The County Line

This year's primary could have a record field

With less than a week to go before the filing deadline, 72 candidates have declared their intentions to run for municipal office in this year's May 5 primary elections in Hamilton County. It may be a record field before the deadline at noon on February 6.

This week's entries created interesting contests for some offices and possibly greater interest for the voters as races for mayor are now certain in Noblesville, Carmel and Westfield as well as many city council seats.

The most recent candidate to emerge for mayor was Jeff Harpe at Westfield, challenging incumbent Andy

Cook in the GOP primary. Rick Sharp had filed earlier in the week against Jim Brainard in the Carmel mayoral race. And, Mike Corbett will challenge John Ditslear in the Noblesville contest.

In something of a surprise candidacy Westfield-Washington Schools Superintendent Mark Keen entered the race for Westfield City Council, probably the first time a top school official has run for city council. And former County Assessor Debbie Folkerts has filed in the increasingly crowded field for Noblesville council-at-large.

At Carmel, longtime Clerk-Treasurer Diana Cordray will face a challenge from political newcomer Christine Pauley. Rarely has Cordray been opposed. Noblesville Clerk-Treasurer Janet Jaros said she is not running again, and this week Evelyn Lees filed for the city clerk's job.

Only three Democrats have filed for office: one in Fishers, one in Noblesville and one in Cicero. This will insure a November election. If there is no opposition for the general election, the law allows election officials to declare the unopposed candidates elected without actual balloting.

Jan Unger, clerk-treasurer at Cicero, who holds the title of the only elected Democrat in the county, is officially running again. She may be unopposed as she has been before since Republicans seem satisfied with her performance.

With a final rush of candidate filings expected in the days before the deadline, the primary appears certain to hold greater interest than last year's primary when the county set a modern-day record for low voter participation.

\$12 million invested...

County launches new public safety radio system

This week Hamilton County launched a new state of the art public safety radio network that will revolutionize communication for police, fire, EMS personnel. The radio system has been badly needed for several years.

Research began on the project back in the spring of 2013 and was determined that

a P25 architecture based Motorola system was the route that Hamilton County wanted to go. Many reasons for the Motorola system were positive but none more than being compatible with surrounding counties and being able to directly communicate with those agencies.

\$8 million dollars in funds was allocated for the infrastructure and construction

began in October of 2013. An additional \$4 million was used for radio hardware that would equip police cars, fire trucks and utility vehicles.

When asked how the new system would compare to the old, Hamilton County Communications Director Mike Snowden said

Amtrak to continue Hoosier State train through April 1

Amtrak will continue to operate the Hoosier State train between Indianapolis and Chicago under an Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) contract extension through April 1, 2015. A previous extension expires on Jan. 31.

The 60-day service agreement allows extra time to complete long-term contract negotiations for Amtrak to continue operating the Hoosier State with portions of the service being provided by INDOT contractors. INDOT is negotiating renewal of the service on behalf of the state, Beech Grove, Crawfordsville, Indianapolis, Lafayette, Rensselaer, Tippecanoe County and West Lafayette.

The four-days-weekly Hoosier State (Trains 850 & 851) -- together with the three-days-weekly Amtrak Cardinal (Trains 50 & 51) -- provides daily service between Indianapolis and Chicago and enables passengers to reach the national Amtrak network.

“There is no real comparison to the systems in that our current system is based on older technology that is largely proprietary to the Harris Corporation while the new system boasts state of the art technology that is based on the P25 industry standard for radio system architecture. While some features are proprietary to Motorola, the bulk of the system is built under P25. In addition, because we will be working from 8 tower locations instead of the prior systems 4 towers, our coverage area will be much better.”

The coverage area that the new system provides will make the ability to reach units in the field easier, but much more importantly, their ability to reach dispatchers will mean that officers and firefighters will have more reliable coverage.

According to Hamilton County Public Safety Radio Systems Administrator James Miller, “As with any large construction project there will always be minor issues that arise however this project has went as well as could be expected for a project of its size.

When asked how the new system will benefit the public safety dispatchers, Communications Director of Operations Darin Riney said “From the very first transmission on the new Motorola system, the communications officers could hear the difference from what they were used to. Very clear transmissions with high quality voice sounds during both transmit and receive. The system has more capacity and functionality than the previous system, but at the same time, is easier to use. With all public safety, as well as the public service agencies in Hamilton County, being on one countywide radio system is a great positive for all citizens of Hamilton County in that all aspects of those departments can speak to one another as the need arises. Also, with the increased functionality, the communications officers can potentially reduce some phone calls, as they now have a direct connect intercom with some of the surrounding counties and can speak with them directly rather than having to go through the phone systems and following voice prompts to reach the other dispatch center. I believe that with the new system, the dispatcher will rely less on the recording playback systems to hear what was said by field units. With the increased quality, once everyone adapts to the digital clarity of the system, there should be less opportunity for misunderstanding transmissions.

The new radios that offices and firefighters carry have extraordinary safety features built into them. Each radio has an emergency button that can be pushed by the user. The radio then transmits a loud alert tone to emergency dispatchers and the radios have built in GPS to show exactly where the person needing assistance is.

Firefighters have an additional safety feature built into their radios called the “man down” function. If a firefighter’s radio goes from the normal vertical carrying position to horizontal, in just a few seconds the radio first sends a beeping alert signal to the firefighter in case the radio was knocked over by accident. If the firefighter is truly in an emergency situation and doesn’t acknowledge the radio a few seconds later the radio goes into emergency mode and alerts everyone on that channel including emergency dispatchers there is a problem.

Noblesville Fire Department Division Chief Rick Russell said “The Motorola P25 system should provide a reliable, and always available communication system for all our public safety professionals. The system is designed to provide interoperability communication throughout Hamilton, and Marion County. The portable radios were designed with firefighting operations

in mind. The design, and safety features should enhance our communication while working in extreme environments.”

According to various public safety personnel there have always been areas of the county that have been hard for officers and firefighters to communicate in and this system has shown vast improvement in those areas. While no radio network can guarantee 100% coverage so far officials have been very happy with the improved coverage.

Noblesville Police Captain Brad Arnold said “I’m very pleased with it, the improved quality of communication is incredible”. Arnold said all of his officers have been issued their portable radios that they keep on their person. NPD has installed about 25% of the mobile radios in their fleet of squad cars with the rest scheduled to be installed within the next few weeks.

The new Motorola radio system went “live” as of January 27, 28 and 29 in phases, and is now fully functional.

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A word fitly spoken

Every word that parts the lips falls upon a soul, be it your own or that of the hearer. With your words you can turn away wrath or stir up anger (Prov 15:1), you may show yourself wise or prove yourself a fool (Eccl 10:12), and you may “strive about words to no profit, to the ruin of the hearers” (2 Tim 2:14). For this reason it says in Prov 18:20 (NKJV) “A man’s stomach shall be satisfied from the fruit of his mouth, from the produce of his lips he shall be filled”. With each spoken word being heard by the Almighty, we have been warned “.....that for every idle word men may speak, they will give account of it in the day of judgment” Matt 12:36 (NKJV). “The Word of our God stands forever” (Isaiah 40:8) and it appears ours could haunt us throughout eternity even after the vibrations of sound have dissipated into the air if it were not for His grace and mercies anew every morning (Lam 3:22-23).

Over a phone or even recorded the voice that delivers the word conveys character and emotion through the depth of its tone, the amplitude of its pitch, and through the rate at which the words flow from or catch on the tongue. The great literary giants of old could, in print, open our eyes to the soul of the writer while painting pictures in the eye of the mind with a stroke of a pen. Who cannot catch a glimpse of the rose and feel the sadness in Elizabeth Barrett Browning’s “A Dead Rose” when she wrote “ *O Rose! who dares to name thee? No longer roseate now, nor soft, nor sweet; But pale, and hard, and dry, as stubble-wheat,--Kept seven years in a drawer--thy titles shame the*”. And the words that the body declares, these words speak as loudly as the words that part the lips. Our bodies deliver an oratory while the tongue speaks, revealing the truth behind the pronouncement. Without a sound our members can carry on a conversation. The cold embrace whispers a reception of

mere tolerance while the warm kiss of a holy greeting speaks of a virtuous love. The lips say come and join while the shoulder, with ever so slight a turn proclaims the shunning. The eyes with focused intention court a dialogue, yet when cast down with purposeful disinterest reveals your self-pride replete with contempt and resentment. But the word which is “a word fitly spoken is like apples of gold in settings of silver” Prov 25:11 (NKJV). A word in season, wise and well received is a thing of beauty and such a word has a physical presence beyond the utterance of the speech itself. It is more tangible than any word printed by man on a piece of paper. And a word fitly spoken surpasses the monologue of even the most refined body language. A word born out of love, this word is precious. Spoken with pure intent to bring joy, to edify, to comfort and to encourage. A word chosen with unsparing discernment to bring a loving rebuke or understanding counsel. Skillfully prepared this word will teach and preach the Words of our Lord. This word fully lacks the ugliness of pride, slander, and malice. It contains no gossip, it is not pretentious, and in it will be found no deceit.

Whether we are speaking with the lips, the pen or with the body we must choose our words wisely as our words will not fail to achieve an end, whatever that end may be. An unfit word may not be unspoken nor a glance once seen be blind. Therefore I pray “Set a guard, O LORD, over my mouth; Keep watch over the door of my lips” (Psalms 141:3) so I may say “The Lord GOD has given me the tongue of the learned, that I should know how to speak a word in season to him who is weary” (Isaiah 50:4) and so I may remember “Even a fool is counted wise when he holds his peace; When he shuts his lips, he is considered perceptive” (Prov 17:28).

“Finally, brethren, whatever things are true, whatever things are noble, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report, if there is any virtue and if there is anything praiseworthy--meditate on these things” Phil 4:8 (NKJV)

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

Noblesville wins HCC title...

Millers top Royals, 68-57

Noblesville 68, Hamilton Southeastern 57.

Coach Donna Keck said that was only the “first goal” for her Noblesville Lady Millers. With the win over HSE Saturday evening in The Mill Noblesville finished its conference season perfect at 6-0 and won its first Hoosier Crossroads championship since the second year of the conference, 2001-02.

The post-season, Keck explained, is still ahead.

“We wore them down a little with our depth. We made their big-four play 32 minutes,” said Keck.

It was the third game of the week for the Millers.

“We wanted to make this like a sectional week,” said the coach. “We’ll end our regular season with two tough games, playing at (No. 5) Heritage Christian on Tuesday and then hosting (No. 2) Lawrence North on Thursday.”

Heritage Christian beat Lawrence North 53-51 in a Saturday game.

In this week’s poll (there will be a new one released this afternoon), Noblesville was ranked No. 6 and Hamilton Southeastern No. 17. Noblesville’s only loss has been to No. 4 Homestead.

In the contest last evening, Noblesville twice was on the doorstep of blowing out the Royals. The Millers led by 20, 37-17, late in the second quarter. Southeastern came back and trailed 38-24 at halftime. Then, in the third quarter, behind five points from Bre Lloyd, a 3-pointer Megan Watson and a bucket from Olivia Kegley, HSE came roaring back and once got as close as seven, 44-37. Pacers rally falls short, Kings end losing streak

The Sacramento Kings ended Bankers Life Fieldhouse on the second half of a back-to-back and mired in an eight-game losing streak.

They didn't look the part, however, on Saturday night. The Kings (17-29) led by double digits for most of the night and withstood a late rally to hold off the Pacers (17-32), 99-94.

Sacramento seized control midway through the first quarter, reeling off a 19-2 run to take a 30-12 lead. Former Pacers guard Darren Collison scored seven points in that sequence, while dynamic forward Rudy Gay added six. The Pacers, meanwhile, missed seven of eight shots and coughed the ball up six times over a 6:04 stretch.

"We turned the ball over and didn't play well offensively, didn't really settle into the

game," Pacers guard C.J. Miles said. "Even the good looks we got, we didn't shoot the ball well."

The Kings stretched their lead to as many as 23 points in the second quarter, though Indiana did mount a bit of a rally. George Hill scored seven straight points in a 1:02 stretch in the latter half of the quarter to cut the deficit to 13, but that would be the closest the home team would get before the break.

The visitors scored 64 points in the first half, matching the most the Pacers have allowed in the first half this season, shooting 50 percent from the field. Sacramento was a perfect 18-of-18 from the free throw line in the half, while Indiana only attempted five free throws.

"The plan was not to put them to the free throw line," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel said. "They're number one in the league in drawing fouls. We weren't very disciplined

with our hands and our body position and we marched them to the line 18 times."

Indiana mounted another rally in the second half, reeling off a 16-3 run over the end of the third and beginning of the fourth quarters to climb within seven points of the lead. But Sacramento righted the ship, holding the Pacers at bay for the next several minutes.

The Blue & Gold eventually made it a two-possession game when Kings All-Star center DeMarcus Cousins fouled out with 1:46 to play. Roy Hibbert hit two free throws to trim the deficit to six, then C.J. Miles knocked down a pair on the next possession to make the score 93-89 with 1:21 remaining.

To the home crowd's dismay, Gay responded by knocking down a fadeaway jumper over two defenders on the left baseline that was the proverbial dagger.

George Hill did manage to hit a 3-point-er with six seconds remaining that cut the

deficit to three, but Gay calmly knocked down both free throws to seal the victory for the visitors.

The Kings' new triumvirate of Collison, Gay, and Cousins did most of the heavy lifting for the Sacramento offense on Saturday. Gay led the way with 31 points on 10-of-22 shooting. Collison added 23, going 9-for-15 from the field. Cousins was just 6-for-24, but still managed 20 points and 19 rebounds, recording his 28th double-double of the season.

C.J. Miles and David West both had 17 points to lead Indiana. Luis Scola finished with 13 points and five rebounds, while Roy Hibbert added 11 points and seven boards. George Hill tallied 14 points, six rebounds, and four assists in 22:06 off the bench.

Indiana now has three days off before returning to the court against their Central Division rivals, the Detroit Pistons, on Wednesday at 7:00 PM.
