Tipton and Sheridan figure to be the favorites at Taylor. Tipton is 11-11 and edged Sheridan 54-53 in mid-January.



open to us a door for the mystery of Christ, on account of which I am in prison, that I may make it clear, which is how I ought to speak" (Col 4:3-4). Paul arrested and under guard, speaks of a mystery unknown until revealed in Jesus,

the Son of God. The mystery, God's plan & purpose for the salvation of His fallen creation, now made known to the saints (Col 1:26-27, Rom 16:25-26). A revelation of divine truth, this is the gospel message the proclamation of Jesus! It doesn't take eloquent words or a masterpiece of composition with precision oratorical delivery. Just a simple, clear message, Jesus Saves. Plainly put, "if you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes unto righteousness, and with there is such as He. the mouth confession is made unto salvation" (Rom 10:9-10).

Fully God and fully man, He left the throne of heaven to be born of the virgin. Without sin and with his own blood He redeemed our sinking souls because it took blood to make the atonement, "For the life of the flesh is in the blood, and I have given it to you upon the altar to make atonement for your souls" (Lev 17:11). "With the precious blood of Christ, as of a lamb without blemish and without spot, He indeed was foreordained before the foundation of the world" (1 Peter 1:19-20) to bring salvation. 



The Greyhounds swept all 11 swimming events, finishing 1-2-3 in the eight individual races, and qualified all 27 of their swims under the state cut time. That means Carmel will have all of their swims at next Friday's state preliminaries at the IUPUI Natatorium, and the 'Hounds are halfway home to a national-record tying 29th consecutive state championship.

Carmel finished with 567 points, accumulating all 544 of the possible swimming points. They also added 23 from diving. The host Millers, meanwhile, finished second and qualified two swims under the cut time, plus got a diver out to regionals.

Westfield was third, with Emily Verbrugge getting two cut times. Hamilton Heights' sophomore sensation Brooke Schultz set a new record in winning the diving event, and Guerin Catholic, which is still developing its program, improved its score greatly over last year.

For Carmel, the state cut is the goal in every event, since it guarantees a place at state regardless of the sectional place.

"Anytime you can put that many girls in the (state) meet, it's a good sign," said Greyhounds coach Chris Plumb. "Some people who've never been there got through some nerves to get there, and they handled themselves well today."

The 'Hounds are taking their state journey one step at a time, with the sectionals the first half of the overall meet.

"We're at halftime, and it's been a good first half, but you got to finish the game," said Plumb.

Carmel set six new sectional records, with Amy Bilquist getting three of them. The senior commit to California won the 50 and 100 freestyles, this after teaming with Sammie Burchill, Alex Clarke and Veronica Burchill to win the medley relay at the start of the meet.

Veronica Burchill took the butterfly blue medal in a new record time, while Claire Adams set a new mark in winning the backstroke. The meet ended where it began, with the Greyhounds setting a new record in a relay. This time it was the 400 freestyle relay, with Katy Schlies, Kendall Smith, Emma Nordin and Trude Rothrock finishing first.

Adams also won the 200 free, with Veronica's sister Sammie Burchill taking first in the individual medley. Nordin won the 500 free and Alex Clarke was first in the breaststroke. The 200 free relay team of Veronica Burchill, Kathleen Dougherty, Nordin and Rothrock also were winners.

Meanwhile, the Millers had two state cut performances from two of its butterfly swimmers. Kate Holtkamp was fourth and Alexa Akers placed fifth, but both were comfortable under the state cut time. Two of Noblesville's relays were second: Alyssa Conley, Julie Kaess, Lydia Conner and Emily Christophersen in the 200 free relay and Conley, Kaess, Taylor Parrish and Christophersen in the 400 free relay.

And don't forget about diving.

Dayana Popa finished second in that event, sending her on to the Fishers regional, which takes place Tuesday.






