Sheriff's office educates on violence

Thursday evening at the 4H grounds, the Hamilton County Sheriff's office took a progressive approach toward educating the public on workplace and school violence that is unfortunately becoming more and more common place in the world we live in.

According to Major Tom Gehlhausen's introduction there are over 600,000 occurrences of violence in the workplace annually and 397 fatal injuries occurred in 2013 that were classified as homicides in the United States.

Speaking to a group of about 50 attendees Sgt. Bill Clifford was the key note speaker for the evening. Sgt. Clifford touched on everything from stalking and bullying to acts of violence in the workplace. Clifford talked about how to identify signs of someone that may have ill intentions and how to react if you find yourself in the middle of a situation that could escalate from bad to worse.

Sgt. Clifford took time to go into detail about what we, as the general public, should expect out of law enforcement officers that respond to these potentially deadly situations. The sheriff's office trains their deputies to first and foremost stop the threat. Deputies will seek out the aggressor or shooter and stop them.

Clifford talked about what to do if you come into contact with a shooter. What if you have no choice but to come into direct contact with someone that is shooting? Find improvised weapons...hammers, baseball bats or anything heavy within reach can become a weapon if your life depends on it.

Along with Sgt. Clifford, Deputy Brad Osswald spoke is a school resource officer (SRO) assigned to Hamilton workplace and school violence. Heights High School. The Sheriff's office has 6 other officers besides Osswald that are assigned either full or part-time to the Heights school system. Noblesville, Carmel, Westfield, Sheridan and Fishers have SRO's assigned to their respective school systems as well.

Brief intermittent stoppages are expected on northbound and southbound US 31 near 191st Street, while police and flaggers help direct traffic around this area.



Two powers meet tonight

Like many high school coaches, Carmel's Scott Heady is looking forward to a little time off and a little more practice time in February. The IHSAA this season has allowed teams to play a 22-game schedule, two more in past years. That has created a couple extra back-to-back weekends.

"This weekend will be 11 games in 29 days," Heady pointed out. "We haven't had much practice time that wasn't just preparation time for the next game. The good thing is we have just five games in February, so we are looking forward to the opportunity for some quality practice time heading to March."

But, February isn't exactly the top priority on Heady's mind this week as Carmel hosts Ben Davis tonight and plays at New Castle on Saturday.

"Ben Davis is obviously a key MIC Conference game," said the Carmel coach. "They are extremely athletic at all positions; have size and strength inside, and play smart and make few mistakes. We must handle their defensive pressure and not give second chance points."

If Carmel wants a piece of the MIC crown, the Greyhounds will need to get a piece of the Giants at the Eric Clark Activity center tonight.

Ben Davis is 5-0 in the MIC and Carmel is 3-1. The team which defeated Carmel, North Central, is 3-1.

Ben Davis will have only one conference game remaining after meeting Carmel, a Feb. 12 home tilt with Lawrence North, which also is 2-1.

Carmel, 13-2 overall, lost to North Central 66-59 back on Dec. 12. The Greyhounds' only other loss was a 36-33 decision to Brownsburg of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference last week.

Ben Davis has defeated North Central 51-50. Lawrence North defeated North Central, 61-57, in a Marion County Tourney


Carmel and New Castle will be playing in the nation's largest high school gym. Heady does not want to see what would be labeled as the state's biggest upset of the season.



Vintage third quarter leads Pacers past Knicks

When they were steamrolling their way to the best record in the Eastern Conference last season, the Pacers owned the third quarter. The Blue & Gold (17-31) got back to their old ways on Thursday night, dominating the first period after halftime en route to a 103-82 win over the New York Knicks (9-38).

Indiana led by five points at the break, but quickly blew the game open in the second half. The Pacers started the half by going to the post early and often. Center Roy Hibbert scored on four of the team's first five possessions and had 10 points barely over four minutes into the period.

"Big Dog was big for us," Pacers forward Solomon Hill said of Hibbert's performance. "We kept giving him the ball and he kept delivering."

But it wasn't just Hibbert who had it going in the third. The entire team was en fuego.

Rodney Stuckey scored seven points in the period, hitting all three of his shots. Solomon Hill buried a pair of triples on back-to-back possessions. As a team, the Blueand-Gold went 5-for-7 from 3-point range and shot a blistering 65.2 percent from the field.

On the other end, the Pacers held the Knicks in check, as New York shot just 21.1 percent from the field. As a

result, Indiana outscored the visitors, 35-12, making a 4-of-5 shooting and collected five rebounds (three of them victory all but inevitable.

"We saw openings and then I got going a little bit and other guys were able to get going," Hibbert said. "The third quarter was a very important turn for us."

Though the Pacers came away with the win, it was the Knicks, winners of four of their last five games, who were firing on all cylinders in the early going. New York scored on eight of their first 11 possessions, shot 61 percent in the first quarter, and led by as many as 11 points.

Perennial All-Star Carmelo Anthony had it going early. Melo scored 12 points in the first quarter on 4-of-7 shooting, making both of his shots from beyond the 3-point arc.

Indiana made 14-of-23 shots in the period (60.9 percent) to take a five-point lead into the break.

Fresh off a 22-point performance on Tuesday, Stuckey picked up where he left off on Thursday, scoring 11 points column. in the first half on 4-of-7 shooting.


