The story dates back to an article published by the Hamilton County Reporter in October of 2013. At that time, the County Jail was about 120 prisoners under capacity.

All of that has changed because of the passage of House Bill 1006 by the Indiana General Assembly.

convicted law violators.

"The law took the previous four classes of felony violations (class A,B,C.D) and divided the criminal statues into six levels,"

Heirbrandt sad. "A Level 6 felony is the lowest level felon and most persons convicted at this level are minimum or medium classification inmates. The new rules dictates that after June 30, 2014 and before July 1, 2015, a court cannot commit a person convicted of a Level 6 felony to the Department of Corrections (state prisons) if the person's earliest possible release date is less than 91 days from the date of sentencing."

Basically, what that means is that many drug addicts, thieves and those with mental problems will end up, not in state prisons, but at the Hamilton County Jail and at other county jails throughout Indiana.

Those with mental problems likely will be the biggest concern because county jails aren't experienced in handling these cases. Also, addition costs will be handed to counties for medications, etc.





Noblesville falls to Brownsburg...

Bulldogs' defense frustrates Millers

Brownsburg's boys basketball team is only giving up 46.7 points per game this

Noblesville got an up close look at that defense Friday night, when the Bulldogs came to the Mill. It was a tight game for the first half, but Brownsburg broke away in the fourth quarter, and eventually beat the Millers 56-46. The loss dropped Noblesville to 10-8 on the season, and 1-5 in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference.

' They're a good defensive team," said Miller coach Brian McCauley. He said that Brownsburg coach Steve Lynch "does a great job getting those guys to be physical," and noted that the Bulldogs were solid ath-

Brownsburg's defense proved to be troublesome for Noblesville outside the 3point line, as the Millers were held to just 1-of-10 from beyond the arc. Sean Wilson made Noblesville's lone '3' with around three minutes left in the first half.

"So credit their defense for really making us uncomfortable in the perimeter," said McCauley.

The Millers are giving up only 49.7 points per game, so a defensive battle was expected. And that's what everyone got in the first quarter, which ended with Brownsburg ahead 9-7. Senior Joev Brewer scored five of those points, all from free throws.

"He was engaged tonight," said McCauley of Brewer. "One possession we had three offensive rebounds, Brewer was a part of that. I thought that he was strong in the post, we hadn't seen that in a while. And I thought he did a great job of being physical. Got to the free throw line. Ends up with seven rebounds. He had a quality game."

Noblesville started the second quarter well, with Joey Herron making a layin and Wilson draining a pair of foul shots to get the Millers ahead 11-9. But the Bulldogs scored six unanswered points after that to take the lead for good.

Darrian Ringo made a jumper to tie the game, then later scored on an easy layin. Seconds after Ringo's basket, Brownsburg made a quick steal, and Jordache Mavunga got the ball in. Just like that, a tie game turned into a four-point lead. The Bulldogs steadily extended their advantage to 24-18 at the half.

"We had eight turnovers in the first half, they had 10 points off of those turnovers," said McCauley. "A lot of it was their defense, but our offense isn't where it needs to be and we were exposed with that tonight."

Still, Noblesville kept it close in the third. John Kiser scored four points in that quarter, then Brewer brought the Millers to within two a couple times with layins. Then with 14.8 seconds left in the period, Brewer's 3-point play moved Noblesville to within 32-29.

But Brownsburg's Michael Fowlkes erased that with a 3-pointer in the last seconds of the quarter, and the Bulldogs opened the fourth ahead 35-29. Kiser hit a couple baskets to keep Noblesville within

That would be as close as the Millers would get. A 9-0 run gave the Bulldogs a 46-33 lead midway through the period. Noblesville fought until the end, getting to within seven a couple times, but the Bulldogs sealed the win with 8-of-13 free throws in the final two minutes.

Kiser scored 16 points in the fourth quarter, giving him 20 for the night - all in Rebounds: Noblesville (17) Brewer 7, Herron 4, the second half. Brewer had an exceptional game, scoring 13 points and grabbing seven rebounds.





With just over a minute remaining in the game and trailing by two, George Hill stepped around a screen and was fouled by Cavaliers guard Kyrie Irving. Realizing he had been fouled, Hill jumped backwards and launched a one-handed 3-point attempt with Irving draped on his left arm.

As the ball passed through the net with an accompanying whistle for Irving's foul, Pacers fans roared out of their seats, as the bucket gave Indiana a four-point play, the lead, and the final bit of magic they needed to pull out the 103-99 win over the red-hot

"I've been having him work on that before practice," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel joked after the game.

Just as the fourth got underway, Solomon Hill, who had been silent on the offensive end while trying to guard James (25 pts, 6 reb, 5 ast), sent the sold-out crowd into a frenzy with a huge slam. He followed up the dunk with an acrobatic and-1 layup that went in from high off the glass. Initially it was ruled an offensive foul but was then overturned by another official. The crowd at Bankers Life Fieldhouse roared in ap-

"Coach put the ball in my hand for a play, and I just tried to be as aggressive as possible," Hill explained of his explosive fourth quarter. "You gotta make them account for you. If you don't make them account for you, it's kind of like five-on-four

out there." Solomon Hill, who poured in nine points in the fourth quarter alone, continued to pace Indiana along with the sharpshooting C.J. Miles, who dropped in a team-high

But in the wake of Solomon Hill's acrobatic shot, James took the Cavs on a oneman 6-0 run, making three consecutive shots and putting Cleveland up nine. At that point, things were looking grim for Indiana, but the Pacers responded with a 12-2 run of their own to seize the lead from the Cavs.

Following a Timofey Mozgov layup, Cleveland wrested the advantage back once again. It was then that Miles found himself open in the corner with two minutes remaining. The Pacers were trailing 89-88, but Miles connected on a 3-point jumper that sent the crowd at the Fieldhouse into bedlam.

After a cool-handed 3-pointer from Iman Shumpert in response, George Hill, who finished the night with 20 points and seven assists, executed his 10-on-the-difficulty-scale, four-point play. The game-deciding basket that gave the Pacers their final lead of the night; leading to what was, without question, their biggest win of the 2014-15 season.

"I think we have a chance now where we are playing a lot of home games," Solomon Hill told reporters after the win. "We have to stay with it. keep getting guys back (from injury): Lavoy Allen, Ian Mahinmi; when we get those guys back. If we just keep playing together, I think we can get back to the playoffs."

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
