free throws to give the Tigers the lead at 32-30, and they would not relinquish it. Later, with Avon under its basket, Small made a steal, launched it to Kollmeyer on the other side of the court, where he made the easy layin. It was a 7-0 run that had Fishers ahead 34-30.

"We tried to go to our 1-3-1 and get steals, because Kollmeyer's so good out top and he finishes so well," said Leonard. "And that helped us to get us going."

Fishers rode the momentum to a 44-33 lead in the fourth quarter. Neither team scored in the first minute, but Dollison changed that with a 3-point play to give Fishers a 37-31 advantage.


Warner, Kirtz selected to U.S. Army MVP Team

Pacers make furious comeback, fall to Miami by two

When the Pacers were trailing by as much as 21 points against the Miami Heat (19-24), it seemed as if consecutive loss number seven was a foregone conclusion. But thanks to a furious second-half rally, the Pacers made a forceful comeback against the team that had sent them packing in the last two Eastern Conference Finals.

With 30 seconds remaining in the game and the Pacers down just three points, George Hill launched a 3-point attempt late in the shot clock that would have silenced the crowd at the AmericanAirlines Arena. But Hill, who was playing in his first game since December 31, was just off the mark, as Miami corralled the rebound and went on to win 89-87.

"(They showed) a lot of heart and a lot of fight getting back into this game down 21 and to give ourselves a chance to tie it up,"

Pacers coach Frank Vogel said. "I'm very proud of the group that did that."

The Pacers had yet another chance to knot things up with 10 seconds left and fed Hill again, who slashed through the lane for a two-point bucket to make the score 88-87.

After Dwayne Wade split a pair a free throws with six seconds on the clock to extend the Heat's lead to two, Vogel took a timeout and drew up the final play of the game.

As Hill cut to the basket once again, he dished it out to C.J. Watson in the corner for a would-be tying shot, but the ball cruelly rimmed in and out, sealing the fate of the Pacers.

"Well, I was thinking that I didn't have legs for overtime, so I don't know what we are going to do," said Heat guard Dwayne Wade of his thoughts when the final shot was in the air.

Indiana (15-30) had taken the first two games of the season against Miami, but

game three of this season's matchup was one in which the Heat's offense was playing like LeBron was still in South Beach. Miami shot almost 60 percent in the first half, and finished the game shooting an impressive 48 percent from the field.

From the start, Indiana seemed to be out of sync. 14 first-half turnovers led to a 17-point first-half deficit. C.J. Miles, who led the team in scoring at halftime, was forced to exit with a left groin strain and did not return. And Roy Hibbert found himself in early foul trouble, which led to the Pacers being outscored 26-12 in paint during the first half.

"We were very displeased with how we played in the first half," Vogel said. "I challenged them early on to get a little angry and we did."

Even with the negatives, the Pacers were able to rattle off an 11-0 second-half run, and outscored the Heat 27-21 in the third quarter and 23-14 in the fourth, which

allowed Indiana to winnow the lead to single digits in the final frame.

Looking for a spark on offense, Vogel turned to Donald Sloan to start the fourth quarter. Sloan, who hadn't played all game, came in and delivered instantly, converting an off-balance layup which made the score 66-75.

Also impressive off the bench was Luis Scola, who scored a team-high 14 points on 5-of-8 shooting.

Although the loss extended Indiana's losing streak to seven games, the impressive return of George Hill gave reason for the Pacers to be hopeful for the future. The Hometown Hero has played only five games this season due to various injuries, but in just 20 minutes of action tonight he was 5-of-10 for 13 points, sparking the comeback that was almost able to add one to Indiana's win column.

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
