First Merchants reports record net income

First Merchants Corporation (NASDAQ - FRME) has recorded 2014 record net income of \$60.2 million, an increase of \$18 million over 2013 net income of \$42.2 million. Earnings per share totaled \$1.65, an increase of \$.24 and 17 percent over 2013 earnings per share of \$1.41.

Net income in the 4th quarter of 2014 totaled \$15.3 million compared to \$11.2 million in the 4th quarter of 2013. Earnings per share for the 4th quarter of 2014 increased by 21 percent totaling \$.41, compared to \$.34 per share in the 4th quarter of 2013.

Michael C. Rechin, President and Chief Executive Officer, stated, "Our 4th quarter results capped off a very productive and profitable 2014 for First Merchants. Our goal is to improve operating leverage independent of the interest rate environment. Our 2014 results evidence our commitment to execute on organic growth while adding franchise additive acquisitions. During 2014, we fully incorporated Citizens Financial Bank and its attractive marketplace into our company. In 2015, we expect similar strong results through the integration of Community Bank of Noblesville, having closed the transaction in November 2014. The recent announcing of the agreement to acquire Cooper State Bank in Columbus, Ohio, complements our prior acquisitions in fortifying our best growth markets. Our management is focused on achieving additional prudent growth and our overall 2015 plan." Total assets equaled \$5.8 billion as of year-end and total loans were \$3.9 billion, an increase of \$292 million, or 8 percent over the same period in 2013. Of the increase, \$147 million was the result of organic growth and \$145 million resulted from the acquisition of Community Bank of Noblesville in November of 2014. Total deposits equaled \$4.6 billion as of year-end and increased by \$409 million or 9.7 percent as Community Bank of Noblesville accounted for \$228 million. Borrowings declined by \$111 million during the year and tangible equity increased by \$77 million or 17.6 percent. Tangible book value per share increased by \$1.48, or 12.2 percent, to \$13.65 per share as of year-end 2014 up from \$12.17 as of year-end 2013.

Net-interest income totaled \$187 million in 2014 and net-interest margin totaled 3.91 percent as yields on earning assets totaled 4.35 percent offset by the cost of supporting liabilities which totaled .44 percent. When normalized for fair value accretion income of \$8.9 million in 2014 and \$2.2 million in 2013, net interest margin totaled 3.73 percent in 2014 compared to 3.94 percent in 2013.

Non-interest income totaled \$65.7 million in 2014 compared to \$54.8 million in 2013. Non-interest expense totaled \$168.6 million in 2014 compared to \$143.2 million in 2013. The significant variances in both non-interest income and non-interest expenses are primarily due to the acquisition of Citizens Financial Bank in November of 2013

Provision expense totaled \$2.6 million in 2014 and net charge-offs totaled \$6.5 million. In 2013, provision expense totaled \$6.6 million and net charge-offs totaled \$8.1 million. The December 31, 2014 allowance for loan losses totaled \$64 million and our remaining fair value mark totals \$43.2 million including \$8.8 million related to Community Bank of Noblesville loans.

The December 31, 2013 allowance for loan losses totaled \$67.9 million and our remaining fair value mark totaled \$46.1 million. Non-performing assets declined from \$81.7 million in 2013 to \$70.1 million including the fourth quarter addition of \$12.4 million related to Community Bank of Noblesville.

As of December 31, 2014, the Corporation's total risk-based capital equaled 15.34 percent, Tier 1 common risk-based capital equaled 12.63 percent and tangible common equity ratio totaled 9.16 percent.



After Noblesville unloaded on Kokomo earlier in the week, the Lady Millers returned to The Mill last evening and powered past Pendleton Heights 88-50.

The third game of the week will come in a prime time special, also in The Mill, Saturday evening when Hamilton Southeastern comes calling for a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game. Noblesville already has clinched a share of the conference championship. Southeastern needs a victory to tie the Lady Millers for the crown. In HCC play, Southeastern has lost to Westfield 38-37.

Noblesville will enter the game with an 18-1 overall mark, beaten only by 19-2, No. 4 ranked Homestead. The Millers are ranked No. 6. Southeastern is ranked No. 17 with a 14-5 mark. The Lady Royals are 14-5 after a close loss to Pike earlier in the week.

"Southeastern is a good team," said Keck after watching the explosion against Pendleton Heights last evening. "They gave (No. 12 ranked) Pike a good game."

There's a little sidebar to the Noblesville-Southeastern game on Saturday. Southeastern has defeated Noblesville 17 straight times, 15 during the regular season and two in sectional play. The Millers' last victory over the Royals was a 75-56 verdict in the 2001-02 season.

Keck said she isn't concerned about the HSE game being Noblesville's third this week.

"We've got depth," said the coach. "Our team is built for this situation. We used all 12 players in the Kokomo game and again tonight against Pendleton Heights."

Keck removed her starters from the game one last time with the Millers leading 75-46 and 5:25 remaining in the game.




