Ten-digit dialing in the 812 area code starts Saturday

Mandatory 10-digit dialing in the 812 area code area will begin on Saturday, in anticipation of the implementation of the new 930 area code.

The mandatory dialing period has been established to help customers prepare for the addition of the 930 area code to southern Indiana, which will take place on March 7. Once mandatory dialing begins, customers will be required to dial the area code, along with the seven-digit phone number, when making calls within the 812 area code, including local calls.

Previously, the IURC delayed the start date for mandatory 10-digit dialing after it became aware of concerns regarding the ability of critical segments of the business community and telecommunications providers to prepare for the switch to mandatory dialing, specifically those serving the medical and law enforcement industry.

In anticipation of the mandatory dialing period, customers are encouraged to begin practicing 10-digit dialing, check with any alarm service providers or providers of other services that use the telephone network to ensure the customer's equipment is capable of using 10-digits, and to update pertinent medical records, business materials, personal contacts, and pet I.D. tags with all 10 digits of their phone numbers.

Purdue participating in USDA's farm start-up effort

A team of Purdue University faculty, staff and Extension educators will lead a for Extension educators, workshops and U.S. Department of Agriculture effort in Indiana aimed at supporting new and beginning farmers and ranchers.

The National Institute of Food and Agriculture initiative - called Infrastructure, Access, Community: A Plan to Support Beginning Farmers in Indiana - is designed to increase the number of farm start-ups in the state and provide direct, practical assistance to anyone who is new to farming.

"We are particularly interested in supporting small farms and military veterans," said Kevin Gibson, one of the team leaders.

"This grant comes at a very critical time for the agriculture industry," Gibson said. "The ag workforce is rapidly aging, and the average age of farmers in this country is now over 58 years. Once these farmers and food? At the same time, consumers are increasingly interested in buying local foods Local Growers Guild, which will arrange opportunities for new and beginning farmers resources for farmers. to help meet this demand."

Plans call for annual training sessions farm tours focusing on effective farming practices, a "one-stop shop" website with a variety of resources for beginning farmers and networking events.

"We will accomplish our goals by improving the infrastructure needed to support beginning farmers, increasing the access beginning farmers have to training and educational materials, and developing a community of educators and experienced farmers who will support beginning farmers and ranchers," said Tamara Benjamin, a research scientist at Purdue and one of the project leaders.

Including funds provided by Purdue, the project will spend nearly \$850,000 over three years to address these goals, she said.

Looking for a job? Positions open at the **U.S.** Postal Service

If you, a family member, a neighbor, or a friend, are seeking a job the U.S. Postal Service has news for you. Go immediately to the USPS Careers site (bottom of page) at www.usps.com, click on Indiana and you will see there are a number of positions open in several ZIP Codes in the Greater Indiana District:

The two categories most required are City Carrier Assistant and Rural Carrier Associate. Because the positions posted change frequently, the Postal Service recommends that those seeking work check each day for jobs posted.

The salary for a city carrier assistant (CCA) is \$15.68 an hour. The employee will be required to work Saturdays and weekdays as needed. May include Sundays and holidays. He/she must be available to work assigned tours, scheduled days and must be available to work on short notice.

A CCA delivers and collects mail on foot or by vehicle under varying road and weather conditions in a prescribed area; maintains professional and effective public relations with customers and others, requiring a general familiarity with postal laws, regulations, products and geography of the area.

The salary for a rural carrier associate (RCA) is \$16.65 an hour. A RCA cases, delivers, and collects mail along a prescribed rural route using either a vehicle provided by the Postal Service or the he/she will be compensated. The employee provides customers on the route with a variety of services.

driver's license, a safe driving record, and at least two years of documented Act may apply for any posted position. driving experience.

ALL applicants must apply online at http://www.usps.com/employment by the close of a job posting period — 11:59 p.m. on the date in question. Paper applications will not be accepted.

Candidates, except for individuals performing active military duty, will need to be present for screening activities, including an interview, in the facility location or vicinity.

A written exam is required — Postal Exam 473. Instructions regarding the exam process will be sent via email once the candidate successfully submits an online application. Qualified applicants must successfully pass a pre-employment drug screening to meet the Postal Service's requirement to be drug free. 


