She was preceded in death by her paternal grandfather, Richard H.Fosnight and maternal grandfather, Mark Thistlethwaite.



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

Westfield Police offer Craigslist safety tips

Internet services such as Craigslist are an increasingly quick and convenient way to buy and sell items. However, we often hear stories of people who have been victimized after setting up a sale through the website. The item being sold could be fake or broken, the cash being used could be counterfeit, or the check written could be bogus. There have been real estate scams offering fictional rentals, foreign scams offering more than your selling price, fake job scams, and fake ticket scams. Assaults, robberies, and murders have also occurred during these transactions.

The Westfield Police Department urges its residents to be cautious when buying and selling on Craigslist. Trust your instincts and always meet in a public place. One option is to utilize our lobby in the Public Safety Building located at 17535 Dartown Rd. The lobby is open during business hours, Monday – Friday 7:30 am – 4:00 pm.

If you do become a victim of a crime, report it to the police immediately via 911 or dispatch at 317-773-1300. Also, report all suspected fraudulent Craigslist ads by flagging the post as prohibited or at craigslist.org/contact.

With this in mind, the Westfield Police Department would like to offer the following safety tips and reminders to help avoid scams and protect yourself when using Craigslist. Some of these are directly from "Craigslist Best Practices" offCraigslist.com.

- •Always deal locally with the person so you can meet them in person.
- •Many scams begin with a "seller," "landlord," or "employer" who is based out of state or out of the country and is unable to deal with you directly.
- •Never rent housing without seeing it first; never purchase expensive items sight-unseen.
- •Never submit to a credit check or background check for a job or house listed on Craigslist until you have met the interviewer or landlord in person.
- •Avoid jobs that ask you to send them money. This is always a scam.
- •Never give out your financial information (PayPal, bank account, etc.) or social security number.
- •Never wire funds via Western Union, Money Gram or any other wire service.
- •Know that fake cashier's checks and money orders are common. Banks will cash them and then hold you responsible

- •Never accept one that is for more money and then give back "change"! This is a common scam!
- •Craigslist does not provide "buyer protection" or "seller certification."
- •Only a scammer will "guarantee" your transaction.
- •Be especially careful buying/selling high-value items.
- •Do your research!
- •Know about the item or vehicle you're buying, how to tell if it is fake, or if it's priced correctly.
- •Check whether the pictures included are downloaded from the Internet. Copy the link to the image and search it in Google
- •Make sure the landlord really owns the house. If it's an apartment or condo, you can call the related association or property management company. If it's a home, you can search property records for the area.
- •If you are buying tickets, know what your ticket should look like. Ask for proof
- •If you're buying tickets through the mail, don't pay the entire amount up front. Offer to pay half up front, half when received. Put everything in writing, including the seller's information. Ask that the tickets are sent with a tracking number. •Avoid deals involving shipping or escrow services. Many scammers will use a spoof email that mimics a legitimate site and escrow account but is really fake.
- •If you are buying a high-priced item where an escrow service is suggested, pick it yourself. Never allow the seller to pick and never do business with a company you've never heard of.
- •Be certain you are on the authentic Craigslist site. Spoof sites have been created that look exactly like Craigslist but are only designed to take your money. website The official http://www.craigslist.org/; anything other than that is not real.
- •Insist on a public meeting place, like a restaurant or the Public Safety Building.
- •Do not meet in a secluded place, or invite strangers into your home. If you must meet at your residence, do not let them inside and do not be alone to meet them invite a friend, relative, or neighbor over to assist.
- •Tell a friend or family member where you're going to meet someone you contacted through Craigslist and take someone with you – Never meet them alone!
- •Take your cell phone along with you.

Action must be taken to stop human trafficking

Dear Friends,

Human trafficking is a \$31 billion dollar industry that spans the globe. In the United States, approximately 17,500 people are victims of human trafficking each year and this problem continues to grow at an alarming rate. The majority of these victims are girls between the ages of 12 and 14.

It's time to do something. It's time to take decisive action.

That's why the House recently passed a package of 12 bills to eradicate this form of modern-day slavery. The victims of these crimes need our help. The perpetrators of these heinous acts must be brought to justice.

I was proud to vote for all of these bills, including:

House Resolution 181 – the Justice for Victims of Trafficking Act: This legislation increases and streamlines law enforcement resources dedicated to fighting human trafficking. It makes it easier for law enforcement officials to obtain the vital wire tap warrants they need to stop organized crime networks and rescue victims.

House Resolution 285 – the Stop Advertising Victims of Exploitation (SAVE) Act: The SAVE Act criminalizes those who knowingly advertise the commercial exploitation of children and trafficking victims.

House Resolution 159 – the Stop Exploitation through Trafficking Act: This bill provides incentives for states to adopt safe harbor laws that treat trafficked children as victims, rather than criminals or delinquents. Victims need support, not judgment.

Human trafficking is a crime that knows no geographic or socio-economic boundaries. I know this firsthand from my time as a U.S. Attorney where I was involved in the creation of IPATH: the Indiana Protection of Abused and Trafficked Humans. Trafficking is in our urban, suburban and rural communities – including Indiana's 5th District – and it must be stopped. As your member of Congress, I am committed to ensuring seamless coordination between local, state and federal officials to bring an end to this unacceptable crime. We must stand up for victims who've had their voices taken away.

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Young 'Hawks has arrived

Back in mid-January even many loyal Sheridan basketball fans were beginning to think that this young Blackhawk team was a year away.

Sheridan had won 13 of 15 games, but then the Blackhawks hit a lull in their schedule, losing four straight, including a 54-53 loss to a Tipton team which many were predicting as the favorite in the Taylor Sectional.

But, just as suddenly as the losing string had come, Coach Jeff Guenther again turned things around. Sheridan won its final three regular season games and then blew through the sectional with wins over Taylor 47-28, Tipton 60-44 and Elwood 67-52.

After winning their first sectional ever, the Blackhawks now are ready for a very tough Class 2A regional at Lapel.

It will be Shenandoah (22-3) going against Wabash (22-3) in the 10 a.m. opener and then Sheridan (20-6) meeting Fountain Central (20-3) in the second game. Championship game action is set for 8 p.m.

Sheridan will begin by facing one of the best defensive teams in the state. Fountain Central's 33.65 average is 8th best in Indiana.

Actually, stats would indicate that this regional will be defensive-minded. Sheridan is allowing just 39.2 points a game; Shenandoah 38.2 and Wabash 39.9.

Sheridan is the highest scoring team at 59.7, followed by Shenandoah at 54.2, Fountain Central 52.5 and Wabash 51.3.

"Fountain Central is an excellent basketball team," said Sheridan coach Jeff Guenther. "They rely heavily on their post play with two big forwards."

Fountain Central's leading scorer is 6-0 sophomore Megan Williams at 17.5 points a game. She also is rebounding 13.2 boards a contest.

Williams has great hands and Fountain Central does a really good job of delivering the ball high. She is an excellent athlete and does a good job of going up and getting the ball. We will need to limit her touches and block out well."

The only other Fountain Central player averaging in double figures is 5-10 sophomore Maggie Fishero at 10 points a

Fountain Central's only losses have been to Class 4A McCutcheon, 48-45; Class 4A Lafayette Jeff, 54-49 in double overtime and to Class 2A Seeger, 34-33.

The loss to Seeger was the Mustangs' last game of the regular season. In the sectional, Fountain Central defeated Seeger 39-23 and then rolled over Clinton Central 72-22 and Riverton Parke 43-32 for the championship.

"Wabash and Shenandoah have both had outstanding years," Guenther looked at the overall regional.

"Wabash has excellent guard play. Shenandoah came through a brutal sectional. They have an excellent post player, as well."

Shenandoah has lost only to Frankton 65-50, Lapel 62-58 and Yorktown 42-38. The Raiders beat Lapel 58-49 and Frankton 62-60 in the sectional after opening with a 61-36 romp over Wapahani.

Shenandoah is a big team and is led in scoring by 5-11 sophomore Rachel Rathwohl at 18.4. She is the only Raider averaging in double figures.

Wabash's three losses have been to 1A Culver 48-39, 3A Tippecanoe Valley 60-48 and 3A Rochester 49-44.

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





A look at the state finals

It's the weekend when the sound of 106 POUNDS bouncing Indiana Pacer basketballs is replaced by the sound of people hitting the mat - either a wrestler on a takedown, or a referee signaling a pin.

That's right - it's state finals time! The

224 state qualifiers - 16 wrestlers each in 14 weight classes - will march into Bankers Life Fieldhouse Friday night for what will be a rollicking two days of wrestling. Even an overtime Pacers game can't compare to the tension and drama of the IHSAA wrestling state finals.

Ten of those wrestlers are from Hamilton County. Hamilton Southeastern qualified the most with six, while Fishers will have two competing at state. Westfield and Carmel will have one wrestler each on the mat

Of course, there are good wrestlers everywhere, and it doesn't matter where one winds up in the draw - a wrestler must be prepared.

Take the 106-pound division, for example. Hamilton Southeastern's Klayton Anderson is ranked second in the state. He gets eighth-ranked Christian Hunt in his firstround match. Who could be awaiting the winner? The top-ranked wrestler, Colton Cummings of Lowell.

Wrestlers must win their match tonight to advance to Saturday's top eight. Those who make it to Saturday are guaranteed to wrestle three more matches and will receive at least a top eight place in the state in their weight class.
